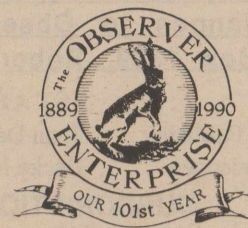

WCCCD announces Labor Day festivities

West Coke County Community Development plans continue for the organization's all-day Labor Day Extravaganza in Robert Lee Saturday, September 1. A number of activities in the county park and nearby are scheduled with added booths and acts for the stage entertainment still coming in.

The WCCCD hopes the event will further the goals set by the relatively new group, one which is to keep locals, and draw others, in the community. Granted, small communities face intense competition but steps need to be taken for opportunities to promote our own assets.

Activities are set to begin with booth openings at 10 am under the shade trees in the park. Over 30 booths are now reserved and more to follow. These will include arts, crafts, food, and products of organizations and individuals. Booth reservations are \$10, \$15 if electricity is needed; call 453-2068 or 453-2438 after 5 pm.

One of the fun events will be a Beach Volleyball tournament (a volleyball contest played in sand). Register now for participation at \$12 per team; contact 453-4650 after 5 pm.

A stage for crowd entertainment will be set up near the booths in the shade with some performances already scheduled - a 6 year old fiddler, Jr. Pageant, Kaylan

Gardner and Band, Gary Davis, a ventriloquist & friend, Leroy, and square dancers, to name a few, from 1-4 pm. Admission is free to the booth and entertainment area. Bring chairs or blankets for added comfort.

A Miss WCCCD, age 7-10, and Junior Miss WCCCD, age 3-6, will be chosen from contestants on Saturday after 4 pm on the entertainment stage. Entries must be from West Coke County and will receive a \$100 and \$50 savings bond respectively, and represent the development board at events later in the year. An ABC golf tournament will begin at the Mt. Creek course adjacent to the park at 1 pm. Entries are \$6, tee-off 1 pm; call 453-2317 to enter.

Bronte accident is fatal

Steven Derrell Hill, 21, of Bronte was killed in a one-vehicle traffic accident 2 miles east of Bronte at approximately 3 am Saturday morning.

According to Sheriff's Deputy Wayne McCutchen, who arrived at the scene about 5:30, the pickup driven by the victim veered off the county road and overturned twice. Hill was thrown from the vehicle which rolled over him. Lance S. Wilson, of Richardson, a passenger, was not ejected and escaped injury.

The victim was pronounced dead at the scene by Gary Shaffer, East Coke County Peace Justice, McCutchen said.

Funeral services for Hill were conducted in Bronte Sunday afternoon.

Roach seriously injured in mishap

Bill Tom Roach, longtime Robert Lee businessman, was critically injured Monday morning in a two-vehicle traffic accident in San Angelo. Mr. Roach, who sustained serious neck injuries in the collision, was air-lifted from Shannon Medical Center to Lubbock Methodist Hospital Monday evening. He was reported only slightly improved Wednesday. Surgery is a consideration by neurosurgeons.



White Grubs in Lawns
Now is the time to control white grubs in your lawn. They should be treated when more than four grubs per square foot are found be tak-

ing plugs 3-4 inches in diameter and 4 inches deep from several areas of the yard.

Treatment should be made with Dursban, Diazinon or Of-

tanol. Always remember to read and follow label direc-

Yellow Pecan Aphids
We are seeing yellow aphids in pecan trees now. These are what causes the honeydew from pecans to get all over your car. They are extremely hard to kill and if you can stand the honeydew for awhile, treatments are not recommended.

Fertilize Fruit Trees Now
Fertilizer now will help put your landscape fruit trees in good shape for winter.

Caution and common sense are the watchwords for this process, but many trees benefit from a boost before cold weather comes.

Make sure the tree is not actively growing as added fertilizer will promote more growth resulting in severe freeze damage.

Trees under three years old should not be fertilized now as they are the most likely to begin new growth.

On mature trees that are not actively growing, apply one cup of ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) around the dripline. The dripline is the edge of the tree's root area. For trees that look to be in poor health, two cups should be added.

