Local entities announce upcoming elections

WCCCHD

An election has been called for May 5, 1990 by the West Coke County Hospital District. Purpose of the election is to fill three board positions. Terms of Linda Arledge, Barbara Chesney, and Bill Helwig will expire. Chesney and Helwig have indicated they will not seek re-election. Kenneth Green and Joy Bagwell will remain on the panel; their terms do not expire at this

Filing deadline for the board positions is March 21 at 5 pm. In order to be a candidate on the ballot, one must be 21 years old, a taxpayer residing in the hospital district, a registered voter, and must present a petition with 25 signatures of eligible voters to the office of the district administrator, according to the election

Administrator Larry Melton A. L. (Speedy) Brasuell.

advised the newspaper of the filing of one candidate, Golda Brown. He said other petitions have been picked up and are still out. Petitions are available at the hospital district

Melton said that although an amendment has been passed to increase the board member terms to 4 years, the 3 positions to be voted on May 5 will be for two year terms.

City of Robert Lee

At the regular meeting February 12, the City Council of the City of Robert Lee ordered an election for May 5, 1990, for the election of a Mayor and two Councilmem-

Junell discusses finances

State Representative Robert Junell, accompanied by his wife, Beverly, spoke at a town meeting in Robert Lee Thursday evening, February

Junell, voted the outstanding freshman legislator, was introduced by Coke County Democratic Chairman Patti Ivey. He made a presentation of one of the flags which flew over the state capitol during the last session of the legislature to Robert Lee Superintendent Jerry Gibbs, for the school.

Reform of the finance of the state's education system will be the goal of the special session for the legislature when it convenes February 27. The state has given the lawmakers until May 1 to come up with proposals for equitable funding for all school districts in Texas.

Junell encouraged discussion, input, and opinions of his 66th District constitutents on the education funding. Property taxes are the principle revenue for education in school districts. Many areas have had their tax burden increased to the limit due to the oil industry bottoming out or undue stress from indebtedness or state mandates. For

example, at this time Water Valley's tax base is \$1.55 per \$100 evaluation and in contrast Robert Lee school district's 'ax base is \$.73.

According to Junell, legislators hope to find some equity between a poor school district's \$1,900 per student and \$3,600 spent per student in affluent areas. He predicts that no new taxes will be approved in this election year. Consolidation of a great number of schools is a possibility, but is an unpopular proposal. Junell said he is personally

Santa Fe Depot restoration plans made

Committee members of the Bronte Masonic Lodge #962 A. F. A. M. and the Bronte Chapter #1048 Order of the Eastern Star met Saturday morning January 13 to formulate plans for restoration of the old Santa Fe Depot which is to be the home of the Masonic Lodge and has been designated by the Historical Commission of the State of Texas as a historical landmark.

Upon the completion of the restoration of the building, a representative from the Grand Lodge of Texas A. F. A. M. and the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron from the Grand Chapter of Texas, Order of the Eastern Star, as well as other dignitaries will be present for the dedication of the landmark.

The Santa Fe Railroad deeded the rights to the building and acreage to the Masonic Lodge for the purpose of a Historical Site and home of the Masonic Lodge.

Members of the local committee on restoration elected Master Mason Jim Lammers, grandson of James C. Lammers Master Mason, stone mason and builder of the depot as chairman of the restoration and remodeling committee. James C. Lammers was Past Master of Bronte Lodge in 1912. In turn, Noah Pruitt, Jr. took record of the meeting. Pruitt, Past Master, in 1962 was appointed Chairman of the Restoration Pledge Committee. He will be accepting pledges from anyone interested in Memorials and Honoraium to living or deceased individuals who have

contributed to either of these organizations or buildings.

Beginning the first week in February, Lammers will have the plans laid out for the restoration and work resume

opposed to the lottery as a solution. He said it is almost an assurance there will not be a state income tax in the near future. One saving could be enacted by using school facilities 12 months a year.

He believes that financial incentives will be offered to districts that are willing to execute economic savings. At this time, Texas ranks 46th in education, not a statistic to be proud of.

At a time Texas is building 61,000 prison cells and drawing up plans to imprison individuals who are now 4th graders, something is wrong with priority here, said the representative.

"I would rather see education funding come from cigarette tax, sales tax, corporate profit taxes, not property

tax", he advised the group who attended.

Junell said, "We are very fortunate to have Sen. Bill Sims and Congressman Charlie Stenholm in our corner". They, along with others, are petitioning the EPA for exceptions for landfills in smaller communities.

He believes in the special session beginning February 27, some change in funding will be made for a one year, short term solution and legislators would come back later to look at the long haul.

Attending the town meeting were a number of teachers. administrators, Robert Lee Mayor Wilson Bryan, Bronte Mayor J. T. Henry, county commissioners, city councilmen, and a good group of interested individuals from both school districts in the county.

