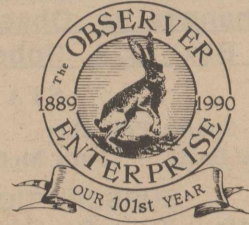

Although some tabulations are still pending, preliminary results of the 50th Anniversary of the Coke County Stock Show are excellent.

The weather, which is always unpredictable during the stock show season, started out wet and chilly, but cleared up just in time for a nice weekend.

A banner depicting the 50th anniversary of the show hung from the announcer's stand. A total of 384 barbecue plates

were served by the director's wives, with Roy Tinkler, Fred Beaty, and Gaylon Pitcock getting the credit for some of the best barbecue ever served in West Texas.

"The quality of the livestock exhibited improves every year, with the show getting better and better," was one comment overheard from a veteran stock show parent. Although too early for a definite monetary total, the premium sale was termed very

strong.

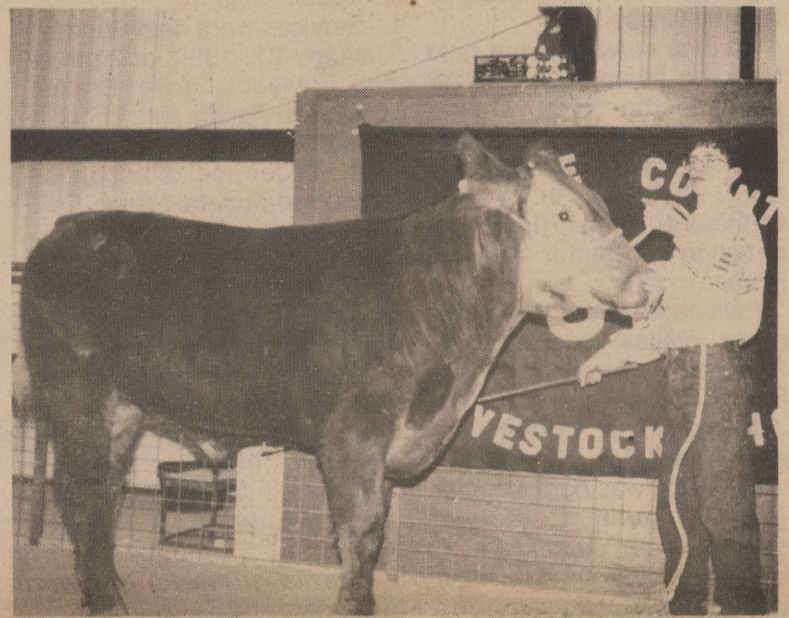

Candidate profiles to be published

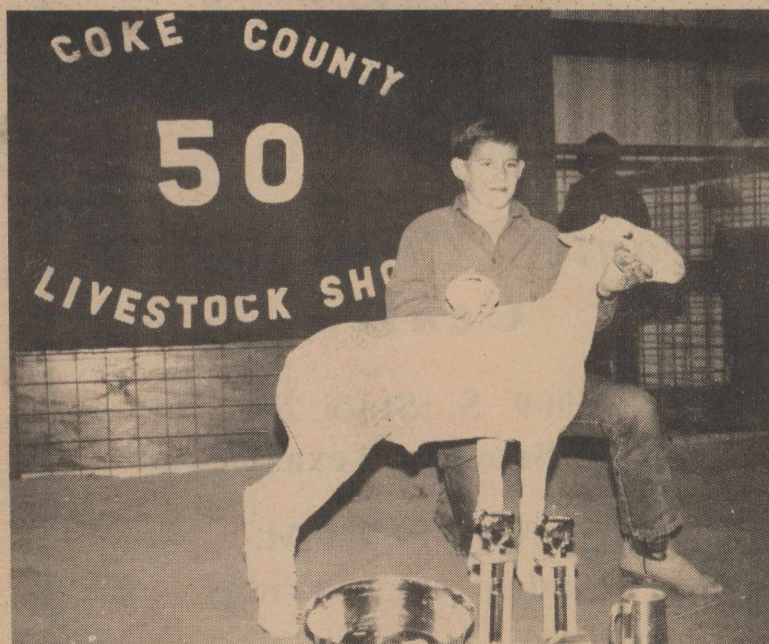

Earnings affect Social Security

One of the interesting aspects of the fact that most people can look forward to a longer life in retirement is a tendency of many to continue working and even to start a second career. For some, it's a matter of filling the empty hours; for many others, however, it becomes a matter of need.