Higher rates than those suggested could cause freeze damage, but the correct amount at the right time will make the trees look healthier and bloom better next spring.

other non-domestic animals. Some people have begun to adopt these species as pets, even taking them into school classrooms," he said.

"In our opinion at TDH, no animal should be allowed on school property unless it has a clean bill of health, and there is no way a veterinarian can certify that a wild animal does not carry rabies," Davis added.

Davis said that anyone who is bitten or attacked by an animal believed to be rabid should notify local health and animal control authorities. Specimens of the animal should be tested to determine whether the animal is rabid. Also, the victim's doctor may recommend treatment to prevent onset of rabies.

OEC announces discovery

Oryx Energy Company announced recently an oil and gas discovery in the Gulf of Mexico that flowed at a combined peak total rate of 11,356 barrels of oil per day (BOPD) and 9 million cubic feet of gas per day (MMcf/D).

The OCS-G 6888 #2 ST#1, located on Viosca Knoll Block 826 approximately 140 miles southeast of New Orleans and 100 miles south of Mobile (AL), is in 1,726 feet of water. The well flowed from three zones in Pliocene-to Miocene-Age sands. It confirmed earlier discoveries on the block and encountered additional pay zones. Oryx Energy, as operator, has a 50-percent interest in the block. Conoco Inc., a subsidiary of Du Pont, has the remaining 50-percent working interest. "This potentially significant discovery in the Flex trend is a direct result of our work with 3-D seismic and hydrocarbon indicator technologies," said James E. McCormick, president and Chief operating offi-

cer of Oryx Energy. "We plan further confirmation drilling on the block later this year."

This is the third well in an ongoing evaluation of Viosca Knoll Block 826. The initial well, OCS-G 6888 #1, located one mile northwest, tested 1,366 BOPD and 6.9 MMcf/D in August 1989. In January 1990, the second well, OSC-G 6888 #2, reached a successful objective but was not tested.

Dallas-based Oryx Energy Company is the largest independent oil and gas company in the world, with assets in excess of \$5 billion and proved reserves of more than one billion equivalent barrels. Oryx Energy conducts its domestic operations through Sun Energy Partners, L.P. and is its managing general partner and 98-percent owner. 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Mentally impaired qualify for SS

People who are developmentally disabled may qualify for monthly benefits under either the Social Security or the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) programs. The medical requirements for eligibility so far as disability is concerned are the same for both programs. Other eligibility requirements differ.

A mentally impaired person can get Social Security payments when a parent starts getting Social Security retirement or disability payments, or when an insured parent dies. It doesn't matter how old the person is, but he or she must have become disabled before age 22. A mentally disabled person who has worked long enough and recently enough under Social Security can also get benefits on his or her own Social Security work record.

SSI payments are paid to disabled people of any age, as well as to the blind and people 65 and over. SSI payments, however, are made to people whose income and resources are below certain levels.

In deciding if an unmarried child under 18 and living at home can get SSI payments, part of the parents' income and resources may be considered to be the child's. If the parents' countable resources exceed the SSI limit, the excess is included with the child's resources. After deducting allowances for the parents' work and living expenses and for other children living in the home, the remaining amount of the parents' income is included with the child's to decide if the child is within the income limit.

Although people living in public institutions are generally not eligible for SSI payments, an application may be submitted when it appears that a person will be able to leave an institution soon. And, sometimes it is the SSI payment that makes it possible for the person to leave the care facility.

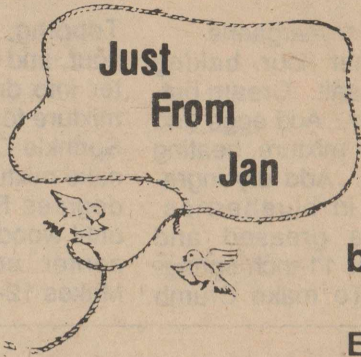

Many parents are anxious for their child to know the letters, numbers, shapes and colors before starting kindergarten in the fall. However, academic-type activities and drill may not be the best thing you can do to ready your child for school.

The results of child development research tell us that fantasy play activities are more effective in the development of language, social skills and thinking skills -- all of which are essential for success in school.

