Large absentee group casts ballots

Over 25% of the registered Coke County voters turned out to cast ballots in the Democratic Runoff Election last Saturday. An unusual number of absentee ballots (106) were voted which normally projects a large voter turnout also.

Following the official canvassing of the votes on Tuesday, Phelan Wrinkle was declared the winner of

the runoff election for Coke County Treasurer with 413 votes over candidate Bobbie Arrott who garnered 332 votes. All of the winners in the county races in the Democratic Primary and the (Runoff) Second Primary will appear on the General Election ballot in November. There are no Republican nominees for county offices. Elected county officials will take office January 1, 1987.

Bullock confirms spread of sliding economy

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said a downward slide in sales tax collections last month confirmed that the energy collapse has spread to other sectors of the Texas economy.

Bullock said there was a 4.4 percent falloff in sales tax collections in May compared to the same month a year ago.

"The downturn in oil has finally set in motion a wave that's soaking the rest of the Texas economy," Bullock said.

He said collections in May this year amounted to \$438.4 million compared to \$458.7 million for the same month last year.

Bullock said the \$20.3 million drop was due to declines in retail sales, services, and construction and oil and gas.

Last month, he said, taxes attributable to retail sales were up 10.9 percent while May's collections showed a 10.7 percent decline.

Taxes from services were down 12.7 percent in May, reversing a 15.5 percent gain in April.

Taxes from oil and gas were off by about 40 percent and construction was down about 18.5 percent.

He said last month's sales tax collections were the first time this year that the monthly income has fallen below the same month of the previous



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Lightning safety tips listed

Lightning is deadly and annually kills more Americans than tornadoes and more than hurricanes and floods combined.

However, since lightning usually kills only one person at a time, lightning deaths do not attract as much attention as other weatherrelated fatalities.

"Lightning is particularly common with spring and summer thunderstorms in Texas, so individuals should take certain precautions during stormy weather," advises Dr. Gary Nelson, a safety engineer with the **Texas Agricultural extension** Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Quick thinking combined with common sense can go a long way in preventing lightning fatalities when thunderstorms are on the prowl, Nelson emphasizes.

He lists some "dos" and "don'ts" regarding lightning safety:

Outdoors:

-- Do seek protection immediately. Safe places in-

-- Don't touch any metal fences, wire, clotheslines or pipes. In a car, keep your hands off any metal or the radio.

-- Do get off your bicycle, golf cart, horse, tractor or motorcycle.

-- Don't take cover under lone trees, taller trees in groves or in unprotected shelters such as those on a golf course or camp ground.

-- Do head for a cave or under a cliff is you're hiking in mountains or other hilly

-- Don't huddle in groups; spread out a few feet from one another.

-- Do head for a low spot -lower than ground level -such as a ravine, gully or ditch, but not one that's filling with water.

-- Don't remain near railroad tracks.

-- Do get off beaches, piers or docks and get away from pools, oceans and lakes.

-- Don't swim, wade or go boating; head for land at the first signs of a thunderstorm.

-- Do seek shelter in a clump of head-high trees or a thicket of small ones if you're stuck in a forested area.

-- Don't stand in open spaces, since most lightning fatalities are people who are taller than their surroundings-- a golfer in the middle of a fairway, a farmer in a field, a rider in open country.

-- Do immediately set down golf clubs, tennis rackets, fishing poles and other metal objects that can act as lightning rods.

Indoors:

-- Do get away from appliances and metal fixtures such as refrigerators, ranges, sinks, bathtubs, air conditioners, washing machines, clothes dryers and telelvision sets.

- Don't use the telephone except in an emergency.



One of the most intriguing stories I heard in Florida was about a young man who, in 1934, bummed his way 2,000 miles from Minnesota to see Ernest Hemingway at his home in Key West, that tiny coral island 100 miles from the mainland and the southernmost city in the continental United States.

Some old-timers faintly remember the handsome, enthusiastic young man who, for a short year, was a resident of Key West and often was seen at Hemingway's side. His name was Arnold Samuelson, and he later was to spend a great deal of his life in Texas. He was 22 when he went to see Hemingway.

He was a would-be writer and greatly taken by a Hemingway short story, One Trip Across, which later developed into the nov of To Have and Have Not. He arrived in Key West with the clothes on his back, a partial loaf of bread and spent the night in jail so he'd have a roof over his head. But he marched right up to Hemingway's house -- still standing on Whitehead and in good repair as a museum -- and the famous author answered the door.

Samuelson said he only wanted to talk. Hemingway was nice and invited him back the next day. The author took a liking to Samuelson and gave him a job for \$1 a day to take care of his boat, the Pilar. This also furnished him a place to sleep, and soon Hemingway was taking him as a crewman on fishing trips in the Gulf Stream and to Cuba. During this time Hemingway also would lecture him on writing and sometimes life. I'd always wondered who was the person Hemingway called "Maestro" in stories and some of his books. This was Samuelson, and the nickname often was shortened to "Mice"

LURE OF THE OPEN ROAD

It was difficult to find out
much about Samuelson, and



then I located a book that had been published under his name called With Hemingway -- A Year in Key West and Florida. Samuelson never knew the book would be published. After he died in 1981 his daughter, Diane Darby, was going through his belongings and found the manuscript. She, along with Samuelson's son, Eric Samuelson, published it.

