## Primary runoff elections set for Tuesday

Absentee balloting for Republican and Democratic Primary Runoff Elections began Monday, April 4, and will continue in the county clerk's office in Robert Lee through 5 p.m. on Friday, April 8. Tuesday, April 12, is voting day. Voters must vote the same party ballot they voted in the March 8 primaries.

Democrats will find only one race on the ballot. Combined

voting boxes for Precincts 1, 3, and 9 will be available at Senior Citizens Bldg. in Robert Lee, while Precincts 2, 4, and 5 will vote at the Bronte City Hall.

Three runoff races will be on the Republican ballot. Precincts 1, 3, and 9 will vote at the Robert Lee School and Precincts 2, 4, and 5 will cast their ballots at the Bronte School.

## District DHT head named

Walter G. McCullough, a 17-year veteran with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, has been named head of the department's 17-county San Angelo district.

McCullough will succeed Benjamin W. Bohuslav as District Engineer April 1. Bohuslav will direct the department's Yoakum district.

McCullough is a native of Comanche and graduated from high school there. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Civil Engineering at Texas Tech University in 1971. He also holds an MBA degree from Baylor University.

He joined the department in the Waco district office, but most of his career has been in the San Angelo area. Presently, he is District Construction Engineer.

As District Engineer, McCullough will direct highway department operations in Coke, Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Glasscock, Irion, Kimble, Kinney, Menard, Reagan, Real, Runnels, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Tom Green and Val Verde counties.

He and his wife, Deborah, have three children. They attend Southland Baptist Church. McCullough is active in the Downtown Rotary Club.

## Bass Tournament slated

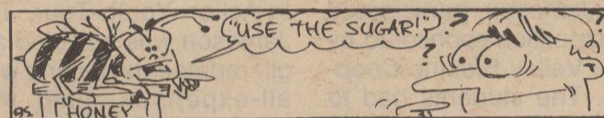

## Harmon is at home following surgery

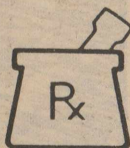

tee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Wyatt Nesbit said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or share-cropper," Nesbit said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days thus allowing more

opportunity for people to run for the committee," Nesbit said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Wyatt Nesbit said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

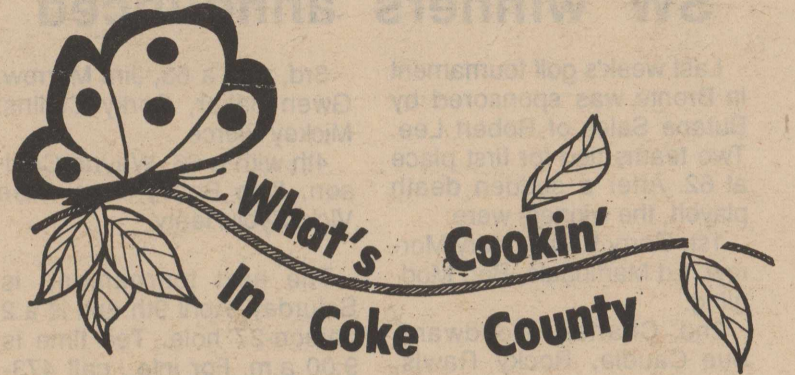

## Caution advised

### TAKE PRECAUTIONS WHEN REFINISHING FURNITURE

For do-it-yourselfers, hours spent refinishing furniture can result in some beautiful furniture -- and headaches, dizziness or nausea. According to Dr. Peggy Owens, a housing specialist, liquid paint and varnish removers are the culprits. She says that although do-it-yourselfers typically heed label warnings to use strippers in a well-ventilated area, they often don't realize how much ventilation is required. "If at all

possible, it's best to work on projects outside. When you must work inside, you'll need 10-15 exchanges of indoor air with outdoor air every hour," explains the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist. Owens says that rate of air exchange can be obtained with a window exhaust fan, but not an air conditioner. "Air conditioners don't provide adequate ventilation for paint remover fumes because they recirculate air rather than exhausting it."

## - Social Security -

A person who returns to work after beginning to get Social Security retirement benefits may qualify for higher benefits because of the additional earnings, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

It is not necessary for the worker to take any action if his or her earnings would result in higher benefits. Social Security automatically refigures the benefit rate after the earnings are credited to the worker's record.

People should, however, notify Social Security if they expect to earn more than the annual exempt amount. Earnings over the exempt amount result in the withholding of a person's benefits. In general, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt

amount. The exempt amounts are \$6,120 for people under 65 for all of 1988 and \$8,400 for people 65 through 69. There is no limit on earnings for people 70 and over.

In addition, a worker's benefit can be increased by 3 percent a year (1/4 of 1 percent a month) that the worker does not get benefits after 65. Starting for people who reach 65 in 1990 and later, the credit will be gradually increased until it reaches 8 percent in 2009. The credit also applies to widows and widowers.
