County Stock Show, Sale termed "strong"

The 1989 edition of the Coke County Stock Show was another excellent showcase of quality livestock and dedicated youth exhibitors. With the sometimes temperamental January weather cooperating as best it could, this year's show, barbecue, and sale were termed very strong by stock show committee members.

Highlight of this year's stock show activities was the official dedication and renaming of the show building to the **Sterling Lindsey Memorial Exhibit Building**, in memory of the late long-time Coke County Agricultural Agent. On hand for the dedication were Mrs. Frances Lindsey and two of their children, Lesa and Edwin.

Judging began on Friday evening, with Brande Burrows exhibiting the Grand Champion Lamb and Michael Lee showing the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb. Michael was also presented the Ralph Walker Top Hand Award for 1989.

Saturday morning's activi-

ties started with a clean sweep by Brian Arrott in the Swine Division, with Brian driving both the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion.

Scott Antilley's Angus steer earned Grand Champion honors in the Steer Division, with Debra Drennan exhibiting the Reserve Grand Champion.

Showmanship awards were presented to Melissa Arrott in the Sheep Division; James Tennison in the Swine Division; and Teresa Vaughn in the Steer Division. The Frank Percifull Overall Showmanship Award was presented to Shane Kelton.

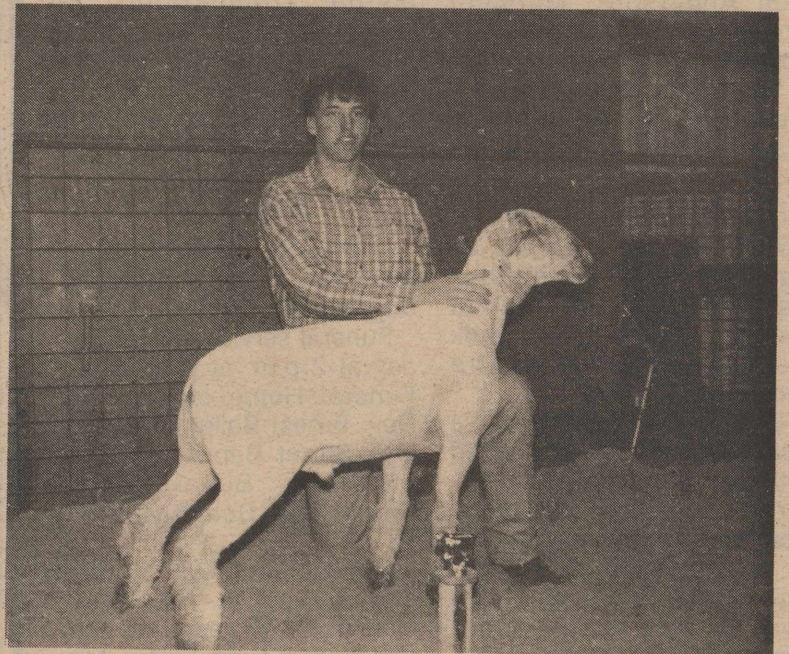

Letter describes special feeling of aide

Editor's Note: The following reply was originally printed in an Ann Lander's column, and is reprinted here at the request of one of our local nursing home aides.

Just a Nurse's Aide

Someone asked what I did for a living. I said, "I'm a nurse's aide in a nursing home." The person made a sour face and sighed, "Oh Lord!"

A lot of people think it's an awful job. "Not for all the money in the world," is what one of my friends said. Well, believe it or not, there is something special about this job. People really depend on me. I not only care for them, I care

about them as well.

Being a nurse's aide is not glamorous. There are many aspects of the daily routine that are demanding and physically difficult. But I take pride in my work. There is so much to learn. I try to improve my skills every day. Things do get hectic. Sometimes all the call bells seem to go off at once. Family members ask me to do extra things that take time. I do my best to accommodate them but sometimes it just isn't possible.

My work is the kind that many sons and daughters can't do or won't do, yet somebody must take care of

the sick and the old. So I bathe and shower my patients. I want them to be fresh and clean. I comb and brush their hair. I want them to look nice. Their hands sometimes shake so I have to cut their food and help them to eat. I want them to get proper nourishment.

Now do you understand why my job is important even though some folks look down on a nurse's aide? These elderly people really depend on me. Being there for them makes me feel very special. Just sign me

