Rash of burglaries noted

Sheriff Marshall Millican reported Wednesday that his office is investigating a rash of recent burglaries in west Coke County.

On the night of Dec. 7 or early Dec. 8, a person or persons burglarized, the Best Connection on Hwy. 208 in Robert Lee. Over \$2000 worth of property was taken including tools, equipment, and tires.

A residence in the north part of Robert Lee sustained a forced entry burglary on Friday, Dec. 9 between 9 am - 2:30 pm. A glass pane in a back door was broken to reach the door lock. An undisclosed amount of cash was taken.

On Tuesday, Dec. 13, a farmhouse two miles south of Robert Lee was broken into in another daylight burglary. The break-in occurred between 10 am and 3 pm. Property taken

included 3 rifles and 4 wrapped Christmas gifts.

Sheriff Millican said this time of year always produces a high number of thefts, burglaries, and robberies. Surrounding counties, particularly Runnels County, are also encountering the same problems. He said those who are not working should be aware of unusual activities around the neighbors' property and report any suspicious happenings to his office. Alert action could result in arrests of suspects.

Bronte VFD to buy new truck

The Bronte Volunteer Fire Dept. reports that on Monday they voted to buy a new fire truck. The dept. gave the city approximately \$50,000. This came from a memorial fund, donations, bar-b-ques, and other earnings from the city. The new truck ordered Monday, Dec. 12, 1988, cost approximately \$60,000. It should be here in about 5 months. Donations will still be needed for operation of the new truck.

The department expressed their appreciation to all those who helped.

Obituaries

Kemp

Cecil Warren Kemp, 76, of Bronte died Thursday, Dec. 8, 1988, in Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo.

Service was held at 2 p.m. Saturday at First Baptist Church of Bronte with the Rev. Charles Woodward officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, directed by Shaffer Funeral Home.

He was born April 16, 1912, in Runnels County. He was raised and attended school in Ballinger, and enrolled at Sul Ross State University in Alpine.

He was married to Mrs. Cecil (Frances) Kemp Feb. 4, 1937, in Ballinger. The couple moved to Bronte 40 years ago.

He was Justice of the Peace

in Bronte for 17 years. He was a former city councilman and school board member, and belonged to Masonic Lodge No. 962. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Cecil (Frances) Kemp of Bronte; one daughter, Mrs. Bob (Carolyn) Marcato of Willton, Conn.; one brother-in-law, Hugh "Bub" Lewis of San Angelo; one sister, Mrs. Foy (Gladys) Farmer of Ballinger; five grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and three nieces.

Pallbearers for the services included Royce Fancher, Royce Lee, Aubrey Denman, Billy Joe Luckett, all of Bronte, and Vetal Flores and Gene Hirschfeld, both of San Angelo.

Heart conference noted

Dr. Guno Kletter recently attended the annual conference of the American Heart Association, held this year in Washington, D. C. The conference was attended by an overwhelming 28,000 participants from all over the world including Japan, Iceland, France, Brazil, China, and the USA. Dr. Kletter said he learned what many patients of foreign doctors have encountered for years. He observed that the Japanese were very hard to follow.

Dr. Kletter advised the most surprising presentation made at the conference was presented by a French doctor who described a technique in which a muscle from the chestwall is wrapped around the heart. The muscle is then stimulated to contract and by doing so, it pumps the blood out of the ailing heart. This technique is successfully used in patients whose hearts cannot function adequately any longer and a heart transplantation is not possible.

Dr. Kletter noted, "In addition to my cardiology update, I got some culinary knowledge, too. When eating lunch with a Chinese doctor, he asked me if I knew what those reddish-brown cubes scattered on his plate were. I looked but couldn't make a diagnosis. He then explained they were prepared from blood from ducks, supposedly a delicacy in China."

His impressions on Washington, D. C. itself: crime is up;

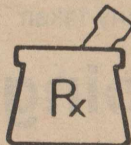
on arriving on Nov. 11, he read in the newspaper that the 305 case of homicide had just happened. When he left Washington one week later, the 310th murder of this year was reported. The rate is almost one a day; most are, of course, drug related. Dr. Kletter said he decided when he was informed of these statistics, it was about time to return to West Texas.

Kr. Kletter, who has an office at 2030 Pulliam in San Angelo, practices family medicine in Robert Lee each weekday, 8-1 pm, in his office on Washington, next to Coke County Pharmacy.

Four voting delegates representing Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau recently participated in the 55th annual Texas Farm Bureau convention Dec. 4-7 in Corpus Christi.

Policies directing the state's largest farm organization were adopted by more than 1,300 delegates from 216 organized Farm Bureaus. Approved recommendations on national policies will advance to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting to be held Jan. 9-13 in San Antonio.

Speakers featured at the convention included Bill Banowsky, president of the Dallas-Fort Worth Superconducting Super Collider Authority; S. M True of Plainview, TFB president; Neal Burnett of Plainview, TFB secretary-treasurer; (financial report); and Warren Newberry, TFB executive director.

The business session covered the final two days of the meeting. The last order of business was the election of the president, S. M. True.

County leaders also attended several special conferences on the 1990 Farm Bill; animal rights, biotechnology, environment; state legislative session outlook; economic services, communication and information; and labor relations. Commodity conferences were also held.

This year's youth winners were Rene Balas of Altair, 1988 Miss Farm Bureau; Sandra Fay Dornak of El Campo, Talent Find Winner, and Robert Benton of Eden, Free Enterprise Speech winner.


