## Longhorns wrap up district title

The Bronte Longhorns have wrapped up the District 6-A title by virtue of their decisive 20-0 victory last Friday night over Irion County. They clearly own the title by going 9-0 on the season and have looked awesome all year. The team holds a No. 8 ranking in Class A by the Associated Press and 13th by
the Harris Rating System.

Tonight the Coke County Championship is on the line when the Steers host the Longhorns in Robert Lee at 8 p.m. in the season finale. Pride and the will to defeat each other has always entered into the matches between the two county schools.

## Rawlings keeps record of scores

Jim Rawlings has kept an interesting record of football scores between the Bronte Longhorns and the Robert
deer have been heedless to hunters and working activities.

Deer taken are in excellent condition with good racks and heavy body weights, reported Geanette Skinner of Robert Lee. She and her husband, Jim, own Skinner's Grocery where 115 carcasses were brought to their storage vault over the weekend due to warming temperatures. Four bucks weighed in a.t 140 lb., dressed weight, with the largest rack a 12 pointer, she said. Robert Vaughan of Robert Lee was the lucky winner of the 30.06 rifle in their Saturday drawing and another will begin for a . 243 rifle.

A biologist with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department visited Skinner's storage on Saturday to check the ages of selected deer, as well as weights and antler development for the TPWD records. Judging by jaw teeth he found the majority of the deer were $11 / 2$ to 2 years old with 1 going 5 years old and 1 was at least $71 / 2$ years old. He pronounced the $1986-87$ season prospects as superior.
The Silver Peak Grocery, a new business at Silver, also has deer storage, one of only 2 in Coke County. A spokesman reported on Monday that a total of 25 deer had been in storage over the weekend with a great number of area hunters either taking them on home or quartering them in ice chests. He related that all

Lee Steers over the years. He also compiled some facts about the games and submitted this information for Coke County fans. He collaborated with Ronnie Baker of Robert Lee and they came up with the following information and scores: Bronte has won 35 games between the years 1931 and 1985; Robert Lee has been victor in 33 contests between the two teams. There have been 4 ties. The most points scored was 54 by Robert Lee in a 54-0 victory in 1945. The most points scored by Bronte was in the 1974 game which Brone won 41-0. The two teams battled to a 0-0 tie in 1977 for a new record in lowest point total!

Here is how the teams scored in their games (sometimes meeting twice a season) over the past 54 years, according to Jim's research: 1931 - RL 26, Bronte 0; 1932 RL won, score not available; 1933 - RL victory, scores N.A.; 1934 - RL won 2 games, scores N.A.) 1935 Bronte won 2, no scores; 1936 - RL won both games, scores N.A.; 1937 - Bronte won both, no scores; 1938 Bronte 2 wins, no scores available; 1939 - Bronte 6, RL 6 and Bronte 8, RL 0.
In 1940, Bronte won both games, the first score being 12-0 and second game score unavailable; 1941 - Bronte won both; 1942 \& 43 the schools did not play during those two years of World War II; 1944 - Bronte 6, RL 6 and RL 12, Bronte 7; 1945 RL 29, Bronte 0 and RL 54, Bronte 0; 1946 - RL 13, Bronte 7 and RL 13, Bronte $0 ; 1947$ - Bronte 25, RL 0 and Bronte 32, RL 0; 1948 - RL 14, Bronte 0 and RL 13, Bronte 12; 1949 - Bronte 14, RL 12 and Bronte 7, RL 0.

In the fifties the teams mixed up their wins with Bront recording 10 wins to Robert Lee's 6 within that period. Scores were: 1950 RL 33, Bronte 0 and RL 25, B 12; 1951 - RL 29, Bronte 19, and Bronte 12, RL 7; 1952 RL 8, Bronte 7 and RL 7 , Bronte 7; 1953 - B 28, RL 6 and B 39, RL 6; 1954 - B 34, RL 25 and B 29, RL 25 ; 1955 Bronte 38, RL 6; 1956. Bronte 13, RL 0; 1957 - RL 25 Bronte 7; 1958-B 31, RL 8 ; 1959 - B 23, RL 8 and B 38, RL 0 .

