**Bryans attend Crosbyton drama**

Wilson and Lucile Bryan last week attended the second annual production of God's Country, A Musical Prairie Drama, depicting the history of Crosby County. The couple attended the first performance last year in the new Blanco Canyon Amphitheatre, 10½ miles north of Crosbyton, and found the play and theatre to be delightful. They met many of the actors and workers involved both on stage and behind scenes, shared experiences and ideas, and came away feeling that "both their county and ours has a good thing going".

Several Crosbyton families hope to attend Ole Coke County, Home of the Rabbit Twisters next summer, even

though they are busy in rehearsals in July. Since they do not rehearse on Saturday nights, they plan to attend Mountain Creek Amphitheatre's first Saturday performance, with one family hoping to spend the previous week at Lake Spence in their RV, thus realizing a recreational dream they have held for some time.

"Blanco Canyon Amphitheatre is the same size as ours, and the play is the same length and character," the Bryans explain. The play is written, produced, and directed by local people, and financed only by memberships, gate fees, and donations, with all profits turning back into next year's produc-

tion, just as Coke County's play. Actors and workers come from every town in the county, and they report that comraderie and unity are increasing.

The Bryans felt that "the main difference in the productions of our two counties is that they have larger numbers of people working at the many jobs necessary to stage a play. We need more people to become involved in the nitty-gritty of production. We plead for volunteers!" The Bryans urge those interested in keeping Ole Coke County alive to contact members of Coke County Pageant Association, or City Hall of Bronte or Robert Lee.

Coe's friend, Martha Campbell, of Portland took them on a tour of downtown Portland and they attended

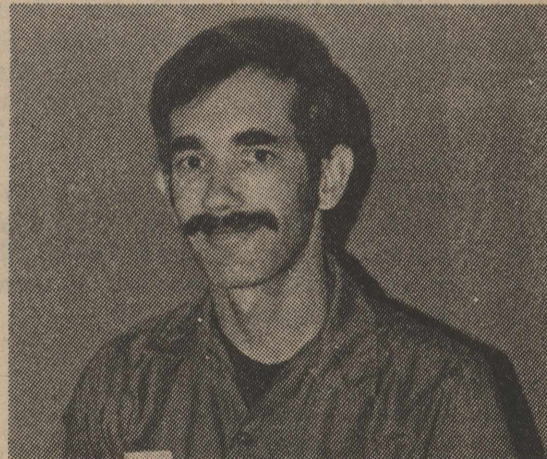
the dog races on their last night there. They agreed that Oregon is a beautiful state and their rose gardens are something to behold.

A few weeks ago I was so fortunate to be able to attend a conference in San Francisco on the management of the elderly patient.

It was on the plane to San Francisco that I had my first lesson, when a 93 year old lady, presumably in good health, mentioned that she did not see a doctor often... her remedy for health problems is vinegar!

At the conference important topics were presented such as urine incontinence, infections in the elderly, depressions, dementia and foot problems. In the nursing home, depression often leads to immobilization and refusal of food, causing malnutrition. According to one of the speakers, the offering of sweets such as candy can

surprisingly cause a breakthrough in a patient's downhill course.

Foot problems are often caused or aggravated by wearing shoes of the wrong size or shape and a small correction can make such a difference. To accentuate the importance of staying mobile, one doctor gave his 91 year old mother a pair of Nike running shoes as a birthday present.

The speakers on this conference were carefully selected and came from geriatric centers in California as well as from Seattle, Boston and even New York. I was very satisfied with the content and realize that much is applicable to conditions in our nursing home. The time and money were well spent.