Fantasy play is what children commonly call "pretending." Through fantasy play children

learn more abstract thinking and problem-solving skills. They can also test their ideas in a safe situation.

Here are some suggestions for ways to encourage fantasy play in your children:

- Let children have a place for a pretend house, doctor's office, grocery store or museum. They will try out different roles as they play "house," or any variation of this common childhood game.
- Keep a box of old clothes, purses, shoes and other items for dress-up. That also encourages children to try different roles and create stories to go with their games.
- Encourage children to use

dramatic play to act out their favorite fairy tales and stories.

- Provide low-realism toys and objects that require children to use their imaginations. A big box, for example, can be a house, a rocket ship or a bear's cave, depending on the imagination of the child playing in it.

Avoiding heat exhaustion

Summer traditionally is a time for fun in the sun. The Texas Medical Association warns that hot, humid weather may pose severe health problems, ranging from the less serious heat fatigue or heat exhaustion to the potentially fatal heat stroke.

To avoid heat-related illness, drink plenty of water and juices, bathe or shower frequently with cool water, and use fans and air conditioners liberally. When outside, wear light-weight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing; cotton is best. Avoid vigorous activity during the hottest part of the day, noon to 4 pm., and wear a hat or use an umbrella when in the sun.

In hot weather or during strenuous exercise, the body cools itself through perspiration. Cooling occurs when perspiration evaporates from the skin. However, when challenged by long periods of intense heat, the body may lose its ability to cool. Hyperthermia is the result. Poor ventilation, improper clothing, and the lack of fluids can contribute to this.

Heat fatigue, the least serious of heat-related illnesses, causes weakness. Symptoms include cool, moist skin and a weakened-pulse. The person may feel faint or dizzy. Mild hyperthermia can cause heat cramps -- muscle spasms in the abdomen, arms, or legs after strenuous activity. With both heat stress and heat cramps, body temperature usually remains normal.

Heat exhaustion, caused by the body's loss of water and salt, is a more serious warning that the body is overheating. Symptoms include thirst, giddiness, weakness, profuse sweating, loss of coordination and appetite, and nausea. Body temperature often is elevated, but usually no higher than 101 degrees.

Heat fatigue, cramps, and

heat exhaustion may be treated in several ways. Victims should lie down in a cool place, preferably air-conditioned, and drink water or fruit and-vegetable juices. Alcohol and caffeine should be avoided. Victims also should shower, bathe, or sponge off with cool water. If left untreated, heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke.

Heat stroke can be life-threatening, and immediate medical attention is required. Heat stroke usually is preceded by headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion and even convulsions. The victim may be flushed, but may not be perspiring. The pulse generally is strong and rapid, and the body temperature may reach 104 degrees Fahrenheit and keep rising. The person may lose consciousness. In this situation, keep the victim cool, but do not attempt to render aid. Expert emergency attention is required for suspected heat stroke.

Prevent serious heat-related illnesses by making sure the proper precautions are taken. With sound judgement and an ounce of prevention, the summer can remain a time of fun and leisure for everyone.

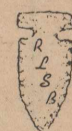

Since clothing prices for boys and girls have dropped, bargains may be easier to find, Beard said. However, style is costly and very important to young people who like to dress similar to their peers.

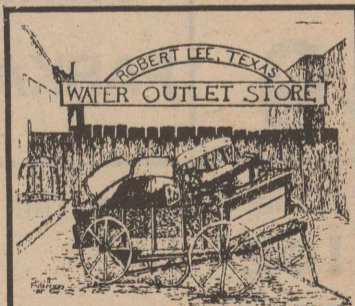
To get the most for your money when shopping for clothes, Beard suggests following these tips:

- Make a list of specific items needed before you go shopping. Also, include the quantity of items needed.
- Take your child shopping with you. Before you go, prepare him or her for what you are looking for, and shop only for the child since children get tired easily.
- Consider the child's growth patterns. Don't buy more than what is needed. Children grow rapidly and may outgrow what you buy before the school year is over.
- Consider purchasing two or three outfits that can be mixed and matched for a more useful wardrobe.
- Consider the special activities your child will be involved in. If special clothing will be needed for each activity, consider these as a share of the clothing budget. Decide if parts of these garments could be worn with regular school clothing as a wardrobe extender. Less expensive tops such as brightly-colored t-shirts can add variety to a wardrobe.
- Choose styles and fabrics that will grow with the child. Raglan sleeves, cuffs on pants, adjustable straps and waistbands, large hems in dresses and tops are features that can add to the wear-life of a garment.
- Also, consider the care factors. Knits, especially cotton or cotton/polyester, are easy to care for and stretch for comfort. Choose durable fabrics such as denim and corduroy to withstand children's abuse and repeated laundering.

