Local election results released

Coke County Clerk Ettie Hubbard released the results of Tuesday's Special Election on Wednesday and explained that the votes had not been canvassed by presstime.

Apparently sparked by interest in the pari mutuel wagering referendum on the ballot, Coke County voting numbers far exceeded the Secretary of State's estimation of the statewide turnout. A light vote of 12-14% was expected for the off-year Special Election last Tuesday. Out of 2,190 registered voters, 798 cast their ballots for a 32% turnout in Coke County.

Local voters adopted 11 of the proposed constitutional

amendments including 3, 8, 12, 13, 15, 16, 19, 22, 23, 24, and 25 and rejected the other fourteen. They turned down the proposal to return to an elected State Board of Education (204-534) in place of the current appointed panel. The #2 referendum proposition to return parimutuel gambling to Texas for the first time since 1937 was defeated in Coke County by a count of 343-427. Although statewide ballots were not final, preliminary reports indicate it probably will pass by a very close margin, perhaps a 53-47% split.

Texas is the largest state in the nation without legal

track wagering. Pari-mutuel betting reigned in Texas early in the century, 1905-09 and again from 1933 to 1937. Most West Texas counties passed the option.

EMS gets reprieve

The impending collapse of the West Coke County Volunteer Emergency Medical Service may have gotten a reprieve Tuesday night when a public meeting was held at the Robert Lee School.

Presently staffing the ambulance are 10 people who have been carrying the load for the community, leaving their homes or jobs at a moment's notice. Emergencies never wait for weekdays either-- they happen on holidays, days off, Sundays, and often at 2 a.m. Many faithful ambulance personnel have been lost due to being overwhelmed by the crush of ambulance runs. The staff is literally worn out. The organization is dominating their lives. Present volunteers can no longer keep up the pace for the entire comunity. That was the issue Tuesday night. A good response to the appeal for help by the EMS staff was evidenced by the number attending. Lou Wright chaired the meeting which included a question and answer period along with information about training requirements, etc. A total of 12 people committed themselves for the next school. Ms. Wright informed the group that dates for the next training session will be set as soon as possible. It was also noted that drivers for the ambulance are not required to take the same training as attendants.

The EMS group urged everyone in the community to consider sharing the responsibility with them.

Services were held at 2 p.m. October 30 in the Robert Lee Baptist Church with Rev. Jimmy Rogers, pastor of Pecan Baptist Church officiating. Bro. Rogers was assisted by Rev. 
Ms. Burns was born March 11, 1909 in Maryneal. She lived in the Bronte area more than 20 years.

Horns tarnish Eagle perfect record

The Bronte Longhorns proved that the District 6-A football crown will not be an easy path for the Sterling City Eagles. Coming into the game last Friday night in Bronte, the Eagles had the lead with a perfect 5-0 district record and a one game lead over Eden. The night ended with Eden and Sterling tied at 5-1, though Sterling has the nod since they beat Eden, and Bronte with an outside shot at the district crown.

Bronte's level of play improves each game and last Friday it would be hard to find anyone who would argue that they were not the best team in the district. The score was 13-0 in favor of Bronte, but that does not reflect the three other scoring threats and the amount of time the ball stayed in the Sterling end of the field.

Longhorn fans can look back to one fumble costing Bronte district in 1987, that is if they win their last two games against Irion and Robert Lee. That fumble was in their own end zone in the Eden game that Eden recovered for a TD. Had that not occurred along with an 87 yd. run by Eden in last minutes of the game, Bronte would be tied for the lead and then, having beaten Eden and Sterling, would be in a good position for the play-

Sheldon cautions against aid ads

Al Sheldon, counselor at Bronte High School, would like to caution parents reoffs. However, that did not happen and Bronte still has a shot at the playoffs.

Last Friday's scoring opened early in the second quarter when Bronte's quarterback, Stephen Lee passed for a 10 yard TD to John Morrow. The Longhorns got the ball at the Sterling 13 when Shannon Hoffman recovered a fumble. Lee kicked the extra point and it was 7-0 with 10:53 left in the half.

Just before half-time Sterling was at the Bronte 43 yard line attempting to pass their way quickly downfield for a score. Morrow burst into the Sterling backfield and knocked the ball loose from the Sterling QB where it was recovered by Shane Kelton. Only 14 seconds was left on the clock. Lee threw one incomplete pass and the clock stopped at :08. Then from the Sterling 42 yard line, Lee passed to Adam Minjarez at the one yard line where he was pushed out of bounds with one second left. But excitement was all that came of that drive. Lee passed again intended for Morrow, but it was intercepted in the end zone and time ran out.

