Rivals to clash Friday night

The annual Coke County High School Football Championship will be decided this Friday night in Bronte when the Robert Lee Steers will travel to Bronte to play the Longhorns. Neither team has a chance of making the play-offs, but traditionally it is still one of the most important games of the year.

Bronte comes into the game with a 6-3 season record and a 4-3 district record and Robert Lee is 6-3 on the

87 season and 4-3 in district. This will be the final game of the 1987 season.

Jim Rawlings has kept an interesting record of football scores between the Bronte Longhorns and the Robert Lee Steers over the years. He also compiled some facts about the games and submitted this information for Coke County fans. He collaborated with Ronnie Baker of Robert

Lee and they came up with the following information and scores: Bronte has won 36 games between the years 1931 and 1986; Robert Lee has been victor in 33 contests between the two teams. There have been 4 ties. The most points scored was 54 by Robert Lee in a 54-0 victory in 1945. The most points scored by Bronte was in the 1986 game which Bronte won 54-27.

Robert Lee with the Rev. Larry Anderson and the Rev. Keith Williams officiated. Burial was in Paint Creek Cemetery, directed by Shaffer Funeral Home.

Ms. Plumlee was born June 1, 1897, in Edith. She had lived in Robert Lee since 1938, and was a member of the Victory Assembly of God Church.

Survivors include two sons, Sam Plumlee of Carlsbad, NM, and Derwood Davis of Portland, OR; one stepson, S.B. Plumlee of Robert Lee; five daughters, Eugenia Smith of Carlsbad, NM, Bessie Brice and LaVern Summers, both of Robert Lee, Trudi Green of Sun Lakes, AZ, and Ganiele Gardner of Midland; one sister, Lilly Gaines of Robert Lee; two brothers, R.B. King of El Paso and Dave King of Robert Lee; 22 grandchildren, 55 great-grandchildren and seven great-great-grandchildren.

The two teams battled to a 0-0 tie in 1977 for a new record in lowest point total!

Here is how the teams scored in their games (sometimes meeting twice a season) over the past 54 years, according to Jim's research: 1931 - RL 26, Bronte 0; 1932 - RL won, scores not available; 1933 - RL victory, scores N.A.; 1934 - RL won 2 games, scores N.A.; 1935 - Bronte won 2, no scores; 1936 - RL won both games, scores N.A.; 1937 - Bronte won both, no scores; 1938 - Bronte 2 wins, no scores available; 1939 - Bronte 6, RL 6 and Bronte 8, RL 0.

In 1940, Bronte won both games, the first score being 12-0 and second game score unavailable; 1941 - Bronte won both; 1942 & 43, the schools did not play during those two years of World War II; 1944 - Bronte 6, RL 6 and RL 12, Bronte 7; 1945 - RL 29, Bronte 0 and RL 54, Bronte 0; 1946 - RL 13, Bronte 7 and RL 13, Bronte 0; 1947 - Bronte 25, RL 0 and Bronte 32, RL 0; 1948 - RL 14, Bronte 0 and RL 13, Bronte 12; 1949 - Bronte 14, RL 12 and Bronte 7, RL 0.

In the fifties, the teams mixed up their wins with Bronte recording 10 wins to Robert Lee's 6 within that period. Scores were: 1950 - RL 33, Bronte 0 and RL 25, B 12; 1951 - RL 29, Bronte 19, and Bronte 12, RL 7; 1952 - RL 8, Bronte 7 and RL 7, Bronte 7; 1953 - B 28, RL 6 and B 39, RL 6; 1954 - B 34, RL 25 and

B 29, RL 25; 1955 - Bronte 38, RL 6; 1956 - Bronte 13, RL 0; 1957 - RL 25, Bronte 7; 1958 - B 31, RL 8; 1959 - B 23, RL 8 and B 38, RL 0.

Bronte won 6 of the 1960's games and RL took 4. In 1960 it was Bronte 32, RL 8; 1961 - Bronte 25, RL 8; 1962 - RL 24, Bronte 6; 1963 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1964 - RL 34, Bronte 14; 1965 - Bronte 20, RL 15; 1966 - Bronte 31, RL 6; 1967 - B 28, RL 12; 1968 - RL 30, B 15; 1969 - B 12, RL 0.

