A lot of special programs Additionally, 4-H helps them build positive self-concepts for directing their lives, while learning and having fun as well. Families can add to the fun by learning and growing together.

Volunteer leaders assisting in the 4-H program also learn new skills while sharing their expertise with young people. Through a valuable network of volunteer leaders, state landgrant universities, state and local governments and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, 4-H continues to stimulate youth to develop life skills and explore many career options.

About 74 adult volunteer leaders work with 4-H boys and girls in Coke County through 4 different 4-H clubs.

WCCCD plans hunter bbq

West Coke County Community Development continues to make plans for a barbecue supper to welcome hunters to the county on Friday night, Nov. 3. Discussion of the project and other items of business were on the agenda of the monthly general meeting Monday, evening, Sept. 25, in the county courtroom. Chairman of the barbecue committee, Bob Wrinkle, was out-of-town and will report on the progress at a later date.

A good number of interested citizens were present along with board members President Robert Wink, D'Ann Eubanks, Edna Havins, Joe Brazier, and Joan Davis.

Dave Hughes will serve on the industrial board being formed by Coke County to investigate possibilities of attracting industry to the area.

Speedy Brasuell, city councilman, spoke to the group about recent ordinances enacted to enhance the appearance of the city by taking steps to eliminate unsightly refuse on vacant lots and either to repair or demolish

long-vacant houses and buildings. A panel has been formed to review-the sites in question and recommend what should be done. The WCCCD agreed to support the moves and aid the city any way possible.

Texas Parks & Wildlife game warden Sparks Burdett was also a guest speaker for the organization. He recited some general rules for the upcoming hunting season and made an estimate on hunters who come to Coke County during hunting season as over a thousand, some once, some a number of times, for tremendous economic impact.

Board members and committee heads will meet soon in a called session. The next general meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 23, at 7 pm in the county courthouse in Robert Lee. A speaker on drug awareness will present the program at that time.



Fifth releases balloons



So what do you do when he lies? You hit him with the perjury law - a law against lying.

The drug stamp law has been called the Al Capone law. That's because Big Al was never convicted of running a protection racket. He was never convicted of promoting prostitution. BUT HE WAS CONVICTED AND SENT TO THE PEN FOR EVADING TAXES.

Notify SS of address change

People who receive Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments very often forget to notify Social Security when they move or change address, particularly if they have direct deposit. Failure to notify Social Security of a change of address is one of the most frequent causes of failure to receive the monthly payment. One reason for this appears to be the fact that many people assume it is enough to notify the post office when they change their address. However, the post office only forwards the mail to the new address for a short period of time. Then, it automatically sends back any mail that is not properly addressed.

Many people have their checks sent directly to their accounts in a bank or other financial institution. Direct deposit makes it unnecessary to wait in line to cash their check and may avoid the risk of theft

However, Social Security also sends out important information to beneficiaries that may affect their benefits. If Social Security does not have your current address, the beneficiary may not receive important information that could result in their payment being reduced or stopped without first receiving prior notice.

SSI recipients may have additional problems if they do not report their new address. Their living arrangements are part of the basis on which their payments are granted. Failure to report a change in living arrangements could result in an overpayment -- receiving benefits to which they are not eligible or even an extra payment. The law requires overpayments to be paid.

A change in address may be reported by telephone, mail, or by visiting any Social Security office.

Archery reg changes told

Archers planning to hunt hunting point that measures during Texas' archery-only hunting season for deer and turkey Oct. 7-Nov. 5 should be aware of state archery regulations, including some new regulations on the use of crossbows by handicapped

Law enforcement officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said the longbow, which includes recurved and compound bow, must be hand-held and hand-drawn with no mechanical devices built into or attached to the bow that would allow the archer to lock the bow at full or partial draw.

Also, no device to propel the arrow is permitted other than the energy stored by the hand-drawn bow, and the bow also must have a minimum peak draw weight of 40

Arrows used in taking game animals and game birds may not be poisoned, drugged, or explosive. Each arrow must bear the name and address of the user in a non-water soluble medium.

When hunting turkeys and any game animal other than squirrels, the arrow must be equipped with a broadhead

at least 7/8 of an inch in width and have a minimum of two cutting edges.

Crossbows are not authorized for use in hunting game birds or game animals except that persons having an upper limb handicap may use a crowbow to hunt deer and turkey during the archery-only season, Oct. 7-Nov. 5, provided: (1) no telescopic sight is attached to the crossbow, (2) the crossbow has a minimum of 125 pounds of pull, (3) the crossbow has a mechanical safety, and (4) the bow conforms with the requirements applicable to arrows as described above that are authorized for legal use with the longbow.

"Upper limbed handicapped person" means a person who has a permanent loss of the use of fingers, hand or arm in a manner that renders the person incapable of using a longbow, compound bow or recurved bow. While hunting deer or turkey with a crossbow, persons handicapped in this manner must have in their immediate possession a physician's statement certifying the extent of the disability.

Ag protection introduced

WASHINGTON, D.C. --Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-TX) has taken steps to protect animal producers and researchers by introducing a bill known as the "Farm Animal and Research Facilities Protection Act of 1990"

The bill is designed to prevent, deter and penalize crimes and illegal acts of terrorism against U.S. farmers, ranchers, food processors and agricultural and biomedical researchers. It also allows farm and animal facility owners to bring civil actions against violators.

"Unfortunately, it is apparent that current laws are not discouraging acts of violence against our food producers and researchers," said Con-gressman Stenholm. "The true victims of these illegal acts of terrorism are not just the owners targetted for attack, but all members of society who rely on producers for food and on researchers for vital medical breakthroughs."

Stenholm pointed out that polio, drug addiction, cystic fibrosis, cancer and Alzheimer's treatments, as well as surgical techniques,

pacemakers and many vaccines and antibiotics are dependent on research using higher animal forms.

"I believe that when a computer or cell cultures can be used in place of an animal for research this should be done," commented Stenholm. "However, I do believe responsible animal research should be used when it is the only way to save human lives."

"My disagreement is not with animal rights advocates interested in established guidelines for proper animal care, but with extremists who insist that no circumstances exist under which we can morally differentiate between the value of the life of a human and that of an animal," said Stenholm.

The Congressman pointed out that the acts of terrorism that have occured around the country, including Texas Tech University in Lubbock, are hindering medical research and putting lives in jeopardy as people await medical breakthroughs to help them "beat the odds" while fighting disabling and terminal dis-

During October, National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the Cancer Information Services (CIS) of The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center urges all women age 40 and older to have regular mammograms to detect breast cancer early, when it is most treatable.

Emily T. Parnell, manager of the CIS, says information specialists staffing the 1-800-4-CANCER number are prepared to answer questions about early detection of breast cancer and send callers a free brochure on mammography. Mammography, an x/ray of the breast, can detect breast cancer in its earliest

"One in 10 American women will develop breast cancer," Parnell says. "Mammograms can improve