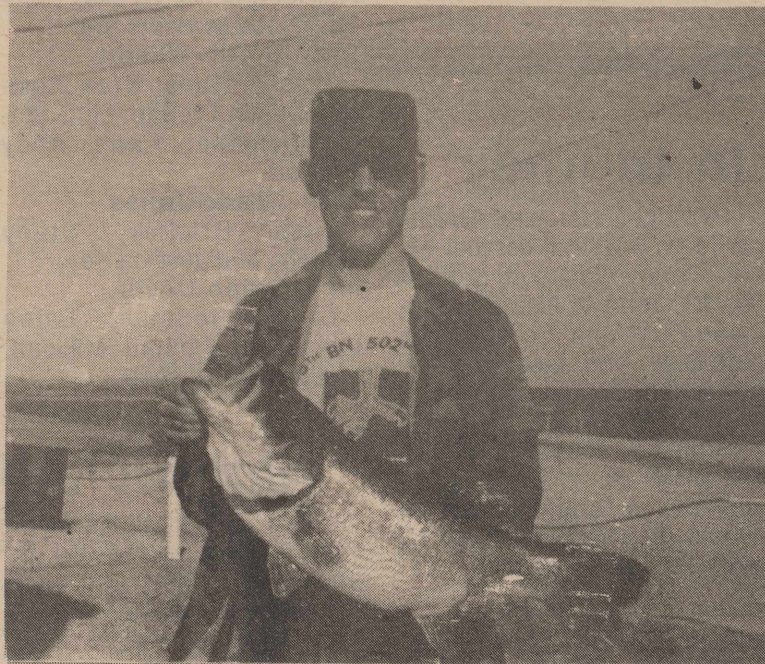

Following the meal, President Marie Guffy presented "TRTA Legislative Priorities: for the group's consideration and awareness for the 71st Legislative session. Some of the priorities were (1) asking the Legislature to return to the 8% contribution as stipulated in H.B. 2623, (2) to determine what impact the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988 will have on TRS-Care group insurance program, (3) approve cost of living for retirees, (4) improve survivor benefits, (5) resolve the problem of impoverishment of a spouse or retiree requiring nursing home care, (6) continue to protect the integrity of Texas Homestead Act, (7) work to maintain the Teacher Retirement System as a separate agency. The suggestion was made to write or contact the TRTA and/or our Legislators to express our wishes and concerns. Teacher Retirement System Updates will be presented at each meeting.

The next meeting of the CCTRTA is scheduled for the Robert Lee First Methodist

Church. The covered-dish luncheon will be at noon on February 20th.

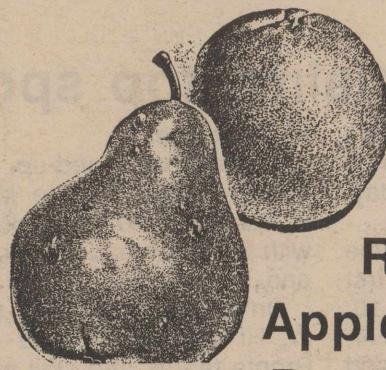

Judge Denman invited the commission to head up a committee to plan a county-wide centennial celebration for 1989. The group agreed to accept the responsibility if it can have suggestions and cooperation from all parts of the county, including individuals and organizations.

The commission was asked to look at the old photostat machine housed in the courthouse basement, and to consider accepting it as a true antique for the museum. Due to its size, it will pose a problem both for those who try to move it and for the museum, since the machine is too large to place there. A museum committee in another county wants it and has enough space. There may be enough interest among Coke County citizens to carry the project of keeping it to completion, but it will require a county wide push. The machine may be seen at the Court House. It produced county records until recently when new technology made smaller and cheaper work possible.

Ten newly appointed members were present, with County Judge Denman, Commissioner Luckett, and a visitor, County Attorney Bill Helwig.

Visitors interested in preserving Coke County history are invited and urged to attend meetings and to participate in all aspects of such activities as the group undertakes. Dates of future meetings will be published in the Observer/Enterprise.

Historical group meets

Coke County Historical Commission met January 17, in its first meeting of the new year with out-going Chairman Jeffie Roberts calling the meeting to order. After reading her annual report listing numerous accomplishments by the group in 1988, she pointed out unfinished projects to be completed in 1989.

An application for a grant to repair the roof of the Coke County Museum on South Chadbourne Street, Robert Lee, has been submitted and correspondence continues with the Santa Fe Railroad concerning placing a historical marker on the depot in Bronte.

Chairman Roberts reported that the historical marker for Robert Lee's First United Methodist Church has arrived and will be installed and dedicated at a later date, and that Bronte's United Methodist Church has been informed from Austin headquarters that its marker has been approved and will be delivered upon completion.

The group expressed appreciation of Roberts' hard work as chairman, and, with a brief farewell, she presented the in-coming chairman with her "books" and other useful literature.

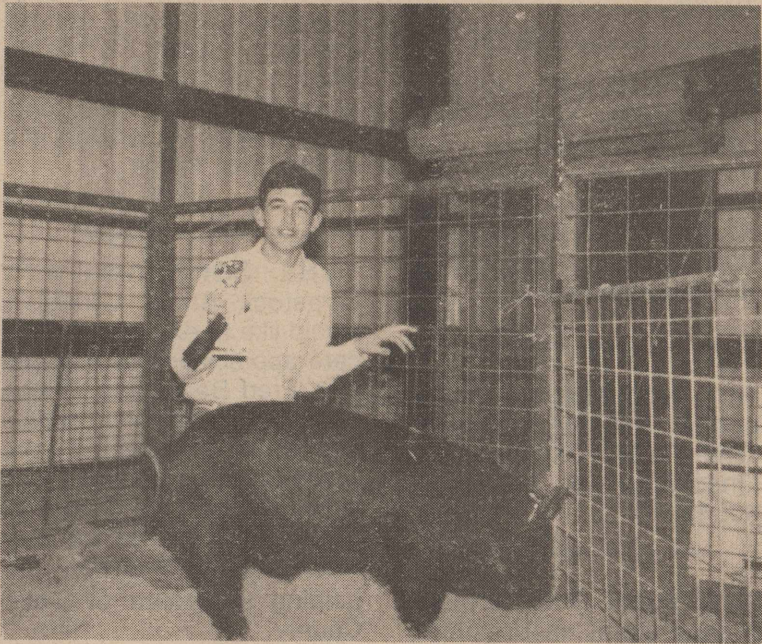

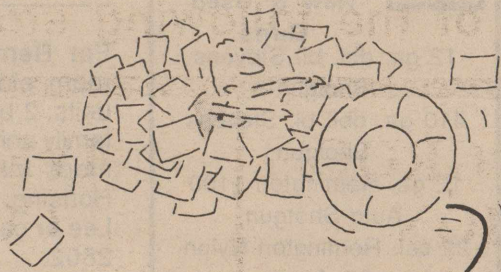
