Changes alter tonight's county grid match-up

Bronte and Robert Lee play this Friday night (tonight) in Bronte's Homecoming game. Several changes from past years have taken place. The game is no longer a district game due to last year's realignment of the districts by the U.I.L. Therefore, the game comes earlier in the season and perhaps won't have quite as much impact on either school's record as it might at the end of the season. The winner will be Coke County Champions 1988 and there has never been a lack of spirit for the game.

Bronte comes into the game at 1 and 1, while Robert Lee is 0-2 on the season.

Jim Rawlings has kept a record of the games from 1931 to the present. With help from Ronnie Baker of Robert Lee, he provides these scores and facts. There have been 4 ties. The most points scored was in 1945 when Robert Lee won 54-0 and in 1986 when Bronte won 54-27. The lowest total was in 1977 with a score of 0-0.

Here is how the teams scored in their games (sometimes meeting twice a season) over the past 57 years, according to Jim's research:

1931 - RL 26, Bronte 0; 1932 - RL won, scores Not Available; 1933 - RL victory, scores NA; 1934 - RL won 2* games, scores NA; 1935 -Bronte won 2, scores NA; 1936 - RL won both games, scores NA; 1937 - Bronte won both, scores N.A.; 1938 -Bronte 2 wins, scores NA; 1939 - Bronte 6, RL 6 and Bronte 8, RL 0.

In 1940, Bronte won both games, the first score being 12-0 and second game score NA; 1941 - Bronte won both; 1942 & 43, the schools did not play during those two vears of World War II; 1944 -Bronte 6, RL 6 and RL 12, Bronte 7; 1945 - RL 29, Bronte 0 and RL 54, Bronte 0; 1946 - RL 13, Bronte 7 and RL 13, Bronte 0; 1947 -Bronte 25, RL 0 and Bronte 32, RL 0; 1948 - RL 14, Bronte 0 and RL 13, Bronte 12; 1949 - Bronte 14, RL 12

and Bronte, 7 RL 0.
In the fifties, the teams mixed up their wins with Bronte recording 10 wins to Robert Lee's 6 within that pe-

riod. Scores were: 1950 - RL 33, Bronte 0 and RL 25, B 12; 1951 - RL 29, Bronte 19, and Bronte 12, RL 7; 1952 - RL 8, Bronte 7 and RL 7, Bronte 7; 1953 - B 28, RL 6 and B 39, RL 6; 1954 - B 34, RL 25 and B 29, RL 25; 1955 - Bronte 38, RL 6; 1956 - Brorite 13, RL 0; 1957 - RL 25, Bronte 7; 1958 - B 31, RL 8; 1959 - B 23, RL 8 and B 38, RL 0.

Bronte won 6 of the 1960's games and RL took 4. In 1960 it was Bronte 32, RL 8; 1961 - Bronte 25, RL 8; 1962 - RL 24, Bronte 6; 1963 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1964 - RL 34, Bronte 14; 1965 - Bronte 20, RL 15; 1966 - Bronte 31, RL 6; 1967 - B 28, RL 12; 1968 - RL 30, B 15; 1969 - B 12, RL 0

In 1970 - RL over Bronte 32-0; 1971 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1972 - RL 33, Bronte 15; 1973 - RL 19, Bronte 0; 1974 - Bronte 41, RL 0; 1975 - Bronte 20, RL 0; 1976 - RL 28, Bronte 0; 1977 - Bronte 0, RL 0; 1978 - RL 21, Bronte 14; 1979 - RL 7, Bronte 3.

Sweetwater girl fatally injured in auto accident

Eighteen-year-old Wendy Marie Davis, an Angelo State University student from Sweetwater, was pronounced dead early Sunday morning by Bronte Peace Justice France Kemp following a 5 a.m. car crash 7 miles south of Bronte on Hwy. 277. Miss Davis, driving a late-model vehicle, veered to the right, crossed the highway and struck a concrete culvert, and was thrown from the car, said investigating DPS trooper Roy Blair of Robert Lee. Her passenger, Christine Marie Menifee, 18, and also a San Angelo college student, is in St. John's Hospital with a broken collar bone, cuts, and abrasions.

Funeral services for Miss Davis were held on Tuesday in Sweetwater. Local arrangements were handled by Shaffer Funeral Home of Bronte. weekend. Homecoming will begin Friday with the football game against Robert Lee. Saturday will be a day filled with activities for ex-students and guests.

A parade will be held at 11:00 a.m. featuring vehicles from the different eras of the school's history. Decade re-

unions will be Saturday afternoon, as well as an Open House by the school board to show visitors the new construction which has taken place over the last few years.

Secretary of State Jack Rains, whose office governs Texas elections, advised voters to register before Sunday, October 9, to be eligible to vote in the November 8 election. Rains said during a recent voter-registration drive, "This election is of the utmost importance; we are going to the polls to elect the next leader of the free world." Also on the statewide ballot will be candidates for U.S. senator, all 27 U.S House seats, all 150 Texas House seats, six members of the Texas Supreme Court, two Texas Railroad Commission members and numerous local officials. Three proposed constitutional amendments will appear on the Texas ballot, too.

Rains hopes to encourage registered voters to get involved in promoting registration for friends, relatives, and fellow workers. Texas now fields about 60% of eligible voters at the polls

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 8. 1988**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for purp

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways.'

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will ap-"The constitutional amendment pear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by state treasurer could decide to trans- funds from other sources. The Texas

board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university, fund the permanent school acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

Michael Dukakis is ready to declare South Africa a Terrorist Country.