In 1970 - RL over Bronte 32-0; 1971 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1972 - RL 33, Bronte 0; 1973 - RL 19, Bronte 0; 1974 - Bronte 41, RL 0; 1975 - Bronte 20, RL 0; 1976 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1977 - Bronte 0, RL 0; 1978 - RL 21, Bronte 14; 1979 RL 7, Bronte 3.

The 1980 years were tied up with 3 wins each until last year when Bronte won and stepped in first place. Tonight's game will either add to Bronte's lead in the decade's victory or if Robert Lee wins, tie it all up again!!!

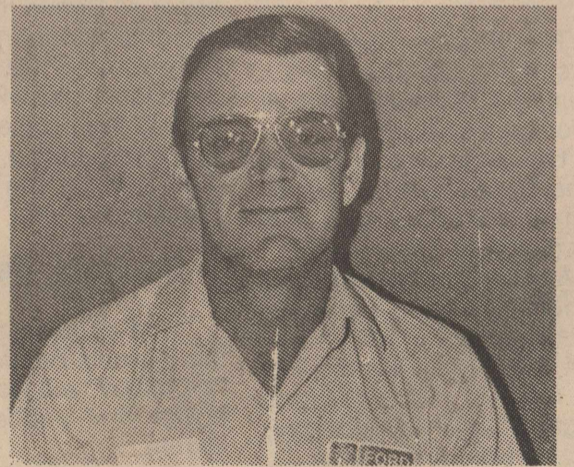
The 1980 scores looked like this: 1980 - Bronte 25, RL 0; 1981 - Bronte 6, RL 0; 1982 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1983 - Bronte 16, RL 13; 1984 - RL 21, Bronte 6; 1985 - RL 35, Bronte 26; 1986 - Bronte 54, RL 27.

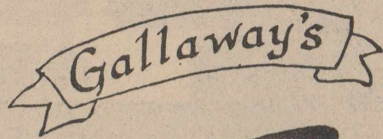

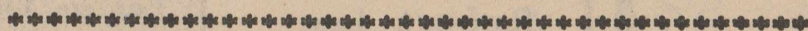

The Steer defense played well against Eden, holding them to just one touchdown and two field goals. Unlike one paper reported Dillard and Dockery did not run at will against the Steers. They had 3.05 and 2.95 yds. average, respect-

Dogies fall short

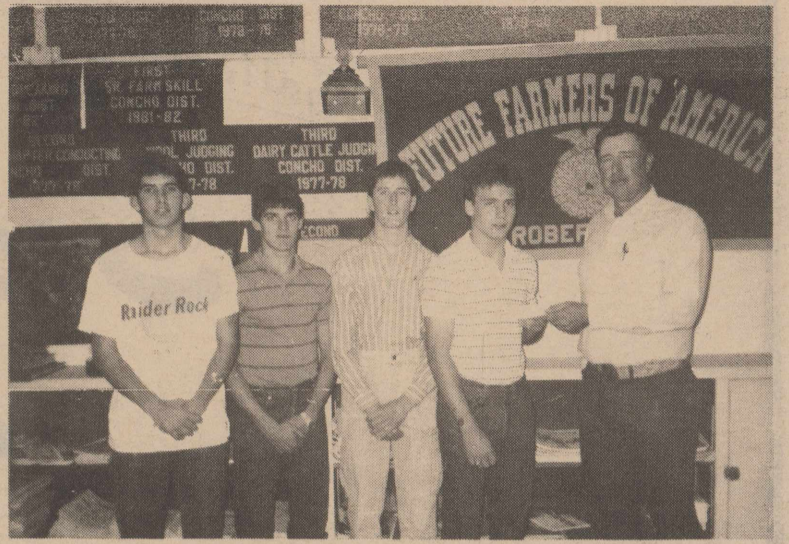

Bronte play-off hopes stung

Bronte's slim play-off hopes vanished last Friday night in Mertzon when the Irion County Hornets stung the Longhorns 28 to 16. The Longhorns moved the ball well but self-destructed on fumbles, miscues, and penalties.

Irion County took the opening kick and marched from their own 34 for the score. They ran from the 2 yard line, fumbled and recovered their fumble in the end zone to score 6 points. That set the scene for the entire night. They missed the extra point and led 6-0.

After kicking off Bronte started at their own 25 yard line. They fumbled on the 1st

play and it was recovered by the Hornets at the 24 yard line. However, Bronte's defense held them out aided by a penalty and took over at the 31 yard line. They went 69 yards for the TD in twelve plays with Waylon Ensor carrying the ball over from the 1 yard line.