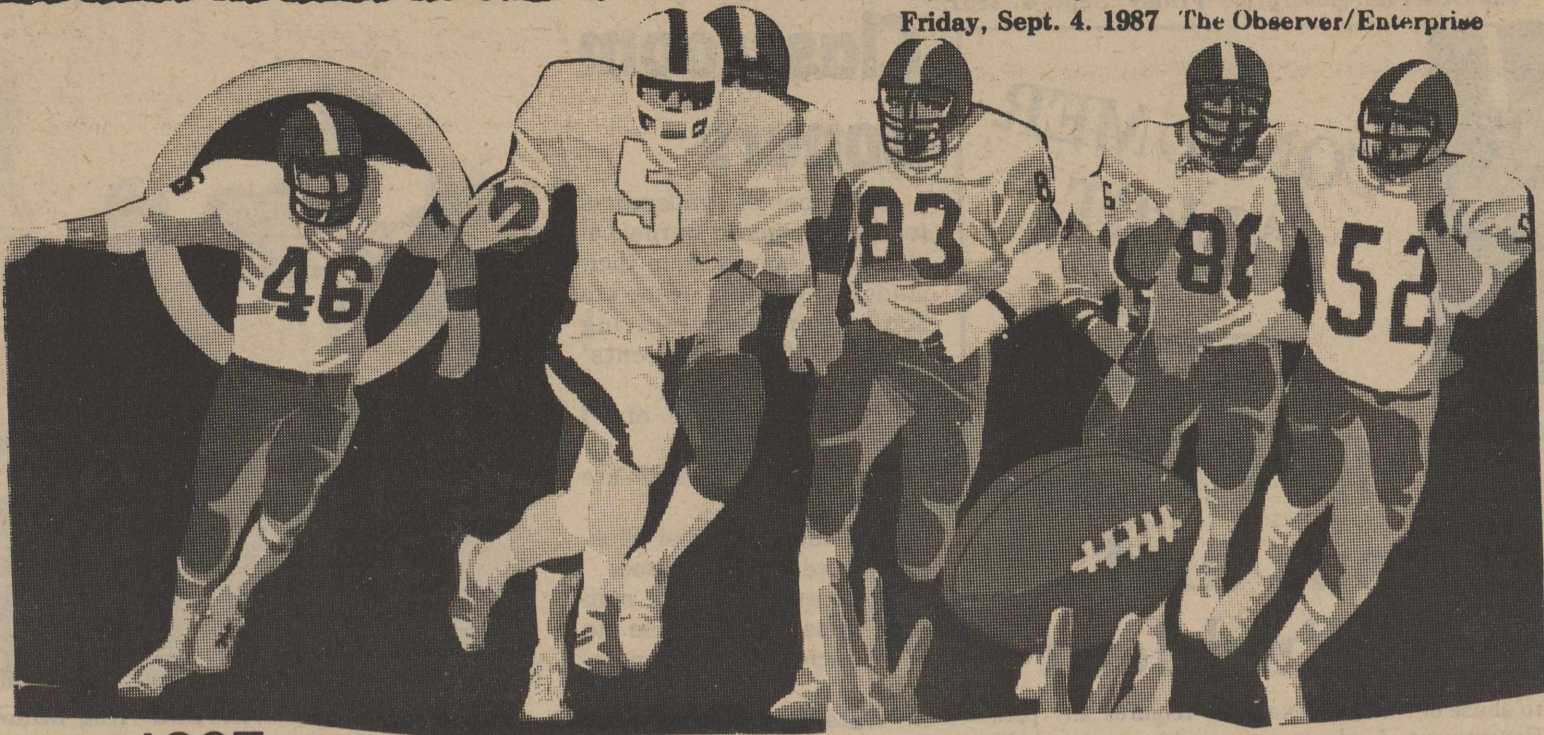

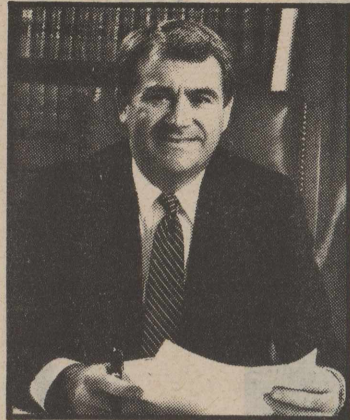

## Abuse of the Elderly: A Serious and Growing Problem

Investigations into abuse of the elderly by the Texas Department of Human Services have risen by more than 150% since 1983. DHS estimates that at least 110,000 incidents of elder abuse occur every year in Texas, many of which go unreported.