Here are some reasons why that would be

Russia has a much worse record than South Africa. Look at the terrible atrocities and suffering recently in Afghanistan at the hands of the Soviets.

We have been depending upon South Africa for many essential materials for national defense. The Soviets and the Soviet bloc countries are the other source for defense raw materials.

Take chrome ore. It is essential to the manufacture of stainless steel and superalloys. It is crucial to the aerospace, chemical defense, power generation, and transportation industries.

The purchase of industrial grade diamonds from the Soviet Union has increased about a 65.5 fold monthly average since Congress slapped sanctions on our friends in South Africa.

Antimony is a mineral which is essential in the manufacture of bullets, computers, radar, and sonar -- and of which the United States has inadequate domestic sources.

Ninety-eight and eight tenths percent of all world reserves of platinum are located in South Africa or Russia.

South Africa holds 68.7 percent of the world's reserve of manganese and the Soviet Union holds 20.2 percent.

Rhodium is essential for use in catalytic converters, particularly in the United States and Europe. South African reserves of rhodium may soon dry up unless sanctions against South Africa are lifted so that United States investments will be allowed there.

Since Congress voted sanctions against South Africa, chrome ore imports from the Soviets have increased about eight-fold. Likewise, U.S. dependency on Russia for the other strategic materials has increased alarmingly.

Interior Secretary Donald Hodel has taken a leading role in calling attention to the problems the sanctions legislation has created.

"If you ask somebody should we buy a major component of a weapons system from the Soviet Union," noted Hodel, "they would say, 'Of course not, that's crazy!' Then should we buy the raw material that is necessary to make the weapons system from the Soviet Union? Of course not. Because of the sanctions against South Africa, we are increasingly dependent on the Soviet and Soviet-bloc countries for raw materials that are essential to the defense establishment, at the very least."

Do we want to trust good old Gorbachev to sell us materials to build defense weapons against him?

It is Mikhail Gorbachev who is quoted as saying on November 2, 1987, quote:

"In October 1917 we parted with the Old World, rejecting it once and for all. We are moving toward a new world of communism. We shall never turn off that road."

Gorbachev seems to agree with Vladimir Lenin:
"First we will take Eastern Europe, then the masses of Asia, then we will slowly encircle the last bastion of capitalism (America) and it shall fall like an over-ripe fruit."

The couple traveled on down to Florida where they saw lots of rain, toured the



The annual ram performance test conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here is set to begin September 16-19 with delivery of the rams according to Dr. Maurice Shelton, Test Coordinator. Shelton said the test is scheduled to culminate with a Field Day and Sale set for March 16, 1989.

"The rams may be entered as individuals or in sire or ownership groups," said Shelton. He added that entries may be registered or non-registered and of any breed, though based on the type of data collected the information from the test is more useful with Finewool breeds.

'Animals should be lambs at the time they are entered, continued Shelton. Those showing yearling teeth will not be accepted."

A part of the test, the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders' Association Registry of Merit Program, is open only to registered rams born on or after October 1, 1987.

Shelton suggests that animals be introduced to feed before delivery, and that they not be heavily shrunk when starting the test.

All animals going on test will be required to undergo and pass an examination and test for epididymitis. If they have not been tested before arrival, a blood sample will be collected at the time of delivery.

Breeders are asked to provide as much information as possible on their rams including sire, birth-date, type of birth, age of dam and her reproductive history. The Certified Ram Category and eligibility for sale will continue to be based on the ROM index.

Soon after arrival, but before the first official weigh-day, the rams will be examined by a committee appointed by Shelton. Animals thought to be unsound will be noted and owners can remove these animals if they desire. Also at this time, owners can remove animals for any other reason. After animals are officially weighed, breeders are asked to leave all animals on test except for health reasons.

Once on test, the rams will be self-fed a commecially prepared and pelleted ration. Shelton will formulate the ration with the help of staff nutritionists.

When placed in the feed pens, the rams will be self-fed in large groups. However, selected sire groups may be fed for short periods in small pens to collect feed efficiency data.

As in the past, the test will be on a self-sustaining basis. An initial deposit of \$135 per animal will be required. Any unused funds will be returned following the test.

FARM SAFETY WEEK IS SEPT. 18-24

In conjunction with National Farm Safety Week, Gov. William P. Clements Jr. has proclaimed the week of Sept. 18-24 as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week.

inis years theme, "Ensure Your Future with Farm Safety", stresses the hazards involved with agricultural production and the effort into preventing injury and illness on the farm, especially during times of economic stress.

Each year this event is observed to initiate and promote safety on Texas farms and ranches. About 100 Texas fatalities result from farm and ranch related accidents each vear, and an estimated 10,000 disabling injuries and 100,000 injuries requiring medical attention occur annually.

According to National Safety Council figures, most fatalities are caused by (in descending order) tractors, firearms, drowning, burns, falls, electrical shock and machinery. During the past 10 years, rural fatalities have

been reduced by 50 percent due to increased awareness and improved safety design. Some 1,600 farm deaths were estimated for 1987.

Most agricultural accidents and work illnesses can be prevented at little or no expense. For instance, safety features on farm equipment and machinery should be maintained and repaired when needed. These precautions and the use of safe work procedures can reduce the needless suffering of rural accident victims and prevent the financial burden of agricultural accidents on productivity and family income.




Mitchell Co. Fair slated