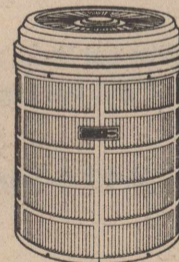

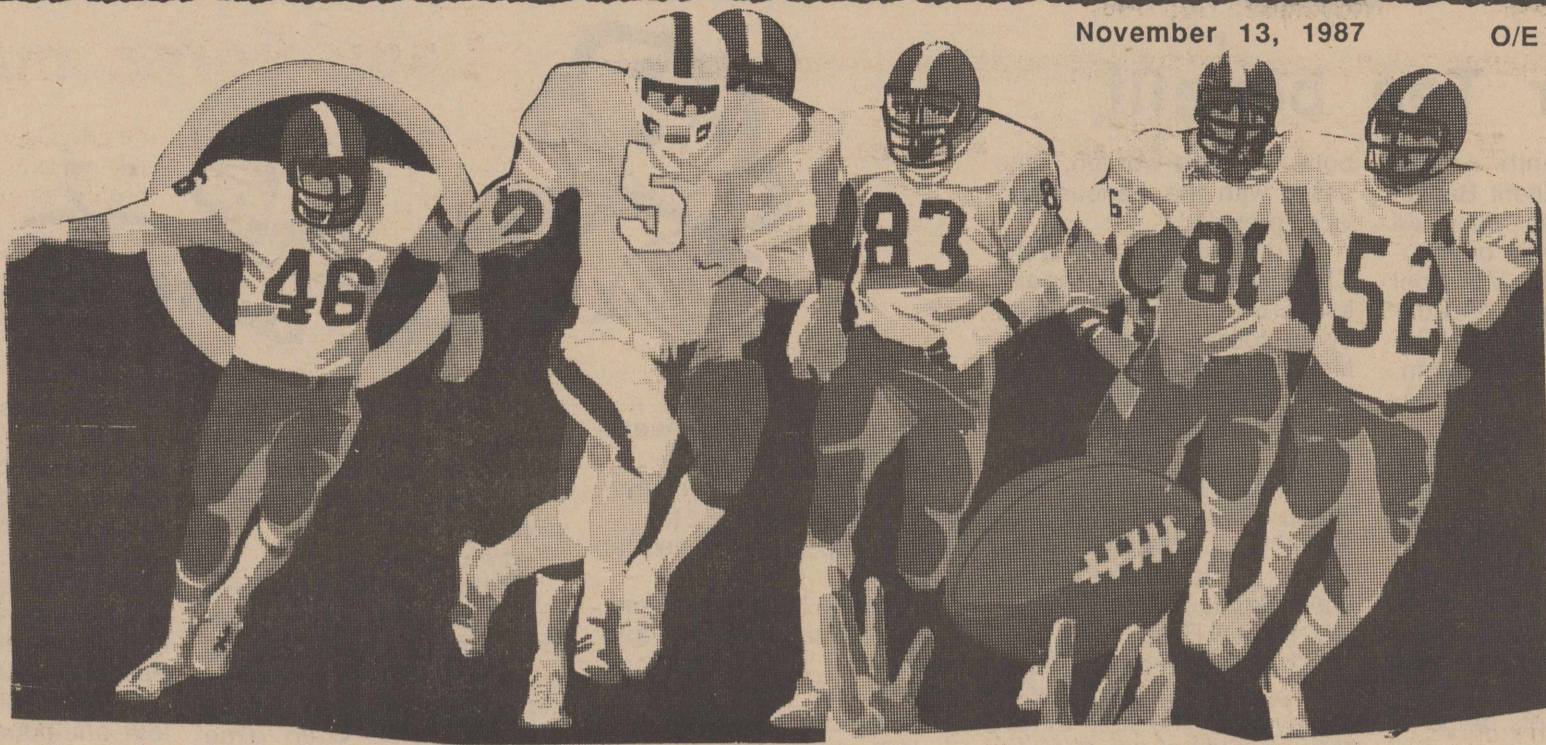

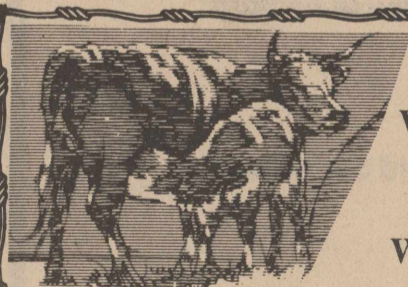
qualified persons. Also regular classes are taught in the Benge Studio by art teachers.

