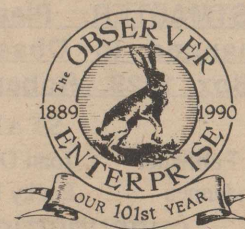

The Robert Lee Volunteer Ambulance Service is facing a severe problem, need of personnel to man the service. If you have been certified in the past and could feel it in your heart to be re-certified and assist us, it would be greatly appreciated. If you have a clean driving record and could assist us by driving the ambulance. Any HELP we can get would be wonderful from one day a month to more.

September 10, our ambulance was out of service due to lack of personnel. Thank goodness, this was one of the days nothing happened.

At present time, we are trying our best to provide emergency service with four drivers and seven EMTs. This is too demanding a volunteer work load for this number.

I'm new at being a driver and I'm sure I don't realize a lot of past or maybe even present problems, but I feel when it comes to either saving a person's life or at the very least making their trip to the hospital safer and more comfortable, you should be able to do so with anyone. Please try to omit personal feelings and help with this needed service.

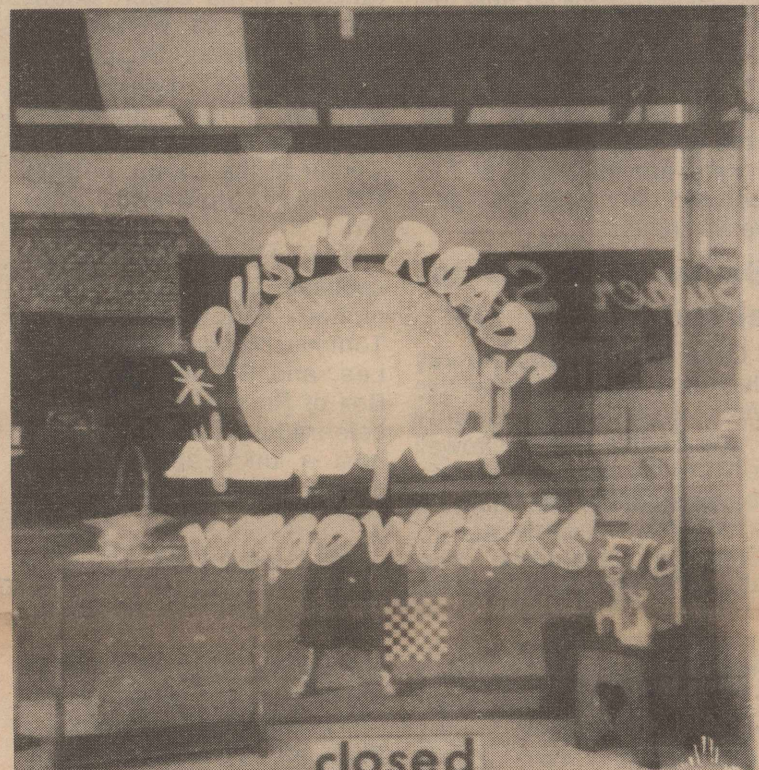
I think everyone basically agrees that without medical services in Robert Lee, the ambulance is NEEDED. Now, everyone must decide what they can do to help. I realize not everyone is able to handle emergency work for many different reasons, but you might be able to attend someone else's child or business while they do. I have the utmost faith that the people of Robert Lee will come forward and help when they know the need. I was born and raised in Robert Lee and have been back here eleven years. I've never seen the community not help when help is needed. Help is needed now. Please let us hear from you.

## KLST interviews WC EMS

West Coke County EMS members were interviewed in Robert Lee by KLST Channel 8 television personnel on Monday afternoon and the segment was aired on Tuesday. Among those shown on the news clip on Tuesday night's news were Mayor Jackie Walker, Joan Burns,

and Mary Cherry. The gist of the news report was the fact

that the small group of 8 active volunteers (an ambulance run requires a driver and 2 trained emergency technicians) won't be able to physically hold out much longer. Most of the volunteers have regular jobs and often go into San Angelo more than once a day. The very real possibility exists that the service will be forced to fold without additional aid from other volunteers.

**Santa Fe seeks to abandon rail line**

Coke County Judge Aubrey Denman received a letter this week from Foard County Judge Charlie Bell of Crowell concerning the proposed abandonment of the Santa Fe railline from Sweetwater to Cherokee, Oklahoma. The railroad is also proposing the closing of the line from Sweetwater southward to Presidio. Judge Bell advised that one meeting has been held August 28 to organize opposition to the abandonment.

