## Prospects for spring turkey season termed excellent

Spring turkey hunting season has been lengthened for 1988 to 23 days. It will open Saturday, April 2, and close April 24. Two gobblers are allowed during the seasoning but only if 2 turkey tags remain on the hunter's valid Texas Hunting license. One tag is marked "Fall Only", one is "Spring Only", and the third "Fall or Spring"
Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to onehalf hour after sunset.
High turkey populations over most of Texas should
provide excellent hunting for the upcoming season. Although early spring has been dry, green grazing is picking up with winter seeds still avail able. Gobblers should be in good shape.

If you haven't tried to call a wary "tom" up and watch him preen and strut for a supposed hen, you have missed an unusual hunt. Camouflage is almost a must and a good hiding place is necessary to lure them within shotgun range.

Sterling Lindsey, longtime Coke County Extension Agent died at his home near Robert Lee March 17 Local services were held on March 19.

He moved his family to Robert Lee and accepted the County Agent position on July 15 . He helped organize the County Trapper's Association that year and was ahead of his time by advising landowners to promote wildlife as a supplementary in come during hard times as he worked closely with sheep and cattle producers as well as farmers.

Mr. Lindsey's outstanding work as a county agent and service to his community did not go unnoticed. He gar nered many honors of appre ciation for his efforts. In 1965, the National County Agents Association presented him the Distinguished Service Award. He coached five 1st place State Soil Evaluation teams from Coke County in 1966, 1969, 1971, 1973, and 1977. The National Agriculture County Agents Ass'n. gave him a Career Guidance

Award in 1969 for schoo "Career Days". He received Outstanding County Agent Award in 1978 from the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Ass'n. In 1981, he gained the Distinguished Service Award from District Volunteer Leaders Ass'n.; was named "Citizen of the Year" by the local Lions Club; and received a Community Service Award from the F.F.A. Chapter. His

BEEF PRODUCTION FOR TODAY'S MARKET Recent health awareness questions aimed at the consumption of leaner beef has prompted the organizing of Beef Production For Today's Market, a one-day workshop set for March 21st at Producers Livestock Auction in San Angelo.
The workshop is being ointly sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Producers Livestock Auction and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.
Rex Jones, Tom Green County Agricultural Extension Agent and a key coordinator of the event, said emphasis toward lean beef consumption has made packers keenly aware of consumers' demands for leaner cuts of beef. "Some of the packers are getting demands from retai buyers for leaner cuts of beef," said Jones. "So what
arying to do in this workshop is get the best au thorities we can to talk about implications that this trend will have on the cow-calf producer."
Jones pointed out that various breed associations are promoting lean beef sales through such programs as Branded Beef. Branded Beef is a term which designates the various associations and packing companies which are concerned with the amounts of fat in today's beef market.
"We feel the time is right to educate area producers on the trends which the business seems to be taking," said Jones. "If this trend is something that is going to be in demand, it behooves the cattle producer to know now of the adjustments he may need to meet this demand."

## GREEN UP YOUR LAWN

About this time of year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the upcoming spring season.
There are three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start -- scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.
Scalping a lawn in early spring serves to revitalize it and promote early spring green-up.
Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower $1 / 2$ to 1 inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing. They are excellent to add to a compost of use as a mulch for garden and landscape plants.
It is recommended to keep the lawnmower blade lowered until early summer.
After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) to promote leaf and root growth. Use 1.5 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This is equal to 18 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer or 12 pounds of a 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the early summer and fall.
For a dark green lawn, apply nitrogen every 50 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet. Monthly applications of iron chelate or iron sulfate during the spring and summer promote a healthy
color in St. Augustine lawns.
To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from be coming a problem, apply a pre-emergence herbicide (weed killer) in early spring, after the grass has recovered from winter. Applying a preemergence herbicide too early could further weaken turf-grasses injured by winter conditions. Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use but as with all herbicides, should only be used according to instructions on the label. Also, check weed killer label as most of them can damage or kill pecans, fruit and many shade trees. Still the best weed control is fre quent mowing following fertilizations and a good sharp hoe.
Proper maintenance is es sential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn.