Who needs to know CPR

Medical personnel and life guards aren't the only people who need to know CPR, or cardio-pulmonary resuscitation.

The composition of your family, where you live and your lifestyle may make it important that you know CPR.

In cases of drowning, suffocation, electrocution, automobile accidents, or heart attacks, someone trained in CPR can provide proper life-saving measures until trained professionals take over.

According to the health educator, people who should have CPR training include the following:

- * Parents of young children.
- * People who provide day care for children in their homes.
- * People who live in homes with backyard swimming pools, or a pond where family members swim, and apartment-dwellers who live in

complexes where no life guard is on duty at the swimming pool.

* People who provide care of an elderly parent or relative in their homes.

* Rural families that live some distance from medical facilities and families in those areas that have limited ambulance service.

* Individuals who engage in boating, swimming, water sports or higher risk outdoor activities, especially if they are done in remote areas with limited access to medical facilities.

* If your family falls in one of these categories, take a CPR class which is offered by local units of the American Red Cross, American Heart Association and other health agencies.

For a short investment of your time, you'll be better able to handle a medical emergency in your family.

Tax exemptions for dependents

April 15, 1988 will be here before you realize it. So if you plan to claim an exemption for a dependent who is at least 5 years old by the end of the tax year, the taxpayer must list the dependent's social security number (SSN) on Form 1040 or Form 1040A. This applies to tax returns due after Dec. 31, 1987, disregarding any extensions.

The social security number requirement applies to **any dependent** claimed on the tax return, including adults and children, according to Jackie Walker, local tax preparer.

Example. George may claim his mother as a depen-

dent on his tax return. Therefore, George must apply her SSN on his tax return when he claims her as a dependent.

Penalty. If the dependent's SSN is not listed on the tax return, or if the listed number is incorrect, the taxpayer who claims the dependent may be subject to a \$5 penalty. The penalty applies to each missing or incorrect number.

If a dependent does not have a SSN, you should apply for one right away. You will need the following information.

1. Date of birth.
2. U.S. citizenship or legal alien status, and

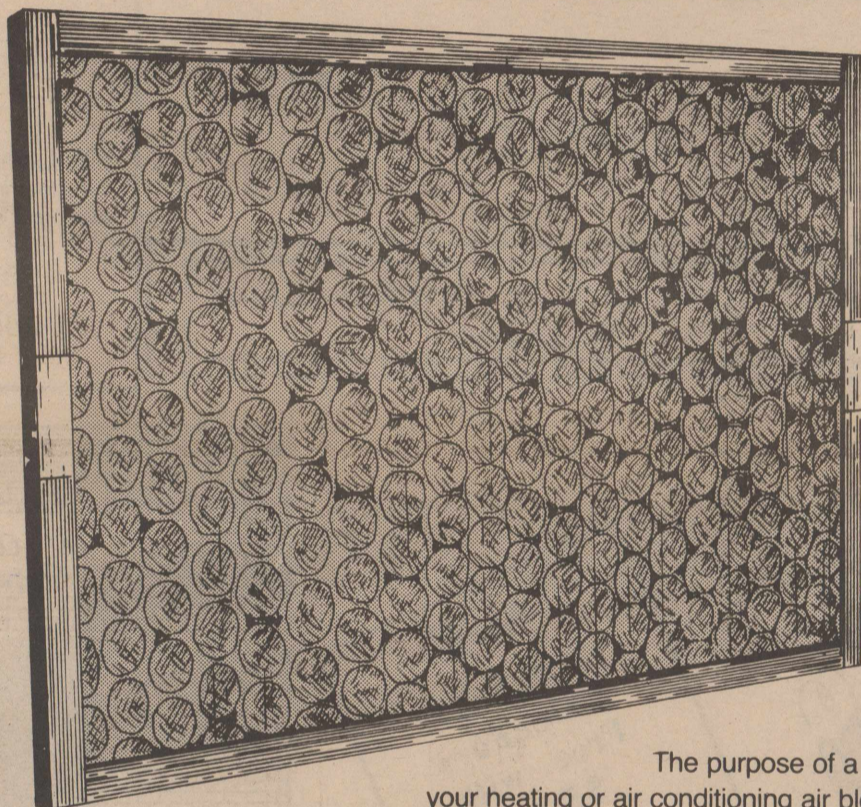
3. Identity.

