Home energy assistance noted

Some low-income Texans may receive help in paying heating bills this winter through a Department of Human Services program.

The Home Energy Assistance Program will make onetime payments to low income families, according to an announcement from the DHS.

Aid is available for one-person households with monthly income... at \$589,49. at less two-person home, \$973.49 for three, \$1,165.49 for four, \$1,357.49 for five and \$1,549.49 for six.

Energy assistance checks will be sent directly to those whose applications are approved. However, the checks will be made payable to the energy provider.

Those receiving checks should present them to the appropriate utility company or other provider with their regular energy bills.

If the assistance check is more than the energy bill amount, the additional money will be credited to the person's account for future bills. If the bill is higher than the check amount, the individual is responsible for paying the difference.

Applications have been mailed to families receiving Social Security payments, food stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

Other low-income individuals may request applications by calling 1-800-252-8060 between January 22 and February 28.

recently by the Colorado River Municipal Water District standardized regulations at its three major reservoirs - Lakes O. H. Ivie, J. B. Thomas and E. V. Spence.

Uniform rules and regulations were adopted by CRMWD directors, who earlier had decided to raise and broaden permit schedules and make them applicable to all users, except under and over-age individuals.

There are a few minor changes in rules such as specifying that pets must be kept under control, and offroad vehicles banned. Oth-

New ordinances adopted erwise, most rules and regulations pertaining to sanitation, safety and structures are the same.

The permit schedule after January 1, 1990 will be \$2 per day for adults ages 17 to 64 for individuals; annual adult \$20 for individuals; \$50 annual to cover the holder and quests for aquatic activi-

One major change is that permit fees will apply to all persons - picnickers as well as boaters, fishermen and skiers. Permits will be required for aquatic activities, whether they originate from private or public lands.


Surely, your readers' grandmother, grandfather, aunt, uncle, mother, father, brother or sister took great joy

After getting off to a slow start, winter pastures have improved in recent weeks due to favorable weather conditions, including badly needed rains in some locations.

Winter pastures are high quality forage and represent considerable investment, and Tommy Antilley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.... Thereand livestock producers make the most of their winter pas-

First, use forage sparingly. This means limiting grazing until forage is growing faster than animals are consuming it. For stocker calves, grazing twice a day at 45-minute to one-hour intervals usually is adequate to supply their needs, said Antilley. For cows with calves, once-a-day grazing from one to two hours is satisfactory. Also, a "creepgate" can be effective for controlling grazing by cows while premitting full use by young calves. Dairy cattle usually can attain their needs by grazing twice-a-day for 1 to 1-1/2 hours.

Cattle train easily to come out of the winter pasture to an adjoining area of dry grass and soil. Protected areas of brush or trees are beneficial for shelter from wind and rain, said Antillev.


Provide high quality hay and small amounts of grain to help train cattle to come out of the winter pasture, said Antilley. Many growers realize that keeping cattle from lying on winter pasture or from excess trampling results in more efficient use of forage.

By using forage sparingly, good quality hay can be harvested from excess growth in late spring.

Second, be sure adequate amounts of fertilizer are applied for additional growth, said Antilley. Winter pastures panuse. untertilizer andiedat analyses are helpful for determining if forage is obtaining adequate amounts of plant nutrients and for deciding on additional fertilizers needed. Apply topdress fertilizer while soil is firm enough to support application equipment.

Third, keep records of what pastures have produced, said Antilley. A portion of the cattle (20-25%) could be weighed and tagged early during the grazing period and weighed again at the end of the season for an estimate of gains produced by the entire

Winter pastures are more expensive than summer pastures but can return great dividends year in and year out, said Antilley.
