Spring turkey prospects are 'excellent'

High turkey populations over most of Texas' turkey range should provide excellent hunting during the upcoming spring gobbler season, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Rio Grand turkeys had an outstanding production year in 1985, which means large numbers of two-year-old gobblers will be available, said turkey program leader Don Wilson. "Spring 1985 was the second-best production period on record, and even though the 1986 year was only average there still should be unusually high number of birds."

Hunters should be aware of a new alignment in spring turkey reasons this year. There are two separate seasons, with opening day earlier in 20 South Texas counties.

In Maverick, Zavala, Frio, Atascosa, Live Oak, Bee, San Patricio, Nueces, Dimmit, LaSalle, McMullen, Webb, Duval, Jim Wells, Kleberg, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, Hidalgo and Willacy Counties, the season will be March 28 - April 12.

All other counties, including Coke County, are authorized to have a spring season April 4-19.


The season dates, which

are earlier than in 1986, are set to coincide with peak gobbling activity. Wilson said most gobbling was over by the time last year's spring season got underway.

Most turkey hunting in Texas is for Rio Grande turkeys, which range over the western two-thirds of the state.

In counties offering a spring season on Rio Grande turkeys, the bag limit is two gobblers. Hunters are reminded that it is illegal to take turkey hens during the spring turkey season. Regulations allow hunters to take three turkeys per year, with one tag on the hunting license valid for either the fall or spring season. Therefore, if a hunter took two turkeys during the fall, he would be allowed only one gobbler during the spring season.

Wilson said there are an estimated 417,000 Rio Grande turkeys in Texas, with the highest populations found in the Edwards Plateau, the South Texas Plains, the Cross-Timers of west-central Texas, and the Rolling Plains of West Texas.

Dear Editor:

So often all we ever hear about young people in the news are negative things. I realize this usually occurs in larger cities than Robert Lee, but even here in our town, we sometimes may not appreciate our youth as much as we should. I would like to relate a short story about one special group of young people in Robert Lee, that I have the joy and privilege to teach.

On March 5, 1987, my grandmother, Mrs. Alice Cannon, died. I was in the library with my seventh grade class at the time Mr. Gibbs told me of her passing. I did not say much to my students, but they could tell I was upset. The next day was the beginning of spring break, so I did not see them for a week.

This past Thursday, we were again having our library day. At this time all of the seventh grade students, led by Christie Payne, gathered around my table in the library. Needless to say, I was overwhelmed!

These young seventh graders decided, on their own, to contribute money and buy a book in memory of my grandmother. With the help of our school librarian, Mrs. June Gulley, they chose a pictorial book, Texas. This book will be a permanent part of the high school library.

I have taught school for six years, the last three in Robert Lee. Each class is very special in its own way, but this seventh grade class will always be remembered for their wonderful kindness and sweetness of spirit during a most difficult time in my life.



Postal Pointers

A very confusing endorsement appears on books and other packages you may receive. This endorsement is "Forwarding and Return Postage Guaranteed". To some customers this means you can return it "free of charge". This is NOT the case. This means that if someone has moved-- we can forward it "postage due" if we have a forwarding order. If we do not have a forwarding order, we return it to the sender-- "postage due".

If you receive a book or

other item with this endorsement and you did not order the book or do not want it-you should write "refused" on the article and initial it and we can return it to the sender. If you open it or open the letter attached to it-then you must pay postage back to the sender.

Remember-- decide whether or not you want the article when it is delivered to you and if you don't want it-don't open it to take a "peek" because if you do-you have to pay return postage.

WTU files rate request

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to lower the amount it charges its customers for fuel.

The petition, filed Wednesday, March 18, asks that the fixed fuel cost factors for the months of May through October be reduced by 35 per cent. The fixed factors are based on the expected cost of fuel as forecast at the time the factors are set, and specify the amount to be charged per kilowatt-hour for power plant fuel and purchased energy used to supply the customer.

Company officials listed three reasons for the request for lower factors. One is the softer market for natural gas, which is the principal fuel at eight of WTU's generating stations. Related

to this is the recent renegotiation of a contract with the Company's major supplier of natural gas. The third reason is the completion of the Company's first coal-fired generating unit, the Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon.

If the new fuel rate is approved, WTU expects the costs being charged to its customer to more clearly reflect the actual price of fuel, thereby eliminating the need for refunds during the six-month period.

Since the fixed fuel factor method was established in 1983. WTU has made five refunds to retail customers of over-collections occurring while fuel costs were declining. The most recent refund was credited to customer bills in February.

For the girls, Melinda Parker won 2nd place in the Discuss with a throw of 83'4".





4-H promotes leadership

4-H PROGRAM CONTINUES TO DEVELOP LEADERSHIP

Currently a target of proposed budget cuts in the Texas Legislature, the 4-H program remains one of the top youth organizations in the state and nation for turning out leaders-- the future of America.

'Some officials have pointed the finger at 4-H as costing the state too much, yet we spend only about \$8.00 of state general revenue per 4-H member each year," points out Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which administers the 4-H program. 4-H enrollment in Texas stands at about 305,000 members.

"That investment goes to programs and activities that help boys and girls gain leadership and coping skills that will make them more productive citizens."

Regardless of the types of projects 4-H members are involved in, whether they deal with beef or swine, safety or electricity, foods and nutrition or any of the more than 60 other project areas, the ultimate goal is still leadership and citizenship development," emphasizes Carpenter. "And I think we have done a good job in this. Studies have shown that 4-H members do well when they enter the mainstream of life. They are the community leaders, the ones that take charge to make life better for all concerned. Many go into agriculture and related industries and provide this state and nation with needed

strength in this area. "A County judge recently told me that he's never had a 4-H member come before his court for disciplinary action," Carpenter points out. "I'm sure that's the case in many of our counties, and it shows that 4-H is having a positive influence on the

lives of young people. You just can't put a price tag on that kind of achievement.'

A recent nationwide poll showed that 4-H had a positive impact on lifeskills needed by adults to become self-directing, productive members of society. Study results showed that former 4-H members were more involved in community activities and 4-H leadership positions than were nonparticipants of youth programs.

4-H alumni also said they were more satisfied with the program's contributions to their personal development (self-worth, responsibility and goal setting development).

In the study, former 4-H members gave higher ratings to experiences in gaining knowledge and skills and in developing a feeling of self-worth than did member of other youth programs. Of particular importance to 4-H members was the fact that 4-H enabled them to learn to work with others and to develop a sense of responsi-

"4-H has a proven tract record and is an investment in the future of this state and nation," Carpenter points out. "It's a program that we can't forsake-- there is too much at stake.
