Robbery occurs in RL

Coke County Sheriff Marshall Millican stated Wednesday that the holidays had been relatively quiet except for one alarming incident. Tom Lee, who ranches and lives south of Robert Lee on the Colorado River just below Lake Spence, reported that one of his ranch hands was assaulted and robbed the day after Christmas. The young Hispanic male lives in a house southwest of the Lees and, according to the victim, four males wearing ski masks, pullovers, jeans, and athletic shoes burst into the house about 6 pm on Monday, Dec.

26. After they demanded money and roughed him up, he was robbed of \$210 cash. He was tied tightly, spreadeagled on his bed, and the suspects fled. He neither heard nor saw a vehicle and could not identify his assailants but got the impression they were young and at least three might be Hispanic.

The Lee family was gone on Monday but returned Tuesday and Lee found the victim still tied at 10 AM, some 16 hours later.







hospital and the right artery will be repaired in the same way. Tests showed an 85% constriction there also caused by the radiation and a gradual buildup of scar tissue.