Due to the proximity of Coke County to the area in question, Judge Bell would like to see county spokesmen at the upcoming meeting. State, federal, and regional representatives will gather in Crowell on Wednesday, September 26 at 10 am at the Foard County courthouse for further discussions to oppose the closing.

Mrs. Gassiot was a retired schoolteacher.

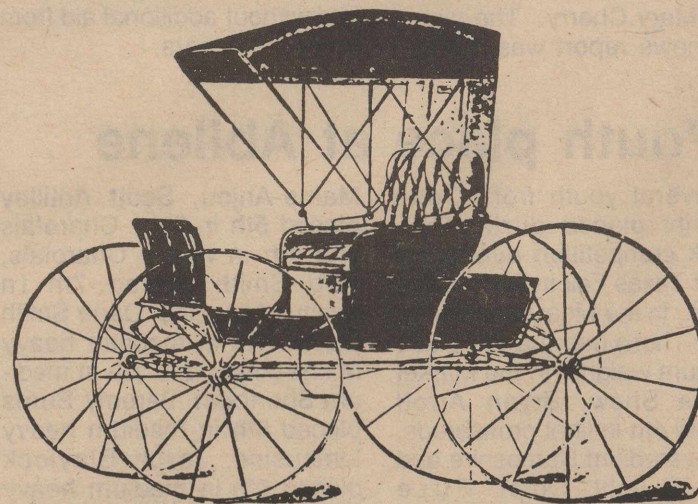

**Jim Bowie Days**

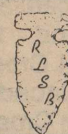

## Defense shines in victory over Miles

The Longhorns traveled to Miles last Friday night to take on the Bulldogs in their second game of the season. The Horns' defense gave up five first downs, only 42 yards rushing, and 76 yards passing for the game. Team Captains this week were Sean Conway, Tim Sims and Billy Magness.

Brandon Marshall had his second 200 yard game this week with 203 on 22 carries. Super blocking Longhorns.

Bronte won the toss, Bill Windham received the kick off and returned it 16 yards to the 41 yard line. The Horns made two first downs and on the seventh play, Marshall scored on a 28 yard run. The PAT failed. Darrell Lucas kicked off and put the ball out of the end zone to place the ball on the 20 yard line. The Defense held Miles to four downs to force the punt, but Bronte fumbled on Miles' 36 yard line. Again the Horns held the Bulldogs to four downs and started their second drive on their own 19 yard line. Four plays later, Marshall scored on a 52 yard run, but again the PAT failed. Miles took the ball on their own 23 and the tough Horn defense, led by Jason Pierce, Conway, Windham and Lucas, forced another punt to the Bronte 39 yard line. The Longhorns' offense was unstoppable until the 5th play on the Bulldogs four yard line when the Horns lost its second fumble. After another Miles punt, the Horns took over on the Miles' 33 yard line. With 4:50 remaining in the half, the Horns turned the ball over on the Miles' seven yard line after an incomplete pass. Miles had a short punt to give Bronte the ball on the Bulldogs' 25 yard line. It took two plays before Marshall scored on a 20 yard run. The PAT was good and Bronte led 20 to Miles' 0. Magness intercepted with 0:40 left on the clock to end the half.

The third quarter started with the Horns on defense. Good plays by Rudy Sanchez, Tim Sims, and Justin Phillips forced the Bulldogs to punt. The Horns moved the ball to the Miles' 41 to face a 4th and 9 for the first and came up short by one yard. Two plays later, Phillips intercepted and then lost a fumble to Miles. On the next play, Pierce recovered a fumble on the Miles' 34 yard line. This drive ended after a 4th and 4 fell short. The Longhorn secondary, consisting of Phillips, Marshall, Jay Parker, and Magness, were busy in the fourth quarter when Miles tried to go with the pass. With 6:50 left in the game, Phillips put the Horns' first punt up. After the Horns lost a fumble and Miles later had to punt, the Longhorns had the ball on their own 25 yard line. Two

plays into the drive, Jamie Flores left everyone on the right side for a 49 yard run to the Miles' 6 yard line. Marshall scored on a two yard run for the touchdown and Phillips passed to Gary Bilbrey for the PAT. The Horns held the Bulldogs when Flores recovered a fumble.

