Candidate filing dates announced

The filing period for Coke County officials whose terms will expire in 1988 opened Dec. 3. Deadline for announcing candidacies is Jan. 8, 1988. Filing dates were changed to accomodate the early March 8, 1988 Primary Election. The balloting process changes will allow Texans to vote in the "Super Tuesday" election which standardizes them with most states in the nation.

Terms expire for the following Coke County positions: Tax Collector; Sheriff; County Attorney; Commissioner, Precinct 1 & 3; and Constable, Precinct 1 & 2.

According to County Clerk Ettie Hubbard only two persons have filed for candidacy at presstime.

Albert N. (Bob) Fields has filed for re-election for Coke County Constable, Precinct 1, subject to the Democratic Primary set for March 8, 1988. He has served 2 terms in that capacity, taking office in Jan. 1981.

Fields was born and raised in Coke County and has made his home in Robert Lee except for time spent in the service during World War II. He and his wife, Dale, have two sons, Albert Dale Fields and James Fields. Their family includes three grandchildren.

Sheriff Marshall Millican has announced he will seek his 3rd term in office. He was also sworn in during Jan. 1981. Millican's name will be placed on the Democratic Primary Election Ballot for

March 8, 1988.

A graduate of Robert Lee High School, Millican's parents and grandparents are lifetime Coke County residents. His wife, Sheri, was also raised in the county and

is a teacher in the Robert Lee Independent School District. The couple has two children, Kannan and Stewart.

Patti Ivey of Robert Lee is the Democratic Party Chairman of Coke County while Frances Pierce of Bronte serves in the same capacity for the Republican Party. Mrs. Pierce stated Wednesday that no Republican candidate has filed with her at this time. Applications for the various positions may be obtained from either of the chairmen.

Texas Mohair Board sets biennial election

The Texas Mohair Producers Board will hold a biennial election on February 14, 1988, to fill four expiring terms on the Board.

The Board is authorized under the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to collect producer assessments at the first point of processing in the amount of 4 1/2 cents per pound on a refund only basis and to use such funds to finance programs of research, disease, predator control, education and promotion.

One Board member will be elected by producers residing in District V which includes the following counties: Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Kerr, Kendall, Comal and Blanco.

Three Board members will be elected at-large by producers residing in the 54 counties within the boundaries of the Board's assessment area. These counties are: Terrell, Crockett, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Val Verde, Kinney, Edwards, Bandera, Real, Medina, Uvalde, Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Blanco, Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, Coryell, Lampasas, Burnet, Hayes, Travis, Bell, Williamson, Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Con-cho, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, and

Hood.

Any person who is engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced, mohair for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their employees if such person is required to pay the assessment that is collected on mohair within the state.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his/her name in nomination for membership on the Texas Mohair Producers Board by application to the above organization, signed by himself and at least ten (10) other persons eligible to vote in the election. Such applications must be filed at least thirty (30) days prior to the election date in order to have his/her name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters of record not later that two (2) weeks prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place (Texas Mohair Producers Board Office, P.O. Box 5337, San Angelo, TX 76902) before midnight on the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to February 1, 1988, may obtain one at his/her County Agent's office, through his/her local warehouse or from the Texas Mohair Producers Board office at the above address.





CHOOSING EDUCATIONAL TOYS

"High-tech" toys may be among the best selling this Christmas, but they're not necessarily the most educational.

According to a child development specialist, some of the best playthings for beginning the literacy process are those that children have been getting for generations.

Babies need toys that are responsive to their actions. Those that squeak, honk, move and change are best.

Specialists suggest giving toddlers over 13 months old realistic looking toys like cars, dolls and dishes, that are small replicas of real objects.

The smaller versions of real things help children to realize that one object can symbolize another and this is the foundation of literacy.

As children develop the ability to use symbols, the toy can look less and less like the real thing that is being represented. Youngsters between 3 and 4 are learning to pretend and toys that are not anything specific allow them to expand this skill.

Children learn that they can make representations of their world and then change it. They can make it different at different times by, for example, using blocks as buildings one time and then for people or food another time.

This is a magical time for youngsters and some of the things they like best are unrealistic characters like Mickey Mouse, a very popular figure with this age group.

The specialist says that toys which encourage the use of symbols through play help the child learn the connection between the real world and

handle and even chew and progressing through picture books and story books. It is especially important that parents read out loud to even the youngest children.

Specialists agree that talking teddy bears and dolls or battery operated toys that perform without any action imaginative play.