"Take special care when buying shoes for children," Beard said. "Don't ask for the size you think your child needs, have both feet measured by a reputable shoe salesman."

Shoes should be sturdy and provide support, she said. Buy at least two pairs that can be interchanged for longer wear and comfort.

"Your child should never wear hand-me-down shoes," Beard said. "Hand-me-down shoes force the child's feet to conform to the footprint already in the shoe."

He shot a 102 and a 96 in the 11-12 year old division. Second place was Drew Bridges, 103-107, and third place was Jamie Gladden, 108-103.

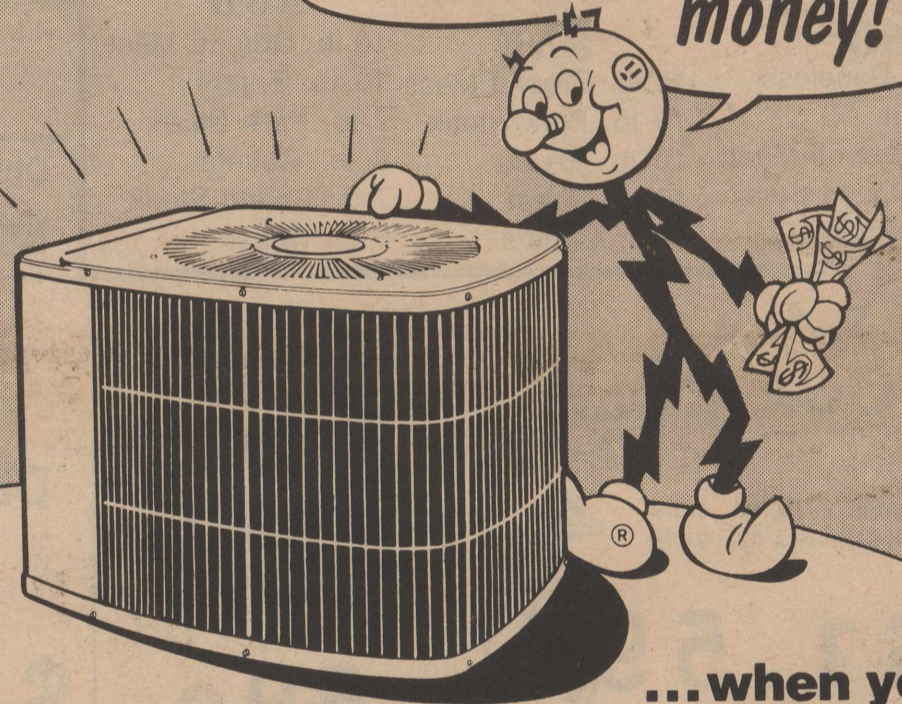

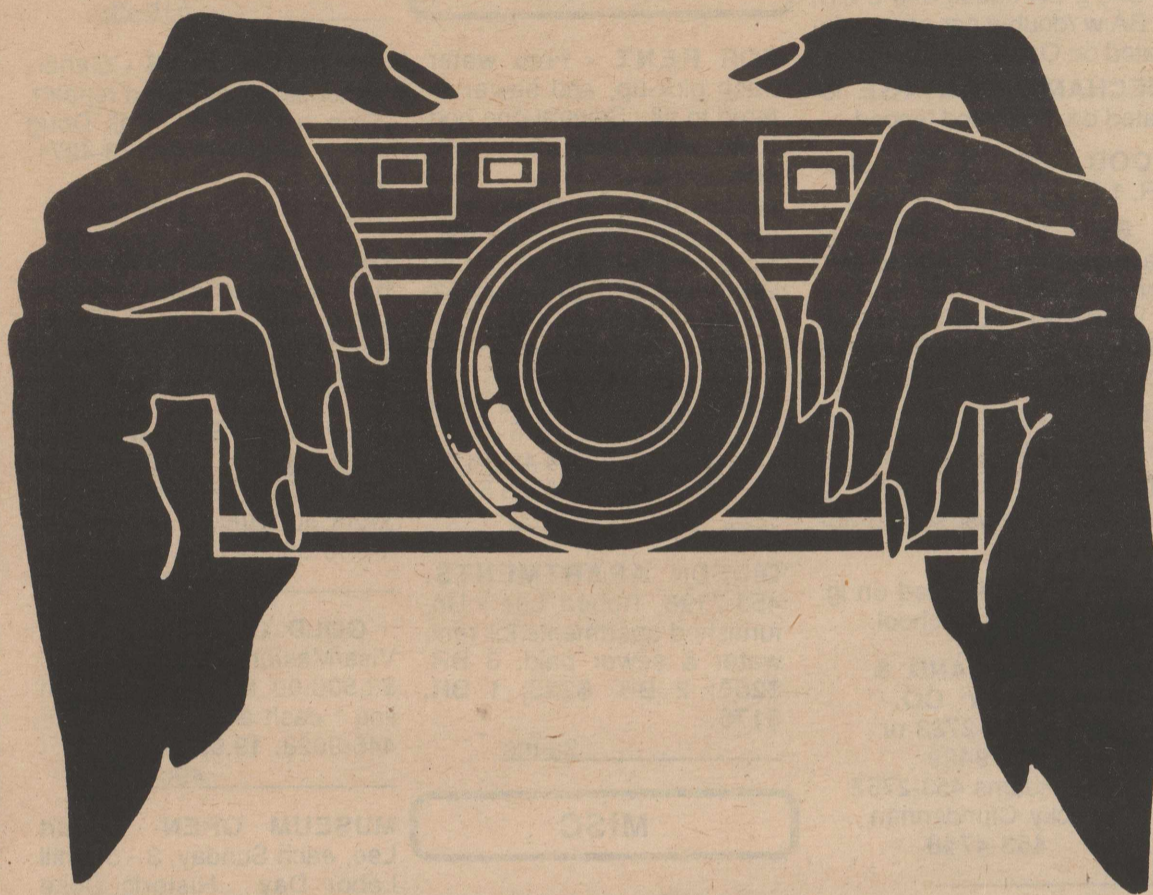

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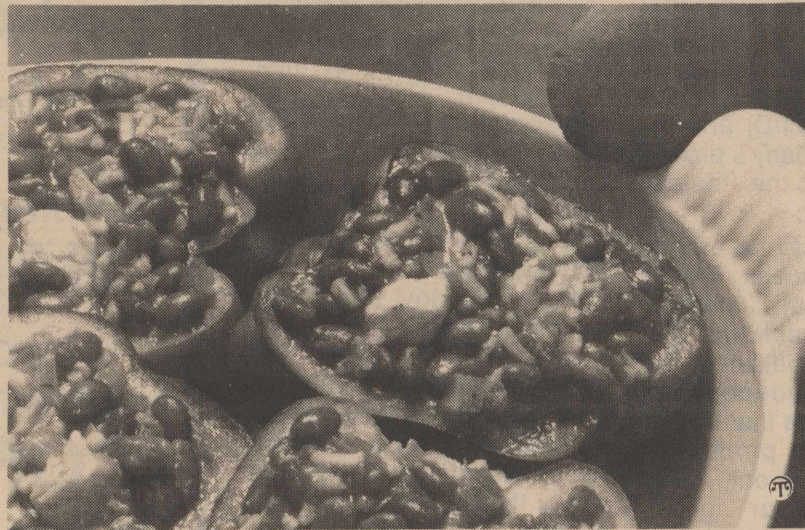

Austin chalk discoveries

Oryx Energy Company has announced two new Austin chalk discovery wells that tested at a combined daily rate of more than 1,800 barrels of oil (BOPD) and 1 million cubic feet of gas (MMcf/D) and extended the company's proven acreage base in the Pearsall Field to the west.

