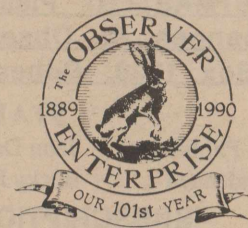

City reviews trash collection rules

For your continued service and sanitation for the City of Robert Lee, we would encourage you to review the trash collection rules.

1. Capacity of container should not be less than 10 gallons or more than 32 gallons and should be constructed of substantial material with a tight-fitting lid.

2. Disposable bags may be used in lieu of garbage cans but said bags shall be constructed of substantial plastic

and/or polyethylene or equivalent material, having the same characteristics. Said bags shall be leak-proof, waterproof, and sanitary and shall be of sufficient strength so as not to break or tear during normal use by the Sanitation department in the collection and disposition of the same. Whenever disposable bags are used in lieu of containers, they shall be sealed before being placed in collection locations. It shall be unlawful for any person to use a disposable bag when the

same is torn or unsealed. 3. In the event trash and/or garbage is of the nature that it cannot be placed in the receptacle, including but not limited to, tree limbs and/or hedge cuttings, such materials shall be tied in bundles of less than 50 pounds and less than 4 feet in length to facilitate removal and collection by the City of Robert Lee.

FmHA county committee election slated

Farmers in Coke County will have an opportunity to choose one person from among 1 candidate running for the Farmers Home Administration county committee in the June 29, 1990 election, FmHA County Supervisor, Dennis Cumbie said this week.

Any person who has an interest in a farm in the county

as owner, tenant, or sharecropper is considered a farmer and is eligible to vote, Cumbie said. Spouses of eligible farmers also are considered farmers for voting eligibility.

Ballots for the election are published in the weekly edition of The Observer/Enterprise and also are available at the FmHA county office at 103 S. Irving, Rm

510, San Angelo, Texas. If they cannot be returned to the county office in person, ballots may be mailed in, Cumbie said.

Among other duties, county committees help determine whether an applicant is eligible for a FmHA farm loan. Two of the three members are elected by county farmers, and the third is appointed by FmHA.

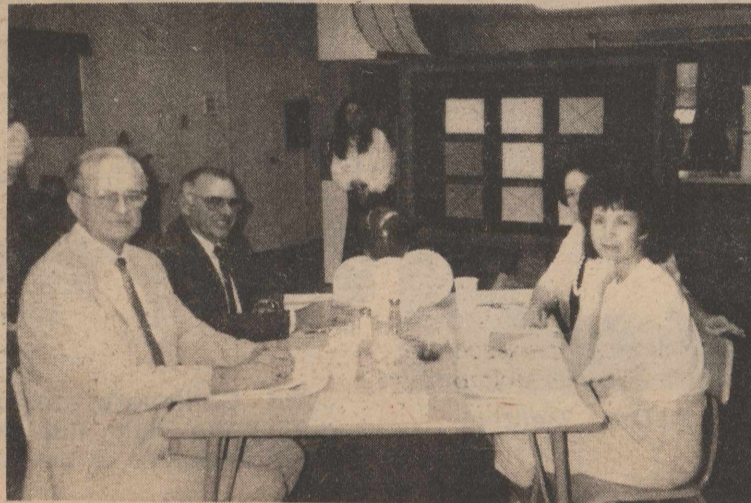

Blair, Sonnenberg attend state contest

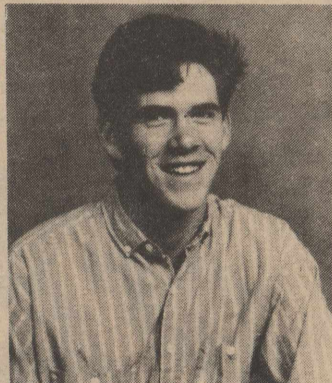

"This was the most fitting way to end a very successful year in music by adding these awards to our Sweepstakes we received earlier this year," said Homer Stewart, Bronte band director.



