Good, general rains break August heat

County residents were elated to get good rains last Thursday and Friday to give a temporary break to dry, August heat. Although the east side of the county received smaller amounts, 4/10 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches, the west side gained a whopping 3 to $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches over the 2-day period. The good spring season was vanishing fast with a number of August days over 100 degrees when the rains fell. Some hail was reported near Norton but Bronte and Robert Lee escaped any damage from the heavy thunder and lightning displays which accompanied the clouds.

Ccke County Extension Agent Tommy Antilley reported that Milo harvest may be slowed down some but farmers around Bronte are already back to cutting. Cotton in the area might have been as well off without the moisture since it requires many heat units to produce, he said. Late planting, coupled with cool, cloudy weather, has slowed cotton development. Overall, Antilley said, the rains are invaluable this time of year for pastures and haygrazer-type crops.

Some plan to use the moisture to get small grains in the ground.

Accident report believed hoax

Frantic efforts to locate a man reportedly pinned under an overturned tractor in the southeastern part of Coke County were the result of an apparent hoax, said Sheriff Marshall Millican. He said a call on a CB radio in the area Sunday afternoon reported the accident and asked for help. Despite a search by law enforcement officers and volunteers, no trace of an accident victim was found. A Border Patrol helicopter from San Angelo joined in the effort. The hunt extended over into Runnels County and lasted until 11 p.m. when the search was called off.

According to Millican, giving a false report is against the law, leaving the caller open for prosecution.

T. Paul Barron, a resident of Robert Lee since 1977, passed away August 17 in a San Angelo hospital. He had been a resident in West Coke County Nursing Home, where one of his recent high moments was seeing a picture of one of his greatgranddaughters, Molly, holding her new little sister, Kathy. Kathy was born on the 4th of July and brought the population of his greatgrandchildren to three.

Barron was born in Midland in 1897 to West Texas pioneers J.H. and Annie Aycock Barron. T. Paul graduated from Baylor University in 1920. He was an enthusiastic Baylor alumnus and enjoyed displaying his Baylor diploma, signed by former Texas governor and then Baylor board president, Pat Neff. At one time T. Paul attended a Sunday school class where Pat Neff was his teacher.

After graduating from college, Barron served as Chamber of Commerce Secretary in Childress before returning to Midland to be the editor and publisher of the Midland Reporter-Telegram. While in the newspaper business T. Paul developed one of the lifetime habits which Robert Lee residents may have observed. He habitually stopped for coffee several times a day while running errands, in Midland, ostensibly for the purpose of garnering "local news". When he retired to Robert Lee, T. Paul transferred his base of operations to Sam's Place. He looked forward to spinning yarns and chatting with other old timers about people and daily events.

During the 1920's, T. Paul was elected mayor of Midland. He was, at the time, the youngest mayor in the state of Texas. In the early 1940's Barron sold the Midland newspaper and was in the hardware and western store businesses for a number of years until he retired. He was very proud of his participation in the growth of Midland from a sleepy cow town to an oil metropolis. But he personally preferred the pace and relationships of the smaller West Texas towns. He loved Robert Lee and often stated that he felt

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more at home here than in any other place he had lived.

In Robert Lee, Barron was a member of the First Baptist Church. He loved church music, especially choral works with harmony. He often added an impromptu "amen" to the close of an outstanding anthem.

T. Paul is survived by his wife, Pauline Coalson Barron, a Robert Lee retired teacher and long time resident. T. Paul's only child, Charles Barron, lives in New York and is president of defense electronics for the Eaton Corporation. Barron is also survived by two stepdaughters, La Nelle Abbott of San Angelo and Yvonne McElwain, Boulder CO; and one stepson, Derwood Coalson of Ft. Collins, CO. T. Paul enjoyed riding horses with La Nelle on the Abbott's ranch near Robert Lee and as late as 1977 kept his own horse there.

