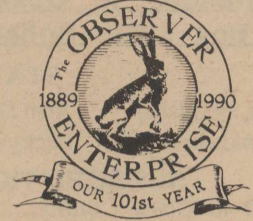

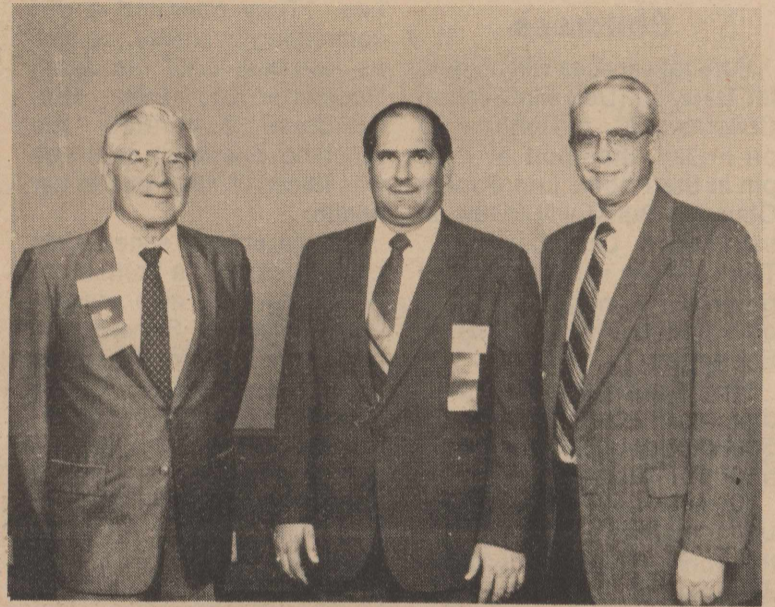
Helwig received a special plaque from the Texas 4-H Foundation, the service organization of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service 4-H Youth Development program.

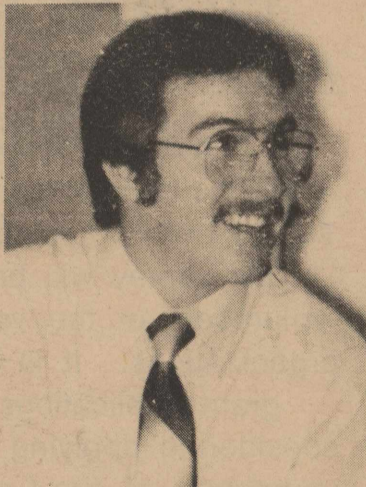
## Kemp completes course

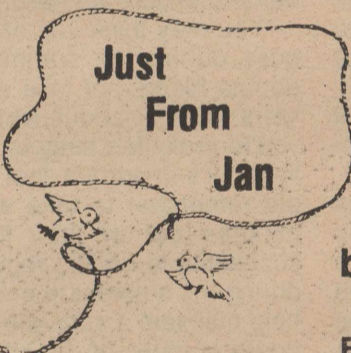
Mrs. Childress died Tuesday night at 10:20 pm in Shannon Medical Center after a lengthy illness.

Born into an early ranching family December 25, 1916 at the family ranch, she was the daughter of Jim and Lizzie McCutchen who ranched all their lives in the Indian Creek community east of Robert Lee. She attended Robert Lee Schools and was married to Thomas Burl (Bigun) Childress of Paint Creek October 14, 1940 in Courtside, Arizona. He worked as a heavy equipment operator in California, New Mexico, and Wyoming until 1945 when the couple returned to Robert

Lee. They operated a dirt contracting business, as well as ranched, until his death December 28, 1969. Mrs. Childress continued the ranching operation until she was forced to retire due to her health.

Her parents; a sister, Oda Lee Keyes; and a brother, C. W. McCutchen, also preceded her in death. Survivors include one sister, Charlene Blair and her husband, Curtis, of Robert Lee; one brother, Raymond (Dee) McCutchen and his wife, Kathleen, also of Robert Lee; one brother-in-law, Ben L. Keyes of Christoval; one sister-in-law, Sybil McCutchen of San Angelo; and one brother-in-law and sister-in-law, Earl and Dovie Childress of Coleman; and a number of nephews and nieces, great-nephews and nieces, and great-great nephews and nieces.

Robert Lee City Council met Monday, June 11, at city hall. July 7, 1990 was set for Public Hearing on dilapidated buildings. An ordinance was presented to change the ordinance regarding Municipal Judge. The Mayor may serve as Judge due to lack of case load. This will eliminate the cost of a Judge's salary.

Bill Helwig's contract regarding the Court will be changed also, to eliminate some cost.

