

MEXICAN VANILLA: IS IT SAFE?

Many questions have been asked about the use of Mexican vanilla. Here is the latest release from Al. B. Wagner, Jr., Extension Food Technologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This summer more than ever tourists may be traveling to Mexico to take advantage of bargain prices. But one bargain may not be in your best interest. I am referring to vanilla purchasing in Mexico. The kind that is an extract of tonka beans or better known as coumarin is no bargain and may damage your health. This product smells like real vanilla and usually sells for \$1.50 to \$2.00 per bottle.

The genuine vanilla bean is a native of Mexico, but is not cheap, even where it is grown. The vanilla plant is an orchid in a vine form that grows in the sub-tropical areas of southeast Mexico and nearby countries.

The tonka bean is a native of South America, but grows in Mexico. It is a tree that grows up to 150 feet tall that belongs to the pea family. It

smells enough like vanilla to satisfy all but the experts. However, in 1954, this imposter was prohibited by the FDA for use as a food or food additive because it was determined to be a poisonous and deleterious substance.

It is interesting to note that a derivative of coumarin is used in certain blood thinning medicines (anticoagulants). This derivative also known as warfarin is used in rat poison as well. causing the rodent to die from hemorrhaging. There has been no evidence that coumarin itself has a blood thinning effect in humans.

The chances for deception in buying vanilla would be lessened if everyone bought the whole bean. Vanilla beans are long (7-10 in.) and thin (1/4 in.) like a pencil. They turn dark brown to black when cured. The entire pod can be ground and used for flavoring, or the flavoring can be extracted with ethyl alcohol and water. Tonka beans, on the other hand are oval in shape, about 5 inches long by 3 inches wide. Only the seeds are used for flavoring. These are about 31/2 x 2 inches in size. The pod is not used at all.

Verifying the presence of coumarin in vanilla type products is relatively easy using a fairly simple laboratory procedure. The FDA has tested many vanilla type products from Mexico and has found coumarin often and in varying amounts. But how does the average consumer know before they buy? There is no good way to tell. Stay away from the real cheap bottles of vanilla (\$1.50-2.00) is one suggestion. The best way to avoid coumarin in your vanilla is to not buy it in Mexico.

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





Jack Brewer honored

Jack Brewer, formerly of Odessa, was honored recently by being named to the Texas High School Athletic Directors Association's Hall of Honor. The prestigious award was announced at a banquet at a Houston hotel on July 29. He received a certificate, afforded the honor of being placed on the elite roll of other athletic directors who have gained the Hall of Honor and will receive a ring to be made at a later date.

The recently retired Directly of Athletics from Ector County Independent School District, has had a distinguished athletic career as an athlete, a coach, and an athletic administrator.

Jack graduated from Stillwell High School, Stillwell, Oklahoma. During his high school career, he was a 4 vear letterman in football, basketball, and baseball. His performance as a blocking back resulted in earned recognition as All District, All Region, and Honorable Mention All-State. At Northeastern State University in Tahlaquah, OK, he again earned football honors, being named to the All Conference Team.

In 1950, Jack became known as Coach Brewer accepting the position of assistant coach in Borger, Texas. From there, he went to Howard Payne College in Brownwood, and then to La Vega High School in Waco as head coach and athletic director. At Waco he was

named District Coach of the Year and Central Texas Coach of the Year.

Ector County Independent School District employed Jack in 1958 as an assistant coach at Odessa High School. At Odessa, he has served as Assistant Athletic Director, High School Assistant Principal, and Junior High Principal, before being named as Director of Athletics in 1970. He is directly responsible for the present structure of athletics in Odessa. Under his guidance, Odessa has won two State Championships in Basketball and one State Championship in Track. In Football, they won 172 games, lost 17, and tied 6 games resulting in three State Championships, State Finalist five times, and State Semi-Finalist seven times.

During the past 15 years as Director of Athletics, Jack has been honored numerous times by the Ector County ISD Board of Education for his contribution to the schools and community. Many local organizations also presented several awards of Commendation for his contributions. He was inducted into the "Top of Texas Hall of Fame" in 1981.

Jack Brewer and his wife, Nina, have spent summers, weekends, and holidays at Lake Spence for a number of years. They retired as employees of Ector County ISD in June, 1986 and are making their home in Robert Lee where they have plans to build a home.

Wages must be reported

Do you hire someone to clean your house? Or watch your children until you get off work? Or care for your lawn?

If so, and you pay the person \$50 or more in cash in a 3-month calendar quarter, you MUST deduct Social Security taxes and report the wages. If you don't report, you may be subject to a penalty; and the individual can lose valuable Social Security protection.

Keep in mind that Social Security is much more than a retirement program that provides monthly checks as early as 62 and Medicare at 65. It also pays monthly benefits to a worker and dependents if she or he becomes severely disabled before 65. And, certain dependents can get payments if the worker dies.

