Final pageant presentations slated

"OLE COKE COUNTY - Home of the Rabbit Twisters" will be presented for the second and final weekend Friday and Saturday evenings (July 31 - August 1). "A Singin'" by the Pageant choir and Indians will begin at 8:00 p.m. Flag ceremony begins at 8:25 p.m. with members of Fort Concho Infantry, choir and audience participating. The pageant begins at 8:30 p.m. Tickets are \$4.00 for adults, \$2.00 for children 5-12 and a 25 percent discount for groups of 20 or more. The outdoor theatre has wooden benches so a cushion is advised. A large enthusiastic crowd attended the colorful pageant each night this past weekend for a total of 660 paid attendance plus many small children, workers, and cast. Seven states other than Texas and 35 Texas cities were represented Friday night, four states and 36 Texas cities Saturday. The cast did a very fine job in presenting their roles. The narrator, "The Old Timer", (played by Tommy Williams) did an excellent job of holding the audience's attention. A new facet has been added this year - parking attendants - Jessie Gloria, Ricky Royall, Tony Dean, Domingo Perez and Fidel.

The horses, mules, wagon, the young and old actors and actresses dressed in styles of the early days some rustic, some frills, and others very colorful add to the beautiful outdoor set-

ting. These characters when not on stage mingle through the crowd on the top side TWISTER AVE. and visit. Commonly seen walking, visiting and occasionally stopping for someone to take his picture is the Indian Chief (Alvin Lara) dressed in his beautiful full-length head dress.

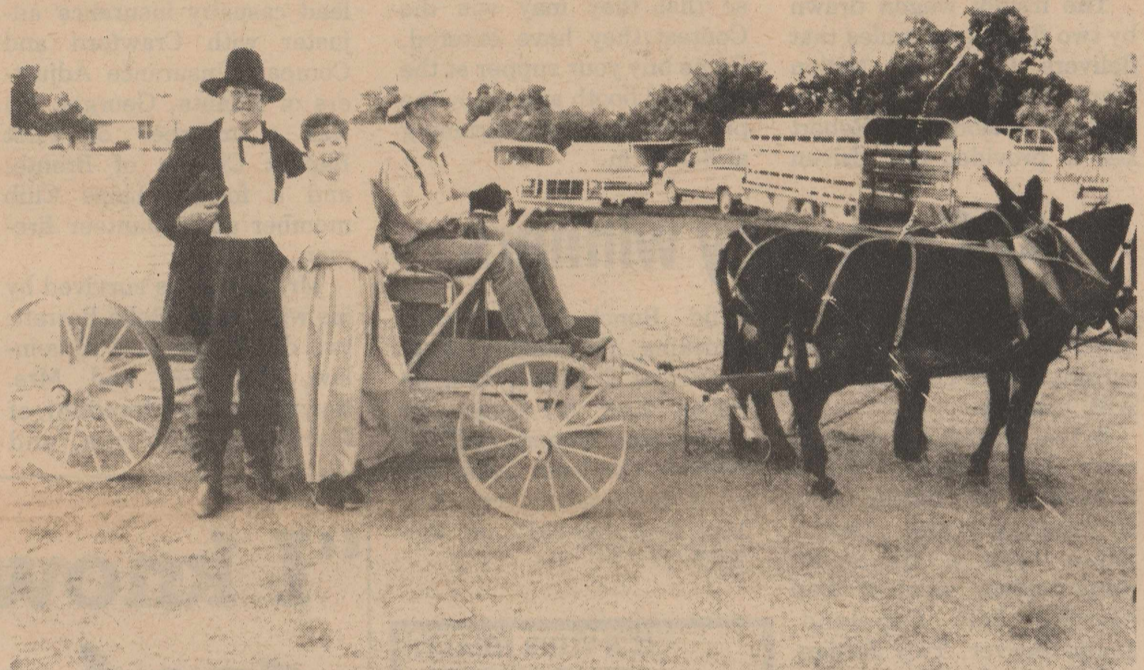
Poehls sets meetings

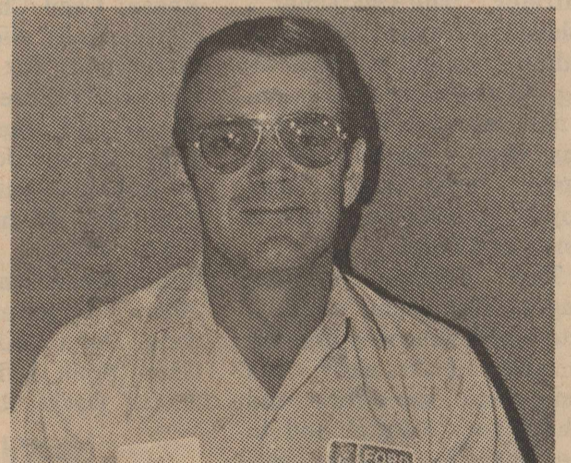

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is the nation's largest donor of



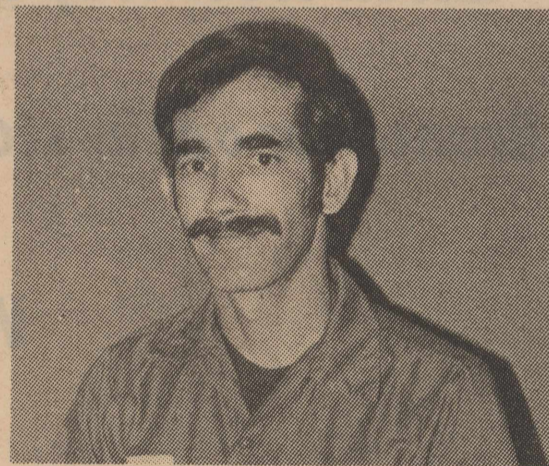

The second annual affair, sponsored by Snyder individuals Red and Harvey Pinkerton, drew 350 entries. The tourney did pay out for the father-son team; last year they lost money with a short entry list.