A public, hospital, or religious birth record will generally be accepted as proof of birth and citizenship. A school record may be used for proof of identity. All records must be original or certified documents.

Form SS-5 can be obtained from any office of the Social Security Administration.

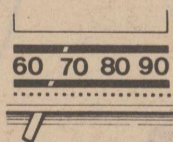

A clean filter, along with other conservation measures you can do at home, will help you save energy and money!

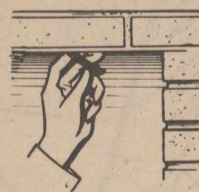
Set Thermostat at 68°

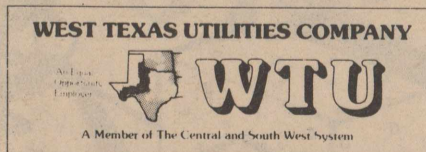


Keep Damper Closed

Fall hunting season opens

Saturday, November 14, is akin to a holiday in many parts of Texas. It is the opening day of the 1987 fall hunting season. Jeeps, campers, camouflage clothing, flannel shirts, and hunting boots will be common sights for the next two months.

Firearms hunting season will open on Nov. 14, for a 51 day run, through Jan. 2, 1988. Coke County sportsmen will be allowed 4 deer, either sex (limit 2 bucks). New to the county this year will be the regulation that frees both the hunter and the landowner in that no antlerless permit will be required. Hunters have only to tag their deer with the proper tag from the hunting license. Another significant change is that the head of any deer taken must remain with the carcass (not necessarily ON) until it reaches its destination.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department urges hunters to harvest their allowed limits because many areas are overpopulated and during a hard winter, forage and stock competition could result in a food

supply shortage.

Experts say that although deer numbers are up, hunters may not get as much as a look at game as in other years due to lush habitat and poor visibility. Deer won't have to feed or move around in daylight hours.

Shooting hours for all game animals and birds (except migratory game birds) are one-half before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Wildlife biologists say record rainfall and flooding during May and June apparently had no effect on quail and turkey nesting and hatches. Plenty of mature turkeys remain and it looks like a bumper crop for the 1987-88 season. Two turkeys, either sex, will be allowed in Coke County Nov. 14-Jan. 3, with the spring season lengthened from April 2-24 for gobblers.

Experts say quail populations have rebounded, leading them to expect the best year since the yard winter of 1983-84 when many froze without feed and good cover. Numbers have improved to

the point that the TPWD set the upcoming bird season from Nov. 7-Feb. 28 with a statewide bag limit of 16.

Other seasons include javelina with 2 allowed from Oct. 3-Feb. 28 with a statewide bag limit of 16.