The Longhorns are off to great start for the '90 school year. This week's game is in Water Valley at 8 pm. Make the trip to show the Horns we support them. GO HORNS!!

"I was so proud of the 7th

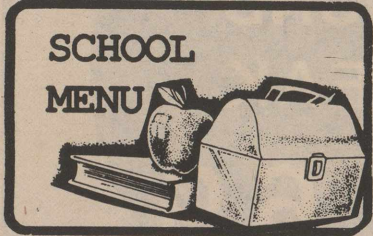
grade. They served very well and passed like they were 8th graders. They did a super job," Coach Connie Bozarth said.

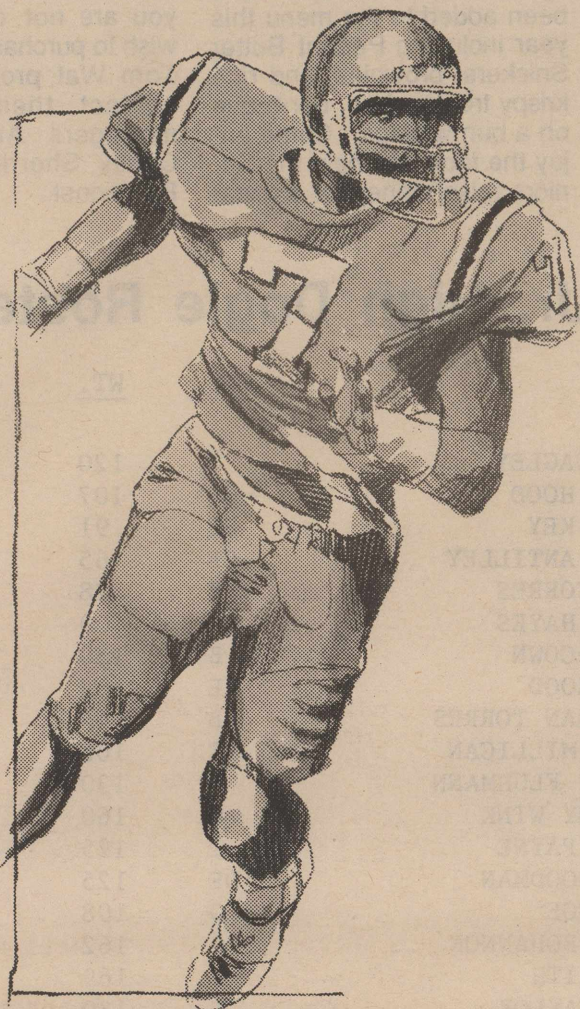

In the second quarter, Chad Wagley scored on a 10 yard run. There were two interceptions in the game by Wayne Hayes and Jason Key.