T. Paul Barron was a member of Midland Masonic Lodge 623 and was a long time member and past president of the Midland Rotary Club.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church with Brother Roy Epperson. along with Delbert Downing of Snyder, officiating. Burial was at Terry Memorial Cemetery, with the Rev. Jimmy Rogers of San Angelo presiding. 
Mr. Kirkland was born April 26, 1898, at Fort Chadbourne. He was retired from the Santa Fe Railroad, where he had been employed for 41 years.

Adapting to kindergarten

ADAPTING TO KINDER-**GARTEN** -- Even the parents of children who have attended pre-school or day-care can have mixed feelings about sending their child off to kindergarten, says family life specialist Diane T. Welch. "It's not unusual for parents to almost regret that the child must face the demands of school, and yet be proud that he or she is growing into a self-sufficient individual who can adjust to and enjoy the world outside the home," she says. "Children will have mixed feelings too, so by expressing their joys and concerns, parents become a role model for the child, encouraging open communication about school." According to the specialist, some parents fear that by allowing children to express negative emotions about starting school, they will encourage these feelings. But talking about it allows the child to acknowledge and work through these emotions without shame or guilt.

GETTING READY FOR KINDERGARTEN -- As the school year approaches, parents of kindergarteners can help their child make a smooth transition to school. Family life specialists with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service suggest making a visit to your child's classroom and teacher. Some schools schedule these visits with parents in advance. Explore the playground and bathroom, try out the chairs and find

the water fountains. Encou-

rage your child to play with another child who will be in the kindergarten class, so he or she will have a friend there. The specialists also suggest getting a head start on schedule changes by adjusting bedtime and mealtime if that will be necessary once school begins. If new day-care arrangements for before or after kindergarten are necessary, start the daycare routine before school begins, so the child doesn't have to adjust to both at once.

Shephards visit in Bronte



News from Oak Creek:

I've been reluctant to send out very much information about how the fishing's been here at Oak Creek this summer for several reasons. We hoped the lake would not have the fishing pressure it normally gets and we got our wish. The lake is working alive with bass just under the legal size limit and these, for the most part, have had a chance to grow. Not only does the lake have a healthy number of bass, it also has bait fish by the millions to feed the game fish. With the moss beds coming back and all the other cover that's already there, this old fishing hole has a lot of productive water to fish. The action on the bass is early and late, about two hours on either end of day light. Most of the crappie, catfish and bream are being caught at night

and some nice strings are being taken on a variety of baits.

Oak Creek is one of a few lakes left that has not been stocked with exotic fish of some sort over the past several years. The only fish not native to the lake are fish we wanted, Mississippi blue cat and the scrappy bronzeback smallmouth bass. The smallmouth bass fishing is different in many ways and requires techniques that differ from the way you fish for the largemouth bass.

Six months ago, we had 15 inch smallmouths caught and these fish are only two years old. To catch these old bronzebacks, you are going have to fish the rocky bluffs, drop-offs and structure that has rock in 15 to 30 feet water. The lake has a lot of this kind of water that was fished little up to now. The

only bad thing about all this is that once you hook on to a few of the smallmouths it's gonna be tough to decide where to do your fishing.

It wouldn't be any trouble making up your mind if you saw what I got to see this past Sunday evening. Steve Meldurm of Midland had two black bass, caught on top water baits that tipped the scales at 9 lbs. 8 ozs. and 5 lbs. 7 ozs. These cool fronts that are moving through are turning the fish on and from now to cold weather comes we expect to see a ton of fine fish taken out of this old fishing hole.

Sheep, goat field day slated at Angelo A sheep and goat field day on Sept. 3 will provide area producers a chance to observe research and education projects under way at the **Texas A&M University Agri**cultural Research and Extension Center near San Angelo.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, the Robert Lee ISD school officials will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatified with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Jimmy Bickley, Robert Lee ISD, HC 61 Box 303, Robert Lee, Texas 76945; 453-2612 for a hearing on the decision.

Households are required to report increases in household income over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced meals or for free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

SNACKING FITS THE ACTIVE LIFESTYLE

Skipping meals in favor of eat-and run snacks isn't necessarily a nutritional disaster. Many people assume that snacking is bad when, in fact, it can be good for you.

