FB talent contest slated



Congratulations on your One Hundreth Anniversary. Time sure flies, it was fifty years ago this month that Bob Hall and I published the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Robert Lee Observer, and a mighty fine job we did - we thought.

Everything was set by hand - letter by letter and word for word, made up of two pages each and run off on the Old County Campbell, Cylinder Press.

Albert Puett acquired the job of Editor in 1924, I think, from Berryman and Lamb. Mr. Lamb stayed on as typesetter for several years, I guess until 1927 when a tornado destroyed our house.

That was the year three tornadoes struck and demolished the Methodist Church and the Primative Baptist Church and our house, Buchanan's garage,

In 1928, the Observer put on a contest for subscriptions and gave away a 1927 Chevrolet to the winner. Miss Myrtle Hurley won the car.

Letter to the Editor --

Orginally, on being moved from Hayrick, the Observer set on the site where Key Feed Store is now.

Not long after electricity came to Robert Lee, the Wojtek Boys, Otto, Victor and Frank, wanted to build a movie theater on the lot, so the Observer Office was moved to a lot just across the street on the west side of the courthouse, where the agriculture building is now.

By the way, the tall steeple on the old courthouse was toppled in the tornado in 1927 and replaced with a short type dome.

In those days the presses were run by a gasoline engine that had to be cranked by hand. Long belts from the engine to the ceiling on wheels, another belt to the Press and another to the Job Press. So when electricity came to Robert Lee (I don't remember the year) my dad got an electric motor to run the presses.

-

The reason the old copies of the Coke County Rustler and the Observer were in such bad condition was becaused they were rolled up and kept in open shelves built all the way to the ceiling and after the fire in 1937 or 38, I took them all down and placed them in an old trunk, but I put the Volume 1, #1 copy in a large scrap book that I had and forgot about it. It moved with me to Houston, San Diego, Los Angeles, and San Bernardino, California and finally to Brownwood, Texas.

I came across it one day while looking for something in the book, so I brought it back about 1981 and gave it to the Observer office.

I see somebody has painted the Old Buchanan house, I understand it is the only house left that was moved from Hayrick to its present location.
