Extravaganza promises to be best ever

The West Coke County Community Development's Labor Day Extravaganza Saturday, September 1, has mushroomed into the largest festival-type event ever held in Robert Lee. At press-time Wednesday, 49 arts, crafts, food, and game booths from all over Texas had made reservations with a few others still in limbo. Booths will open at 10 am and be located under shade trees in the county park. Free stage entertainment, including the Kaylan Gardner Band and other local musicians will hold forth from 1-4 pm. An ABC golf tournament will tee-off at 1 pm adjacent to the booth area. Eight teams have entered the Beach Volleyball tourney at

the park and promises a wild time from 10 am until finals later in the afternoon. The Little Miss WCCCD beauty contest will be on the entertainment stage at 4 pm.

Robert Lee Volunteer Firemen will hold a barbecue, beginning at 5:30 pm in the Rec Hall next to the booth area. Tickets are available at the door if you don't have advance tickets.

Shadofaxx will take place in the Rec Hall from 8-12 midnight to conclude the day's activities. The band plays country/western plus a wide variety of other music. A number of advance tickets have been sold but tickets will also be available at the door.

regs listed Fall hunting

The Texas early hunting season for migratory birds, which includes all dove species and teal ducks, will

open Saturday, September 1. The teal duck season has been closed for 1990 in light of drought in the breeding ground areas.

Coke County is in the central dove hunting zone in which the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department made some changes in the hunting dates for 1990-91. Mourning dove fall season opens September 1 and closes October 24, 1990. The 1991 winter season is scheduled for January 5-20.

Migratory hunting laws have always differed slightly from other hunting rules. The shooting hours for mourning doves are 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset with a daily bag limit of 12. Shotguns must be plugged back to a 3shot capacity. Law prohibits baiting migratory birds. Standing crops or feed present in normal agricultural activities are not considered baited areas. Texas hunting licenses are required.

In south Texas, whitewinged dove hunters will find that season limited to 2 days, September 1 and 2. They must purchase a \$6 whitewinged dove stamp for those

2 days, in addition to their Texas hunting license.

State hunting license expire on August 31, 1990. When purchasing your license prior to Saturday's opening day, pick up a migratory game bird brochure and the 1990-91 Texas Hunting Guide and read them through. Chances are you will see some facts you were not aware of. Refer to these guides for information or call Coke County Game Warden Sparks Burdett of Robert Lee with your questions.



Hunter safety course set

ten hours of instruction and scoring of seventy or above on the hunter safety exam are required for certification.

The only cost for the certification is a five dollar fee that is sent to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to cover costs of books, materials, and certificates. A minimum age limit of twelve years will be in effect (as of September 1, 1990). Pre-enrollment will be required by September 17, as the course will be limited to thirty applicants.

Instructors for the course are Bill Helwig, Richard Johnson, Sparks Burdett, and Sid Long. All instructors have been certified by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

This year, persons whose birthday is between September 2, 1971 and August 31, 1974 must complete and pass a hunter safety course to

The ABC's of Back-to-School

Running to school in the morning or from school in the afternoon, children run the risk of injury.

"Any injury to the brain can significantly impair a child's ability to learn, concentrate or remember information and this can have a damaging effect on a child's development."

Before you send your children back to school, outfit them with a few safety reminders.

Walking to School

Most pedestrian accidents are the fault of the walker, not the driver, according to the National Safety Council, so:

 Be sure to allow enough time for your child to get to school without rushing.

Plan your child's walking route to minimize the number of street crossings

street crossings.

Teach your child always to use sidewalks and to cross at crosswalks. Where there are no sidewalks, have your child walk

facing traffic, so the child can see oncoming cars.

Riding the School Bus

Although school buses are much safer than family cars, statistics indicate that 40 students die and 7,000 are injured each year in school bus accidents. The majority of these accidents occur outside the bus, when students are boarding or exiting.

• Have your child wait for the

 Have your child wait for the bus to stop completely, then board carefully, using the handrail.

 Tell your children to take their seat quickly and stay in that seat for the entire ride — never putting head, arms or hands out the window.

Teach your children to cross at least 10 feet in front of the bus so the driver can see them.

"Going to school without parents is a sign of a child's independence," said Dr. Wasco, "but children must learn that practicing safety is a prerequisite for independence."

VA Questions

Q. Can I get a release of liability from the VA if a nonveteran assumes my VAguaranteed home loan?

A. If the buyer meets with Department of Veterans Affairs approval, you may be released from liability.

Q. My spouse and I do not live together, neither do I contribute to her support. Can I claim her as a dependent on my pension claim?