Jessie Martin Casey, 90, of Midland and formerly of Robert Lee, died Saturday, February 10, in Midland Memorial Hospital.







WTU taxes told

West Texas Utilities Company's share of support to the taxing entities within the company's 52-county service area amounts to \$8,869.225 million for 1989, making the electric utility one of West Texas' largest ad valorem taxpayers, according to Mark Morrow, WTU's property tax representative.

Approximately 56 percent of that total went to school districts with the balance distributed among other taxing entities such as city and county governments and water, fire, hospital, drainage and road districts.

Bob Boone, WTU local manager in Robert Lee and Paul Sublett, Bronte manager said WTU paid \$127,308 in ad valorem taxes in Coke County. Major recipients include two school districts dividing \$53,981, and county government which received \$42,058. The cities and towns in the county received \$3,186 from taxes with the other taxing entities receiving the balance.

In addition to ad valorem taxes, WTU supports local governments by payment of gross receipts tax and sales tax where applicable.



It is generally accepted that diabetes is inherited. Because diabetes is an inborn error of metabolism, it exists from the time of conception, although the recognized biochemical and physical signs make their appearance at varying times in the life cycle. It is characteristic of a patient with diabetes to know of other members of his family who have the disease or who had it during their lives. It has also been observed that the disease occurs at a progressively earlier age with each passing generation of affected individuals. For these reasons, relatives of known diabetics are advised to be tested by their physicians each year. The only person able to diag-

nose a diabetic is a physician! The onset of symptoms in a diabetic is usually slow. Some studies estimate that diabetes in an adult may go undiagnosed for as long as 10 years. However, diabetes is one of the easiest of the chronic diseases to detect and confirm. Some characteristics of the disease are frequent urination, excessive thirst, obesity and the decreased resistance

to infection. Remember diabetes mellitus often called diabetes can effect the young and old, men and women and children and adults. If you have any concern about diabetes contact your physician.

Agricultural producers within Senate District 25 have the chance to get rid of certain unwanted pesticides during the upcoming Texas Pesticide Amnesty Program.

Senator Bill Sims gained passage of a resolution during the recent Legislative Session authorizing the one-day pilot program. The project will be under the direction of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

In a letter to all producers of agricultural products, Sims said the programs' intent is to encourage pesticide applicators within the 25th district who are storing of pesticides, that are no longer legally labeled for agricultural use, to bring them to a central collection center for proper disposal.

According to Sims, over the past few years, the number of pesticide applicators in Texas reporting to have old, obso-

In most cases it is very frustrating and next to impossible for these people to dispose of such chemicals in a proper and legal manner. 'Storing and disposing of these chemicals on the farm or ranch can result in severe consequences such as personal injury or contamination of a drinking water source," said Sims. "In addition, please be aware that municipal landfills can not legally accept these potentially toxic wastes."

The program is strictly voluntary and is eligible only to persons who apply pesticides for the production of agricultural products on land that they own or control within the following counties: El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Reeves, Jeff Davis, Presidio, Brewster, Pecos, Ward, Loving, Winkler, Crane, Upton, Midland, Glasscock, Reagan, Crockett, Terrell, Val Verde, Edwards, Sutton, Schleicher, Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Menard, Kimble, Ma-son, Gillespie, Kerr, Real, Bandera, Medina, Kendall, Comal and Blanco.

Persons or businesses who purchase pesticides for resale and commercial pesticide applicators are specifically excluded

No fees will be charged to participants in the program. Those wishing to sign up must contact their local County Extension Agent prior to February 16, Dates, exact locations, times and procedures are yet to be announced.

Moving Wall memorial to be displayed

The Concho Valley Vietnam Veterans Association, Chapter #457, is sponsoring the Vietnam Memorial Moving Wall which will be on display in San Angelo at Goodfellow AFB from March 26 - April 2, 1990.

The Moving Wall is an extension of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D. C. and contains the names of 58,175 war dead and MIAs.

The concept of building the Moving Wall grew out of discussions by John Devitt, Gerry Haver and Norris Shears, Vietnam veterans from California, concerned with what they might possibly do to somehow "keep alive" and share the power and good that Devitt had experienced while attending the dedication of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D. C.

The Moving Wall stands 6 feet in height at the center and gradually tapers to 3 feet panels at each end. Each of the two sections are 126.2 feet in length, for a total length of 252.4 feet, which is slightly less than the length of a football field. Both structures are now constructed of aluminum panels mounted to aluminum framing and supported by structural steel bracing. The minimum area required for display is 220 feet by 64 feet. However, the angle of 120 degrees requires a

minimum area of 220 feet in length.

Name rubbing can be done on the new structure with amazing results. All items left at the memorial are collected on the last day, marked, boxed, and shipped to Vietnam Combat Veterans, LTD. office for storage in their warehouse.