Texas law requires any person who has reasonable cause to believe an elderly or disabled person has been abused to report it to the Department of Human Services.

### WHAT THE LAW SAYS

Chapter 48 of the Texas Human Resources Code deals with abuse of the elderly. It provides that:

- the report may be made orally or in writing;
- DHS will investigate within 24 hours of getting the report;
- anyone reporting in *good faith* is immune from civil or criminal liability;
- an elderly person may request protective services;
- district courts can issue orders for emergency protection services for 72 hours, which may be renewed for another 72 hours.

### HOW TO REPORT

If you know of a case of abuse, exploitation or neglect of an elderly Texan, report it to your nearest office of the Department of Human Services. If you cannot make the report during normal working hours (Mon.-Fri. 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.), call the 24-Hour Abuse Hotline: 1/800/252-5400 or the Nursing Home Hotline (if it occurred in a nursing home): 1/800/252-9106.

If you want more information, write for the Texas Attorney General's brochure, "Abuse of the Elderly." Send a stamped, self-addressed envelope to: Jim Mattox, P.O. Box 12548, Austin, Texas 78711.

The U.S. Census reported 1.9 million Texans age 60 or older in 1980 and projects 2.4 million by 1990 and more than 3 million by the year 2000. Abuse of the elderly will undoubtedly increase as well, unless we do something about it.

### KINDS OF ABUSE

The elderly can be abused by their children or other family members and they can be abused by caretakers including nursing home personnel.

Abuse takes many forms: it can be psychological or physical; it can range from neglect of basic dietary needs to sexual assault.

Evidence of psychological abuse is hard for untrained observers to recognize. But many warning signs of physical abuse, neglect and sexual abuse are visible and apparent.

Frequent injuries, burns, bruises in unusual patterns, or passive and withdrawn behavior are warning signs of physical abuse.

Obvious weight loss, lack of personal cleanliness, dirty or torn clothes, and obvious fatigue and listlessness are warning signs of neglect.

Evidence of injury to the genital area, difficulty in sitting or walking, or physical signs of sexually transmitted diseases are warning signs of sexual abuse.

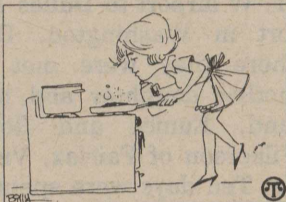

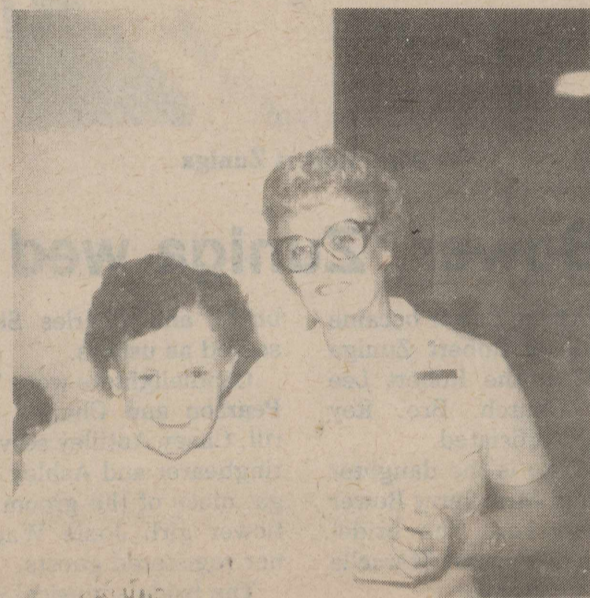

**Social Security**

Occasionally, people ask me if it's possible for a person to get Social Security while in jail. The situation usually arises when the worker has been charged with a felony, and Social Security retirement or disability payments are the family's primary income.

In general, the Social Security law prohibits the payment of benefits to people imprisoned for the conviction of a felony. These include childhood disability beneficiaries as well as people receiving other types of benefits under the Social Security retirement, disability, or survivors insurance programs.