Bronte won 6 of the 1960's games and RL took 4. In 1960 it was Bronte 32, R.L. 8; 1961 - Bronte 25, RL 8; 1962 RL 24, Bronte 6; 1963 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1964 - RL 34, Bronte 14; 1965 - Bronte 20, RL 15; 1966 - Bronte 31, RL 6; 1967 - B 28, RL 12; 1968 RL 30; B 15; 1969 - B 12, RL 0.

In 1970 - RL over Bronte 32-0; 1971 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1972 - RL 33, Bronte 0; 1973 RL 19, Bronte 0; 1974 Bronte 41, RL 0; 1975 Bronte 20, RL 0; 1976 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1977 - Bronte 0, RL 0; 1978 - RL 21, Bronte 14; 1979 - RL 7, Bronte 3.
The 1980 years have been a tie so far with each team credited with 3 wins each, but tonight's game will probably give one team the lead in this decade's rivalry. The 1980 scores looked like this: 1980 - Bronte 25, RL 0; 1981 Bronte 6, RL 0; 1982 - RL 28 , Bronte 0; 1983 - Bronte 16, RL 13; 1984 - RL 21, Bronte 6; 1985 - RL 35, Bronte 26.

Regardless of the outcomes, the Longhorns and Steers have always provided lots of exciting football for all of their fans. Thanks to Jim Rawlings for this look at past Coke County Football.

## FALL FRUIT TREE SPRAYING CONTROLS DISEASES <br> Fall is often the time when

 fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.With the arrival of fall, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer. Applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the major diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and

## bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide.
Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly
The Extension Service advises spraying when 70 percent of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too early will

## Buickerood to be honored

Dorothy Thomas Buickerood, octogenarian short story writer, is to be honored by the Bronte Senior Citizens staff with an autograph party, in their center, Sunday, November 23, from 2:00 to $4: 00$. Everyone in the Concho Valley area is cordially invited. The party's purpose is to personally introduce writer Dorothy Thomas and her two books, MA JEETERS GIRLS and THE HOME PLACE, University of Nebraska Press published, to her steadily increasing number of Concho Valley readers.

It is fitting that Dorothy Thomas should be recognized by her senior age peers, because for better then a decade, they have been Texans. She has now come three months into her 89th year of life and 59 years into her sustained writing and publishing career. Her story and a poem appeared in the The Prairie Schooner, Nebraska's Literary quarterly magazine in 192.7, and her first story in a national monthly magazine, Scribner's, in 1929, this prompted her to terminate her years of teaching that began in 1918, and devote her life to writing. Most of her college education, she got in summer school sessions.
For several years she sent her stories out herself, and was most helpfully encouraged by such editorial giants as Ellery Sedgewick of Atlantic Monthly, Henry L. Mencken, and Harold Ross of The New Yorker. After she began to sell through an agent, he sensibly submitted her stories first to the highest paying, slick paper popular magazines. That accounts for her coming to be known as a Saturday Evening Post writer. While she much valued the wider readership this brought her, Thomas regretted the unfair supposition by literary and university friends that she had sold her soul for mammon. The fact is that she has never written toward publication in any particular magazine or or any lack of readers.
Over the decades her sto-
ries have appeared in almost all our quality and slickpaper magazines, extant and surviving. Many of her stories have been republished in collections and anthologies, collections and anthologies, dramatized on radio and television, two sold to film companies, one to 20th Century Fox and one to MGM neither has been filmed.
With a thought to arithmetic in considering that under 150 of her stories have been printed in the better than a half century she has been writing and publishing stories, it is evident that WRITTING STORIES FOR her living has not made her rich. Still, it has made for a good, if often anxious life and one she has enjoyed.
Dorothy Thomas set out to be a painter and only in her mid-twenties decided to give story-writing first place in her life. She still likes to draw and to paint in water color.
She says she is an old fashioned writer who likes a story to have a beginning, middle and an ending it moves toward with many a surprise, and much telling detail, and characterizing talk. With few exceptions, her stories are about country or small town families and their love affairs, problems, and dreams. Dorothy Thomas writes naturally and joyously. She says, As I see it, the business of my story is to let it tell itself, make me glad I wrote it and some editor and any number of readers glad they read it. If it can make the reader more aware of the life around him, more thankful to be alive, more purposeful and honest, kinder, and yes, happier, that's fine.'

