Lara sentenced to twelve years

On Nov. 24, court convened in Robert Lee at the Coke County courthouse. At that time, Theresa M. Mecher of Robert Lee entered a guilty plea before the court to a charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. She was sentenced to a 3 year probated sentence, fined \$200 and directed to pay \$95.30 restitution, and court costs of \$110.

A panel of prospective jurors was called for Dec. 8 to appear for district court but were dismissed by Judge Royal Hart on Dec. 3 after plea-bargaining by the defendant's attorneys.

Appearing before the court on Dec. 8, Ynes Lara of Robert Lee was sentenced to 12 years in prison by Judge Hart on a burglary of habitation charge. Lara's attorneys have 30 days in which to appeal the case. The defendant must appear on Monday, Jan. 12, 1987 and at that time will either enter an appeal or sign a waiver to be transported to the state penitentiary.

Two civil cases were also on the docket for Monday. reported county clerk Ettie Hubbard.





Holiday goodies

HONEY PECAN TREATS

½ cup butter

2 T. honey

1 cup sifted flour ½ tsp. salt

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup finely chopped pe-

Cream butter, stirring in honey gradually. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Chill 1 hr. Form into 1-inch balls. Place well apart on greased baking sheets and bake in a 300 degree F. oven about 35 to 40 minutes or until light brown. Makes 2 doz.

MICROWAVE PECAN BRITTLE

1 c. sugar

½ cup white corn syrup

1 c. pecans

1/8 tsp. salt

1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. baking soda

In a 11/2 quart casserole, stir together the sugar, syrup, pecans and salt, mixing well. Microwave at high for 6 to 9 minutes until light brown. Add butter, vanilla

and stir well. Microwave at high for 1 to 2 minutes more. Pecans will be light brown and syrup will be very hot. Add baking soda and gently stir until light and foamy. Pour onto lightly-buttered cookie sheet. Let cool ½ to 1 hr. When cool break into small pieces.

SS guidelines

A person who does not agree with a decision on his or her claim for Social Security benefits or supplemental security income (SSI) payments has a right to appeal the decision, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently. However, the appeal must be made within certain time limits.

A person who fails to appeal a decision within the time limit may lose the right to challenge the decision any further, Upp said. However, the time can be extended if the person can show there was good reason for not taking action within the time period.

The appeal procedure for a Social Security claim is a little different from that for an SSI claîm, Upp said. Information about appealing a decision in either case can be obtained from the Social Security Office located at 2214 Sherwood Way in San Angelo. The telephone number is 949-4608.

VA NEWS

Q - I am 72 years old and I receive a VA pension. Do I still have to make an annual report of income?

A - Yes Everyone receiving VA pension benefits, based on age or a nonservice-connected disability, must make an annual report of their income. Any change in income should be reported immediately so that adjustments can be made.

Q - My first husband died of service-connected causes and I received VA Depend and I received VA Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) until I remarried. My second husband recently died. Can I regain my eligibility for DIC payments.

A - Yes. DIC benefits based on the death of a spouse may be restored if the subsequent marriage ends through death, divorce, or annulment.

Q - I am currently eligible to receive benefits under Dependents Educational Assitance. If I enter the military may I use my benefits while on active duty?

A - No. VA benefits are not payable under this program while an eligible person is serving on active duty in the armed forces.



WTU plans another refund

West Texas Utilities Co. plans another refund to its retail customers early next year.

The Company was to file a request Wednesday with the Public Utility Commission of Texas requesting permission to refund a total of \$4.9 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs during October and November. The total includes \$4.7 million actual fuel cost savings, plus \$.2 million in interest.

Bob Boone, WTU local manager, said recently negotiated contract revisions reflecting the continued soft price of natural gas makes the refund necessary.

"As our cost for boiler fuel went down, we simply overcollected under the fuel rate approved by the PUC," Boone said.

This will be the fifth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer

of 1985. With each refund, the fuel rates charged to customers have been adjusted, but the price of natural gas, WTU's, main power plant boiler fuel, has continued to decline.

WTU's base rates have not changed since December 1984. However, Company officials have said that a base rate increase will be necessary after the new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon is completed and placed in service. The assured supply of coal under a long-term contract is expected to stabilize WTU's power plant fuel costs and to partially offset the necessary base rate increase.

The refund will made through one-time credits to retail customers in January or February depending on when the PUC approved it. The typical residential customer will receive about \$9.00.



Rural transit planned

Beginning December 17, 1986, the Concho Valley Council of Governments will begin operating a Rural Public Transportation system in ten counties.

The basic system is already in place and has been operating to provide services to Senior Citizens. Through the new Rural Public Transportation system, service will not be limited to Senior Citizens, but will be available to all persons.

For in-town or local service, the system will be demand-responsive to those who call in for transportation. That is, the driver will try to satisfy every request for local transportation.

Out-of-county trips will be on a fixed schedule and require that passengers call in for reservations.

All services will be on a first-call, first-serve basis. Reservations should be made 24 hours in advance. Shorter notice requests will be served if space is available. Passengers should be ready one-half hour before the scheduled pickup time so the system can get the most out of its limited driver and van resources.

