Possession arrests made

An investigation of a reported suspicious van in a remote area of the county airstrip near Lake Spence last Tuesday evening led to the arrest of two men by Sheriff Marshall Millican and Deputy Jeff Barnes on charges of aggravated possession of marijuana over 200 pounds. James Eugene Shively, 42, of Ft. Worth and Robert James Banse, 38, of San Diego, California were arraigned before Peace Justice Opal Jacoby on Wednesday of last week. They remained in Tom Green County Jail this week in lieu of \$200,000 bail set for each suspect. Millican said he and Barnes drove to the airstrip and while questioning the driver of a 1987 Ford van (Banse), they found a small amount of marijuana and arrested him. Suspecting he might be waiting for a plane, Sheriff Millican contacted the multi-agency narcotics task force based in San Angelo concerning the arrest. The two lawmen were advised to lock the van, move away from the vehicle, and conceal themselves and the

suspect. At about 7:20 p.m. a twin-engine Cessna 210 plane landed and Shively, the only occupant, was arrested. The plane contained 55 bales, 800 lbs., of suspected marijuana which could have a street value of \$1.3 million.





ELECTRICITY IS THE HIDDEN COST

The money saved by freezing fresh produce or food bought on sale can easily be eaten up by energy costs if you don't make good use of your freezer.

A frost-free freezer costs about \$15.00 per month for electricity, depending upon its size and your local electric rates. You can keep your freezer from using more electricity than necessary by making sure it operates efficiently.

A freezer inside the home requires less energy than one kept in the garage because it doesn't have to work as hard to maintain its low temperature

When the garage is the only space available, put the freezer against an inside wall, if possible, since it will be cooler there. If your garage has no ventilation, consider adding a roof vent for air circulation and lower temperatures.

A full freezer runs more efficiently than one that's half empty. If you use your freezer very little, consider pulling the plug on it, buying only what you need for a short period and storing it in the refrigerator-freezer.

Older freezers often use extra energy because they have leaky gaskets that let cold air escape. Test the rubber gasket by placing a piece of paper in the door and closing it. If you can pull the paper out without tearing it, the gasket needs to be replaced.

Depending upon the size of the freezer, rubber gaskets will cost around \$15.00 to \$25.00, do-it-yourself job.

Don't freeze foods you eventually have to throw away. If your family doesn't eat zucchini, for example, freezing quarts of it will simply be a

waste of money. Freeze foods you need and use most often and in amount you can use within the recommended storage time.

For best quality in frozen foods, checking the temperature of the freezer with a freezer thermometer to make sure it is at 0 degrees Fahrenheit or less.

Invest in moisture-vapor proof plastic bags and wraps, freezer wrap, freezer containers or heavy duty foil to prevent freezer burn. Don't try to cut corners by using old plastic bread bags or containers not meant for freezing since that will just reduce the quality for the food.

Also label the date on frozen food packages. Then keep a simple inventory of your freezer to tell you what's on hand and remind you to use packages of food within the recommended storage time.

Although the weather has been hot and dry, the fishing has been great. These last few weeks out at Oak Creek have really brought in some trophy size bass.



SDI. The Strategic Defense Initiative

May be the most important issue in the 1988 Presidential election. Please read <u>Common Sense About Strategic Defense</u>, page 49 in August 1988 "Reader's Digest". In it the author, Tom Clancy, makes a plea for sanity in our military policy.

Strategic Defense Initiative does not propose a method of waging war. It is a means of defense in case our country is attacked. Mr. Clancy says he believes in SDI for a simple and profound reason: "It will make the outcome of a nuclear first strike against us much less certain and therefore far less likely..." He also says, "The objective is not to fight a nuclear war, but to prevent one."

We learn from his article (and other reliable sources) that SDI's essential task - to destroy ballistic missiles - has already been proved feasible, and it offers a sane substitute for the old "balance of terror" between us and the Russians, and that American scientists and engineers have already proven that we can build a formidable strategic defense system and that the SDI program has chalked up impressive accomplishments. The SDI does not require inventing a lot of new technology, but rather the use and refinement of known devices and methods.

He says: "Killing a ballistic missile is a relatively small task. In its boost phase, when it is full of warheads and fuel, it is an enormous target, easily destroyed with the same sort of warhead used to hit aircraft."

Why does Gorbachey demand that the United States stop the development and deployment of SDI while his government works frantically to perfect it?

Mr. Clancy reveals the fact the CIA estimates the Soviets have spent \$150 billion on strategic defense in the last decade, which is 15 times what the United States has spent on ABM research, and that 1400 Soviet land-based intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBM's) are aimed at the United States. That they carry at least 6000 warheads -

two to three times the number needed to wipe out all U.S. land-based strategic targets in a first strike.

Years ago the Soviets promised to conquer the world but predicted they would take America without firing a shot. Although many people seem to be deceived by Gorbachev's talk of change and his propaganda, there has been no change in Russia's conquest for world power and the plan for America to fall.

Making the United States weak and failing to deploy a sane defense can only leave our great nation a sitting duck at the mercy of those who have never known the blessings of a nation like ours. SDI is our best hope for peace.

Think about that when you vote.

Moscow has an antimissile defense system. We have none. Let's elect a president who favors one for the U.S. and who wants to make America as safe as possible.

Lindsey will autograph books belonging to readers who already have copies of past releases. His recently released book will be available at the library next Friday.



are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number, AFDC case number if they currently receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, the Robert Lee ISD school officials will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Jerry Gibbs, Robert Lee ISD, HC 61 Box 303, Robert Lee, Texas 76945; 453-2612 for a hearing on the decision.

Households are required to report increases in household income over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced meals or for free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the US Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.




