# Buy a tree grown in Texas

We all love the piney scent and deep green color of a fresh Christmas tree. But often we wind up with a tree that starts losing needles and turning brown days before Christmas. One way to solve this problem - without resorting to an artificial tree - is to look for a Texas Christmas tree.

It may come as a surprise to you that Texas produces

Christmas trees. The state has about 3200 acres of Christmas trees in production. Some growers have big operations and ship large numbers of trees to commercial lots. Others have choose-and-cut operations where customers can come and pick their own trees.

If you select a Texas tree off a lot, the chances are that it's been cut only hours or days before, as opposed to trees imported from northern states where they have been cut weeks and even months in advance. And a fresh tree will be less of a fire hazard in your home

One way to check for tree freshness is to crush a branch in your hand. The needles should be soft and resilient, almost returning to the original shape when you let go. Dry needles will break or fall off.

Then remember to cut the bottom inch off your tree before putting it in the stand, and to keep it well watered. A fresh tree can easily absorb ½ to 1 gallon of water a day. But that moisture is needed to keep the needles soft and green and maintain the fresh pine fragrance of your Texas tree.

# Social Security benefits

not payable for the month a beneficiary dies, it was announced recently.

The benefit check, which is usually received on the third day of each month, represents the benefit payable for the previous month. Therefore, if a person dies in July, for example, the check that is received August 3, which represents payment for July, should be returned. However, if the check is made out jointly to both husband and wife, the survivor should contact a Social Security office to find out whether the check should be cashed.

If a person's benefits were being handled by direct deposit, the financial institution to which the checks were being sent should be notified of the death as soon as possible. The institution will





# **Questions for vets**

Q - Why is it necessary to have the property appraised when applying for a VA loan?

A - The law requires that the amount of the VA loan may not exceed the reasonable value of the property, construction, alterations, improvements, or repairs as determined by the VA. In order to reach this determination the VA requires an appraisal of the property by a designated appraiser.

Q - I understand that a recently passed law will subject veterans seeking care in VA facilities to new eligibility assessment procedures. Does this income-based assessment apply to VA programs such as the Vietnam Veterans Outreach Centers (Vet Centers), halfway houses and hospital-based home care?

A - Veterans receiving care in halfway houses and in the hospital-based home care program are subject to the eligibility assessment procedures. Veterans receiving counseling at Vietnam Veteran Outreach Centers (Vet Centers) are not.

Make sure paper ornaments and tinsel do not touch light bulbs. Also, never adjust outdoor or tree lights while they are turned on or connected to a power circuit.

Always use a wooden ladder or a metal one with rubber-tipped legs when installing outdoor lights. Be sure to stand on a dry surface.

don't overload circuits.

Avoid overloading electrical wiring by using more than one circuit for your tree lights. Use heavy-duty extension cords to run to other circuits.

# **Postal Pointe**

Let me tell you again this week about some of the services we offer you at the post office. Now with the Christmas mailing season upon us, we need to know as much as possible about these services.

First, we have padded envelopes in three sizes, these are excellent for mailing pictures and other fragile items. We have clasp envelopes in two different sizes. These are good for mailing things too large for regular Our mailing envelopes. boxes, three sizes there also, are heavy-duty, sturdy boxes and you can write directly on them, no label needed.

Insurance is available on all You can obtain parcels. minimum fee insurance (up to \$25) for only 50 cents. If you want the addressee to sign for the insured parcel, you can insure it for up to \$50 for \$1.10. Next is \$1,40 for up to \$100, then it gradually goes up to \$4.40 for \$500.

If you are mailing something worth more than \$500, then you will need to register it. The registration fee starts at \$3.60, and goes up according to the value of the article mailed. This is the safest way to mail valuables, and there is no limit to the value.

Many people want return receipts when they mail letters or packages. A return receipt is available for 70 cents on an insured parcel, registered article, or a certified article. Certified mail is usually a letter (it can be a parcel), but it cost 75 cents to certify an article, plus postage and 70 cents for the This is return receipt. usually used when you just want to be sure the article was delivered.

Getting on to First Class and Priority Mail -- first class applies to items weighing up to 13 ounces. Over that and they automatically become Priority Mail, which is one of the 'hottest' items in the postal service today. These articles are sent in a special 'Priority' sack and receive very special treatment. The rate for articles up to two pounds is only \$2.40, regardless of where it is going in the USA - then gradually increased with weight.

Speaking of special treatment, we also have a service for regular parcel post which is called Special Handling. Once again, these articles are sent in a special sack and are not mixed with the

regular fourth class parcels. The rate for these articles is \$1.10 for articles up to 10 pounds, and \$1.60 for those over 10 pounds. It's worthwhile to have those special parcels kept separated from the others and thus receive special treatment.

Last but not least, there is

our Express Mail - guaranteed overnight delivery for articles up to two pounds for \$10.75. We have a national network, and if your destination city is on our network, it will be delivered the next day. If it is not on the network, you will get second day delivery.

Space does not allow me to tell you about all our services, but these few pointers should help you through the holidays, and you might want to clip this article to use during the coming year.

SAVE THE STUFFING FOR LAST MINUTE -- Food safety experts with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service recommend stuffing a holiday turkey right before you cook it. Warm, moist dressing is an ideal medium in which food poisoning bacteria can grow. To save time, prepare the dry stuffing ingredients the day before, cover them tightly and leave at room temperature. But keep the perishable ingredients, such as butter, mushrooms, oysters, cooked celery, onions and broth in the refrigerator. Then combine the ingredients before stuffing the turkey.



BEWARE OF ACORN POISONING IN CATTLE

Cattlemen should be alert to prevent acorn poisoning in their animals.

Acorn poisoning generally occurs when acorns fall prematurely while they are still green. In past years, numerous cases of poisoned cattle from eating excessive quantities of acorns have been reported by Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories.

Most cattle like acorns and tend to seek them out. Eating excessive quantities can cause death. The quantity tolerated by an animal is influenced by the protein content of its diet, with higher protein permitting the consumption of more acorns without poisoning symptoms.

Animals affected by acorn oisoning have a lack of appetite, appear dull, become constipated and suffer weight loss. They also pass blood in the feces and may bleed from the nostrils. Profuse diarrhea may follow constipation. Affected animals drink large amounts of water and urinate excessive amounts of clear urine.

Many animals go down

after three to seven days of symptoms. If animals do not die, they will require two to three weeks of recovery. Ranchers suspecting a problem or noting symptoms should contact a veterinarian as early as possible.

Treatment is of little value in severely affected animals. However, giving calcium hydroxide and increasing the protein content of the diet may help. Protein, usually in the form of cottonseed meal, combines with toxic elements in acorns, making less

A feed containing 54 percent cottonseed meal, 30 percent dehydrated alfalfa leaf meal, 6 percent vegetable oil and 10 percent calcium hydroxide (hydrated lime) has prevented oak poisoning when fed daily to cattle. This supplement can be fed in loose form in troughs at the rate of about 4 pounds per head per day for adult cattle. Where possible, remove cattle from access to acorns.

Of course, acorn poisoning can be prevented by removing cattle from areas with oaks and acorns during the time they have recently fallen. Try to reserve these pastures for late fall or winter grazing. If any animals are suspected of poisoning, remove other animals until a diagnosis can be made.


