Large absentee vote precedes election

The absentee voting period for the November 6 general election ends Friday, November 2, at the close of the business day. A historic trend has been set over the last 15 years indicating voter turnout probably will not exceed 50% of those eligible at the polls, says Secretary of State George Bayoud, Jr. Regardless of his prediction, absentee balloting across the state has shown unusual numbers, possibly due to the interest in the governor's race.

Coke County clerk Ettie Hubbard reported Wednesday morning that 72 voters had cast ballots in her office, in addition to 17 votes by mail. A total of 2,226 persons are registered to vote in the upcoming election next Tues-

Voters will find the November 6 ballot to be quite lengthy and choices will lead off with the U.S. Senate race listing Phil Gramm (R), Hugh Parmer (D), Gary Johnson (L), and Ira Calkins, a write-in who also announced as a write-in for Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, State Treasurer, Commissioner of General Land Office, Commissioner of

Agriculture, and Railroad Richards (D), and Jeff Daiell Commissioner.

Fall hunting opening set

Glorious fall weather has only enhanced the anticipation of the upcoming opening Saturday, November 3, of the general firearm hunting sea-

The gates will open on whitetail deer hunting in Coke County November 3 and remain open until January 6, 1991. Four deer will be allowed with a 2-buck limit. Shooting hours are 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset.

Coke County Game Warden Sparks Burdett has said that in light of the rains during antler production periods, he expects to see one of the area's better years for horns. Deer are fat and in excellent shape. Burdett had talked to TPWD Wildlife Biologist Don Davis at

Winters who said deer survey counts were down overall but this could be due to deer being less visible and not having to go far to make a living or travel to water. Reports indicate that deer are not even inclined to frequent feeders right now, he said. Hunters may have to work harder for kills than in recent drought years.

Fall turkey season will run concurrently with deer hunting - November 3 through January 6, 1991; and allows 2 turkeys, either sex. The spring season, April 6 - May 5, is for 2 gobblers. Only 3 turkey tags per license year are provided. News is not too encouraging for turkeys.

Bull testing dates set

There has been a bull testing facility begun in San Angelo for performance testing bulls of any breed. The first test will begin November 17, 1990 with bulls being received on the 17th and 18th, initial weigh-in on December 1 & 2, then weights taken on 28, 56, 84, and 112 days from start of test. There will be a field day and sale date determined later for review of the bulls. The test is not limited to any breed, the testing fee will be \$125. per bull with half to be paid on delivery day. The remaining fee will be paid at

the end of the test. Producers will be billed periodically for feed, veterinary services, medicines and testing services when used.



What can be recycled? The number one recyclable product is paper, including newspaper, office paper, cardboard, junk-mail, cereal boxes and grocery bags.

Newspaper and other paper products can be tied and bundled. Paper bags can be reused. Magazines can be donated to doctor's offices, given to a friend or better yet, check them out at the library instead of subscribing.

Aluminum cans make up 5% of the total solid waste stream. Cans are the most common form of recycled aluminum. Aluminum siding, gutters, down spouts, storm doors and window frames and aluminum lawn furniture frames are all recyclable.

Iron and steel are the most recycled material used today. Scrap metal dealers were the most visible recyclers in business long before comprehensive recycling programs were established.

Glass makes up 8% of our waste. All container glass is

recyclable. More than 12 million tons of glass containers are collected annually and remelted with raw materials to create new glass bottles and jars or Fiberglass. The Glass Packaging Institute reports that 25% of any given glass container is made from recycled glass.

There are three basic types of glass: Clear, green and brown. Not all recycling centers accept all three types. Most recycling centers will not accept light bulbs, ceramic glass, dishes or plate glass, because they contain different materials than bottles and

Plastics make up 7% of the total waste -- most of which is packaging. The most common recycling products are soft drink and milk containers. Recycled plastics are used in flower pots, drainage pipes,

toys, traffic barrier cones, carpet backing and fiber fill for pillows, ski jackets and sleeping bags. Only about 2% of plastic waste is recycled.

Recyclable materials include wood waste, yard waste and kitchen waste. These wastes comprise 18-25% of solid waste and offer an excellent opportunity for recycling, especially composting.

Automobile tires, motor oil, and bulk household items can be recycled. Usually items like old clothing, furniture and appliances are sold at garage sales or donated to charity.

Recycling reduces the amount of waste that is buried in landfills or incinerated. Recycling cuts down on litter and conserves natural resources. However, to be successful in recycling depends on the availability of markets for recycled materials and products.