However, benefits may continue to be paid to any family members receiving benefits on the prison's Social Security earnings record. And, the prisoner's benefit may begin again with the first full month after release from prison if he or she is otherwise entitled to benefits.

The only exception to the prohibition against the payment of benefits to prisoners

is if the person is entitled to benefits on the basis of a disability and is actively engaged in a vocational rehabilitation program approved by a court of law. The program must be expected to result in the person's being able to do substantial gainful work within a reasonable time after release.

A crime is considered a felony if it is defined as such under applicable State law. In legal jurisdictions which do not use the term felony, a crime shall be considered a felony if the sentence exceeds one year.

The present prohibition is a result of legislation enacted in 1980 and 1983. Before 1980, Social Security benefits were paid to people imprisoned for a felony on the basis that the benefits were an earned right that could not be taken away under existing law.

granola snacks than cookies, are a good source of dietary fiber.

Cookies usually contain both vegetable and animal fats, and have more cholesterol as a result. Granola snacks are low in cholesterol because they are made with vegetable oils.

It is difficult to say which is the better choice. Both snacks provide comparable amounts of carbohydrate, fat and energy. The granola snack has a little less cholesterol and a little more fiber, but it may also be high in salt. So the small differences between the two snacks may be nutritionally insignificant.

If you are paying premium prices for granola products labeled as health snacks, when your children would just as soon have a cookie, be aware that you are not buying extra nutrition.

Making home-made cookies, where you can use vegetable fats or preparing your own granola with less salt is probably a more nutritious alternative than the store-bought version of either snack.

The key thing is that children eat any type of snack food in moderation as part of a balanced diet that gives them the nutrients they need.



**GRANOLA SNACKS OR  
COOKIES IN THE  
LUNCH BOX?**

Granola snacks are often advertised as a "healthy" alternative to cookies for the kids' lunch boxes or after school snacks.

According to a report of the American Council on Science and Health, however, there isn't much difference between commercial granola snacks and store-bought cookies.

Their analysis showed that granola snacks contain 110 to 150 calories per serving, depending on added ingredients such as dried fruits, nuts and chocolate. Two oatmeal, chocolate chip or sugar cookies contain between 120 and 130 calories.

The granola snacks provide 2 grams of protein, 5 grams of fat and 20 grams of carbohydrate. The cookies have 1 gram of protein, 5 or 6 grams of fat and 16 to 18 grams of carbohydrate.

Both the granola snacks and the cookies are relatively high in sugar, fat and calories. Both supply about equal amounts of vitamins and minerals.

When it comes to sodium, granola snacks vary widely, and some approach the amount of sodium in corn chips or potato chips. But the nuts, dried fruits and whole grains which are usually found in greater amounts in

**Letter to the Editor**

Dear Editor:

I want to tell you and others how I enjoyed reading of the obituary of John Adkins. He was a cousin of mine.

Now I will tell you how we were cousins. His father, Jack Adkins, was a first cousin to my mother, Selia B. Austin.

I have pictures of the Adkins boys (cousins Jack's boys, that is).

I, being a sickly little girl, Papa boarded me out with Cousin Jack and Cousin Mollie who lived up the road from the Sanco Post Office.

There were two Adkins girls, Zemina and Ila, who were near my age - and I lived with them several school terms and also with Aunt Mary Benningfield. Uncle Jim ran the gin at Sanco. I spent several school terms with them as they grew into men. Cousin Jack and Cousin Tom Adkins, they grew up with the Austin boys. My uncles were Eli, Robert, Isham, Coke and Aunt Maggie and my mother who was born after they arrived in Coke County. It was then Concho Co. I can remember my mother saying that Jack and Tom would cry at times to return to their mother back in Kentucky. But they did not return.

My mother said that Cousin Mollie, Cousin Jack's wife, made her wedding dress. When J.J. Austin and wife were preparing to move from Kentucky to Texas these two young boys of J.J. Austin's sister wanted to come along and as they would be needed to help him to move as they planned to ride the train when convenient and then go over land driving cattle and horses and several wagons trailing, well, we children of Eugene and Selia Fletcher wondered why these boys called our Grandpa Austin Uncle Jurde.

