Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number if they currently receive food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy the Bronte ISD Superintendent Michael Hartman, will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Michael Hartman, Bronte I.S.D., Box 670, Bronte, Texas 76933, 473-2511 for a hearing on the decision.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced meals or for free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

## Changes mark new school year

Quite a number of changes will be evident when school bells ring in the 1986-87 year in Bronte. New personnel, different school hours, and fresh, new facilities will greet students on their return to school.

New school hours beginning this fall will be 8:15 for the first bell, 8:20 for tardy bell and beginning of first period classes; 12:15 - 12:45 lunch, and dismissal at 3:45. Another major change is that tutorials for students not

passing a subject, while voluntary in the past, will be mandatory this year and will be held from 7:55 until 8:15 each morning. Buses will run accordingly, so that students will arrive by 7:55. Students who ride the bus and do not have to go to tutorials may go to a study hall. Non-busriders, who are not failing, need not be at school until 8:15.

New classroom space, which has been sorely needed, has been made possible by the construction of a new

home economics cottage and learning/resource center on the campus and the conversion of the old facilities into classrooms. The former high school and elementary libraries have been combined into one spacious center by closure of the hallway between two existing wings at the school. The home economics department is now housed in a separate building located near the ag shop. The new cottage is equipped with built-in sewing machine cabinets, classroom space, storage area, teacher's office, and two kitchens. Another area of improvement is the renovating of the old gym with new ceiling, lighting and new backboards.

The faculty for both the high school and elementary is now complete with quite a few new personnel on the staff. New high school teachers and coaches are Gene Tuttle, head coach and elementary phys. ed. teacher; David Tandy, h.s. girls basketball and track coach, football assistant, and government and health teacher; Roxie Poe, English, art and theater arts teacher; Gaylon Harrison, history teacher and coach; Sarah (Sally) Buxkemper, high school science; and Connie Bryan, girls volleyball, junior high sports coach and English teacher.

## Coaches are enthusiastic

Two-a-days have been going strong at Bronte High School beginning this week for athletes coming out for football and volleyball.

Coaches are enthusiastic about the hard work and effort the players are showing as they brave the heat and increased physical activity.