RENT-TO-OWN COSTS MORE-- Rent-to-own agreements make buying a new television or furniture seem affordable, but can cost more in the long-run, according to Bonnie L. Piernot, a consumer economics expert. Rent-to-own programs vary, but an 18-month rental period is typical. Customers don't have to rent for that length of time, but those who do become owners of the product explains Piernot, who is a specialist with the Texas A\&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "Advertisements for rent-to-own programs often stress the possibility of ownership and low weekly or monthly payments," Piernot remarks. "But over the months these low payments add up to much more than the cost of the item." For example, if you rent-to-own a 19inch portable color television set for $\$ 15$ per week, the total cost over 18 months adds up to $\$ 1,170$. A rent-to-own agreement for payments of $\$ 54$ per month adds up to $\$ 972$ after 18 months. Since a typical 19 -inch color television sells for about $\$ 300-\$ 400$ in a retail store, and sometimes less on sale, a rent-to-own customer can easily pay over twice the price, adds the specialist.

SEWING AND SAVING A WEDDING GOWN - Like traditional weddings, homesewn wedding gowns are back in style. The Sewing Fashion Council reports that since 1984 the number of bridal fashion patterns has increased 100 percent. About 40 percent of the wedding fashions are sewn at home by the bride, a family member or a professional dressmaker. Dr. Ann Beard, a clothing and textiles specialist, says that home-sewing a wedding gown has always been a way to hold down expenses, but that isn't the only motivation. "The home-sewn wedding dress has grown in appeal because it offers the opportunity to have something unique and to create a family heirloom," she adds. To preserve your family heirloom, it should be cleaned immediately after the wedding and stored using one of two methods, advises the Texas A\&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist. Hang the dress on a padded hanger, with waist loops running from the inside waist seam to the hanger to take stress off the shoulder seams. Also stuff the sleeves with tissue paper. Then wrap the gown in freshly washed cotton fabric, such as an allcotton sheet. The specialist says the other option is to fold the dress carefully and wrop the dress carefully and wrap it in the all-cotton fabric. Then store flat inside an acid-free box, which will be available from many commercial cleaners.

SEEKING OUTSIDE HELP IN CARING FOR ELDERLY
When it comes to elder care, families take care of their own. Research shows that families - spouses, adult children, siblings -- provide 89$90 \%$ of the care for frail elders.
Sometimes this caregiving becomes a burden that leads to exhaustion and physical illness, social isolation and a reduced income. Being totally involved in the specific details of day-to-day care may also mean the emotional side of the relationship suffers.
Yet, even though family members know they need help with care giving, and that services are available in the community, they often will not use them.

Why? The answers are many and complex.
Some research suggests that families involved in par-ent-caring are not used to seeking and receiving services as a normal part of daily living.
Some family caregivers may feel guilty about allowing someone else to do the things they think they should be doing.
And sometimes the elder prefers or insists on family support, even when the burden on the caregiver is considerable.
When caregivers feel overstressed by the situation, it's time to examine why. This may help family members ready themselves to seek outside help.
By seeking some outside support for some jobs, family members may be able to continue some of the main caregiving tasks for a longer time than if they continued alone.

five drugs. A few mixtures contain as much as 50 percent ethyl alcohol, which is the equivalent of 100 -proof whiskey.

Sleeping pills usually contain antihistamines to induce drowsiness and drugs with other sedative properties. After prolonged use, sleeping pills disrupt healthy, normal sleeping habits. Some of the possible side effects are blurred vision, rapid pulse, dizziness and dryness of the mouth.

Over-the-counter drugs are useful for minor ailments that last a short time. But taking them constantly may be postponing treatment for a serious illness.
If symptoms persist, make an appointment with a doctor and find out for sure what is wrong. Then follow his or her advice for proper medication.
