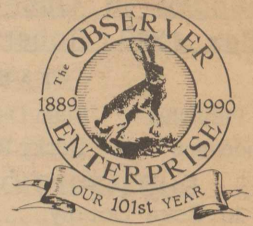

## Local voter turnout nears sixty percent

A woman will occupy the Texas governor's office for the first time in over 50 years. Ann Richards gained the Democratic victory over Republican Clayton Williams after the most expensive campaign in history. Although the race was relatively close - 52% to 48% of the votes - Williams carried West Texas including

Coke County by a 678-552 count.

Locals helped to re-elect U. S. Senator Phil Gramm, 787 over 395 for Hugh Palmer.

Bob Bullock narrowly carried Coke County over Rob Mosbacher, 599-587, for lieu-

tenant governor. Dan Morales received 646 votes over Buster Brown's 481 for attorney general.

Sharp more than doubled Harding at 747-319 in the county vote for comptroller. Mauro tripled Gibreath in his land office bid. County voters gave 588 votes to Nikki Van Hightower to 549 for Kay Bailey Hutchison for treasurer who, in late returns, was victorious. For railroad commissioner, Krueger had 795 to 338 for Boulter. In a campaign drawing much interest in West Texas, county voters went with Rick Perry 749 to incumbent Jim Hightower's 338 total in the ag commissioner's race.

A total of eight judges and justices were also on the ballot. Coke County gave total support to U. S. Representative Charlie Stenholm, State Senator Bill Sims, State Representative Rob Junell, county judge Royce Lee, clerk Etie Hubbard, treasurer Phelan Wrinkle, commissioners Paul Burns, Billy Jo Lockett, and James Tidwell, and peace justices Gary Shaffer and Joan Davis, all of whom were unopposed. Constitutional Amendment #1 passed 490-329.

A total of 1,269 voters cast ballots Tuesday out of 2,226 eligibles, a better percentage than most in the nation and state.

During the last few months, I have heard comments from two sides of the coin concerning the support of local businesses by local consumers. The word on the street is that the local businesses do not try to attract the local consumers by offering the products needed and/or wanted at a price affordable to them. The businesses, however, cannot offer these products at "Walmart" prices until the consumer decides to support them enough to push their sales volume to a higher level. Many times, if a comparison is made between products purchased in San Angelo as opposed to the same or comparable quality product in Coke County, prices are unbelievably similar and lower in our own home -- much lower when the gas price and additional 1/2% sales tax is tacked on to the

trip. In addition to that, the consumer has to realize that a large majority of the sales made in our community is on credit, whereas, shopping in other areas outside Coke County is usually made on a cash basis, giving these businesses the cash flow needed to replace their inventory and offer more items.

Business is a vital part of community -- these business owners are asked to donate time, money and merchandise to many, many, worthwhile organizations throughout the year. In order for we, the consumers, to continue to expect their help for our children's activities and fund raisers, we must be willing to keep them here. Have you ever seen "Walmart" on the back of your child's baseball uniform?

Let's try to work with our businesses to keep our community thriving.

Committee heads and members reported on progress of the four groups which evolved from the strategic planning held last month.

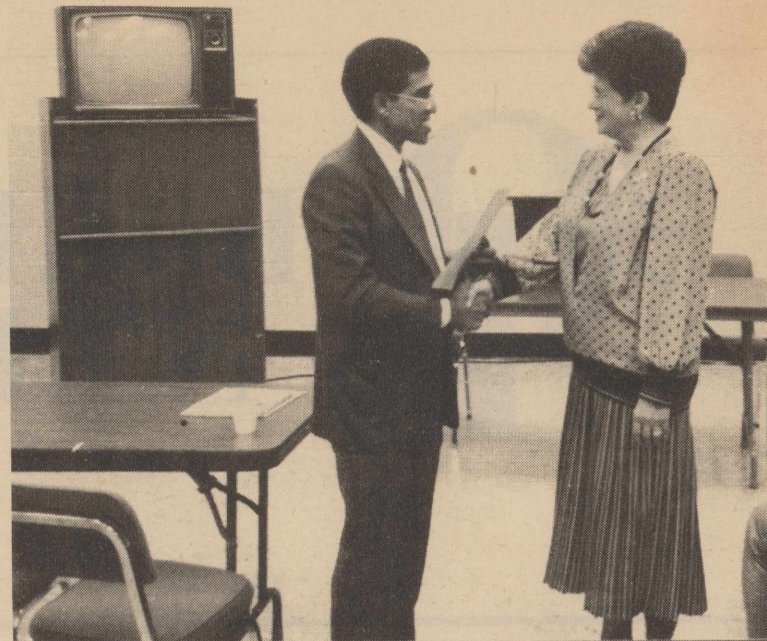
Also discussed was the Christmas Downtown, to be sponsored by WCCCD on Saturday, December 8.