spray to be ineffective later.
Fungicides containing chlorothalonil can also be used for the control of peach leaf curl.

Bacterial leaft spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide, but not fungicides containing chlorothalonil. But again, it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliar burn with the copper fungicide.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the main trunk and main limbs.

Application time will vary with the season, so check your fruit trees closely. For our area, the proper time is November 15 to December 15.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees because there's no other time when peach leaf curl of peach and plum trees can be controlled.

TEXAS UTILITIES ELECTRIC COMPANY, in accordance with its prior public announcement of October 15, 1986, hereby publishes NOTICE that, pursuant to the provisions of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Public Utility Commission's Substantive Rule 23.23(b)(2), it has filed an application on November 7, 1986, with the Public Utility Commission of Texas seeking authority to refund to its customers a prior over-recovery under its current interim fuel factors (base rate fuel component) in the amount of $\$ 58,445,953$ as of September 30,1986 , including applicable interest, and to reduce its interim fuel factors.

Texas Utilities Electric Company has proposed that the refund be made and its interim fuel factors be reduced effective with customers' usage beginning with the first billing month following five days after entry of a Public Utility Commission Order authorizing such refund and reduced interim fuel factors. The proposed change in interim fuel factors is expected to result in a $\$ 42,828,268$ decrease in fuel revenues or a $10.3 \%$ reduction in the interim fuel factors. All customers and classes of customers whose electric service rates include charges for fuel cost pursuant to Texas Utilities Electric Company's Rider FC, entitled "Base Rate Fuel Component," and all territories in which Texas Utilities Electric Company provides electric service through its Dallas Power \& Light, Texas Electric Service, and Texas Power \& Light divisions will be affected if the application is granted.

A complete copy of said application is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

On October 23, 1986, a petition was filed with the Public Utility Commission requesting that Texas Utilities Electric Company refund over-recovered fuel cost revenues and to reduce its current interim fuel factors. That petition has been docketed as Docket No. 7159. All customers and classes of customers whose electric service rates include charges for fuel cost pursuant to Texas Utilities Electric Company's Rider FC, entitled "Base Rate Fuel Component," and all territories in which Texas Utilities Electric Company provides electric service through its Dallas Power \& Light, Texas Electric Service, and Texas Power \& Light divisions will be affected if the petition is granted. A prehearing conference in Docket No. 7159 has been scheduled beginning at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, November 19, 1986, at the Commission's offices at 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas; persons who wish to participate as parties must attend the prehearing conference.

Christmas mailings are beginning to come in now and we want your packages to reach their destinations just as much as you do -- so let's work together this year and if you follow directions for wrapping your parcels, there is no reason why they won't get there in A-1 Condition.
First, select a good strong box or mailing carton. Fill it and be sure to put a slip of paper on the inside with your return address on it. Next buy some good strapping or monafilament tape - NOT masking tape. Tape your package securely. DO NOT use string on your packages. Make certain your name and address are on the outside of the package. If you put "Edith Rt." or "Sanco Rt.", etc. and the package should be returned
for some reason-- we don't know where it goes unless you have your name on it. Just remember -- before you mail-- get your ingredients for a good mailing together -1. good strong mailing carton
2. good tape
3. slip of paper for inside return address.
