## Voters return to polls this Saturday

Eligible Texas voters will return to the polls on Saturday, June 7, to cast their ballots in the Second Primary Election (Run-off Election) for both the Democratic and Republican parties.

The main voter interest in Coke County will be directed toward the only county race on the Democratic ballot, the electing of a county treasurer. Phelan Wrinkle of Robert Lee and Bobbie Arrott of Bronte are vying for the office which will be vacated by treasurer Jerry Thomason who will retire at the end of her present term. In the **Democratic Primary on May** 3, Arrott garnered 526 votes, while Wrinkle gained 345 votes and another candidate, Jackie Walker, also of Robert Lee, drew 233 votes.

Several state races will also appear on both the Democratic and Republican ballots.

Absentee balloting for the upcoming election ended Tuesday, June 3. Coke County Clerk Ettie Hubbard reported Wednesday morning that a total of 60 Democrats voted in the office and 52 others were mailed out. One Republican vote was cast in the office.

Polling places for the Democratic voting will be slightly different than in the Primary election on May 3. For the run-off election only, Mrs. Patti Ivey, county chairman, reported Robert Lee's voting precincts 1 and 3 will be combined to vote at the courthouse while Bronte's precincts 2 and 5 will cast their ballots together at the city hall. ### **Rains bring smiles**

Big rains have put a smile on every face in the area. Official measurements in the city of Robert Lee since last Thursday tallied 5.34 inches but downpours to the north and south have accounted for 8 to 10 inches.

Bronte weather-watchers continue to report ample rainfall amounts as the rains keep coming. Starting last Thursday evening throughout Friday morning gauges registered 3.8 within the city. The overnight rains really saturated the arid ground and smaller showers fell Saturday, Sunday and Monday bringing the total to more than 5 inches. West of town at L.W. Duncan's Hayrick Ranch, a weekend total of 4.9 inches was reported. Eight miles east of town, Don Edmiaston gauged an even 5 inches at his place.

Stock tanks are full and pastures are beginning to hair over. Although cotton planting and wheat harvest

has been delayed, the rain without wind or hail damage, has benefited most folks

When contacted Wednesday, the W.T.U. Power Plant at Oak Creek Lake had a measurement of over 9 inches. The lake had received approximately 6 ft. of water and is still about 51/2 ft. below the spillway.

Mike Ross stated Monday that Lake Spence had already gained about 2 feet of water and the river was running before Monday night's good soaker.

Mountain Creek Lake, Robert Lee's city water supply, filled the first big rain (3.3) before the weekend. Run-off also closed Highway 158 for a short time from Robert Lee to Sterling City when Pecan Creek overran its banks.

More rain is in the forecast for the latter part of the week, but at press time the sun was shining!

#### **Boone clears seven** teet

**Bobby Boone returned** May 25 from the NAIA National Championship Track and Field Meet held in Russellville, Arkansas, on May 22, 23, and 24th. Bobby went into the National Meet tied for 4th with his jump of 7 feet at the McMurry College Meet, held in Abilene in April, where he set a new school record for Lubbock Christian College of 7 feet with the old record being 6 feet 10 inches. Out of the top 20 NAIA highjumpers, Bobby was the only Freshman. The NAIA includes colleges from California to Florida and Canada to Texas. He competed on the 24th and Bobby stated the weather was rainy and very humid. There were 26 highjumpers competing, starting at an opening height of 6 feet 9 inches with only 7 clearing opening height. The bar was

### **Memorial Day Barbecue** surpasses previous years

The ever popular Memorial Day barbecue put on by the Bronte Volunteer Fire Dept. was termed a big success, probably surpassing previous years' outcomes.

The affair attracted a large number of people and helped sweeten the pot for the new firetruck fund. A projected total in excess of \$2000 after expenses was raised and firemen's hopes were also raised as they apply the proceeds toward their goal. The department has been building the fund by monies received from donations, memorials and the annual barbecues and has now reached a balance of around \$29,000 as they push toward a tentative figure of \$55,000. The organization set a five year period to accomplish their goal to buy a new firetruck and feel that they are on schedule or slightly ahead at the end of their third year of fund-raising. A breakdown of funds other than the barbecue showed gate receipts from the Mule Days brought in \$264 to the VFD, and the Mule Days concession stand which was manned by members of the ECC Ambulance Service for the VFD collected an additional \$271.