In the last two years Hemingway books have been legion. Among them are a book of Hemingway's quotes on writing: The Hemingway Women; Young Hemingway; Hemingway in Cuba; Along with Youth -- Hemingway, the Early Years; Ernest Hemingway and his World, an updated version of A.E. Hotchner's Papa Hemingway; and two of the author's manuscripts as novels, The **Dangerous Summer and The** Garden of Eden. I fully expect to see a book called something like I Never Knew nor Went Fishing with Hem-

The Samuelson book was interesting, then became slow and repetitious, but left me very curious about the man who wrote it. He obviously was bitten early and suffered from lifelong wanderlust, and his daughter wrote some things about him that made me ever more

interested.

He was certainly an individualist, caring nothing about appearances. He studied journalism at the University of Wisconsin but never received a diploma because he wouldn't send the school the necessary \$5 to get one. He worked for a while for the Minneapolis Tribune but left because he could not control the urge to move on. In the Depression in 1932, he just took off around the country, hitchhiking, walking and riding the rails. He wrote about his experiences and the dark side of life in a series of articles he sent The Tribune. He stopped for a while in Northern California and lived in a cabin that had no conveniences and read, among other things the Hemingway story. We went back to Minnesota and then to Key West to meet his

Hemingway's guidance

Hemingway made suggestions and lent him books to read and guided him through a story on Gulf Steam fishing, which he sold to Outdoor Life magazine. After leaving Key West he sold a couple of other stories to Esquire magazine but that was about it for his writing career.

He married and, for a honeymoon, took his wife around the country on a

motorcycle. He found jobs working with horses, breaking and training them and in construction. In 1945, he moved to Robert Lee, the small West Central Texas hamlet on the Colorado River.

I've always been very interested in Hemingway

and loved Key West but cannot get my mind off Arnold Samuelson. Perhaps there was something in him with which I identify. I wanted to know more about him, understand him better and found myself wishing somebody had written a book about Arnold Samuelson for a change.





Center celebrates birthday

The Edna Gladney Center in Fort Worth kicked off its 100th year birthday party with a Rodeo Weekend June 6, 7, and 8.

The Edna Gladney Center provides maternity and adoption services to young women from across the country who are experiencing an unexpected pregnancy. The landscaped campus covers a city block, and the extensive services provided by The Center include residential care, a complete medical program (Gladney is the only maternity agency in the country with its own hospital), counseling services, educational and enrichment opportunities as well as licensed adoption services. Gladney operates a 24 hour maternity services hotline, 1-800-772-2740 in Texas, 1-800-433-2922 nationwide.

Gladney traces its roots to 1887 when the Reverend I.Z.T. Morris helped find homes for youngsters arriving in Fort Worth from the East on "orphan trains". His Texas Children's Home and Aid

Society was chartered by the state in 1904. After the Reverend Morris retired in 1925, the agency's director, Edna Gladney, was appointed superintendent. As times changed, the focus of the agency turned to unwed, pregnant young women. Mrs. Gladney received national attention in her fight to have the word "illegitimate" deleted from birth certificates. Mrs. Ruby Lee Piester succeeded Mrs. Gladney, and under her direction The Home expanded its services and increased its residential capacity from 34 to 174. Her successor, Eleanor Tuck, brought 20 years of services at Gladney to her appointment as Executive Director. Mrs. Tuck directs a staff of over 100 employees, and initiated participation in the Korean International Adoption program and the Texas Voluntary Adoption Registry. The agency changed its name to The Edna Gladney Center in January of 1986, to more adequately describe the wide range of services offered.



Tomato problems noted

Tomatoes are the Number One garden vegetable in Texas, but they also cause a lot of headaches for gardeners. Some of the common tomato problems, along with their causes and cures are:

- Young plants dying soon after planting. This is often the result of fertilizer burn or damping off disease. Thoroughly mix fertilizer into the soil and treat seed for diseases. Avoid overwatering.

Stunted, yellowing plants. Low soil fertility, poor soil drainage, shallow or compacted soil, insects or diseases, and nematodes are among the causes. Fertilize and work the soil well and control insects and diseases.

- Stunted, purple colored plants. Low temperatures and a lack of phosphorous cause this problem. Plant at recommended times to avoid temperature damage and add phosphorous fertilizer.

- Spots, molds, and darkened areas on leaves and stems. These could be caused by many things. If a disease is present, identify it and spray or dust. If there is a chemical burn, use only the recommended chemical at the recommended rate. To avoid a fertilizer burn, keep fertilizer off plant leaves.

- Wilting plants. Common causes are dry soil, overly wet soil, nematodes and diseases. Cures include watering, providing good drainage, and controlling diseases and nematodes.

- Weak, spindly plants. Check for too much shade, too much water, plants too thick or too much nitrogen.

- Failure to set fruit. Temperature extremes, too much nitrogen, insects and cloudy weather are some of the culprits. Plant at the recommended time, control pests and avoid excess fertilization.

- Tomato leaf curl. Heavy pruning in hot weather as well as insects or diseases cause this problem.

- Blossom-end rot. Low soil calcium and too much as well as not enough moisture are causes. Add calciumcontaining material, water regularly and improve drain-

- Misshapen tomatoes or catfacing. Cool weather during blooming is the usual cause, so avoid planting too

- Abnormal leaves and growth. 2, 4-D weed killer and virus diseases could be at fault. Remove affected plants to prevent spreading diseases and use care with weed killers to avoid spray
