## Filings complete for most local elections

Candidate filings are complete in six of seven local elections which will be held in Coke County on May 6.

### Bronte

There are three local elections set for May 6 in Bronte.

Eligible voters will elect two city council members. Current members of the council whose terms expire are those of E. G. (Corkey) Collins and Shalon Gibbs. Both Collins and Gibbs have filed for re-election.

Bronte Independent School District will hold an election to select three school trustees. Expiring at this time are the three year terms of Steve Kelton and Lynn Phillips. Also vacant is a 2 year unexpired term made vacant when Mike White resigned. Candidates running on the new three year term ballot are Steve Kelton and Lynn

Phillips, running on the 2 year unexpired term is Richard Hembree.

Two vacancies exist on the East Coke County Hospital Board with the expiration of the terms of R. W. Blackmon and Jane Cumbie. Blackmon and Cumbie have filed application as candidates for the governing board. Candidates for the hospital district must file a petition with the endorsed names of 10 eligible voters in order to be placed on the ballot by March 31, 1989.

### Robert Lee

Three have filed for the three city council seats which will be determined on May 6. They are incumbent Richard Johnson, Ruth Luna and C. O. (Joe) Brazier.

Four have filed for the two available posts in the Robert

Lee School Board of Trustees election, and those are: incumbent Ray Aldridge, Mary Grim, Roy Epperson, and Tom Lee. Both of the school board spots are three-year terms.

Two spots on the West Coke County Hospital District Board of Directors will be filled on May 6. Those who have filed in this election are Kenneth C. Green, Randy Bessent, and Joy F. Bagwell.

The only local election in which the deadline for filing has not passed is that of the Coke County Underground Water District. Two directors will be determined in this election, with one each from precincts 3 & 4. Prospective candidates have until April 16 to file a notice of candidacy in this election. Forms for this purpose may be obtained from the district office in Robert Lee.

## AON winds up successful project year

AON Service Club is winding up another successful year of service projects and community involvement. Service and friendship are the main objectives set forth by the AON constitution. Many different areas and various people have benefitted from recent AON efforts. Past projects have included helping to maintain Cody Bill Park, a Get Out and Vote effort, helping with the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department fundraiser, and donating to the Robert Lee Little League, as well as sponsoring a New Year's Eve Dance. AON members also helped with the Downtown Robert Lee Christmas Parade and sponsored a dance for RLHS cheerleaders. But members' main projects are two, to help whenever possible at the West Coke County Nursing Home and to provide funds for scholarships. This past year, AON Service Club, along with artwork provided by local school children, helped decorate the nursing home for Christmas. Members also provided some of the goodies for the nursing home coffee breaks.

The AON Service Club scholarship award is now in its third year. Two major

fundraisers held throughout this past year have benefitted this scholarship fund set up for RLHS seniors. AON Service Club members hosted a "Chicken Spaghetti Supper" last fall, as well as a Valentine Bake Sale, with all proceeds going into the scholarship fund.

Originally established to aid a college bound senior girl from Robert Lee High School, the first scholarship of \$200 was awarded to 1987 graduate Debbie Flowers. The 1988 award went to Tracy Hubbard and the scholarship has grown to \$500. RLHS Seniors 1989 are doubly blessed because of this year's scholarship funding. Thanks to great community support, AON will give two \$450 scholarships to college bound seniors. Also beginning with the Class of 1989, the scholarships are open to boys or girls.

There are few requirements to apply for these scholarships. First, you must be a Robert Lee High School senior who is going to college. Second, you must complete and submit an application. Sheri Millican, Scholarship Chairman, has the application forms. Seniors may pick up applications from Mrs. Millican at the Robert Lee High School. Completed forms should be returned to Mrs. Millican by Friday, April 7, 1989, and scholarship winners will be announced in May. So, SENIORS 1989, fill out that application.

It is the goal of this service club to continue this yearly scholarship award to RLHS Seniors and to see the scholarship amount continue to

grow. The spaghetti supper and bake sale will, of course, be our yearly tradition, but another tradition is also in the making. A memorial fund is being established to aid this scholarship award. Should an individual care to make a donation to the scholarship fund in memory of, or dedicated to any person, the donation would be greatly appreciated and the individual or family designated would receive acknowledgement. Donations to the AON Service Club Scholarship Fund may be presented to scholarship chairman, Sheri Millican, or to any member.