People who contemplate working after retirement should be sure to understand how earnings will affect their Social Security benefits. To insure that benefits are paid to those who are actually retired, there is a limit on how much a person can make and still receive full benefits.

Under the annual earnings test, the earnings limit increases each year with increases in general wage levels. For 1989, it is \$6,480 for people under 65; and \$8,880 for people 65 through 69. The earnings test does not apply to people 70 and over.

Earnings over the limit cause benefits to be reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the limit. Starting in 1990, the withholding will be \$1 in benefits for every \$3 of earnings over the limit for people 65 through 69. Generally, this means that a person is always better off working than not working, since it is possible to increase one's income substantially.

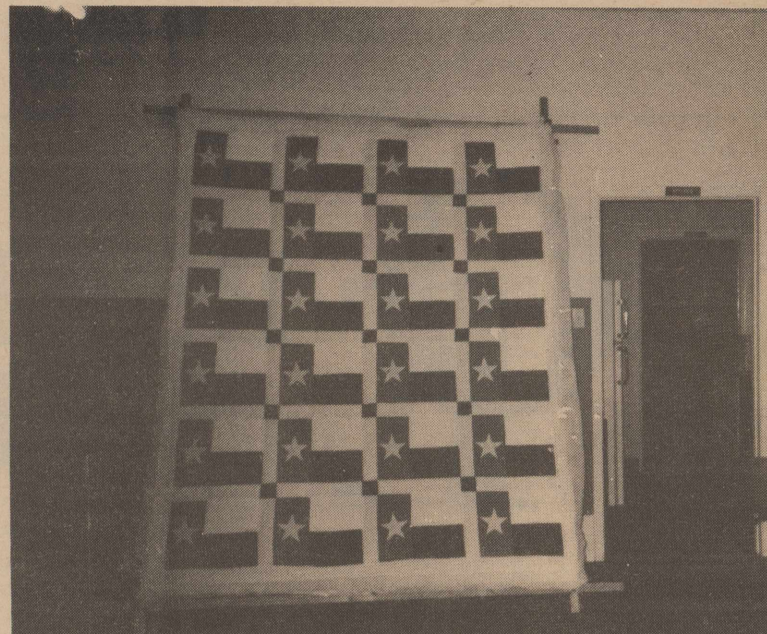
For example, a person retiring at 65 in 1988, receiving the maximum benefit of \$899 a month, or \$10,788 a year, could have a total income of \$19,668, including earnings and full benefits. He or she could earn up to \$30,456 before all benefits are withheld.

A person getting benefits who expects to earn more than the limit must report this to the Social Security Administration (SSA) so the benefits may be adjusted accordingly. Failure to report the earnings could result in overpayments--receiving benefits to which a person is not entitled. The law requires over-payments to be repaid to the Social Security trust funds. Generally, this is done by withholding portions of future checks, but repayments may be made in one lump sum.

People who earn over the earnings limit are required to report their earnings to SSA by April 15th of the following year. They are also required to estimate how much they plan to earn in the future. Benefits are adjusted based on the information in the annual earnings report.

Any change in expected earnings should be reported to SSA immediately to avoid the risk of an overpayment. If a person willfully and fraudulently conceals earnings, penalties are possible, ranging from a fine to a jail term.

If you have any questions about earnings after retirement, please be sure to contact a Social Security office. If you plan on working, it makes sense to work smart and avoid potential problems.

(Stephens County), Tullos graduated from Arden High School in 1939. A long-time Farm Bureau member, he served 10 years on the Tom Green County Farm Bureau board, including three years as its president (1986-89).

Tullos is currently serving as a director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association; is a member of the Middle Concho Soil and Water Conservation District; and has been a member of the Mertzton ISD board of trustees for several years. He is a past director of the Mohair Council of America.

TSTI announces honor students

The Sweetwater campus of Texas State Technical Institute has announced its honor rolls for the recently finished fall term. These lists include both part-time and full-time students from the Sweetwater campus and the Abilene extension.

In order to qualify for the President's List, a student must maintain a 4.0 grade point average for the term. Monte Sparkman and Melinda McCutchen, both of Bronte, have been named to the President's List.

SH reps slate fundraising

The Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging recognizes the importance of the Texas Silver Haired Legislature as it is the only group in Texas whose sole function is to propose legislation of benefit to Older Texans and to present it to the State Legislature.