U.S. Fitness Boom Not Reaching Youth The shape of the nation will one day rest on the shoulders of today's youth. What kind of shape are they in?

According to a study recently released by the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation & Dance, the outlook isn't as good as it could be:

• Forty percent of chil-dren ages five through eight are already exhibiting obesity, elevated blood pressure, high cholesterol levels and inactivity-all coronary risk factors.

• As many as 50 percent of our children are not getting enough exercise to develop a healthy heart and lungs.

Why is the United States experiencing a youth fitness crisis? One reason is the lack of physical education programs. "There are simply not enough quality daily physical education programs across the country to enable our children to learn how to keep themselves healthy and maintain a basic level of fitness," says Peggy Seiter, American Alliance Director of Public Affairs. As these facts and figures show

• There is no federal law mandating physical education. Only four states require all



students to take a specific amount of physical education in all grades-Illinois, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island.

• Only one state—Illinois requires all students to take physical education every day. • Only ten percent of the

states require elementary school students to take physical education for the equivalent of only 30 minutes per day.

• Only eight percent of the states require junior high school students to take physical education for the equivalent of 50 minutes per day.

How much physical education do our children need? The American Alliance recommends that all students receive a quality daily physical education program in grades K-12.

• Elementary school chil-• Secondary school stuminutes per day-every day.

The study also revealed that eight states have cut back the number of physical education

The American Alliance suggests that parents contact their local school board to determine the physical education requirements in their child's school. and to urge their school board to require quality, daily physical education for all children, K-12





No-Alcohol Cough and Sore Throat Remedies

How much do you really know about coughs and sore throats? Here's a primer on two of winter's most common ailments:

Q. Should coughing always be suppressed?

A. No. A cough is the body's natural attempt to clear respiratory passages of foreign material. For example, coughing that comes from a cold, bronchitis, emphysema, and other diseases provides protective action. Similarly, a cough that expels phlegm or smoke, therefore, is useful and should not be stopped.

However, a cough caused by an allergy that disrupts your work, or a dry, hacking flu cough that interferes with your sleep, may call for treatment. Over-the-counter preparations such as cough syrups and lozenges are beneficial. And taking decongestants at night and early in the morning will help stop the build-up of mucus in the throat from a cold or postnasal drip. Remember that any cough that lasts more than one week and persists even after taking medication requires a doctor's attention.

Q. What is the most common cause of sore throats?

A. Although sore throats can be caused by pollutants in the air, allergy to house dust and the dry heat prevalent in wintertime, the most common cause is viral or bacterial infection.



Q. Are some over-the-counter cough and sore throat medications pr ferable to others?

A. Yes. When selecting a cough remedy, look for one that contains a cough suppressant as well as an expectorant to help break up phlegm and mucus that cause upper chest congestion. For sore throat relief, the addition of acetaminophen (a non-aspi-rin analgesic) will help to relieve discomfort and reduce fever. Since most cough syrups contain 5%-20% alcohol, and alcohol has no therapeutic effect on coughs and sore throats, you may wish to choose a formula that is alcohol-free. Until now, sore throat and cough sufferers have had a hard time finding over-the-counter alcohol-free medications. Now, the first line of alcohol-free cough remedies is available: CONTAC[®] Cough Formula and CONTAC[®] Cough and Sore Throat Formula.

Since alcohol increases stomach acidity, doctors often advise patients who suffer from stomach irritation or ulcer disease to avoid alcohol and medications containing alcohol. Then, too, since certain drugs carry a "contraindication" that warns the user not to ingest alcohol during treatment, be sure to ask your physician whether you should avoid over-the-counter preparations that contain alcohol while taking other medication.

Taking more than one drug at a time is especially dangerous because each one can add to the impact of the other. This is particularly true when one of the drugs is alcohol.

Alcohol is a mind-altering drug that works as a sedative; changes the way a person thinks and acts. It is a factor in 50% of America's highway deaths. In 1986, more than 23,000 Americans died in alcohol-related crashes.

Marijuana is also a mindaltering drug. Its use affects a wide-range of skills needed for safe driving. Quick thinking and reflexes are slowed, causing drivers difficulty in responding to sudden unexpected events.

Research clearly indicates that normal levels of driving performance are not regained for at least 4-6 hours after smoking a single marijuana cigarette.

Remember, driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol this holiday season can get someone hurt. Worse than that, it can get someone killed. Think about it, Don't Drink and Drive.