In 1916 or perhaps 1915, the Jack Adkins were moving to Jal, New Mexico and we wanted to follow, and file on land. But we were offered a section at Hobbs, N.M. and we stopped there, and my father, being a blind man, we needed help as my brother was only 13 years old, I eleven, and my sister 5 yrs. old. Another of the

Adkins boys, Ernest, helped us up the cap rock at Gail, Tex. and on into New Mexico at Seminole, Texas.

At about this time John Adkins and a sister and her family left out from Jal, N.M. for Calif. We did not hear much of them any more.

Recently I had a beautiful letter from a young girl in Arkansas who said she was Ernest Adkins' girl. She got my address from a Coke County book she said. So now I have established my cousins and grandparents, Jim and Mary Fletcher. They along with my brother Oren Fletcher, are all buried at Sanco on the side of a little hill along with several other relatives.

And now I will establish who my father was - a blind broom maker - he lost his eye sight while moving to Coke Co. He went to the blind institute at Austin and on a trip home he and Selia Austin were married in 1902. We moved to Hobbs, N.M. in 1916-17 and helped our parents live out that claim. I became a real cow girl with my own pony and saddle. We moved from there, after 10 or more years - Papa sold out to Mr. Selman and did not retain the oil or mineral

rights. I finished school at Hobbs.

Please have someone read this letter, it would make a little history book of early day living - I would love to see it in print.

Now I'm 84 yrs. old past June 29 this year. If you can print it in the paper I'd love to have it published now that I've had a stroke. But am fine -

Have relatives and I guess cousins all over Coke Co. I am an artist, have drawn and painted our old place in the Yellow Wolf Valley.