**Hunting mediocre so far**

Opening of the Texas general hunting season has not lived up to initial expectations in West Texas. It was first touted as a possible record in some sections due to forage, water, and fawn survival. Actually, it was a slow opening locally. It could be that Saturday's warm weather, compounded by lots of food and cover kept deer from showing themselves. The fast-moving cold front late Saturday afternoon caught many hunters miles from their vehicle in shirtsleeves. Sunday morning dawned to cold, wet

weather with temperatures in the 30s.

The three deer storages available to local hunters reported small numbers stored - Skinner's Grocery recorded 27 deer and no turkeys; Davis Grocery had 15 deer in storage; and Silver Peak Grocery reported 11 deer and 1 turkey on hand. Deer carcasses are reported to be extremely fat, with only average horn development.

Another wet norther was blowing at presstime and may keep hunters in camp or at home for a few days.

to help businesses and institutions in the completion of their automation plans or problems. Please notify her if you would like the account representative to call on your institution at no charge.

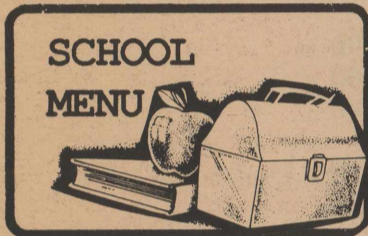

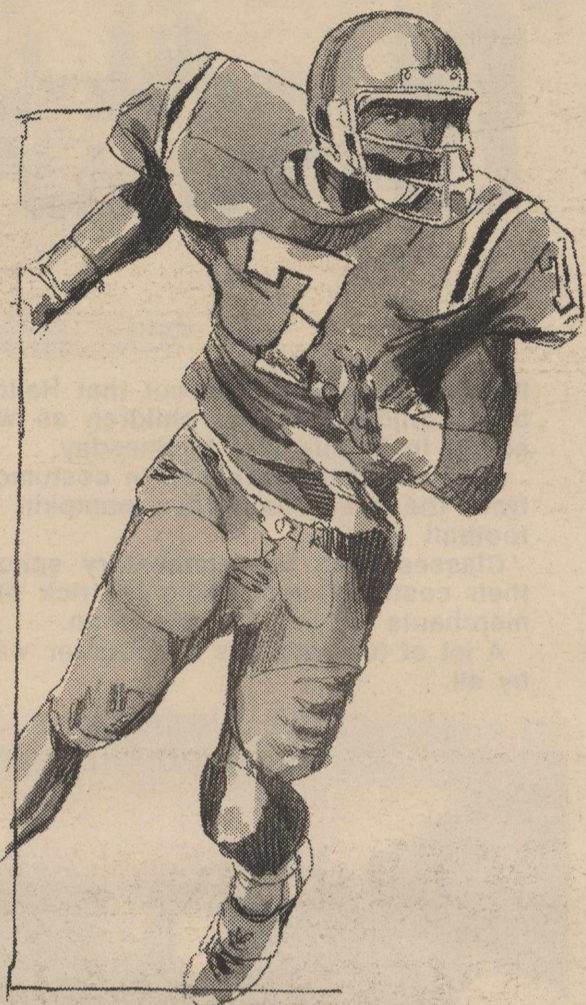

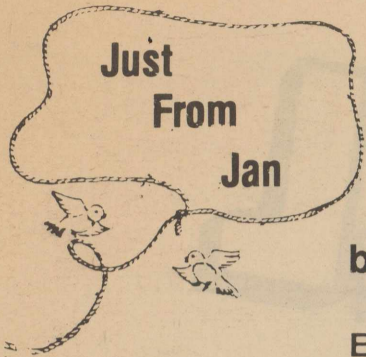

**GET A CHECK-UP DURING NOVEMBER TO GUARD AGAINST DIABETES**

Cutting down on salt, fat and sugar is a major concern for all health-conscious Texans, but even more important to those with diabetes.