A thoughtful gift from an appreciative lady helped to add \$100 to the fund. Mrs. Leotha Wrinkle donated a cake which was auctioned off at the barbecue by Ed Cumbie, and it created quite a lot of good natured rivalry among bidders. A group called the "Mule Skinners' vied with bank officers for the goody before being outbidded. Mrs. Wrinkle had donated the cake to show her appreciation of the fire department's service when she had a fire at her home a while back. A spokesman for the fire department reported about 450 plates were served to the appreciative crowd from the 600 pounds of brisket, 150 pounds of sausage, 75 chickens and gallons of trimmings prepared by the firemen. He also expressed pleasure at the generosity of those donating goods and services and the overall spirit of cooperation of the community.

### FmHA to 'assist'

The Farmers Home Administration office in San Angelo which serves Irion, Sterling, Coke, Reagan and Tom Green Counties will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist", Wyatt B. Nesbit, County Supervisor, announced today.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County Supervisors for FmHA will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Nesbit. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a committment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by commiting to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent."

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done beforehand by FmHA.

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHA guaranteed loan should contact the FmHA county office.



Dear Mr. Spain:

Thank you for printing my letter concerning the report of the Republican County Convention. I didn't blame you for what happened and appreciate your trying to correct the mistake, but there is still one point which needs to be cleared up. You said in your reply that the misconception originated within the party. It originated with one person in the party and ended up sounding like the whole party did something it didn't do. The person responsible was not the secretary or reporter of the meeting and was not authorized by anyone in the party to submit a report to the paper. Had this person told me of their intent, I would have gladly supplied a copy of the minutes and tried to make sure all the information was correct. It would have saved you and me both a lot of trouble.

You weren't to blame for someone coming in and giving you incorrect information, but it is my understanding that it is the responsibility of a free press to verify information, especially that which might be controversial (if you received a report that the Party had resolved to stand on their heads in the courthouse, wouldn't you have verified it before printing it?) It has been unfortunate that one person's mistake has had such far-reaching consequences.

#### Editor's Reply

Dear Mr. Pentecost: You are absolutely right! A newspaper is responsible for determining the facts before they are published. Therefore, in the future, before we run the story about Aunt Lil's visit with her Aunt Hattie in Houston. we will have to call Aunt Hattie to confirm that Aunt Lil did indeed visit with her on the dates indicated. Additionally, concerning your saddle repair classified ad, before it can be run again in the newspaper, a representative of the newspaper will visit your establishment and verify that you do indeed do saddle repairs. If all this sounds silly, it is. There are no newspapers who operate in such a manner, and The Observer/-Enterprise is no exception. We depend on Aunt Lil to be truthful when she tells us she visited Aunt Hattie, and we also depend on you to be honest with your saddle repair business, and we have never had a problem with anyone in this respect.

Concerning the original article, we had no reason to doubt its validity. Most of the Republican attitudes toward the 'no pass, no play' concept, have been along the order of a grudging support for the concept, and radical opposition to other issues associated with the reforms, such as the six week suspension, and teacher competency testing.

So, what we end up with here is a very small reporting error by a member of your group, which has mushroomed into an attack on our competency here at the newspaper. That is not to say that we don't make mistakes. When you deal with approximately 40,000 words per week, if you have an error percentage of only one percent, that ends up being 400 mistakes per week. I think our percentage is much, much lower than that, thanks mainly to some very dedicated employees, who you accuse in a round-about way of not getting their facts straight.

The bottom line is this. I have no intention of responding to this matter again. If you have a problem with a member of your party, fix it. Blaming someone else is not part of the solution.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third members is appointed by FmHA. The Coke County committee assists the FmHA county office in reviewing applications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matters.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Nesbit.

For this first election only, two members will be elected at the same time. One will serve a one year term of office and the other will serve two years.