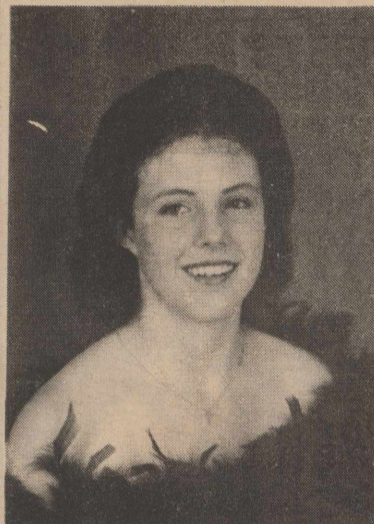

Prine visitors

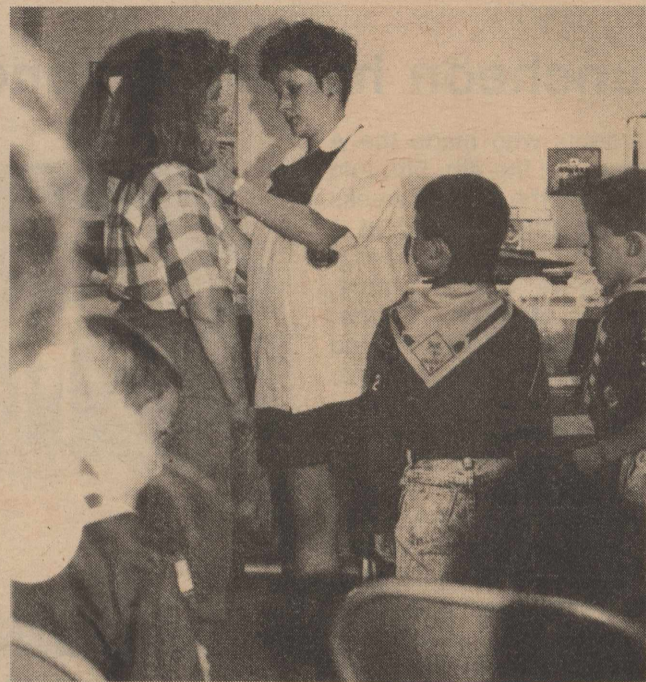

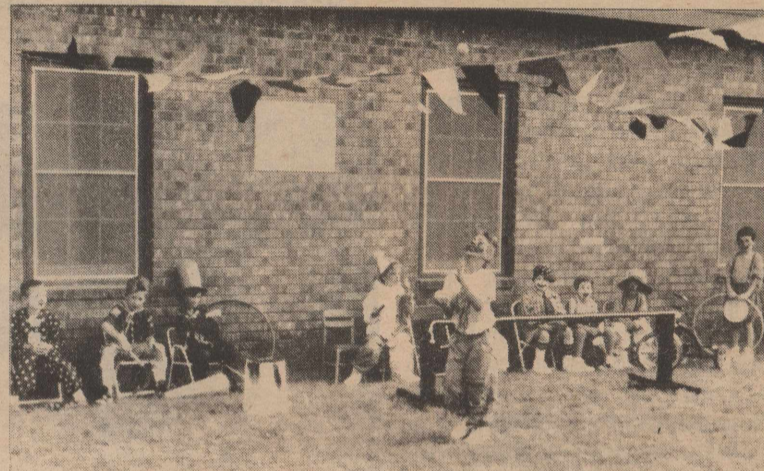

Trimble leads graduating class at Crane

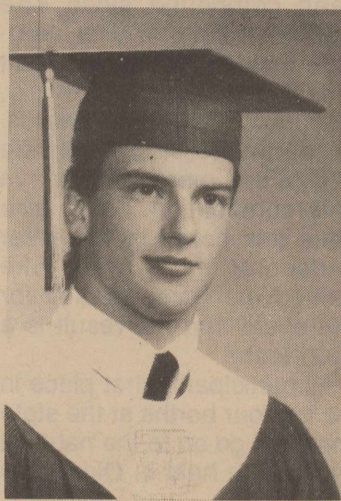

Reed named to TIP award

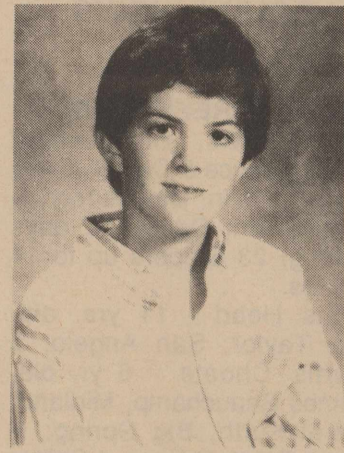

Social Security

People who are developmentally disabled may qualify for monthly benefits under either the Social Security or the Supplemental Security Income (SSI), sometimes both. The medical requirements for eligibility so far as disability is concerned are the same for both programs. However, other eligibility rules differ.

A mentally retarded person can get Social Security payments when a parent starts getting Social Security retirement or disability payments, or when an insured parent dies. It doesn't matter how old the child is, but he or she must have become disabled before age 22. A retarded person who has worked long enough under Social Security can also get benefits on his or her own work record.

SSI payments are paid to disabled people of any age, as well as the blind, and people 65 and over. However, SSI payments are based on financial need, and are made to people who have limited income and resources.

The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

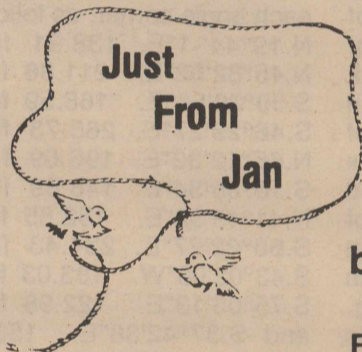

For do-it-yourselfers, the hours spent refinishing can produce beautiful furniture -- and headaches, dizziness, or nausea.

Liquid paint and varnish removers are the culprits. Paint strippers are among the most toxic products used in home workshops. They contain solvents which can damage your skin, eyes, respiratory tract, nervous system and internal organs. Although do-it-yourselfers typically heed label warnings to use strippers in a well-ventilated area, they often do not realize how much ventilation is required.

If at all possible, it is best to work on projects outside. When you must work inside, you will need 10-15 exchanges of indoor air with outdoor air every hour. The rate of air exchange can be obtained with a window exhaust fan, but not an air conditioner. Air conditioners do not provide adequate ventilation for paint remover fumes because they recirculate air rather than exhausting it.

When refinishing you need to wear light-weight plastic splash goggles to prevent eye damage, and gloves to protect the skin.

All solvents will dissolve the skin's natural oil protective barrier, and after prolonged contact, skin will turn dry and develop cracks. Some paint remover solvents will penetrate the skin and enter the blood stream. Plastic gloves made of blended neoprene and natural latex will withstand paint remover for a reasonable length of working time. If you are using steel wool, put cot-

ton gloves over the plastic ones to protect them from abrasion.

Once you have yourself protected, protect your property from fire hazards. The fire-causing potential of paint removers must be stated on the label, and will typically be stated as "extremely flammable," "flammable," or "combustible".

Before starting a paint stripping project, turn off all pilot lights and remove sources of heat, ultraviolet light or flame in areas where fumes may circulate. If you're working in a garage with a hot water heater, for example, be sure the pilot light is off.

As a final precaution, it is suggested that family members in poor health, children and pets not be allowed in areas where paint removers are being used or where fumes from them are present in the air.