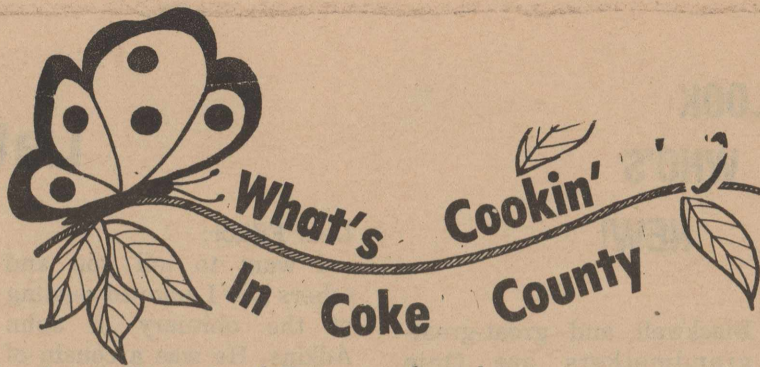

### SANTA FE-STYLE BROWNIES

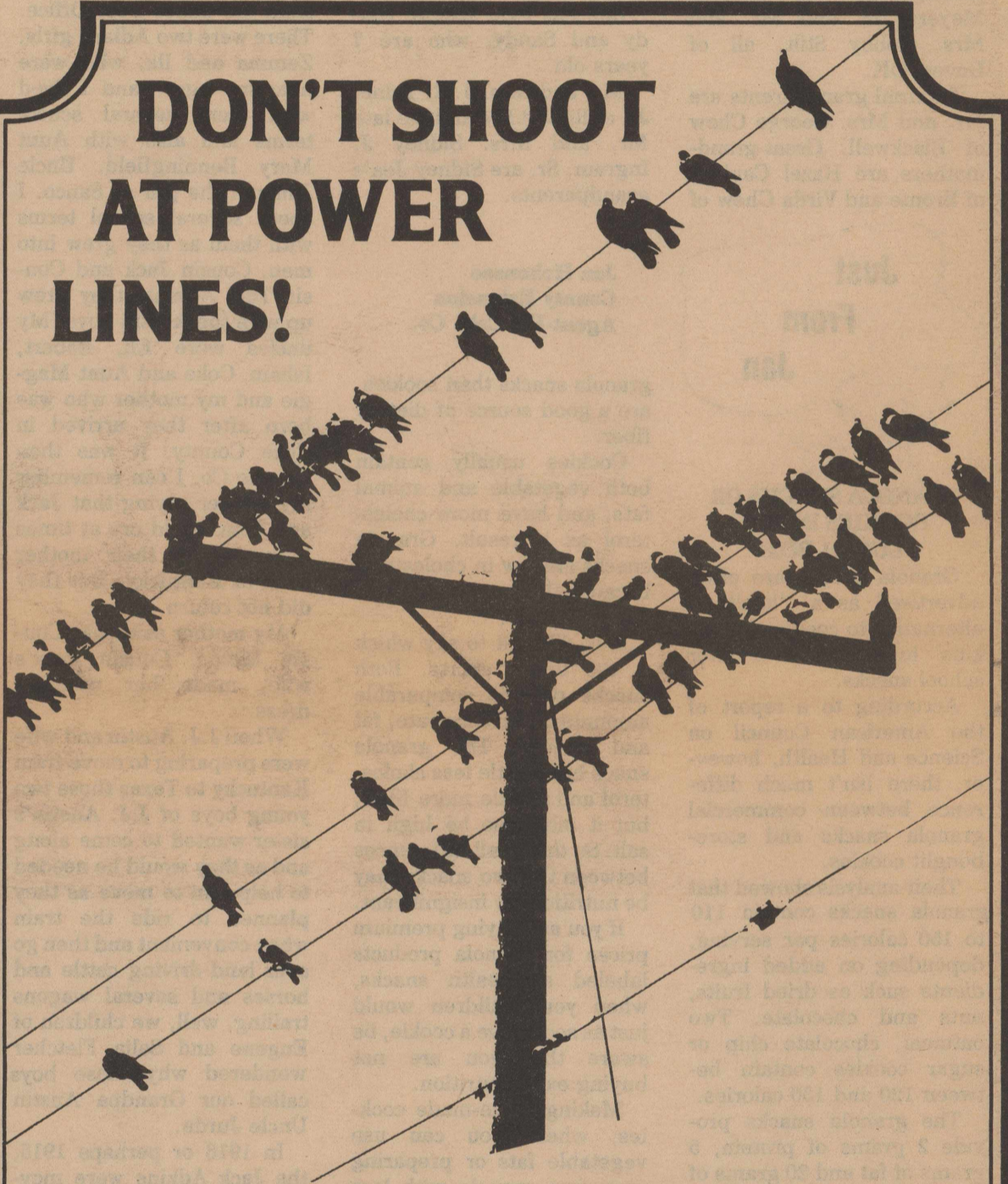
2 pkgs. (4 oz. each) sweet  
chocolate  
¾ c. all-purpose flour  
2 tps. instant espresso  
coffee  
dash of salt  
⅔ c. butter or margarine,

softened  
¾ c. firmly packed light  
brown sugar  
3 eggs  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 c. coarsely chopped  
walnuts  
\*Melt chocolate in small  
sauce pan over very low  
heat, stirring constantly. Set  
aside.  
\*Mix flour, coffee and  
salt; set aside.

\*Cream butter. Gradually add sugar, blending well after each addition. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Blend in chocolate and vanilla. Add flour mixture, beating just to blend. Stir in walnuts. Spread in greased 8-inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes. Cool in pan. Cut into squares or bars. Serve with thawed whipped topping and fresh fruit, if desired. Makes about 20.

Note: To melt chocolate in microwave, unwrap and break in half. Place in microwave-safe bowl. Heat at HIGH 2 to 2½ minutes until almost melted. Stir until smooth.

