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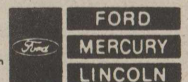
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Baby shower honors Wards

Reservist training told

The 5776th Reinforcement Training Unit, headquartered in Abilene, is a unique Army Reserve unit which has become "home" to many area reservists.

The unit is designed to provide US Army reservists with a place to continue their training, meet drill requirements by attending monthly meetings, and earn valuable points toward retirement. The reservists drill without pay for eight hours, one weekend per month, and remain eligible for certain other benefits, such as shopping at military commissaries and base exchanges. Two week active duty for training during each fiscal year is not required to remain in the Ready Reserve, but is available through the IMA program, if active duty is desired by the individual.

Most of the members of the 5776th are Individual Mobilization Augmentees (IMA). These reservists are attached to specific active Army units, and do their two weeks of active duty with those particular units -- training in the

specific job they would be doing if they were mobilized in a national emergency.

All branches of the US Army are represented in the 5776th, and several members are Vietnam combat veterans. Members find the unit an excellent place to spend the last years of a military career, since some frequently need assistance provided by a unit as the time for military retirement draws near.

Members come from many different military and civilian backgrounds. Because of the rich pool of talent and expertise, lectures and reports given by members -- several of them college professors with doctoral degrees -- are particularly interesting and educational.

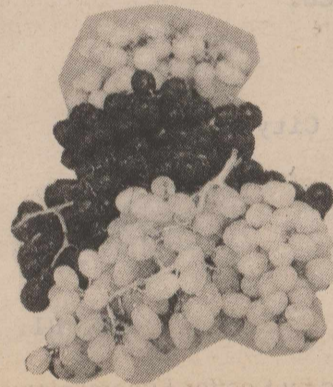
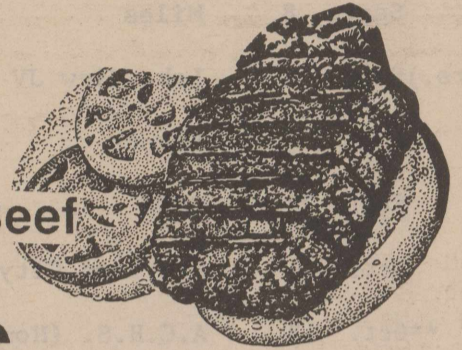

Vaccination recommended

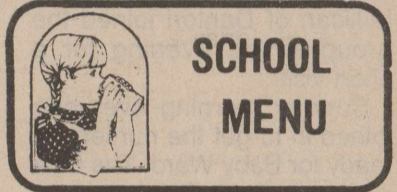
For parents of school children and pre-schoolers, the opening of school means completing a host of last-minute chores. An often overlooked, yet important checklist item, is making sure school and daycare youngsters are adequately immunized. And with reported cases of measles on the rise, local physicians are recommending the addition of a second dose of measles vaccine.

In a news conference held Monday at Angelo Community Hospital, pediatric physicians Rob Patyrak, M.D. and Jane Rider, M.D., said that the recommendation of a second dose of the vaccine known as measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) is in line with the latest policy of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and should be given between

10-12 years of age. The first dose of MMR should still be given at age 15 months, although, there is no outbreak of measles in our area.

Here's what pediatricians in San Angelo recommend you receive as part of a routine immunization plan: 2 months - DTP/OPV; 4 months - DTP/OPV; 6 months - DTP/OPV; 15 months - MMR, 1st Dose; 18 months - DTP/OPV and ProHIB (PRP-D); 4-6 years - DTP/OPV; 10-12 years - MMR, 2nd Dose; 12-15 years - Td.

This recommended schedule was obtained from Angelo Community Hospital.

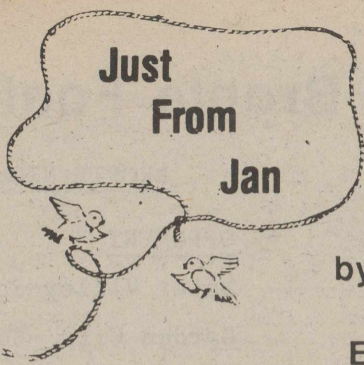

One of these experts, Dr. John Stanton, a researcher on food marketing consultant at St. Joseph's University, Philadelphia, Pa., has predicted that microwave ovens and microwave cooking will increase dramatically by the year 2001.

Stanton has indicated that as the new century begins, 90 percent of American homes will have one microwave oven, compared to 70 percent now; 50 percent of the homes will have two; and 25 percent of our cars will come equipped with a small microwave oven.

Stanton predicts that fewer people will eat breakfast in the next decade, settling for coffee.

For those who want something more substantial, Stanton predicts there will be "one-handed food," easy to open and prepare in the car microwave, and easy to eat with one hand while driving.

Already, 25 percent of American workers eat breakfast in the car. Breakfast tacos and other poultry product share among favorite breakfast finger foods.

