
Open House slated in RL this Saturday

WTU increase will be 16 per cent

Residential customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will pay about 16 per cent more for their electricity as result of a rate increase granted by the Public Utility Commission of

The Comission approved an increase about \$28.5 million annually, which amounts to a 12.9 per cent average. The Company has filed last May for a \$50.4 million rate increase, which would have been a 23 per cent increase.

Under the Commissions final order, the typical residential customer would see his bill increased by \$7.24, or from \$43.95 to \$51.19. This is an average between the summer and



People who have children or other dependents they plan to claim on their 1987 Federal income tax return should remember that a Social Security number must be shown for each dependent age 5 or over, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

If a child or other dependent does not have a number, then one should be applied for without delay. It is easy to apply, Upp said. All a person has to do is complete an application and provide evidence of date of birth, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status. A person 18 or older who has never had a Social Security number must apply in person. A parent applying on behalf of a child must provide evidence of his or her identity

For a person born in the U.S., a birth certified by the issuing agency can be used. Photocopies and notarized copies are not acceptable. The documents will be returned.

All it takes to start the application process is a phone call to the Social Security Office, Upp said. The telephone number is 949-4608. The people there will be glad to answer any questions.



Cheese Sauce: Add 3/4 (3 oz.) to 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Cheddar, Swiss or Monterey Jack cheese, 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce and dash cayenne pepper. Serve over pasta or vegetables.

Egg Sauce: Add 1/4 tsp. dry mustard to flour and stir in 1 to 2 chopped or sliced hard-cooked egg(s) at end of cooking. Serve over vegetables or fish.

Paprikash Sauce: Substitute chicken broth for half the milk and add 2 tsp. sweet Hungarian paprika and 1/4 tsp. onion powder with flour. Serve over chicken or yeal

Curry Sauce: Add 1/2 to 3/4 tsp. curry powder. Serve over shrimp, chicken or eggs.

Sauce Florentine: Add 1 c. chopped cooked spinach and dash ground nutmeg. Serve over fish, chicken, eggs or pasta.

Mushroom Sauce: Add 1 c. sauted sliced mushrooms and 2 tsp. sherry (optional). Serve over fish, chicken or vegetables.

Sauce Dijon: Add 3 to 4 T. Dijon-style prepared mustard and freshly ground pepper to taste. Serve over chicken, pork or veal.

A La King Sauce: Substitute chicken broth for half the milk and add 1/4 c. diced green pepper and 3 T. chopped pimiento. Serve over chicken or eggs.



Link Up America!

Certain individuals in areas served by General Telephone in Texas who presently do not have telephone service may be eligible for reduced telephone installation charges as part of a national program being piloted in Texas to expand the availability of telephone ser-

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of General Telephone, said installation fees for eligible participants will be reduced by a maximum of \$30 with the balance payable without interest in four equal monthly payments.

Texas is one of four states in which the program, called Link Up America, is being piloted. The telephone company official said the goal is to preserve and promote telephone service for low income households and to get those Americans who currently do not have telephone service onto the telephone network.

The concept of Link Up

America was proposed earlier this year by the Federal-State Joint Board to the Federal Communications Commission. The FCC adopted the

program in April. The program will be funded through interstate telephone revenues.

Qualification for the prograin is based on income level and eligibility for social service assistance programs. In general, an individual or household will qualify if income is below the federal poverty level, and the individual has not had telephone service for at least three months.

Qualified individuals who are interested in more details cr who might want to sign up for the program are asked to contact the Link Up America representative in the General Telephone business office.

The program is limited to reduced installation charges and does not include any assistance with monthly phone charges.

Holiday parcels can arrive safely

With a little bit of care, holiday cards and packages can arrive on time and in good shape for the holiday season.

In addition to shopping early and mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box) number, and the city, state and ZIP coce reserved for the last line. The use of apartment numbers is also encouraged.

When sending parcels, it is a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels.

Be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP code.

Customers are reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.



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
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Nursing Auxiliary ends busy year



Make sure paper ornaments and tinsel do not touch light bulbs. Also, never adjust outdoor or tree lights while they are turned on or connected to a power circuit.

Always use a wooden ladder or a metal one with rubber-tipped legs when installing outdoor lights. Be sure to stand on a dry surface.

don't overload circuits.

Avoid overloading electrical wiring by using more than one circuit for your tree lights. Use heavy-duty extension cords to run to other circuits.



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
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
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


Holiday Hints for busy chefs

To make your own whipped butter, soften butter at room temperature. (Or, microwave 1/2 c. butter on HIGH power about 15 seconds or until softened.) 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COW'S PERFORMANCE RELATED TO HER NUTRITIONAL STATUS

The way a cow is handled during the winter will have an influence on a calf's future and next year's calf crop.

The cow's reproductive performance and the health and weaning weight of her calf is greatly influenced by her nutritional status throughout

If a cow is allowed to calve in a poor or thin body condition, the odds are against her to maintain a 12-month-calving interval.

Cattle are usually fed hay during the winter, but if not enough energy is supplied by the hay, additional grains should be given.

Ranchers should have their hay tested to obtain the real protein content. This enables the producer to feed cattle without over or under feeding.

Producers also should make allowances considering the weather conditions and realize that as temperatures drop and wind and rain increases, nutritional needs of cattle increase as much as 20 percent.

A dry pregnant cow can usually live on 20 pounds of average quality hay per day during the winter. If the quality of hay is less or it is a cold wet winter, an additional 2-3 pounds of supplement should be fed daily.

A cow nursing a calf needs about 5-6 pounds of supplement with 22 pounds of hay per winter day. If weather conditions are bad, the supplement should be increased to 7-8 pounds per

Shelter may be considered when cattle have to face severe winter conditions. A windbreak may be sufficient, but overheard cover is important during heavy rains.