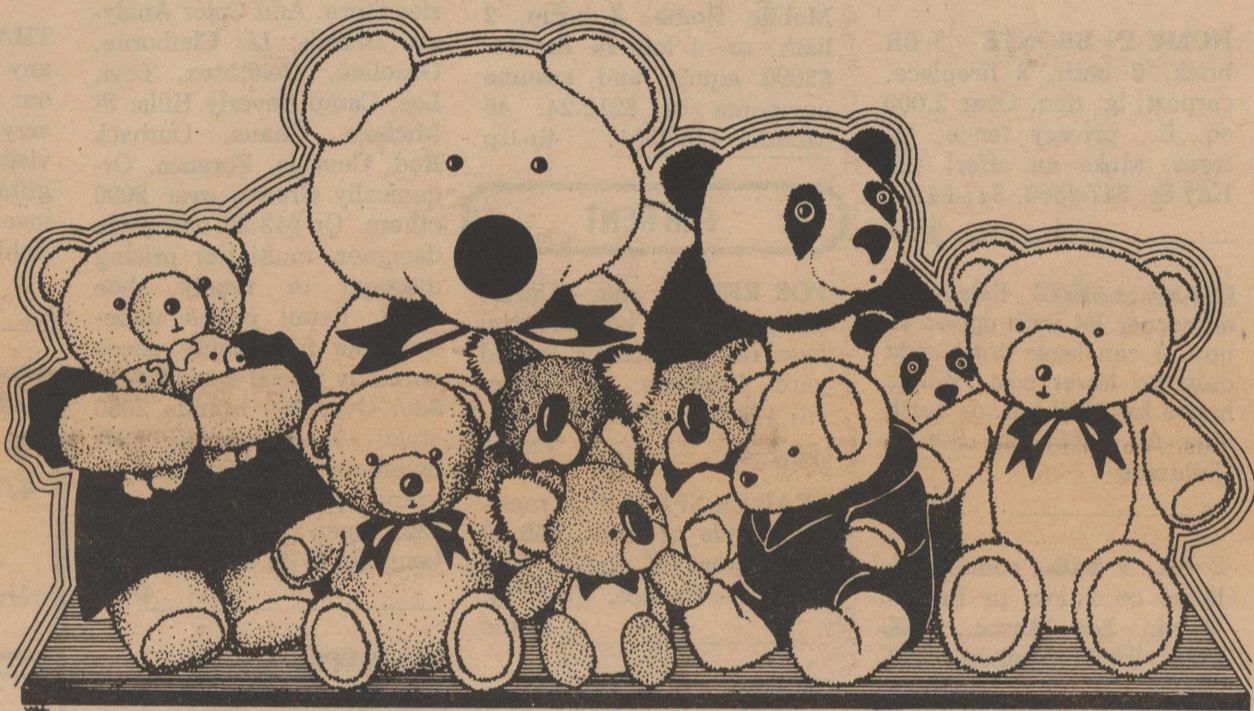

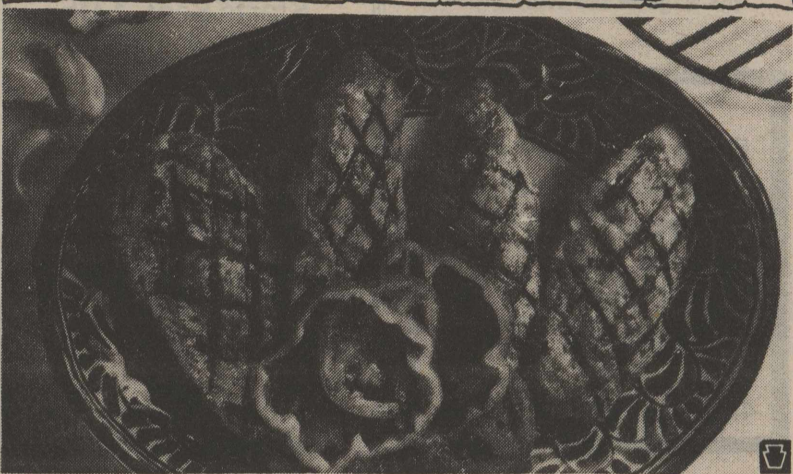

| 2 tablespoons minced fresh cilantro or parsley | 3/4 teaspoon black pepper                  |
| 2 cloves garlic, pressed                       | 4 turkey breast cutlets*                   |

Measure tomato, onion, green pepper, cilantro, garlic, teriyaki sauce, oil, lime juice and pepper in blender container; whirl on medium speed 30 seconds. Place turkey cutlets in large plastic bag; pour in marinade. Press air out of bag; tie top securely. Refrigerate 4 hours, turning bag over occasionally. Remove cutlets from marinade; place on grill 4 inches from hot coals. Cook about 5 minutes on each side, or until turkey is tender. (To broil: Place turkey cutlets on rack of broiler pan. Broil 4 to 5 inches from heat 7 to 8 minutes on each side, or until turkey is tender.) Makes 4 servings.