These foods will be sold at convenience stores and will be "shelf stable," requiring no refrigeration.

The marketing consultant also said quality-oriented quick lunch restaurants will increase, posing new requirements for food processing and packaging to meet these consumer demands.

Stanton also predicts that by the year 2001, irradiation will be gained widespread acceptance in the U. S. as well as the remainder of the world. Now used in some 30 countries, it has not yet had a significant impact here.

A result of these consumer trends, food preparation be-

havior--already sharply different between weekdays and weekends--will have an even wider gap. Recreational cooking will not be a major weekend activity.

Another trend on the horizon is office delivery of individual meals at 4 p.m., packed in easy -to-carry and prepare containers for the trip home.

The marketing venture probably will be best addressed by smaller, localized food preparation firms with emphasis on personal service and menus that can be easily tailored to particular tastes.

The versatility of many poultry products is expected to gain favor here.

Robert Lee Observer - 1939 Cent. Edition Pioneers Recall Cattle Ranges As They Were In 1889

The Odom cattle ranged on the site of the present city of Bronte, and from there through the Ft. Chadbourne country when "Uncle Joe" McCutchen came to the county in 1889. South of the Colorado was the range of the Wylie Brothers, R. K. Henry, and Tom. South of Wylie's was the Cramer outfit, Mule Creek to Tennyson. South of Cramer, Sam Sayner and Skinner had fenced ranges.

E. C. Rawlings was first a cowboy, then late owner of the HXW ranch north of Sanco. Bill Glass owned the present Whiteside land. It was he who sold out to Will and Rufe Whitesides. The Weathers ranch was north of Hayrick.

The old O. B. line fence went close to Sanco on to Silver Peak. South of that the O. B. or Snyder outfit extended to the river and the headquarters were near the mouth of Yellow Wolf creek, not very far from the present Harris Saul headquarters.

The Harris 7F outfit covered its present range south of the river and extended in an L into

the mountains north of Robert Lee. Some of the wire on their line fence is still in a fence on the L. S. Bird pasture, east of Sanco, has been in that fence since 1887, and still scarcely any rust on it, a kind of galvanized wire with large twisted bars.

The above named ranges just about covered the county when it was organized, with the exception of land occupied by settlers, and fenced by them.

Schedule

Impurities cause laundry problems

Minerals, organic matter and other impurities can be the cause of dingy, stiff or even stained laundry. Solving the problem, however, must start with diagnosis.

"Some laundry problems have similar symptoms and more than one possible cause, so to determine if water quality is the culprit, consider your equipment, water, products and procedures," said Dr. Ann Vanderpoorten Beard, a clothing and textiles specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

For example, the symptoms of hard water problems include dinginess or yellowing, a general soil build-up, a stiff, harsh feel and white or gray streaks on colored fabrics.

In hard water, much of the detergent added to the washer must go to softening the water, so little is left to clean the clothes, Beard said. Simply adding more detergent is expensive and phosphate detergents contribute to water pollution.

One way to prevent the problem is to use an adequate amount of low-sudsing phosphate detergent or heavy duty liquid detergent in as high a water temperature as is safe for the fabrics, the specialist said.

Another solution is softening the water with either non-precipitating water conditioners or installing a water softening system in your home.

To undo damage already done, fill the washer with the hottest water the fabric will tolerate, add four times the normal amount of phosphate detergent and one cup of the water conditioner, Beard said.

Agitate just long enough to wet the clothes and soak the load overnight for about 12 hours. Drain and spin without agitating further and then launder the clothes, using the regular cycle with no detergent, but with one cup of the conditioner.

Repeat the process as needed until no suds appear in the rinse cycle. It may be necessary to launder the clothes with one cup of the

water conditioner and bleach that is safe for the fabrics.

Other water problems that cause discolored clothing are rusty or red water, turbid water or acid water. For information on the causes and solutions

for these water problems, as well as for hard water, ask for publication L-2278, "Water Quality and Laundry Problems," from your local county Agricultural Extension Service office.

SS announces anniversary

In August, the Social Security Administration marks the first anniversary of its most successful drive to inform members of the public about their Social Security coverage, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, announced today.

The Personal Earning and Benefit Estimate Statement (PEBES) was introduced to the public on August 4, 1988. Since then, almost 4.5 million people have sent for and received their PEBES. Reactions have been overwhelmingly positive, Upp said. "Why didn't they do this years ago?" is a commonly heard remark.

PEBES offers a year-by-year breakdown of posted earnings and the estimated FICA taxes paid. It also shows estimates for disability, survivors, and retirement benefits at ages 62, full retirement age (currently 65), and 70.

PEBES request forms are available by calling the toll-free number 1-800-937-2000 or writing to: Consumer Information Center, Department 55, Pueblo, Colorado 81009. Ask for Form SSA-7004, Upp said.
