It is a tragedy that death and grazing while fall weeds and devastation can bring benefit to others. It's hard for a family who has lost everything in Hurricane Gilbert to find any appreciation for the muchneeded weekend rains Texas received. Nevertheless, the West Texas region is rejoicing over the 3-6 inches that fell slowly, without wind or damage.

Farmers are elated; they can begin to get ready to plant small grains. Ag people have said most cotton in the area was not damaged by the rains because bolls had not fully opened. Harvested stubbles are expected to furnish good

County rainfall reports include 3 inches around Bronte, with 4 inches gauged north of town. Maverick reported 3.9 inches. The west side of the county fared bet-ter; Wilbern Millican reported 5.7 at Pecan; Union Texas Gas Plant had over 6 inches; T.K. Whiteside measured 4.5 on the Divide; the I.A. Bird ranch received over 5 inches. Three inches were general around Robert Lee.





1st Quarter

The Steers kicked out of the end zone to start the game. Bronte had the ball at the Bronte 20 yd. line. Bronte could not get a first down and punted to the Steer 42 yd. line. The Steers went to work and got a 1st at the Bronte 46, then another at the Bronte 27. Then with 6:55 left in the first quarter, Anthony hit Wes Horn for a 23 vd. TD. The PAT failed and Robert Lee was ahead by 6 pts. As it turned out this was all Robert Lee needed to win the game as there was no more scoring in the game. RL enrollment increase noted

Robert Lee Independent School District enrollment for September 1988 totaled 351. This represents an increase of 19 from last year.

There are 96 students in high school (grades 9-12) 47 in junior high (grades 7-8); and 208 in elementary (grades K-6). A breakdown in elementary figures includes a large increase over recent years' figures. Kindergarten has 29 enrolled; 34 in 1st grade; 2nd grade, 36; 32 in 3rd grade; 27 in 4th grade; 5th grade, 28; and 6th grade has 22 students.



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

Horns lose close homecoming contest

The Bronte Longhorns lost a heartbreaker to the Robert Lee Steers in Bronte's homecoming game last Friday night. Final score was 6-0 Robert Lee.

Conditions were perfect for the game. An east wind of ten to fifteen miles per hour generated by Hurricane Gilbert, kept things pleasantly cool. Clouds from the storm could be seen approaching from the south and east. However, the rain held off until the early hours of Saturday morning.

A large crowd attended the game and enjoyed the homecoming festivities.

Robert Lee scored on a 27 yard pass play early in the 1st quarter for the only points. A bad snap from center caused the extra point try to fail. Bronte dominated on defense and stats for rushing and passing were in Bronte's favor.


Golf team members noted



GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 8, 1988**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the, federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legisla-

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the fol-lowing: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund ana the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and eco-nomic growth in Texas."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment

and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture cap-ital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. 
