

#### D. M. Biard, 86, Pioneer Resident, **Dies Sunday**

D. M. Biard, 86, earlyday res-ident of Haskell County and the father of Myron Biard, Haskell businessman, died Sunday at 7:30 p. m. in the Haskell Hospital after a brief illness. He suffered a heart attack last Friday at the home of his son here, and had been a patient in the hospital since then.

He was born Sept. 29, 1869, in Tennessee. He married the former Miss Lou L. Trice of Dodd City, Texas, July 4, 1899. She preceded him in death in 1941.

Mr. Biard first came to this section in 1898, returning to Fannin County in 1899. After their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Biard moved to West Texas, settling on a farm near Haskell. He did construction work in Haskell and later moved to Weinert where he was employed by Spencer Lumber Company. Since his retirement he had made his home here with his son and daughterin-law, Mr. and Mrs. Myron Biard,

He was a member of the Meth-odist Church and the Odd Fellows Lodge. He was a past grand of the lodge.

He is survived by two sons, Vernon Biard of Orosi, Calif., and Myron Biard of Haskell; three daughters, Mrs. Virgil Phillips of Orosi, Mrs. H. C. Winters of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Eddy Hanson of San Mateo, Calif.; 10 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.