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature is in its second two-year term and has been effective in having its proposed legislation enacted into law. Of the ten priority items presented to the last Legislature in regular session, eight were enacted into law. This success rate of 80% demonstrates that the Texas Silver Haired Legislature is a powerful advocate for Texas seniors.

Lack of funding for travel, lodging, correspondence, etc. has been a severe handicap for many of the 116 members. Because of this problem, a plan for fund raising was approved at its fall, 1989 General Session. Below, please find a copy of the plan which involves the collection of aluminum cans for recycling.

1. There are 28 Area Agencies on Aging in the State of Texas.

2. There are 989 Senior Citizen Sites in these 28 Areas on Aging.

3. The price of aluminum cans is 50 cents per pound. This will vary with time and area.

4. Each Senior Citizen Site shall provide for the collection of aluminum cans, on a continuing basis, at or near their facility.

5. Cans shall be sold monthly, or more frequently as needed, and the proceeds forwarded to the Texas Silver Haired Legislature Foundation.

6. Professional help shall be secured to implement the program. However, the Executive Officers of the Silver Haired Legislature must be involved in promoting the plan with the Directors of the Area Agencies on Aging and the Managers of the 989 Senior Citizen Sites. Also each of the 116 elected Silver Haired Legislators must be encouraged to become fully involved in the effort in their respective Areas.

7. A conservative estimate of an average of 50 lbs. per month for each Senior Citizen Site at 50 cents per pound will result in approximately \$25,000 per month or \$300,000 per year for the Foundation.

The plan will provide these benefits:

a. it will require no out of pocket money from any senior citizen;

b. it will make for more public awareness of the Silver Haired Legislature.

c. it will stimulate the interest of the Senior Sites in the Silver Haired Legislature;

d. it will help keep our communities cleaner;

e. it will contribute substantially to much needed recycling of our resources.

f. it will adequately fund the Silver Haired Legislature so that it may more effectively perform its function.

Containers are available at Senior Centers in both Bronte and Robert Lee for those who wish to deposit their collection of cans.

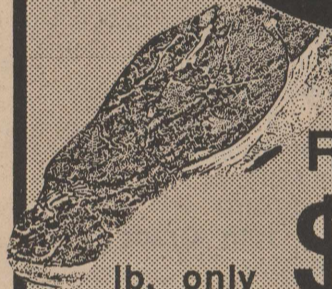

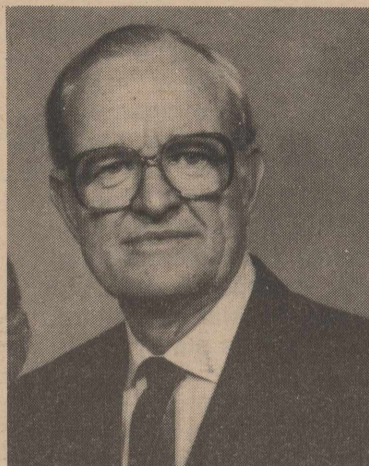
She is currently a housewife involved in farming and ranching.