Snacking can provide you with all the nutrients you need -- if you make wise choices. Your body needs the calories, vitamins, minerals and proteins from wholesome foods. Sugar-filled snacks lack these nutrients but have plenty of calories.

When you don't have time for a meal try some of these:

* Take a bran muffin and yogurt for breakfast at the office.

* Buy from the vending machine that stocks peanut butter crackers.

* Enjoy a pizza with mushrooms and green peppers.

* Keep nuts, crackers and dried fruits in your desk drawer, car or pantry.

If you crave a sweet snack, at least choose one that has some health value, such as carrot cake, oatmeal raisin cookies or granola bars. If you are not overweight, you may have room in your diet for some sweets.

Fifteen hundred calories of wholesome foods -- in a snack or at meals -- can provide the Recommended Daily Allowance of vitamins, minerals and protein that you need to maintain your health.

Some of the snack foods that contain these nutrients include:

* Peanuts, peanut butter crackers, and sunflower seeds provide protein, Bvitamins and fiber. Jan Hohensee County Extension Agent-HE Coke Co.

* Fruit juices, dried fruit and fresh fruit -- especially raisins, apricots, bananas and oranges -- are high in vitamins A and C and iron.

> * Bread sticks, whole grain crackers, granola bars, dry cereals, muffins, bagels, fruit breads and popcorn are excellent carbohydrate sources.

> * Cheese, yogurt and pizza supply calcium, riboflavin and protein.

WHEN BUGS BITE - Insect stings and bites are usually annoying and mildly painful, but in some cases they can be dangerous. "Few people have extreme reactions to bug bites and stings," says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "Yet for the few who are allergic, reactions can be quite severe. Unfortunately, most people don't know they're allergic until they're bitten, so it's impor-tant to recognize and understand the difference between a local and systemic reaction," says Heussner. "Local reactions may cause swelling and redness at the site of the sting or bite. Systemic reactions are far more serious and involve the entire body." Symptoms of systemic reactions include dizziness, shock, fainting, wheezing, hives, a tightness in the chest, and facial swelling. In the case of a systemic reaction, the specialist recommends you call the local poison control center, or immediately take the victim to the nearest hospital

Hunting permits available from TPWD

Persons interested in gaining access to 413,976 acres of hunting lands enrolled in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Type II wildlife management areas may now obtain permits from the department.

Applicants can send a check or money order for \$35 to the TPWD, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744. On a separate sheet of paper, the applicant is required to print or type the following information: (1) applicant's first name, middle, intial and last name; (2) street address; (3) city; (4) state, (5) zip code; (6) county of residence; (7) sex, male or female; (8) height in feet and inches; (9) weight; (10) color of eyes; (11) color of hair; (12) date of birth; and (13) telephone number where the person may be reached during the day. With his information, a permit will be mailed back to the applicant in approximately 10 days. The permits may be purchased in person at 28 **TPWD** field offices across the state . Sale of the permits began the week of Aug. 10.

The Type II program is a new concept for Texas, offering hunters and outdoor recreationists low-cost access to land for hunting in season, fishing and camping. Hikers, bird-wathcers, and those who camp out will be required to purchase a permit. Licensed children under 13 will be the only ones allowed on the acreage free when accompanied by a parent or guardian who has a permit.

Purchasers of a Type II permit will receive a 45-page booklet containing maps and instructions. Each of the maps, (one for each of the 44 units) will indicate legal game, special restrictions, county, acreage of unit and access roads.

The department recently entered into an agreement with the State General Land Office (GLO) for approximately 66,000 acres of land that will be added to the Type II program. The majority of the acreage lies in Hudspeth County near Interstate Highway 10. The GLO lease agreement brings the total acreage in the program to 413,976. East Texas timber lands make up about $\frac{1}{2}$ of the Type II land, 160,000 is in the Trans-Pecos, and the Panhandle adds 28,000 acres to the program.