The council voted to pay 25 cents a mile for mileage expense on personal vehicles and expenses were approved for Mayor Jackie Walker to attend a TML meeting in Lub-

bock June 28 thru July 1.

Jeff Eubanks reported on State Fire Marshal's report on the new requirements and standards that must be met. If the grant was approved, it would cover 90% of cost involved and the City would only expend 10%. It would be well worth the community involvement to canvass the city and apply for a grant.

**Cumbie reunion held in Bronte**

The descendants of Rev. R. M. and Molly Cumbie held a reunion at the Bronte Community Center on June 9, 1990 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the arrival of Rev. Cumbie and his family in Coke County.

Rev. Cumbie had been called to be the first pastor of the First Baptist Church in Bronte. He moved his family here from Carlton, in Earth County, taking two weeks to make the trip by wagon. They finally made their arrival in April 1890. The first night in Coke County was spent at Pecan Mott on the Kickapoo Creek, the sight of the present Bronte City Park. Some two weeks later he bought a farm just north of Bronte where he and the family farmed for a number of years.

He and his son R. E. Cumbie entered the general mercantile business in 1906, a business that is still in the family. He also was an organizer and first president of First National Bank in Bronte and was organizer and stockholder in the first school built in Bronte. Other businesses that were operated by his family were located in Blackwell, Robert Lee and Maverick.

Airman Kelly T. Green has graduated from Air Force basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas.

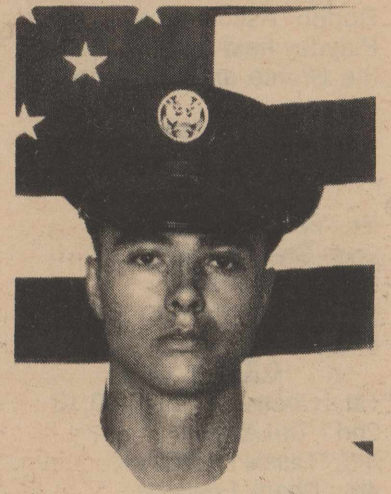
During the six weeks of training the airman studied the Air Force mission, organization, and customs and received special training in human relations.

The state's unusually wet spring is causing rapid increases in flea populations, which were already larger than usual because so many survived the winter.

Fleas tend to be more of an itching nuisance than a threat to human health, primarily because the worst diseases they carried have been eradicated.

The chief sources of flea infestation in the home are family pets, but once indoors fleas thrive in floor cracks, carpets, upholstered furniture and pet bedding. Fleas, of course, are also abundant outside; larvae burrow into the top surface of the soil.

If flea problems are occurring

in the house, the yard, and on the pets, all three must be treated at the same time.

Use only approved products for treating animals. Dusts are preferred because they are generally effective longer. The newer products containing an insect growth regulator can reduce subsequent egg and larval production and can be applied directly to the animal.

Outdoors, treat areas that pets frequent. Use only approved products to thoroughly cover and saturate soil and grass areas. Make sure that application equipment is carefully calibrated to measure dosages exactly.

In the house, thoroughly

vacuum or sweep carpets, rugs, furniture, cracks and crevices. Be sure to reach under furniture and along baseboards. Discard the vacuum bag afterwards.

Use a coarse spray (large droplets) in treating likely infested areas. It is always more effective to treat all carpets, furniture and baseboards at one time. After spraying, use total-release aerosol applications to reduce adult fleas.

Additional applications may be needed about three weeks later when populations build from eggs that hatched since the first spraying. Insect growth regulators used with other sprays will inhibit flea growth in early stages and extend control measures.

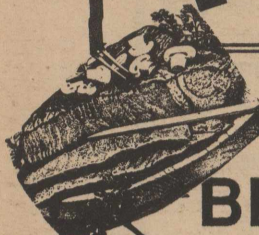

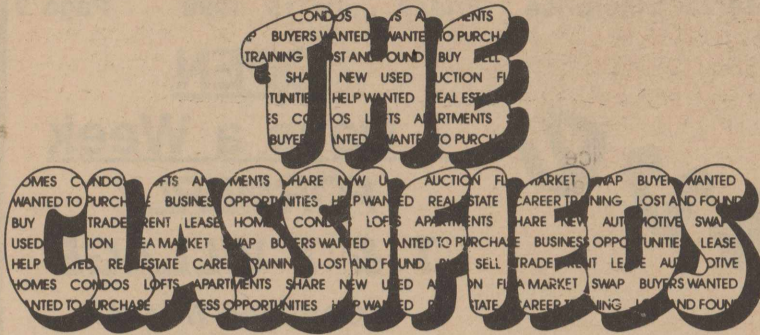
