# County election results are complete

Election returns are complete for last Saturday's balloting for seven governing districts in Coke County.

Voters in Coke County Precinct 3 returned Fred Mc-Cabe, Jr. to the board of directors of the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District by a 68 vote total. Royce Stowe was reelected in Precinct 4 with 17 votes. Robert Lee residents filled three city council seats by giving two year terms to incumbent Richard Johnson, 124, and newcomers Ruth Gloria Luna, 94, and C. O. (Joe) Brazier, 115. Retiring from the city council are J. A. (Jim) Dunklin and F. W. (Pete) Prentice who have served the community for a long period of time. Mr. Prentice was elected to fill a one year term in 1976, and has been on the council

the past 13 years. Mr. Dunklin was elected in 1981, and has served for the past 8 years.

Two positions for the Robert Lee ISD board of trustees went to Ray Aldridge, incumbent, 234, and Mary Grim, 112. Other candidates were Roy Epperson, 38 votes, and Tom Lee, who had a 59 tabulation. Beverly Burdett garnered 93 votes in a strong write-in campaign.

Joy Bagwell was returned to the board of directors of the West Coke County Hospital District with 153 votes. She is joined by candidate Kenneth Green, 147, to complete the panel. Narrowly missing a tie for the second seat was Randy Bessent with 146.

Bronte City Council filled its two vacancies with the election of the incumbent candidates, E. G. "Corkey" Collins, who received 61 votes and Shalon Gibbs, who tallied 57.

Elected to the two slots on the Bronte ISD board of trustees were Steve Kelton, 79 votes, and Lynn Phillips, 78. Both candidates were the incumbents. Richard Hembree received 59 votes to serve an unexpired term on the board.

Jane Cumbie, 74 votes, and R. W. Blackmon, 73 votes, were returned to their positions on the East Coke County Hospital District.

# Commission identifies county schools

## Junell announces bill to aid homes

A bill to aid thousands of Texans in need of nursing home services was passed by the House Tuesday according to Representative Robert Junell who co-sponsored the measure with representative Betty Denton (D-Waco).

House Bill 318 raises the state income cap on Medicaid eligibility from the present \$715 per month to the federal maximum of \$1104 per month.

An amendment to the bill applying the same increase to home-based community care services was also approved.

It is estimated that the increase will allow an extra five thousand elderly and disabled Texans to meet the eligibility requirements for nursing home services.

Each year the elderly population grows. In fact statistics show that people over 85 make up the fastest growing segment of the U.S. population. Many of them are healthy, active people involved with family and friends, church or community groups.

But many others are not that fortunate. They live alone and have little contact with others. If they become ill or unable to function independently, they can easily go unnoticed and unattended. According to Churchill, the Gatekeeper Program seeks to help other customer service representatives who may have contact with the elderly in the normal course of their jobs.

Nancy Johnson, WTU supervisor of residential audit services, recently conducted training sessions for those employees throughout the company's 52 county service area. The training taught the Gatekeepers to recognize certain signals in the elderly such as a change in appearance or behavior, or signs of confusion or disability.

When the employee sees a warning sign, the local agency for the aging is contacted. The agency takes it from there.

They contact the elderly person, assess their needs, and get whatever help is required from the appropriate health or social services.



Six of the 12 units will be designed especially for elderly persons. Two more will be regular single bedroom

homes and the other four will be two bedroom units.







# Near record fish caught

A fisherman from Hurst came within a couple of pounds of setting a new state record for striped bass last week below Lake Texoma's Denison Dam.

Biologist Bruce Hysmith of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said Doug Norwine was fishing from the bank with a surf spinning outfit and half-ounce jig April 23 when he landed a 40-pound, 14-ounce striper.

The fish sets a Red River record, beating a 36-pounder caught from the same area in 1982. The current state record striper is a 43-pound, 8.8-ounce fish caught below the Mansfield (Lake Travis) Dam near Austin in March 1986 by Wayne Savoie of

Round Rock.