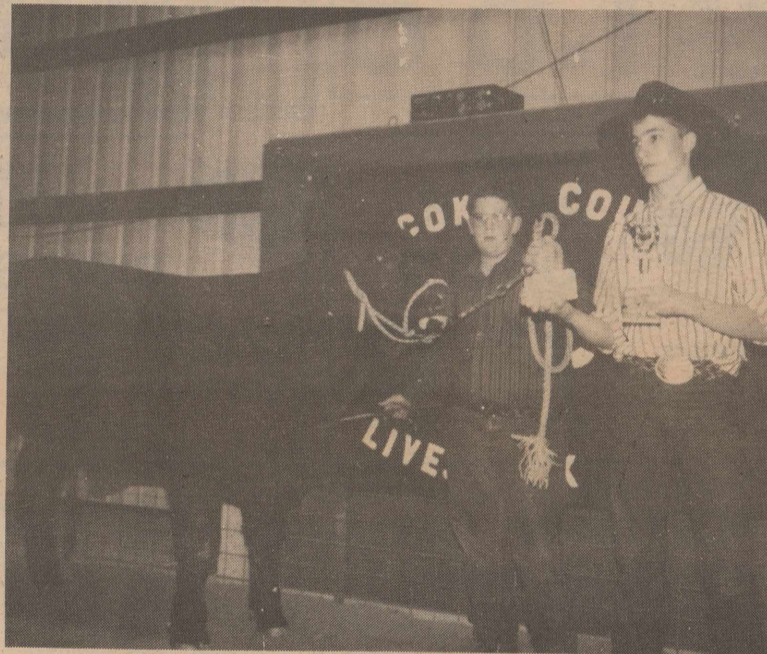

Your Gallbladder: An Efficient Organ Until Gallstones Cause Trouble

Tucked deep within the abdomen just under the liver is a small, sac-like organ, the size of a small pear, called the gallbladder. It is an organ most of us don't pay much attention to unless gallstones form.

Symptoms of gallstones range from slight indigestion to nausea, vomiting, and severe abdominal pain. More than 25 million Americans have gallstones. In addition, over one million more are diagnosed each year, a figure that is expected to increase as the population ages.

The function of the gallbladder is to concentrate and store bile, which is produced in the liver and used to digest fats. One of the smaller organs in the human body, the gallbladder is an efficient workhorse, regulating the delivery of bile into the small intestine as needed to digest foods.

People can function with gallstones for many years; it is only when the stones enlarge or migrate and block one of the ducts connecting the gallbladder to surrounding organs that incapacitating pain may develop. In these cases, the traditional treatment has been surgery to remove the gallbladder.

That operation is called a cholecystectomy and it requires removal of the entire gallbladder. Over 500,000 cholecystectomies are performed each year, making this procedure the second most frequently performed operation in the U.S.

However, for some patients, surgery may not relieve the symptoms of gas, pain, bloating or nausea.

Increasingly, Americans are be-



coming more aware of treatment options that may enable them to avoid surgery. Many people can now be treated with an oral medication called Actigall™ (ursodiol) and, in this way, often avoid the emergency stage of gallstone disease that requires removal of the gallbladder.

Actigall dissolves small-to-medium sized cholesterol-based gallstones, the most common type of gallstone, and generally requires six to 24 months of treatment.

The drug is well tolerated, with only rare cases of mild, transient diarrhea reported.

It is extremely important that anyone who may be experiencing persistent abdominal pain see a physician. Early detection of gallstones helps patients keep their gallbladder and avoid an unpleasant and potentially life-threatening operation as well as a lengthy recuperation.

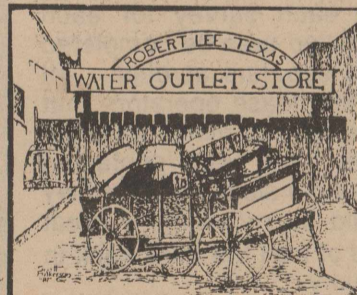

Hunting lease survey set

Another Texas hunting season is nearly over. Hunting lease operators are preparing to close their books on this year's hunts and make plans for next year. Lease hunting occurs throughout Texas, but lease operations vary considerably. Many lease operators would like to know how others are providing services and facilities, managing game animals, protecting their operation, pricing their leases, and the range of lease charges. How can they obtain this information? Beginning January 22, 1990, all 12,500 hunting lease operators in Texas will receive a one-page survey that asks for answers to these questions. The survey is easy to complete, but most important to hunting lease operators, will be the results. Finally, they will be able to compare their lease operation with others in the county and state.

This study is a cooperative research effort between the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service. County agents are helping to get an excellent response rate by supporting this study and answering questions their lease operators may have about it. The value of the information to hunting lease operators will be directly related to the number of surveys returned. The Extension Service will provide county/state data results to each county Extension agent for your area of interest. They will receive the results that compare their personal operation with others in the county and state. This information should help operators and land owners improve their hunting lease programs.

Hunting lease operators having multiple permits will be sent a survey for each permitted area. Each area under permit is described on the survey by acres and/or name--exactly the way it was described on the permit application. Some operators or landowners may receive from two to twenty-two surveys in one day. It is important that each survey for each permitted area be completed as a separate acreage. All hunting lease operators that have four or more permitted areas have been contacted about the study and that they would be receiving a great deal of mail the third week in January.

The Texas hunting lease system has been in operation since 1929. There has never been a statewide study of how lease hunting contributes to wise management of the wildlife resource. Other states are beginning to consider lease hunting as an alternative to traditional agricultural land uses. The results of this study may demonstrate that lease hunting on private land is a practical and sensible alternative.