Holders of Type II permits also will be eligible to apply for special hunts on some of the Type II lands. Officials said a computer drawing will select 12 hunters to participate in a buck pronghorn antelope hunt Oct. 3-11 on lands near Dalhart in the Texas Panhandle. Deadline for submitting antelope applications to Austin headquarters is 5 p.m. Sept. 21. Approximately 125 buck mule deer permits also will be made available to Type II permit holders for hunts on the Black Gap WMA in Brewster County. Deadline for submitting mule deer applications is 5 p.m. Nov. 2.

Still available to Texas hunters is the Type I Wildlife Management Area program (200,000 acres of state land) in which hunters seek permits and hope to be drawn for various areas. The cost is \$40 for the 2-day only hunts and 4 times as many apply as are chosen in the drawings. Type II will undoubtedly be a boon to those who cannot get their names drawn and cannot afford or find a private lease.





GET READY FOR FALL GARDENING

A fall garden often produces better quality and higher yielding vegetables than a spring-summer garden.

Cooler weather means a longer harvest period for many vegetables. Lettuce and leafy greens are sweeter and more tender. You can count on lettuce, collards, spinach, broccoli, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts and Swiss chard to be a part of your Thanksgiving meal and maybe even your Christmas feast.

A fall garden requires careful planning, with planting timed to allow frostsensitive vegetables to mature and be harvested before frost. Cold, hardy vegetables can be planted for later harvesting.

Vegetables adapted to fall gardens can be divided into four groups by their tolerance of freezing temperature.

Warm-season vegetables adapted to fall gardens -- but killed by frost -- include snap beans, southern peas, summer squash, winter squash, cucumbers, sweet corn, and early maturing pepper and tomato varieties.

Cool-season crops usually damaged by light frost when mature include lettuce, cauliflower, kohlrabi, celery, cabbage and broccoli.

A third group of vegetables are those moderately tolerant of repeated light frosts: carrots, parsnip, beets, Brussels sprouts, leaf lettuce, endive, radishes, rutabagas and turnips.

The final grouping -- those tolerating night after night of freezing-- includes bulb onions, green onions, chives. garlic, leeks, multiplier onions, shallots, spinach, parsley, collards, kale, and Buttercrunch and Romaine varieties of lettuce.

Seeds of snap beans, baby lima beans, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, collards, chard, sweet corn, cucum-

bers and summer squash planted early to mid-August will produce crops ready for harvest before the first fall frost. Beets, kohlrabi, leaf lettuce, and spinach seedplanted in late summer will likewise provide abundant fall harvests. Mustard greens, radishes and turnips planted in early to mid-September will make it to the table in October and November.

Gardeners have several choices for starting their fall gardens. First of all, summer vegetable seedlings require constant attention. Sowing seed in the garden in summer is one choice but will require repeated irrigation and careful attention to pest control. It's often easier to start seedlings of tomatoes, peppers, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts and parsley in boxes or pots of potting soil, culture them in protected areas, and transplant them to the garden when four to five weeks old. Another option is to buy transplants of these vegetables at local nurseries to set in the garden at the right time.

WTU plans refund

West Texas Utilities Co. plans another refund to its retail customers in December of this year.

"The Company was to file a request Monday with the **Public Utility Commission of** Texas requesting permission to refund a total of \$3.8 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs during the months of December 1986 through July 1987. The total includes \$3.4 million actual fuel cost savings, plus \$.4 million in interest.

Paul Sublett and Bob Boone, WTU local managers, said recently negotiated contract revisions reflecting the continued soft price of natural gas makes the refund necessary.

"As our cost for boiler fuel went down, we simply overcollected under the fuel rate approved by the PUC," they said.


Check sodium in fast foods

CHECK SODIUM IN FAST FOODS -- If you're trying to reduce your sodium intake, reading the nutrition pamphlets in fast food stores will help, says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. A safe and adequate intake for sodium is 1100-3300 milligrams per day. But some fast-food sandwiches will contain over 1100 milligrams. By checking the sodium figures fast food items, you can either choose lowersodium foods, or compensate for a high-sodium fast food meal with less sodium at other meals, explains Cooksey.