Tracksters return from Europe

Todd Brooks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Spivey, of Bronte and James Paul Skipworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Johnson, of Robert Lee have returned after a three week (June 24-July 15, 1987) tour with the United States track and field teams to Scandinavian Countries. There were selected through the West Texas Track Bests.

After a three hour flight from DFW Airport to New York City, the Texas tracksters joined the other Americans. They departed from JFK airport for a seven hour flight to Europe. The United States delegation passed through the Danish customs to arrive at their hostel. After a short rest they wandered into Stroget (a window-shopper's paradise). Later in the afternoon it was work time as they arrived at the track field for a light workout.

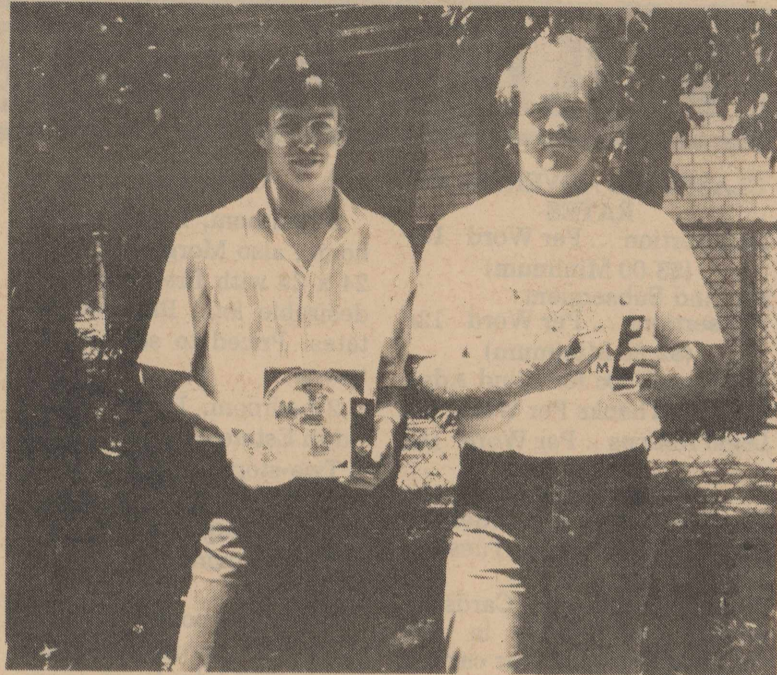
The main purpose of the trip was the **Scandinavian Track Meets - June 28, 1987**, at Uppsala, Sweden - James Paul won 3rd place in Shot Put; Todd won 3rd place in the 400 meter and 4th place in the 100 meter dash. The second track meet was held July 3, - The Stovner Games at Oslo, Norway - James Paul placed 2nd in Shot Put; Todd placed 3rd in the 100 meter dash and 4th in the 200 meter. The third and final meet was held July 10-12 - Scandinavian Championships called the Oresundspelen - there were 40 boys throwing the discus of which James Paul received a plaque for placing 8th; Todd placed 30th out of 128 runners in the 100 meter dash. They received plates, glasses and spoons in place of trophies, ribbons or medals as are usually presented.

Living quarters called hostels included - youth hotel in Copenhagen; University of Stockholm's dormitories; in Oslo they stayed in homes of host families from the Vidar Club; in Sogne, Norway an agricultural school; in Halden a historic mansion; and in Helsingborg, Sweden in a school and slept on cots.

Sightseeing included - boat/coach tour of Copenhagen's energetic harbor and beautiful central district; Christianborg Palace; Tivoli Gardens; the 701-year-old city of Uppsala, Sweden by ferry; castle near Jonkoping; Odinsborg Castle; cathedral (as described by J.P. and Todd - beautiful) in the center of Uppsala; Gamla Stan, Stockholm's old town and the Royal Palace; boat tour of Stockholm; Skansen - a large, open-air museum; atop the pass between Sweden and Norway; Kon-Tiki museum; in the port city of Kristiansand they visited Christianholm Fort, the Fish Quay, and the neo-gothic Kristiansand Cathedral; also, the Dutch town of Flekkefjord and the Kristiansand Zoo; and the Fredriksdal Oen Air Museum.

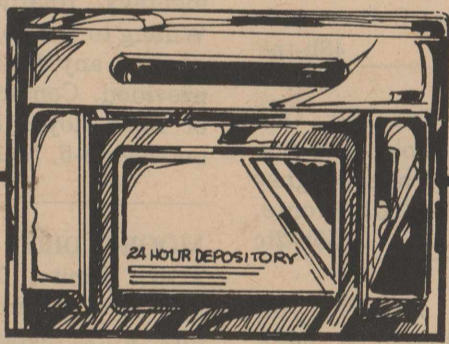

SS benefits until age 18

Children who reach their 18th birthday are no longer entitled to Social Security checks unless they are unmarried and are disabled or full-time students in an elementary or secondary school, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

A child can continue to get monthly payments if he or she has a physical or mental condition that prevents him or her from doing substantial gainful work and that is expected to last at least 1 year, Upp said.

If a child's monthly payments are discontinued at 18, they can start again if he or she becomes disabled before reaching 22, or becomes a full-time elementary or secondary school student before reaching 19.