Bronte struck again in the fourth quarter after a fake punt by Sterling did not work and the ball went over to Bronte at the Bronte 40. Jeff Lee ran the ball three times on bursts up the middle where he was successful all night. S. Lee carried it across for the TD on a 14 yard run. It took Bronte six plays to cover the sixty yards and all were running plays. The PAT was blocked and it was 13-0 Bronte with 10:31 left in the game.

Defense was the real story for the Longhorns. Conda Richards made his presence known all over the field from his linebacker position. He covered the receiver like a blanket and played the run excellently. Shane Kelton and Tim Sims led in shutting down Sterling's running game by keeping Sterling's premier runner, Abel Garcia, in check. Bronte has developed a solid pass defense with the surprising capability of freshman Bill Windham at defensive back, combined with the speedy Adam Minjarez on the other side backed by Stephen Lee. They turned in a perfect 0 score for Sterling who was reputed to have one of the most powerful offenses in the district.

Bronte travels to Mertzon this Friday and though Irion County has a poor 1-5 record in district they will still be tough. There are only two games left in the '87 season, so come out and back the Longhorns!




Rattlesnake killed

Joe Roberts appointed

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association has appointed Joe B. Roberts, 33, of Merkel, Texas, to serve as field inspector for TSCRA District 16 in West Central Texas, effective immediately, says Don C. King, secretarygeneral manager. Roberts will be headquartered in Merkel. He succeeds longtime Field Inspector Hatton M. Moore Jr. of Clyde, Texas. Moore retired after 38 years of service as a brand and field inspector.

TSCRA, a 110-year-old cattlemen's organization, employs 32 field inspectors, all certified peace officers carrying special Ranger commissions, to assist cattlemen and conduct livestock theft investigations in Texas and Oklahoma. In 1986, the inspectors, working with state and local law enforcement agencies, developed 149 theft cases, primarily dealing with cattle. They recovered or accounted for 4,372 head of livestock and ranch-related property valued in excess of \$2.8 million, King said.

Inspector Roberts, who served almost 12 years in the Abilene area as a TSCRA brand inspector, will work with cattlemen in Shackelford, Callahan, Coleman, Runnels, Taylor, Jones, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Scurry and Mitchell counties. He also will supervise all brand inspection activities in his district, King said.

Roberts, a native of Sherman, Texas, began his livestock career as a teenager working for the late Harry "Pete" Hudgins, well-known cowman and TSCRA honorary vice president from Sherman. At age 15, however, he moved to the South Plains to work for a feedyard near Muleshoe, where he graduated from high school. He returned to Sherman to study agriculture and business courses at Grayson Junior College.

From 1972 until his employment in 1975 with TSCRA, Roberts worked primarily on ranches, including the SMS Tongue River Ranch at Dumont, and in feedlots in West Texas and the Panhandle. As a brand inspector, he initially worked the auction markets in Abilene, Sweetwater, and Haskell, but in later vears concentrated on Abilene and Sweetwater. Roberts has been a reserve deputy with the Nolan County Sheriff's Department for a year and a half. He is a certified peace officer and has his basic certificate in law enforcement. Roberts is married to the former Bobbye Millsap of San Angelo. They are the parents of two boys, Joe Ben Roberts, 11; and T.J. Roberts, 7. "Inspector Roberts' extensive livestock background, ranch experience and work as a brand inspector qualify him for this position with TSCRA," King said. "His knowledge of ranch operations in his district and wide acquaintance with area cattlemen also will be valuable in his new job. He should provide good service to TSCRA members and other

office or your mail carrier. 3. When mailing oversized envelopes, be sure to mark them clearly if you are mailing them First-Class. Write "First-Class" on both the front and back of the envelopes so they will not be mistaken for Third-Class.

4. As an extra precaution, put your name and address on a slip of paper inside your packages, so that they can be returned if the address is illegible.

5. Use strong, reinforced tape on parcels, since string or twine can get caught in postal machinery.

6. It is not necessary to use wrapping paper on packages. On a clean box, mark out any confusing addresses and print the mailing address and return address in large clear letters.

7. If you are mailing a package that contains fragile or perishable items, do not hesitate to mark the parcel appropriately so that clerks know to handle it with extra care.

8. You don't have to use Registered Mail (minimum cost \$3.55) when all you really want is a Certificate of Mailing (45 cents). Use Registered Mail to send irreplaceable items or items you want to insure beyond the \$500 limit on regular insurance. Certified Mail will provide you with a record of delivery.

9. You can buy postage stamps and stamped envelopes through the mail by using a "Stamps by Mail Order Form" available at your post office or from your letter carrier.

10. You can buy 14-cent post cards at your post office, thereby paying only for the postage, and not the card.

11. Except for the purchase of money orders, the post office will accept personal checks for payment of postal services and products up to the amount of purchase.