"We continue to be excited about our success in the Austin Chalk," says James E. McCormick, president and chief operating officer of the Dallas-based independent. "When you realize that in January 1989 our production from Pearsall was only about 160 BOPD, our gross production today of more than 15,000 BOPD and 9 MMcf/D is most impressive!"

The C. Jasik #1, located in Dimmit County about 2 1/2 miles north of Big Wells, tested 1,084 BOPD and 643 Mcf/d through a 34/64-inch choke at a flowing tubing pressure of 340 pounds per square inch (psi) from pay zones between 6,152 and 10,021 feet measured depth. The well has a horizontal displacement of 3,822 feet and reached a total measured depth of 10,021 feet. The latest discovery extends the potential for Austin Chalk production to the western edge of Oryx Energy's acreage in the Big Wells area. The Jasik #1 lies 2 1/2 miles southwest of the Heitz #1, Oryx Energy's most prolific horizontal well with a cumulative production of 275,000 barrels since its discovery last fall.

The second discovery, D. Cross et al. #1, flowed 728 BOPD and 359 Mcf/D on a 24-

hour production test through a 28/64-inch choke at a flowing tubing pressure of 220 psi from pay zones between 7,092 and 9,463 feet measured depth. This well has a horizontal displacement of 2,713 feet and reached a total measured depth of 9,463 feet. The Cross #1 is located in LaSalle County, 12 miles southwest of Dilley.

The company began acquiring acreage in the Pearsall Field in the late 1980s. The company now has a 100-percent interest in approximately 180,000 acres, plus an option on an additional 58,000 net acres through a recent joint venture. Cumulative production from all Oryx Energy's horizontal wells in the Austin Chalk exceeds 2,000,000 barrels. By the end of 1990, the company plans to have drilled 85 horizontal wells, about 60 developmental and some 25 exploratory.

Dallas-based Oryx Energy Company is the largest independent oil and gas company in the world, with assets in excess of \$5 billion and proved reserves of more than one billion equivalent barrels. Oryx Energy conducts its domestic operations through Sun Energy Partners, L.P., of which it is the managing general partner and 98-percent owner. Oryx Energy trades on the New York Stock Exchange with the symbol "ORX" and the partnership with the symbol "SLP".

Volunteers needed for drug tests

Volunteers are needed at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston for drug tests which may help with the devastating memory problems that accompany Alzheimer's disease.

"There is as yet no cure for Alzheimer's disease," said Dr. Rachelle Doody, an assistant professor of neurology at Baylor, "but we are hopeful that these drug trials now underway here and elsewhere around the country will provide us with new tools to alleviate some of the misery Alzheimer's patients and their families must endure."

The drugs are physostigmine and SQ20952, which is similar to the blood-pressure medicine Captopril.

If these drugs help in stemming memory loss associated with Alzheimer's, it could be good news for victims of the disease, Doody said.

Volunteers must be 50 or older, in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease and free of any other major health problems. In addition, there are restrictions concerning other drugs patients may already be taking.

Food substitute safety discussed

When trying to cut back on calories, saturated fat and sodium, it may seem smart to buy a butter or salt substitute. But just how smart is it, and are imposters any safer than the real thing?

According to Cindy Rowell, R.D., outpatient dietitian at Methodist Hospital, butter and salt substitutes are safe, although they have no nutritional value and limited uses.

"Butter substitutes are not good for frying and do not make a very tasty spread. Butter substitutes are best when sprinkled on hot, moist food," Rowell said. "One-half teaspoon (the recommended serving size) of a butter substitute has four calories. Two teaspoons of butter or margarine, which contain 70 calories, are needed to equal the taste of a substitute."

Salt substitutes contain potassium chloride, which is a potential health risk for kidney and heart patients. Large amounts of potassium also may irritate the gastrointestinal tract and cause bleeding.

Rowell suggests using more spices and herbs for seasoning rather than a salt substitute and limited amounts of margarine instead of butter.