Costs for this service are on a seat-occupancy basis as follows:

In-County: \$.50 each way Out-of-County: \$1.00 each

Senior Citizens and handicapped passengers are not required to pay for transportation services. However, they are encouraged to contribute a portion of costs, if they are able, in order to help the program meet its expense obligations.

The ten counties to be served are Coke, Concho, Irion, Kimble, McCullough, Menard, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and rural Tom Green.

Out-of-county trips are scheduled as follows:

-Bronte & Robert Lee to San Angelo every Wednes-

-Eden to San Angelo on the 1st and 3rd Monday of the month.

-Mertzon to San Angelo every Thursday.

-Junction to Kerrville every Wednesday.

-Brady to San Angelo on e 3rd Thursday of the month.

-Menard to San Angelo on the 3rd Wednesday of the month.

-Eldorado to San Angelo

on the 3rd Tuesday of the month.

-Sterling City to San Angelo every other Tuesday.

-Sonora to San Angelo on the 3rd Tuesday of the

-Rural Tom Green passengers in Wall, Christoval, Carlsbad and Water Valley will ride the vans coming through their areas from the other counties.

The Rural Public Transportation program is provided in part through Section 18 funds of the Urban Mass Transportation Administration. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is the agency which administers the program state-wide.

"By changing to a Rural Public Transportation system, we will be able to serve a greater portion of the transportation needs of our region while maintaining our present service for the elderly," said Gordon Nelson, Transportation Director for the Concho Valley Council of Governments.

REDUCE SUGAR IN HOLI-DAY DESSERTS - The sugar in many holiday desserts can be reduced by a third, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist. If a recipe calls for 1 cup sugar, for example, use 2/3 cup. This works best in fruit-based recipes and in making puddings and custards, says Dr. Alice Hunt. The sugar in cookies and cakes can also be reduced, but requires some experimenting to find an appropriate level.

More than 900 species of the oxalis family, Oxalidaceae, are found in temperate and tropical areas of the world. Almost every gardener is familiar with two varieties growing in the wild. Yellow wood sorrel (Oxalis dillenti) sprawls in clumps from deep tap roots. Violet wood sorrel (Oxalis violacea) grows from bulbs making underground which form small colonies. Both varieties are perennials.

With leaves like the shamrock or clover, the domesticated oxalis blooms in white, pink, red and lavender. Frequently used for borders and rock gardens, it is an excellent plant for pots, window boxes and hanging baskets.

A sensational new variety is called Iron Cross (Oxalis deppei), an unusual plant from South America. Purple iron crosses enhance the centers of rich green leaves. Rose-pink flowers have vellow centers with darker circles surrounding the stamens.

As an outdoor edging flower, oxalis

bulbs are planted in spring. For winter blooms indoors planting is done in the fall. After blooming stops and the leaves are dry, bulbs should be taken from the soil. All bulbs need a rest before the next planting. When they show tiny roots, it is time for

Best results are achieved when bulbs are covered 2 inches deep in slightly alkaline, well-drained soils and kept moist. They will thrive in prepared potting soil available in the nurseries. Planted in containers, oxalis should be placed in a dark area until growth appears. Normal watering follows, but flooding may cause rot. All watering is withheld after the bulbs are allowed to dry gradually.

Planting in containers for spring blooming usually is done during the autumn in cold regions. In temperate and subtropical zones, flowering may occur from January to October.

Other than containers and sunny borders, rock gardens provide a unique setting for oxalis. It is very effective in rock gardens containing such vigorous plants as yarrow, coral bells and the sedums. Here the contrasts are outstanding. Wildflower lovers find the purple wood sorrel a charming addi-







Facts about sugary treats

During the holidays sugary desserts and candy abound, to the delight of those who crave sweets and the concern of those who believe they're "bad for you".

"People seem to have many misconceptions about refined sugar which influence their attitudes, if not their actions, when it comes to what they eat over the holidays", says Dr. Alice Hunt, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

She says a common misconception is that natural sugar, such as that found in orange juice, is a better source of energy than the refined sugar you get from soft drinks, candy or des-

"The face is that sugar is sugar in whatever form," says the nutritionist. "Each form contains 4 calories per gram and is used by the body similarly."

The difference is that foods with natural sugars typically have other nutrients, like the vitamin C, potassium and folic acid in orange juice. Foods containing refined sugar, such as soft drinks, frequently have no vitamins and minerals. Many desserts may have small amounts of vitamins and minerals, but are also high in fat and sodium, she explains.

is that you are more likely to experience a "sugar high" the natural sugar in foods.

But the Extension nutritionist points out that raisins and other foods containing natural sugars elevate blood sugar and create a "sugar high" just like refined sugar.

It's not necessary to avoid foods with refined sugar to maintain a nutritious diet throughout the holidays, she maintains. But you should make sure that most of the foods you eat have a variety of nutrients and that you're getting enough exercise to burn off extra calories from sugar-rich foods.