However, these benefits can be paid only if the worker has credit for a certain amount of work under Social Security. Also, some recent work credits are required for disability benefits. In addition, the amount of monthly benefits is closely related to the amount of reported earnings.

If you and other employers do not report some or all of your employee's earnings, the person may have a

short-term gain in more take-home pay. But, later on, benefits may not be payable to the worker and dependents; or the amount may be greatly reduced. Therefore, he or she will lose in the long run.

If you employ someone in or around your home, call your Internal Revenue Service (IRS) office for reporting forms and instructions. IRS Form 942 (Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees) is due a month after a quarter ends. For example, you pay someone \$50 or more in the 3 months ending June 30, your report is due by July 31.

For 1986, deduct 7.15 percent from your employee' wages and pay an equal Social Security tax as your share. Include these taxes with your report.

If you have any questions, ask at any Social Security office for a free copy of the publication. Social Security and Your Household Employee. That office has other publications that explain more about Social Security and Medicare benefits.







Ulmer Bird article retold

[Editor's Note - The following feature article was written by Nancy Robinson for the Abilene Reporter News on author-historian Ulmer Bird of Sanco and reprinted as it appeared on June 7.]

Down in the valley where the Yellow Wolf Creek flows there's a stretch of road which detours right off Highway 208, crosses the creek and splices right between the old Methodist and Baptist churches in the little community known as Sanco.

Sacred place to me. For reasons more than one.

Now it is presumed by most that the surprise of the road is to connect what is left of Sanco with the rest of the

Ulmer Bird knows better. Ulmer knows that the road is there to connect the world with Sanco. There is a diffe-

He was born on Nov. 11, 1900. I really don't know if he has ever flown in an airplane in his life. But the day the Cessna 172 started using part of the Sanco road as a landing strip, Ulmer wasn't at all surprised ... or disturbed. He did, however, predict that pilot would have to deal with the Indians. No one knew more about the Indians who had inhabited this valley for thousands of years before the Long Knives moved in than Ulmer Bird.

"I was born just 25 years after the Comanches left their camp hearths with the charcoal fresh on them and a lot of unfinished business in the Yellow Wolf Valley of Coke Co.," Ulmer will remind you with a twinkle in his eye. Then he may go wondering off in any of a dozen directions sharing his stories of Yellow Wolf, who refused to move to the reservation in defiance of Chief Sanco. Or he might tell you about the first time he discovered the automobile in

"Orb Craddock and I were playing together when the first one roared and popped and sputtered down the Yellow Wolf Creek Road. We ran for the gate of my uncle's home and I got there first and opened the gate.

"The motorists roared and clattered through, and one threw out a dime.

"I shut the gate and Orb got the dime. It was my first experience of getting the joy of being of service while another got the reward."

Being of service became a part of Ulmer's life. At the age of 44, the former Princeton student left his Methodist pastorates and his lovely Josephine and signed on as a chaplain in the Army. He left his beloved Yellow Wolf country to move across Europe with the 565th Anti-Aircraft group.

"I ate Christmas dinner in Luxembourg City in '44, that dinner being one Army K

ration, at a time when the Bulge did not mean the middle age spread."

He was in the middle of it at Bastogne, at Echternach and on his knees.

"General Patton put out an Order of the Day asking chaplains to pray for opening weather so our planes could come into the fight. I was up at the Echternach front when I heard a plane which sounded like it was in trouble. It appeared to be a B-17, and was flying very slow-- too slow. I got into my jeep and took to the road following him in. When I got to the airstrip, there he was. There were bullet holes in the plane, and the nose where the pilot's cockpit had been looked like a six by six army truck had smashed through it. But it still stood, high and proud."

Ulmer came home to Sanco. Preached at the Methodist Church and then retired to study and write. He's been a newspaper editor, teacher, and done some cowboying, but it was the poetry in him that craved to be loosed.

Just as Ulmer predicted, the Indians whose spirits will live in Sanco were reckoned with by the Cessna's 172 pilot. And just as Ulmer had always said, the road which had been used as a runway was there to bring the world to Sanco. A pickup truck with a trailer rumbled into town, picked up the slightly damaged airplane and hauled it back to Abilene... which is how I came to know Ulmer and Josephine Bird. No, I wasn't the pilot. The man who bought the airplane salvage insisted I go with him to meet the Birds and to find out more about the mysteries of the Yellow Wolf Valley.

It was as if Ulmer had been expecting us all along.

"Keep this poem, You'll need it someday," he said after that first meeting.

It was called "Grandpa's Children".

"He said,

'Hitch your wagon to a

We hitched.

Of course, we rearranged the wagon

And took a good look at the star

Before we hitched.

Those who ride the shuttle Are the kind who drove the wagons --

They are always on their
