## Spring turkey season set

Turkey hunters are preparing to enjoy the longest spring gobbler hunting season ever in Texas, April 7 May 6.

Don Wilson, turkey program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said prospects are fair for the 30 day season. "Dry weather caused poor turkey hatches during the past two years, so statewide we don't have as many birds as in past years," said Wilson. "There should be plenty of birds for a decent hunting season, however."

In Texas, hunters are allowed to harvest two gobblers in the fall and one in the spring, or vice versa. Last fall's harvest reflected the lower number of birds, as hunters took an estimated 30,000 birds, compared to the long-term average of 39,000 and the 63,000 har-

The longer season was authorized by the Parks and Wildlife Commission in order to give hunters a better op portunity to hunt during the periods of peak gobbling activity which can vary from spring to spring, Wilson said.

While turkey populations are down, Wilson said recent rains over much of the traditional Rio Grande turkey range make an excellent hatch possibility this spring. "There have been wide-spread rains in the Rolling Plains, the Ed wards Plateau and South Texas, so turkey production is likely to improve significantly this year," said Wilson.

In Coke County, spring turkey hunters may take 2 gobblers (but only 3 turkeys a year). Check your license to make sure you have gobbler tags left before you fire.

The 1990 All-West Texas Basketball Team selections were announced over the past weekend. Rocky Rawls was named boys Coach of the Year, while Justin Phillips and Teresa Vaughn were named to the All-West Texas Bas ketball Team.
The teams were chosen by the San Angelo StandardTimes sports staff. This is the first time an All-West Texas Basketball team has been chosen by the Standard Times.

Rawls is in his seventh year as coach of the Bronte Longhorns. He-led his Longhorns to the district title for the sixth straight year. The Longhorns advanced to the finals of the Regional II A Tournament this year. They were defeated by Santo, who went on to become the state champion. Rawls led his team to a 32-2 record

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Cumbie said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the can-

Ms. Blassingame, who is the University Interscholastic League academic sponsor, in turn introduced two senior students who will compete on Saturday in the District UIL meet. Mrs. Lackey presented an interesting program concerning the tremendous growth and patient load at the Rehab Center, some of the treatment programs they offer, and services to businesses. The Rehab Center sees 300 patients a day as outpatients, with 35 new patients each day. The facility can now offer wheel chair and equipment repair. One fairly recent program is the advise and assistance to businesses to prevent injuries at work. The purchase of a high-tech $\$ 60,000$ machine to evaluate persons in preemployment health screening enables the Center to advise employers of injury-prone areas, such as the back. Improved programs to benefit the senior citizen population also have been instituted, particularly for arthritis and strokes.
The minutes of last month's meeting were read and the president discussed the proposed changes in the by-laws of WCCCD. Due to the small attendance, the chages were tabled until a later date.

## Conservation plans made

Over 60,000 conservation plans have been developed on about 13 million acres of the state's approximately 17 million acres of high erodible cropland, the U. S. Depart ment of Agriculture's Soi Conservation Service report ed this week.
"We in SCS made a com mitment to see that every farmer who wanted a conservation compliance plan got one by the deadline of December 31, 1989," said Texas State Conservationist Harry W. Oneth. "Farmers and ranchers themselves have made a strong commitment to soil and water conservation with these plans. In fact, they have already fully implemented plans on approximately 33 \% of the highly erodible cropland."

High erodible cropland without plans include situations where the land is no longer being used for cropping or where the person has decided not to develop a plan at this time.
"Texas can be proud of the enormous conservation effort underway as a result of the conservation provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985," Oneth said.

Oneth encouraged farmers to examine their plans carefully and to be sure they understand what they've agreed to do this year. Each plan contains individual conservation practices and schedules for their installation agreed to by the producer and the local conservation district. "If farmers have questions, now's the time to call or come in and talk about it at their local SCS offices," Oneth said.
Farmers are encouraged to check with SCS when new farms or units are purchased