PUBLIC NOTICE

Pursuant to Section 52.151 of the Texas Water Code, the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District gives public notice of the promulgation of Rules and Regulations relevant to the District. A brief resume of the rules are as follows:

RULE 1-DEFINITION-Pertains to definition of terms within the rules.

RULE 2-WASTE-Provides that no person shall commit waste nor shall they pollute or harmfully alter the underground water.

RULE 3-PERMIT REQUIRED-Provides that a permit is required for wells in excess of 25,000 gallons of water per day.

RULE 4-DEPOSITS-Provides that each application for a permit to drill a well shall be accompanied by a \$50.00 deposit to be returned when a well log is received by the District.

RULE 5-ISSUANCE OF PERMITS-Provides for developing an application form for permits.

RULE 6-REQUIREMENT OF DRILLER'S LOG, CASING AND PUMP DATA-Provides that logs, casing and pump data be delivered to the District within 60 days of completion.

RULE 7-MINIMUM SPACING OF WELLS-Provides that no well shall be located nearer than 300 feet from the nearest property line, and no more than 16 wells per section.

RULE 8-EXCEPTION TO SPACING RULE-Provides that the Board may grant an exception to the above spacing regulations.

RULE 9-PLACE OF DRILLING A WELL-Provides that a well must be drilled within 10 yards of the location specified in the permit.

RULE 10-REWORKING OR REPLACING A WELL-Provides that no person shall rework, redrill or re-equip a well without first making application to the Board.

RULE 11-TIME DURING WHICH A PERMIT SHALL REMAIN VALID-Provides that permits shall be valid if the work has been completed within 4 months from the filing date of the application.

RULE 12-CHANGED CONDITIONS-Provides that decisions made by the Board may be reconsidered upon its own motion or motion showing changed conditions.

RULE 13-RIGHT TO INSPECT AND TEST WELLS-Provides that any representative of the District shall have the right to enter upon the lands for the purpose of inspecting and testing wells.

RULE 14-OPEN WELLS TO BE CAPPED-Provides that the owner or operator shall be required to close or cap the well permanently, except when said well is in actual use.

RULE 15-FINAL ORDERS OF THE BOARD-Provides that orders of the Board in noncontested proceedings shall become final on the day the order is entered by the Board.

RULE 16-REHEARING-Provides any person whose application is denied, or who is not granted relief, may file a motion for rehearing within 15 days from the Board's decision.

RULE 17-RULES GOVERNING PROTESTS-Provides that any person who wishes to protest or oppose any pending matter shall make written notice to the Board before the date the matter is set for hearing.

RULE 18-GENERAL RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR HEARING-Provides that hearing shall be conducted in such a manner as the Board deems suitable, and technical rules of legal and court procedure need not be applied.

RULE 19-GENERAL RULES-Provides for computing time, time limit, and show cause orders and complaints as covered by this rule.

RULE 20-WELL VALIDATION-Provides a method of well validation on existing wells when location and wellhead equipment is determined by district personnel.

RULE 21-TRANSPORTATION OF WATER FROM THE DISTRICT-Establishes a procedure for transportation of water from the district.

RULE 22-WELL DRILLING, COMPLETION, CASING AND PLUGGING-Provides for standards of completion and location of domestic, industrial, injection and irrigation wells, and provides standards for completion and production of undesirable water.

RULE 23-REPORTING UNDESIRABLE WATER-Requires reporting undesirable water encountered while drilling or deepening of wells.

RULE 24-DISPOSAL AND STORAGE OF WASTES-Requires a permit for disposal and storage of wastes and provides for exceptions.

Complete copies of the proposed Rules and Regulations can be obtained and inspected at the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District office in Robert Lee, Texas. The above listed Rules & Regulations were reviewed and discussed at a Public Hearing held on March 27, 1989, after which the Board of Directors adopted same for the district. The rules will go into effect April 14, 1989.