Hysmith said Norwine's big striper was 11 years old, juding from examination of scales. He added that fishing in the trailrace below the Texoma dam has been good this spring for white bass, crappie and blue catfish in addition to striped bass.






# Stewardship emphasized



Conserve Water By Repairing Leaks

Water conservation doesn't always mean installing new water saving devices, and developing better water usage habits. In fact, some of the most effective water conservation occurs when leaky faucets and toilet tanks are repaired. Leaks are not only frequent and annoying, they are also a waste of water, money and energy.

A faucet dripping 60 drops per minute will waste almost 2300 gallons of water per year. That's enough water to fill a swimming pool. Leaky toilets are even worse. They can waste over 300-500 gallons of water per day without anyone noticing.

The average homeowner can fix these small leakes, and possibly save themselves the expense of major repairs or replacement later on.

Before attempting to repair a leaky faucet, make sure to shut off the water supply to the sink. You may also want to line the sink with a towel to prevent scratching and to stop any parts from going down the drain. When you take the faucet apart, remember to lay the parts out in the same order that you're going to put them back together.

Toilet repair may be a little more difficult because the leak isn't always obvious. Put a little food coloring in the toilet tank, letting it sit for 15 minutes, and checking to see where the food coloring is. This will be at least give an indication of where the leak might be.

These are some common problems that may be easily fixed: a full tank and water continues to run; an empty tank and water continues to run; it doesn't flush properly; slow filling or noisy tank; con-



Thinning Boosts Fruit Size, Reduces Damage

While fruit growers may find it difficult to thin the crop that their trees have set, thinning is a sound production practice.

Although the late-season freeze a few weeks ago did light to heavy thinning of fruit crops, many trees are boasting a good crop and need thinning.

The two main reasons for thinning are to increase the size of remaining fruit to make it a more attractive product and to avoid overcropping, which can damage trees.

Thinning should be done as early as possible, but the most practical time is during the fourth, fifth, and sixth weeks after bloom. That's when fruit is about walnut sized or a little bigger than a man's thumb and heavy enough to snap from the tree when limbs are thrashed or shaken.

Thrashing is usually more effective early in the morning when stems are higher in

moisture and snap more easi-

What's a good guide for thinning?

A full-sized healthy peach tree should carry 400 to 700 fruit after thinning. Early maturing varieties will not get as large as later types, so more can be left. Later maturing varieties that tend to have larger fruit can be thinned a little more heavily.

Ideal spacing is 6 to 8 inches between fruit, but that requires hand thinning.

Shaking limbs or thrashing them with some type of padded pole is a common thinning practice. Then some touch-up hand thinning may be needed to remove doubles and insect-damaged fruit.

Plum trees that have set a heavy crop should also be thinned. Do enough thinning so that remaining fruit is 2 to 3 inches apart.

Apple and pear trees generally require thinning. Excess fruit should be hand-picked to leave on fruit per cluster.

and less during at least seven months of the year.

Surprising as it may seem, the Mexican peso presently sells at a rate of over two thousand to the dollar. Don't expect dramatic savings, however, in the popular coastal resorts of Mexico (the Acapulcos and Puerta Vallartas). Rather, it is within the deep interior of Mexico surrounding Mexico City that the normal, remarkably low price structure of Mexico reasserts itself. In the fabled urban centers of the 17th century conquistadors-in such cities as San Miguel de Allende, Patzcuaro, Guanajuato-quite decent hotel rooms rent for \$30 and

under, quite adequate meals are available for \$4, and just about every other expenditure is a happy surprise.

The least expensive country in all of Western Europe is Portugal, whose escudo now sells at 150 to the dollar. Only the most elegant of Lisbon hotels charge more than \$70 for a double room with two breakfasts; other quality establishments lower the price to \$50, while budget lodgings in pensions and small hotels sell for under \$30.

In a country where the U.S. dollar sells at a full 25 percent advantage against its own currency, almost all Canadian areas have become refreshingly priced, but Nova Scotia is even more inexpensive than most. It's quaint, undeveloped and offers lobster dinners for \$8.95 (U.S.).