More than 800,000 Texans suffer from diabetes mellitus -- and over half of the cases are undiagnosed, according to the Texas Department of Health.

November is national diabetes month and a good time for those in high-risk categories to check with their physician to determine if they are diabetic. Complications from uncontrolled diabetes can be debilitating. If left untreated, this disease can lead to blindness, heart disease, kidney disease, limb amputations and even death.

Mexican Americans are three to five times more likely to develop diabetes than Anglos, and blacks experience 33% higher rate of diabetes than Anglos. The majority of these high-risk populations that are afflicted with the disease have the non-insulin type of diabetes, which can stem from inherited traits as well as ethnic dietary habits.

About 90% of all Texans with diabetes have the non-insulin kind or type II, formerly known as the adult onset type. The pancreas produces some insulin, but the body is unable to use it properly. This causes glucose to build up in the blood, leading to the high blood-glucose or blood-sugar levels that are characteristics of untreated diabetes.

Type II diabetes usually occurs in adults 35 or older. Symptoms are blurred vision, excessive tiredness, weight gain or loss, or scratches that will not heal properly.

In most cases, symptoms can be controlled by weight loss, good diet and exercise. Carrying around extra weight can lead to a host of problems. It can drain energy, cause heart and lung problems and diminish self-esteem.

Fewer people have the insulin-dependent or type I diabetes, which usually occurs in early childhood. The pancreas does not produce enough insulin to meet the body's needs. Insulin injections allow the body to use glucose produced from foods for energy. However, the type of insulin taken must be balanced with food and activity.

Symptoms in children include fatigue, extreme thirst, frequent urination, and nausea and vomiting. These

symptoms can cause the child to go into a coma, if not diagnosed soon enough.

The body produces glucose from the foods consumed, so eating right is the first step in controlling diabetes.

Because the majority of people with non-insulin diabetes are overweight, most are advised to lose extra pounds. Even slight weight losses have dramatically improved blood-glucose levels by helping the body use its own insulin more efficiently.

According to the Texas af-

filiate of the American Diabetes Association, people without diabetes stand a greater chance of developing the disease if they are overweight. On the other hand, people with diabetes who are overweight may be able to improve their diabetes control, prevent or delay complications -- even increase life expectancy -- if they lose weight.

A physician can provide a referral to a dietician who can help design a meal plan that will match a person's eating habits with diabetes management goals.

**Seniors take ASVAB test**

The Bronte senior class was bused to First Baptist Church for ASVAB testing on Thursday, November 8, 1990.

The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB), the most widely used multiple aptitude battery in the United States, provides measures of aptitudes for general academic areas and for career areas that encompass most of the civilian and military world of work. It is designed for use with students in Grades 11 & 12 and in postsecondary schools. The school will use the ASVAB test results to provide educational and career counseling for students. The military services use the results to identify students who potentially qualify for entry into the military and for assignment to military occupational training programs.

ASVAB results are reported by composite scores. Composite scores are combinations of subtest scores that have demonstrated validity for predicting performance in academic and career areas. The academic composites measure a student's potential for further formal education and predict performance in general areas requiring verbal

skills (word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, and general science) and mathematical skills (mathematics knowledge and arithmetic reasoning). The occupational composites measure a student's potential for performance in four general career areas which are mechanical and crafts (samples: machinist, auto mechanic, diesel mechanic, sheet metal worker, and carpenter) business and clerical (samples: clerk typist, personnel clerk, transportation agent, data entry operator, and paralegal assistant), electronics and electrical (samples: TV and radio repairman, Automatic equipment technician, instrument mechanic, line installer/repairer, auto electrician), and health, social, and technology (samples: medical service technician, cook, police officer, dental assistant, and flight operation specialist).

In summary, ASVAB results can help students with different needs at various stages in the career development process. The ASVAB, therefore, should be considered an effective component of a comprehensive schoolwide testing program.

## Budget to reduce deficit

The new five-year, \$496 billion deficit-reduction budget passed by Congress over the weekend will help cut the federal deficit and eliminate some tax disparities, according to Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX).

The budget represents two dollars in spending cuts for every one dollar in tax increases. The spending cuts, amounting to \$281.4 billion, are being achieved through \$182.4 billion cuts in defense and \$99 billion cuts in entitlements. Increased or new revenues are expected to total \$137.2 billion.