\*Or use a 2 1/2 to 3-pound turkey half breast, skinned, boned and cut lengthwise into 4 or 5 equal pieces.

## Providing calcium for school kids

Make It Milk For School Lunches -- There's no doubt that children and teenagers need plenty of calcium, but they're now less likely to get it from the small square milk carton that used to be a part of every school lunch. The availability of fruit drinks in pouches or individual serving size cartons means children don't have to buy milk to go with their sack lunches. In many high schools, students also have the choice of getting a soft drink from a machine. "The question for parents is whether they think their child is getting enough calcium each day for good health," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. When

children and teenagers don't drink milk at school or home, the nutritionist suggests that they be offered more dairy products in meals and snacks. Cheese sandwiches, cheeseburgers, cheese and crackers, string cheese, cheese pizzas, flavored yogurts, milk shakes, ice cream and milk-based puddings all add calcium to the child's diet, she explains.

**Children And Teens Need Calcium --** How can you tell if your children are getting

enough calcium? Look at the servings of dairy products they eat each day. "Children ages one through 10 need 800 milligrams of calcium a day," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "This requirement can be met with three servings of dairy foods as part of the everyday diet. Due to increasing bone length and development, adolescents 11 to 18 years old need 1,200 milligrams of calcium, which can be met by eating four servings of dairy foods daily," she adds. One 8-ounce cup of milk, which is the amount contained in a milk carton served in schools, is one serving. A 1-1/2 ounce piece of cheese or a cup of yogurt are also equivalent to one serving, according to the nutritionist.

**Who Needs To Know cpr --** Medical personnel and life guards aren't the only people who need to know how to do CPR, or cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service health education specialist. "The composition of your family, where you live and your lifestyle may make it important that you know CPR," says Dr. Mary Ann Heuss-

ner. In cases of drowning, suffocation, electrocution, automobile accidents, or heart attacks someone trained in CPR can provide proper lifesaving measures until trained professionals take over, she says. According to the health educator, people who have young children or care for children or an elderly person in their home should have CPR training. In addition, people who have homes with swimming pools or ponds, and those who engage in water sports and boating should know the lifesaving techniques. Families in rural areas which are some distance from medical facilities and those living in areas with limited ambulance service should also consider taking CPR classes from the local Red Cross, American Heart Association or other health agency, she says.

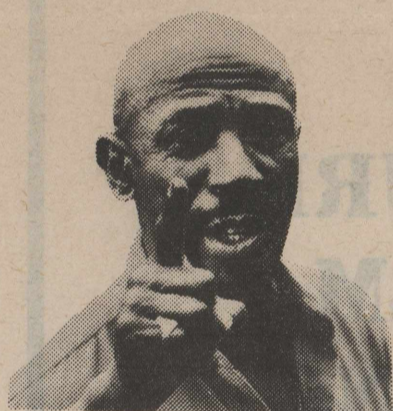

Ann. art. 1446c and seeks determinations by the Commission that (1) the payments provided for in the cogeneration agreement are equal to or less than TU Electric's avoided costs as established by the Commission and in effect at the time the cogeneration agreement was signed; and (2) the cogeneration agreement provides TU Electric the opportunity to acquire the cogeneration installation before the installation is offered to another purchaser in the event of its abandonment, or provides other sufficient assurances that TU Electric will be provided with a comparable supply of electricity, if EDC One Inc. ceases to operate the installation. The joint application has been docketed by the Commission as Docket No. 7623. A copy of the joint application is on file at the Commission.