## Carvers' Carolina vacation

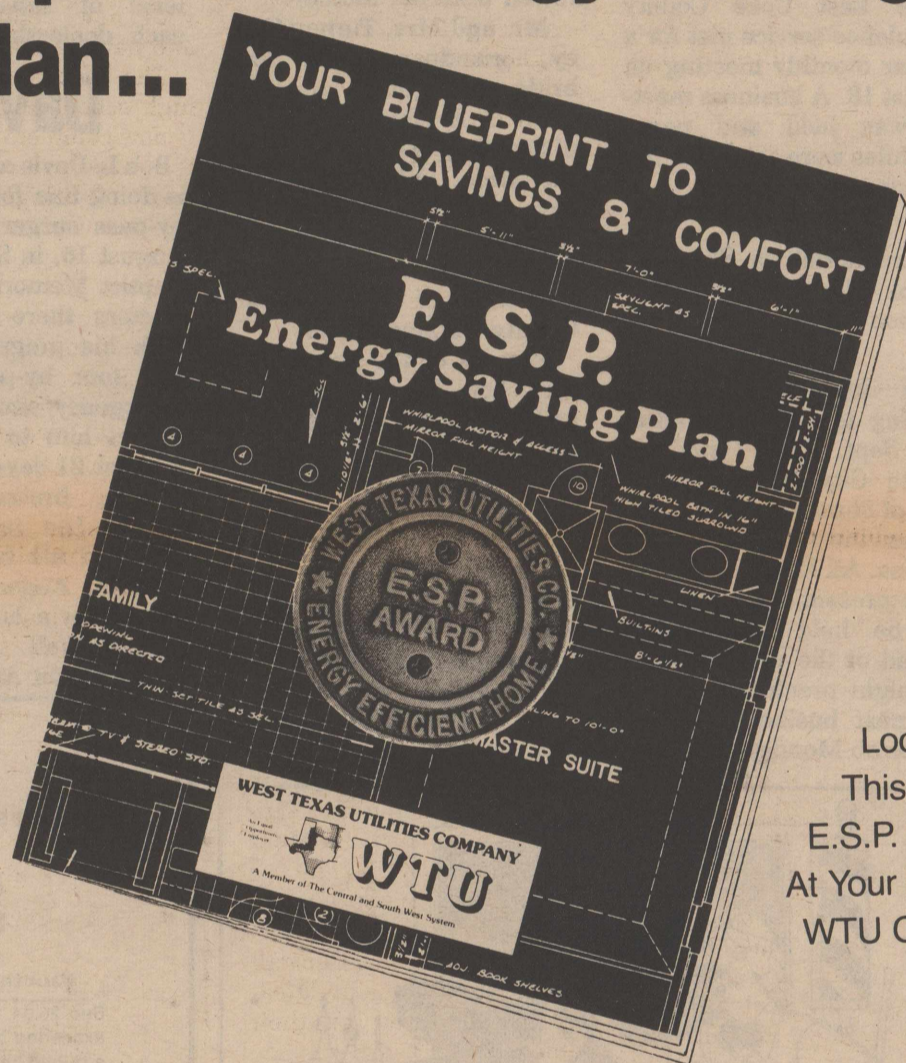

**AFTER SCHOOL ACTIVITIES HELP TEENS DEVELOP RESPONSIBLE BEHAVIOR--**

Participation in band, 4-H, clubs, athletics and other after-school school activities is more than just a "good time" for teenagers. After-school activities encourage responsible behavior and help teenagers avoid delinquent behaviors, such as vandalism, says Diane T. Welch, a family life education specialist. Vandalism is commonly thought of as an urban problem, notes Welch, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. According to studies reported by Pennsylvania State University researchers, however, over half the students in rural high schools had committed at least one act of vandalism. Nearly 75 percent of those students repeated their behaviors 3 or more times. The reports also show that young people who participated in organized youth activities were not as involved in vandalism as those young people who did not have after-school hour activities.

**NO EVIDENCE OF CAT LEUKEMIA VIRUS THREAT TO HUMANS --**

Veterinarians at Texas A&M University say there is currently no evidence that a leukemia virus in cats poses a threat to humans. Feline leukemia virus (FeLV) is in the same virus family that causes leukemia and AIDS in humans. Because of this relationship, some people may be concerned that exposure to FeLV infected cats could be a health hazard for humans. While the virus will grow in human cells in a tissue culture, it cannot infect an intact animal. And the virus has never been found in a human.

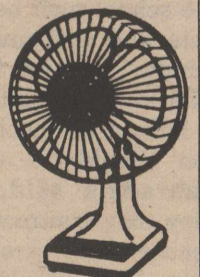

## Otto Havins retires

Otto Havins, son of Fern and Martha Havins of Robert Lee has announced his retirement as Chief Deputy, Tax Assessor-Collector, Wichita County, Wichita Falls, TX.

Otto Joined the staff of the Wichita County Tax Department the day after his retirement from the U.S. Air Force in January 1969. His retirement will become effective August 31.

He graduated from Robert Lee High in 1941 and attended San Angelo Business College before entering the U.S. Air Force in 1942. During his air force career he served as a radio-gunner on a B-17 bomber crew until his

plane was shot down over occupied Europe in 1944. During the remainder of his air force career he served in numerous duties at many bases in the United States and overseas as a personnel supervisor, until his retirement at Sheppard AFB, TX.

He and his wife, Barbara, will continue to reside in Wichita Falls where they have lived for the past 20 years.

His plans are to pursue his many hobbies, yard work and volunteer work with several organizations. Otto still calls Robert Lee home and comes back to visit family and friends whenever he can.

## Immunizations required

Texas children who lack proper immunizations will not only be turned away from school, they and their parents may face medical and economic problems, a Baylor College of Medicine pediatrician warns.

Texas law requires that all children entering public schools be immunized for diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), red measles, mumps, rubella and polio.

"We may think of childhood diseases as minor and something we've all lived through," said John Zahradnik, M.D., assistant professor of immunology and microbiology at Baylor. "However, not only do some children not live through them, others may suffer permanent physical and mental damage if infected."

Another reason for immunizations is to avoid the economic impact of illness.

"Although the vaccines may be expensive, the cost is nowhere near the expense of hospitalization, lost work wages, the potential harm to a child and the worry parents suffer if a child is affected by one of these diseases," Zahradnik said.

Children entering Texas schools for the first time must show proof of receiving a measles/mumps/rubella vaccine, and five doses each of the oral polio vaccine and the diphtheria/Tetanus/pertussis (DTP) vaccine.

He added that children should be immunized before the school rush begins. Parents who wait until the last minute may be faced with long lines at health clinics.

Even pre-school age children should be vaccinated, Zahradnik said, because they may contract these diseases at day care centers or from infected playmates or family members.

Red measles is very contagious and causes a skin rash and respiratory problems, which can lead to pneumonia. Encephalitis and meningitis, both of which can cause brain damage and death, may also result.

Rubella (German measles) is less severe, but can dam-

age the unborn child of an infected mother.

Pertussis can cause suffocation, pneumonia and permanent lung and brain damage.

Mumps causes swelling of the salivary glands in the jaw and may affect the testes or ovaries and lead to sterility.

Tetanus is an often fatal disease that attacks nerve cells in the spinal cord, which controls muscle movement. Muscle spasms of the throat and chest can cause suffocation.

Diphtheria causes swelling of the throat and tonsils which can lead to suffocation. The infection may cause heart, kidney and nervous system damage.

Polio attacks muscle-controlling nerves and produces muscular weakness and permanent paralysis.

Zahradnik said the suggested immunization schedule is to have:

--DTP and oral polio vaccines at 2, 4, 6 and 18 months, and between 4 and 6 years of age.

--Diphtheria and tetanus boosters between 14 and 16 years of age, and every 10 years thereafter.

--Measles/Mumps/rubella vaccination at 15 months of age.
