LADY HORNS WIN STATE!

Competing in Austin Nov. 20-21 for the Class A State V.B. Championship the Lady Longhorns were successful for the fourth time since 1976.

The Longhorns faced the Flatonia Bulldogs on Friday at 9:00 a.m. The Flatonia team had a height advantage of about 2" on the Longhorns.

In Game 1, the Longhorns rose to the occasion continually blocking the taller players. Outstanding performances were turned in by Melinda Parker, Misti Taylor, Dorinda Scott, Tina Hines, Kim Robinson, and DeAnn Parker.

M. Parker had 3 kills out of five attempts, 1 block and 4 pts. Taylor consistently set the hitter, who in turn put the ball down for a kill. She also had 1 kill and 1 ace. Scott had 3 kills, 1 ace and 5 blocks. Hines had 2 kills, 1 ace and 3 blocks. Robinson had 2 kills and 3 blocks. Parker had 1 kill and 1 block. The score was 15-10.

In the second game, the Longhorns continued to dominate at the net. Parker and Scott led the offensive attack with 3 kills each. Melissa Arrott came off the bench to spark the team with 2 kills and great defensive play. Michelle Jones also made key saves on defense. Bronte won 15-8

to advance to the finals at 10:00 Saturday.

Facing a talented small team from Plains, Bronte for once had the height advantage. However, the Cowgirls quick defense caused some problems for the Longhorns.

Game 1 saw only 4 kills by Bronte. Taylor had 1 and Scott had 2. However, there were 7 aces scored. D. Parker had 3, M. Parker 1, Scott 1 and Hines 3. The score at the end of game 1 was 15-11.

Game 2 proved to be a heart-stopping one as Bronte was defeated 2-15. Numerous passing and hitting errors plaqued the Longhorns.

However, the girls managed to get back on track in Game 3. Going for a shutout, the girls scored 8 points before Plains got on the board. Four kills and 1 ace by Melinda Parker paved the way. Scott followed with 3 kills and 4 aces. Taylor had 3 kills and Hines had 2 kills and 1 ace. The Horns ended their season with a 15-4 win and the

State Championship Crown.

For their outstanding play, Juniors Tina Hines and Dorinda Scott were named to the All Tournament Team.

Team members and fans alike celebrated as gold medals were awarded and the Championship trophy was presented to the five seniors.

The proclaimed APPRECI-ATION DAY in Robert Lee and West Coke County in honor of the West Coke County Emergency Medical Service and the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department was a huge success.

Citizens of Robert Lee and West Coke County began arriving early Saturday evening, November 21, 1987, at the Emory (DooDad) Davis, was one of the original Volunteer Firemen.

Davis read the PROCLA-MATION written by Wilson Bryan, Mayor of Robert Lee and attested by Edna Havins, City Secretary. He summarized the background and stressed the need of each organization.

The Robert Lee Fire Department was established and organized in 1947 with the late Sam Jay serving as the first Fire Chief. They began with a 1946 Model Ford, 200 feet of hose, 1 ax, a fire extinguisher, two oxygen masks and a 24-foot extension ladder. Only three of the original firemen still reside in Robert Lee. They are Calvin Wallace, O.B. Jacobs and Bill Tom Roach. J.C. Wallace, Jr., current Fire Chief, joined the department in 1950 and has served continuously for 37 years, a record. The capacity number of membership is 25. There is a great need for more members with only 15 active members on call.

Sales tax changes told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today said Texas businesses and residents should remember that if their offices and homes are sprayed for fleas, termites and other pests, they'll pay state and local sales tax on the service.

"Same goes for garbage and waste collection. These services and others have been taxable since the first of October," Bullock said.

All pest control services are taxable, including the identification, control and elimination of insects, nuisance birds and animals, and weeds, Bullock said.

The tax applies to the service when performed both indoors and outdoors.

Garbage and waste collection is also taxable, unless the service is funded by local taxes and is provided as a basic service by a city of county, Bullock said. Fees charged for the use of a landfill are not taxable, unless the fee is included in or billed as a charge for garbage collection.

Bullock said fees for some garbage collection services are exempt from the sales tax. These include removal of hazardous wastes, domestic sewage such as septic tank waste and waste water, and waste materials produced from oil, gas and geothermal exploration or production.

Cities, counties, municipal utility districts and other government agencies are exempt from paying tax on fees charged for waste removal.

Pest control and waste removal services businesses must have a sales tax permit. Applications are available from the Comptroller's office or by calling 1-800-252-555, ext. 3-4600. The fee for a permit is \$25.



Exercise and diabetes

At the beginning of the 20th century, a diagnosis of diabetes meant certain death for the patient. In fact, the average patient would have had only 16 months of life remaining after the diagnosis was established. Patients who managed to live longer were those who ate low carbohydrate diets and exercised regularly.

In 1921, a Canadian orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Frederick Banning and a medical student, Charles Best, working together discovered insulin. Almost overnight, the almost certain death sentence for these patients was lifted.

In those days, it was understood that patients with diabetes mellitus had a problem with their pancreas which decreased the production of insulin. This hormone was found to control the serum level of glucose (sugar). Decreasing levels of insulin caused increasing serum levels of glucose. Once Banning and Best had made their discovery, patients could be given daily injections of insulin and thereby keep their serum glucose levels down to normal levels. With this miraculous new discovery, diabetes was cured!!! Or so it was thought. As it turns out, the glucose defect was only the tip of the iceberg with this disease.