A. No. A pensioner can claim a dependent spouse only if living with that spouse or, if separated, contributing to the spouse's support.

"I've noticed that a lot of greeting card sections in variety stores and supermarkets are featuring special Grandparents Day sections, which is really gratifying to us."

Baca said the recognition is overdue for older men and women whose contributions to society continue long after retirement and their children's establishment of their own

"Grandparents are more important than ever to their families, and to society. Many of them are taking care of grandchildren for their working children. A significant number of grandparents end up with custody of grandchildren after their children's marriages dissolve."

The role of seniors in the economy and workforce has also changed in recent years, Baca noted.



Eating alone isn't unusual. Teenagers do it after school, employees do it when they're staying late at work and singles of all ages do it almost

Eating alone and eating nutritiously do not have to be two separate things. With a little planning -- even if that planning only goes on in your head -- you can make sure you're getting a balanced diet.

Here are some ideas to make "meals for one" more convenient, enjoyable, and nutritious:

· Take advantage of the single-serving frozen entrees, soups, cereals and other products on the market. They may be more expensive, but can save money if you are not good at eating leftovers and therefore waste food.

 Items that work especially well for single servings include chicken and turkey cutlets, chops, steaks and fish and seafood that can be purchased in small quantities. These foods are a major source of protein and can be prepared quickly and easily in single serving sizes by broiling the meats or poaching the

 Set aside an evening or afternoon to do quantity cooking for future meals. Package, label and freeze in single servings.

· If a recipe serves two or more, one serving should go on the plate and the rest should be put in the refrigerator or freezer immediately. This will help you avoid overeating.

 Heat-sealed freezing/ cooking pouches are good for storing leftovers. They are reheated in boiling water or a microwave, which saves time and cleanup.


· If you have a good cafeteria available at work or school, or you go to business lunches, eat your big meal at noon. Then you can have a lighter meal that requires little preparation at home.

DPS estimates less fatalities

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 40 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday period

"Last year during this endof-the-summer holiday, 48
persons died in traffic accidents, with another four persons dying later of injuries received during that time," said
DPS Director Col. Joe E. Milner. "Our estimate for this
year is below that final count
of 52, and we hope the actual
number of deaths this year will
be much lower than this estimate."

The holiday counting period begins at 6 pm Friday, August 31 and continues until midnight on Monday, September 3. As it does each Labor Day, and on certain other major holidays, the DPS will have all available Troopers on the highways to ensure that motorists have as safe a holiday as possible.

"Since drinking and driving, along with speeding, are the leading causes of traffic fatalities, we hope we can hold the Labor Day deaths down by our increased presence on the highways," Milner said. "We certainly don't want to discourage people from having a good time during the Labor Day holiday, we just want motorists to drive safely."

Last year's Labor Day statistics support the Department's concern over drinking and driving and excessive speed. In 1989, 62% of those killed in Labor Day holiday traffic accidents died in mishaps connected either to alcohol or driving too fast.

"Something else our Troopers will be watching for during the Labor Day holiday period is whether motorists are wearing their seat belts," said Dudley Thomas, chief of the DPS Traffic Law Enforcement Division. "Last Labor Day, 77% of those victims who were occupants of cars or light trucks had not been wearing restraints when they

were killed. The message is obvious: Seat belts save lives."

As in past years, the DPS will issue periodic reports on traffic fatalities throughout the Labor Day weekend.

RL sets economic development meet

An economic development planning program is scheduled for Robert Lee on October 8 and 9.

Dr. Don Stebbins, an economist that will coordinate the program said, "the main purpose of the program is to help local people focus their attention and energy on economic development projects that they select and plan."

The planning procedure that will be used is part of the community development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Stebbins developed the program because he was getting a large number of questions from people in rural communities about how to get started in economic development.

A sufficient number of local people who are willing to work on economic development is the most important ingredient in a successful economic development program according to Dr. Stebbins.

"It's been my experience that, if we can conduct the program with a group of 30 or more people who sincerely want to work, we can almost guarantee that some interesting, useful things will be planned," Stebbins said.

planned," Stebbins said.

During the first meeting, everyone who attends will have an opportunity to make recommendations about what they think can help the economy in West Coke County.

The objectives of the second meeting are to convert the top ranked recommendations into workable goals and develop an action plan for each task force that people decide to work with.

Robert Lee needs some help. This is an excellent chance for us to become actively involved in a program that has been successful in other areas.

The West Coke County Community Development and Coke County 4-H Extension Service, co-sponsors of the program, feel like this program can be successful in Robert Lee which is full of resourceful energetic people.