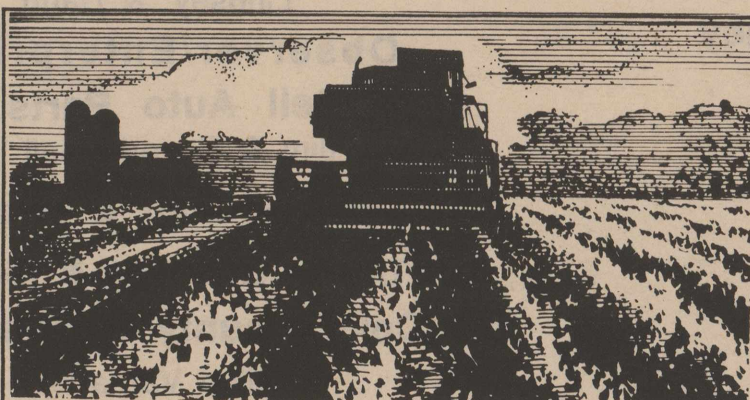

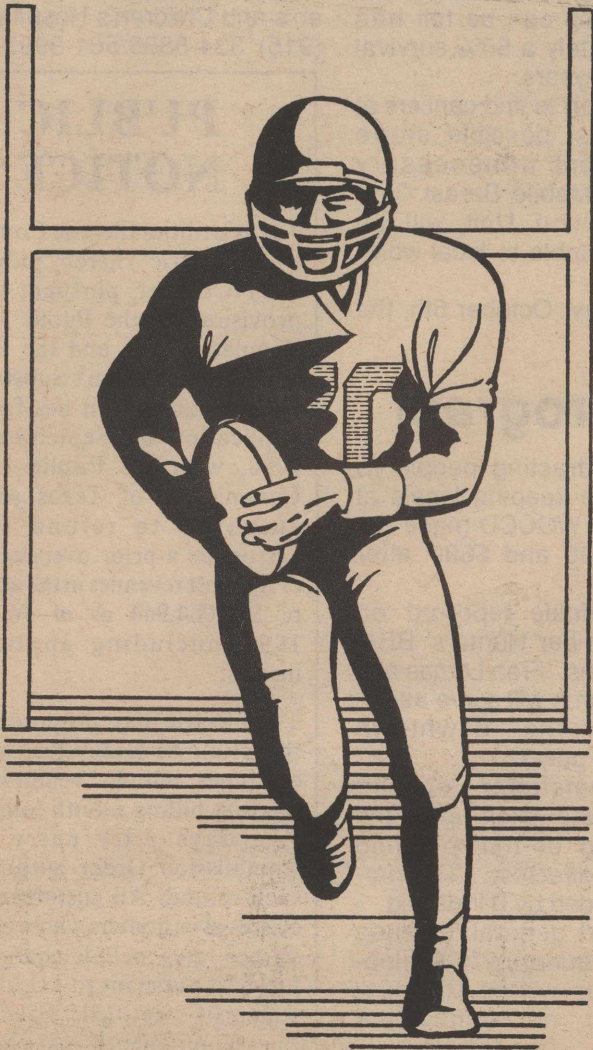

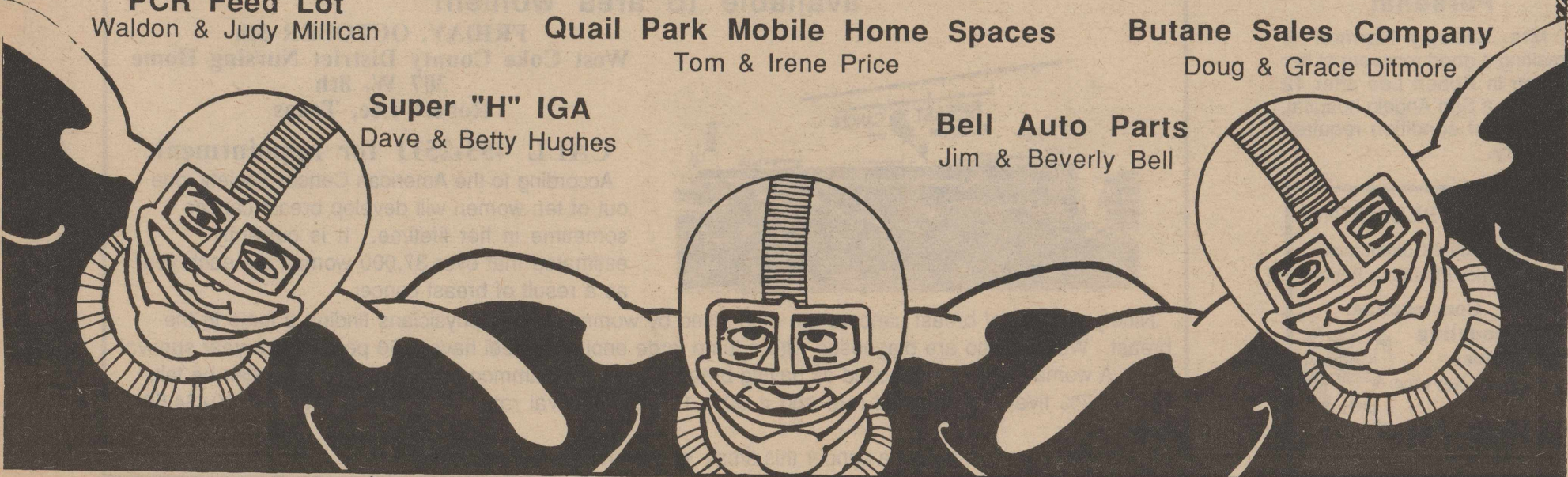

## Breast cancer clinic set for Oct. 5th

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art X-ray equipment, breast can-

cers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be made available to local women.

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