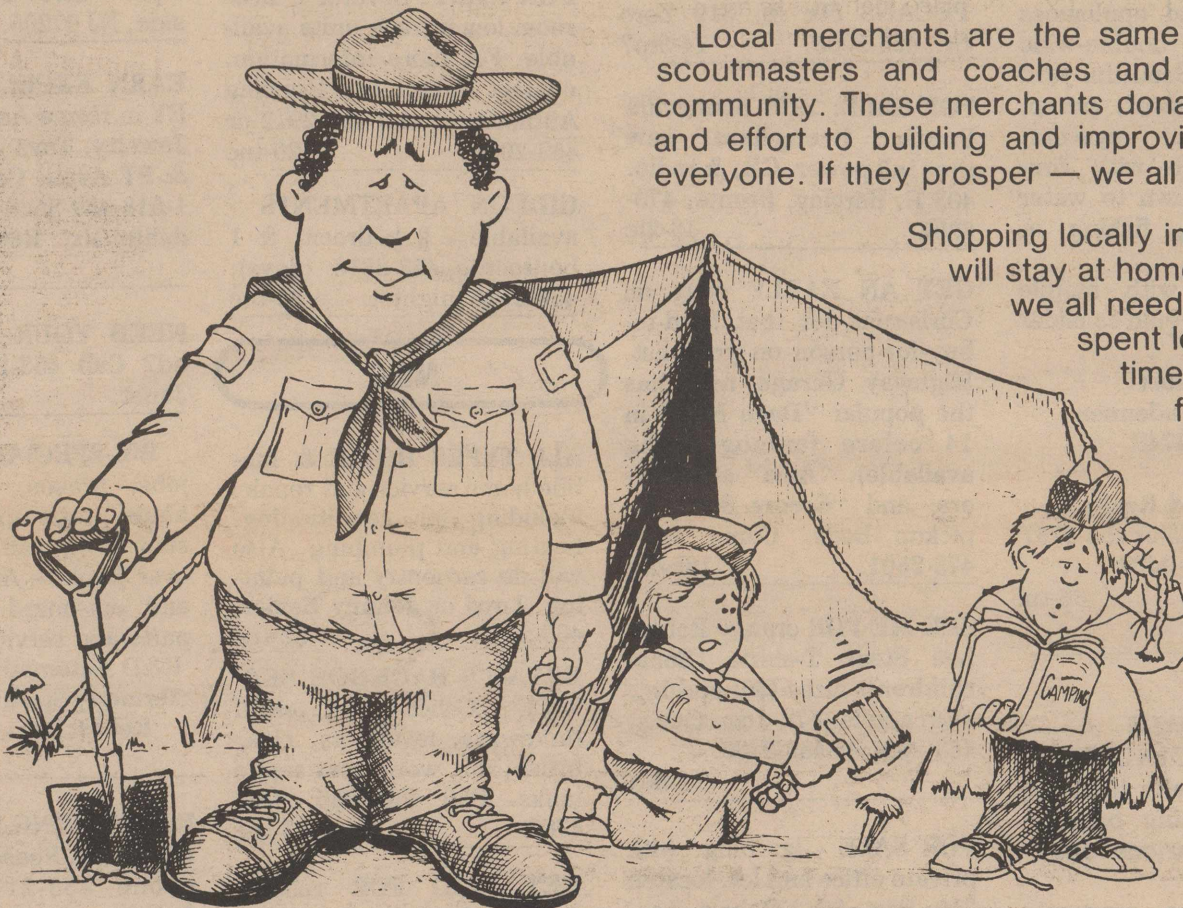

Box 841, Abilene, Texas 79604 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 00997 which authorizes a discharge of once through cooling water at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 57,600 gallons per day plus low volume wastes at a flow variable discharge from the Oak Creek Steam Electric Station which is located adjacent to Oak Creek Reservoir, approximately ten (10) miles north of the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Oak Creek Reservoir thence to Oak Creek; thence to the Colorado River in Segment No. 1426 of the Colorado River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that parameters for total residual chlorine have been added and monitoring requirements for free available chlorine have been deleted. The expiration date of the existing permit was September 28, 1986. It is proposed that the expiration date be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a

public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requestor, or persons represented by the requestor, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

Homemakers clubs

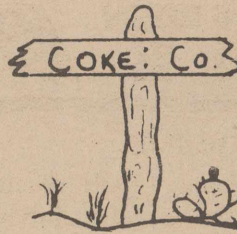

Texas pioneers

Texas pioneers used to brag that "other states were carved or born, but Texas grew from hide and horn." The saying is fairly accurate, because in the minds and hearts of many -- Texas is Cattle Country.

But what's been happening to Cattle Country lately? In fact, the entire picture of Texas agriculture has undergone some drastic changes over the past few years, and just where producers go from here is anybody's guess.

To help bring this picture into focus, the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1987 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

The confidential interviews conducted by mail, telephone or in person by field enumerators provide information used by producers to make their plans for the coming year.

"A sound marketing plan requires good, reliable information and some advanced planning. Information from our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their marketing plans for the coming year," state statistician Dennis Findley reported.

The Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum this year because of budget cuts made by the Texas Legislature, so Findley is urging producers to return their mailed questionnaires as soon as possible.

"Despite these cuts, we still plan to do our best to provide Texas farmers and ranchers with accurate, unbiased information they can use in making their day-to-day production and marketing plans," Findley added.

"Texas producers need all the information they can get just to help them survive these severe economic times."

FALL FRUIT TREE SPRAYING CONTROLS DISEASES

Fall is often the time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it is a critical

time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall, there is often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer.

Applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the major diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly. It is advised to spray when 70% of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide, but not fungicides containing chlorothalonil. But again, it is important to spray at the right time to prevent foliar burn with the copper fungicide.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the main trunk and main limbs.

Fall spray in northern Texas is most often applied from late October to Nov. 15, in Central Texas from Nov. 1 to Dec. 1, and in South Texas from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15. Application time will vary with the season, so check your fruit trees closely.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees because there is no other time when peach leaf curl of peach and plum trees can be controlled.

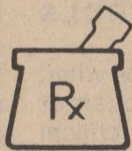
