

High speed pursuit ends in Robert Lee

Baker's Grocery and Market was the sight of a vehicle crash resulting from the pursuit of a stolen vehicle last Tuesday morning. The San Angelo Police Department were in pursuit of George Michael Yarbrough, 35, of Midland, TX, who was the driver of the stolen 1988 fourdoor pickup that crashed into three parked vehicles.

When Yarbrough evaded the San Angelo Policemen in the city and headed north on Hwy. 208, the Coke County Sheriff's Department were asked to assist in apprehension, reported Sheriff Marshall Millican.

Deputy Jeff Barnes repeatedly attempted to halt the

reached the Robert Lee City limits. Yarbrough swerved the pickup back and forth across the highway to prevent Barnes from passing. Yarbrough failed to execute the curve at the Hwy. 158 and Hwy. 208 intersection, swerved out of control and collided with two parked vehicles in the parking lot of Baker's Grocery. As Deputy Barnes pulled in behind the pickup, Yarbrough backed out of the parking lot, into and disabling the Deputy's patrol car.

As Yarbrough headed south on 208, Deputy Barnes fired two shots from his service revolver hitting one of the

stolen vehicle before it tires of the stolen vehicle. Yarbrough drove approximately three blocks and was apprehended by the San Angelo Police Officers.

Luckily, there was only one reported injury related to the incident. Wayne McCutchen, Coke Co. Sheriff's Office Dispatcher, sustained minor cuts and abrasions when the stolen vehicle struck Deputy Barnes' car. The dispatched EMS volunteers treated him on the scene.

The parked car that was struck belongs to Mrs. Addie Jeffries, Robert Lee and the second vehicle damaged was a pickup truck owned by Bobby Baker.

Millican reported that the Sheriff's office will file felony charges against Yarbrough.

Farm Bureau Week proclaimed


County Judge Aubrey Denman has signed a proclamation designating February 13-18, as "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Coke County.

The West Coke County be very informative to Coke Community Development held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, Feb. 6, in the Courthouse with 15 members present. After receiving the Treasurers report of the balance of \$1,1161.61, the group discussed the progress of continuing current projects.

Elaine Francis, President of the Development Board, announced that the signs featuring the WCCCD Sponsorship of the statewide Adopt-A-Highway program have been installed.

Bill Helwig was appointed as chairman of the Adopt-A-Highway project. He will help contact members about a time to clean up between the signs that have been erected. The WCCCD has committed to 2 miles of cleanup of the State Highway beginning at the edge of the Robert Lee City limits extending southwest toward Lake Spence. The state will furnish any materials needed and pick up filled bags

Bill Helwig reported that he had checked on the possibility of armed forces training here in Coke County and that Lake Spence is a good location. Robert Lee could be considered as a positive sight since it is not too far away for warfare activities. He suggested meeting with the colonel at Ft. Hood concerning the armed forces and what Robert Lee has to offer for this. The government pays for the use of land while training for warfare and then will dispatch a "clean-up" crew to the area after the sessions are completed.

Interest was expressed for the Texas Parks & Wildlife to hold their various meetings here in Robert Lee, as we are in a central location for several interested communities. The organization meets periodically and presents gun safety programs and other informative programs. Information will be sent to them about the city.

On the neighborhood watch, it was stated that the law enforcement will meet with the Development members and give them advice and information on how to be aware of possible crimes, and who to contact and what action to take.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show - the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry in the form of professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Michael Lee is the sole member of the Robert Lee FFA scheduled to show at Houston. He has entered the Market Lamb Division. As you may recall, Michael took the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb, Champion and Reserve Champion Crossbred Lamb, Champion Medium Wool Lamb, and the Ralph Walker Top Hand Awards at the 1989 Coke County Stock Show.

Representing the Bronte FFA are several members, one of which is Bryan Arrott. Bryan won the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Awards in the Swine Division at the 1989 Coke County Stock Show. Casey Thorn, holder of the Champion Prospect Swine Award of the County Stock Show, is also scheduled to attend. Other members competing in the Market Barrows Division are Gary Blair, Julie Blair, Donya Cooper, Sharla McGuire, Lee Sonnenberg, and Ray Wallace. Jim Bob Thomas will be entered in the Market Lamb Division.

Representing 817 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed 12,000 entries this year. A variety of animals are shown in the junior show division: market steers, market sheep, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories represent animals raised by the exhibitor as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. These young 4-H and FFA exhibitors represent the future of this great state and nation. Behind all the hustle and bustle of the week's activities, you will find the greatest young people in the world," noted Steve Woodley, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo assistant manager.