Even though insulin helped bring glucose levels back to normal, patients kept having complications from the disease. These included strokes, heart attacks, gangrene of the feet, and blindness. This continues to this day.

As it turns out, the metabolic defect in diabetes affects much more than just the serum levels of glucose. There are profound changes in the blood vessels, nerves, kidneys, eyes, and general metabolism.

Since the 1920's, it has been appreciated that exercise was one of the three components of good diabetic therapy (the other two being diet and insulin). However, very little work has been done to establish what type of exercise program is the best and what effects an exercise program would have on the complications of diabetes. It is well known and appreciated that a regularly performed exercise program may prevent heart attacks, decrease high blood pressure, and improve the periphreral blood flow in non-diabetics. In the world medical literature over the past five years, there have been approximately 150 scientific papers concerning exercise and diabetes. Several interesting facts have become apparent: 1. there are definite health benefits with exercise for noninsulin dependent diabetes (diabetic patients who do not require insulin for treatment),

4. exercise improves coagulation profile (blood clots more normally),

5. exercise provides an improved sense of well being,

6. exercise decreases premature bone loss (osteoporosis),

7. exercise lowers blood pressure,

8. exercise improves the efficiency of the circulatory system.

These eight positive effects are very important. Four of them directly effect the circulatory system. Would not it be wonderful if exercise could help prevent the heart attacks, high blood pressure, strokes, blindness and amputations that are such a big problem with diabetes? I think it can.

Studies indicate that between 80 and 90 percent of the chronic lung disease in this country could be avoided if not for cigarette smoking. In 1983, an estimated 62,000 Americans died of chronic lung disease.



A 515-page report from the Surgeon General of the United States concludes that there is now very solid evidence that nonsmokers have suffered lung disease from exposure to cigarette smoke. Cigarette smoking, the report states, can make a significant measurable contribution to the level of indoor air pollution. Children with parents who smoke appear to have small, but measurable differences in tests of pulmonary function when compared to children from families whose parents are nonsmokers. Eighty other studies support this data.

PREPARING TENDER VENISON

If the venison's tough, don't blame the cook. It could be due to what the hunter did -or didn't do -- in the field.

In addition to the age and sex of the animal, hunting and field dressing practices are extremely important in determining the quality of venison.

An undisturbed animal which is cleanly shot will yield more tender meat than a stressed animal. Field dressing the carcass as soon as possible and letting it hang for a full 48-hours will also increase tenderness by allowing muscles to stretch.

Aging the carcass in cold storage just above freezing for about a week will add to the tenderness and possibly the flavor of the venison. After that, the tenderness is up to the cook.

The key to preparing tender venison is to cook it as you would lean beef.

Most game has little fat and so is very similar to lean beef. The naturally more tender cuts, such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or roasted. But round steak, meat from the leg and the less tender cuts are best when cooked by braising, stewing or pot roasting.

Game meat should never be overcooked. It has short fibers that toughen quickly if overcooked or cooked at too high a temperature. Plan to serve it medium-to well-done rather than rare or overcooked.

frying or roasting will also make it more tender. Marinate the meat in an acid-based sauce for at least 24 hours.

If you use a sauce with the venison, reduce the amount of sugar in the recipe. The natural flavor is sweeter than other meat, so sauces made for domestic meats may be too sweet.

It is recommended to remove all visible fat before cooking, since it will exaggerate the gamey flavor. If some fat is required, ground pork or beef fat can be substituted.

Some people like to add chunks of beef fat or bacon to self-baste and moisten venison as it roasts. If you're trying to cut back on your intake of fat, however, you'll be better off sticking to low-fat cooking methods such as marinating and stir-frying the meat.

Venison has an underserved reputation for toughness. Yet, in a recent research study using taste panels, Texas A & M University graduate student Dan Moczygemba found that venison was rated as tender as lean beef and only slightly less tender that lean pork.

When the beef, pork and venison were compared for fat and cholesterol levels, Moczygemba says preliminary analyses indicated no significant differences.

From a health standpoint that means venison, like other lean meats, can make a significant contribution of protein and other nutrients to the diet without adding extra fat

STORING TURKEY LEFTOVERS

Turkey, dressing or gravy should not be left ouside the refrigerator for long periods of time. Remove all dressing from turkey and store in covered container. Store gravy in separate covered container. Use dressing and gravy within 1 or 2 days. If only one side of turkey has been carved, wrap whole bird; otherwise, remove meat from bones, wrap well November 27, 1987

and store in refrigerator. Use within 2 or 3 days.

When serving leftovers, remove from the refrigerator only enough for 1 meal, so any remaining are kept under constant refrigeration.

Leftover turkey and gravy may be frozen. Wrap turkey in moisture-vapor-proof paper, excluding as much air as possible, or pack in freezer containers. Pour gravy into freezer cartons or jars. Turkey and gravy may be packed in same container. Plain turkey may be stored in freezer, at 0 degrees or less, for 1 month. Turkey covered with gravy may be stored for 6 months. Freezing of dressing is not recommended for it becomes soggy and may develop an off-flavor.