"It has been said: 'When you find yourself in a hole, the first rule is to quit digging.' We are in a deep deficit hole and the only way out is to stop the continual increase in spending," said Stenholm. "The Congress and the President recognized the necessity of a change of economic direction for our country, away from the 'feel good' borrow-and-spend policies of the 80s and toward a pay-as-you-go policy for the 90s. As always, it has required compromise and sacrifice to move our country a small step in the right direction."

Stenholm explained that with no changes, the deficit, or yearly shortfall, would be \$293.7 billion in FY 1991. This reconciliation bill, along with cuts in defense appropriation, will bring the deficit down to \$253.6 billion in FY 91. It also places strict pay-as-you-go requirements on future new programs and puts caps on discretionary spending to avoid future increases.

The national debt, which is the total amount the government owes, is currently over \$3.1 trillion and increasing. The interest on this debt will be \$195 billion in FY 1991. The deficit for FY 1990 was over \$220 billion.

According to the Congressional Joint Committee on Taxation, the tax changes will result in a 1.8% increase in taxes for workers making between \$20,000 and \$50,000; a 2% increase for incomes between \$30,000 and \$50,000; and those making over \$200,000 will pay 6.3% more in taxes. Taxpayers making less than \$10,000 and \$20,000 will have their taxes cut by 3.2%. The overall effect of these changes will

make the tax code more "progressive," meaning those individuals with higher incomes will pay a higher percentage in taxes.

The budget package eliminates the income tax "bubble," puts a tax on high-priced luxury items, and increases beer, cigarette, and gasoline taxes. Projected spending increases in Medicare will also be cut.

"My voting no on any of the three budget proposals we considered would have been an easy vote," said Stenholm. "It's easy to sit back, vote no and criticize. What I had to ask myself was if we didn't pass this budget, what was the alternative, and there was none."

Stenholm added that he was not happy with all aspects of the budget reconciliation package, especially the lack of more spending cuts.

The Congressman pointed out that during the 101st Congress he has consistently voted in favor of spending cuts that would have amounted to over \$18 billion dollars. Most of these amendments were overwhelmingly defeated. The three cuts that were approved, totalling \$242 million, came out of Foreign Aid, Legislative Branch funding, and District of Columbia funding.

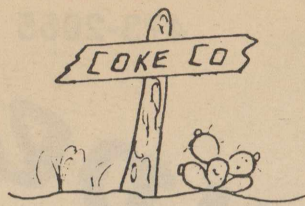
"While our cuts this year were not great, I believe we are on the right track toward cutting spending," said Stenholm. "When the 102nd Congress convenes in January, I plan to continue my fight for a balanced budget, greater spending cuts, and a more fiscally responsible Congress."

### TIME TO WATCH FOR BROWN PATCH ON LAWN

If lawns have been infected with brown patch in prior years, get ready to treat again. Moist conditions with cooler night temperatures are ideal for the development of brown patch disease. San Augustine is the most common lawn affected, but centipede and bermuda grass are also susceptible under certain conditions. Early infections can go unnoticed unless regular in-

spections of the lawn are made. Late September and October are when symptoms are most apparent.


Heavy fertilized, well watered lawns are very susceptible to brown patch. Lush, moist grass creates an ideal environment for disease development. The lawn-devastating disease appears in patches as large 30 feet in diameter. The leaves turn yellow and are easily pulled from the stem. As the affected areas age, new green

growth may develop toward the center of the patch, causing a donut-shaped appearance.

A number of fungicides are available to prevent or treat brown patch. For the fungicides to be most effective, it is best to apply them before the disease develops. In lawns where treatment is limited, be sure to first treat the areas that were previously infected because the disease has a tendency to reappear in the same areas.

## OGT committee hands out cash rewards

Members of the Operation Game Thief (OGT) Committee met October 24 to consider rewards for callers whose information resulted in conviction of game and fish law violators during the past six months and to monitor the Operation Game Thief Fund.

The 24-hour OGT hotline (1-800-792-GAME) received 495 calls the past six months, 48 of the calls resulting in 122 cases being filed against 84 violators, said Captain Wayne Chappell, OGT coordinator. Committee members authorized payment of \$1,800 for 13 callers who requested a reward (35 did not request a reward). The courts assessed \$15,936.40 in fines in those cases.

The OGT Committee meets in April and October each year to administer the OGT program. Funds to support the support the program are derived solely from contributions by private individuals, sportsmen's clubs, corporations and other private sources.

The program was first authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1981, Chappell said. Since its inception, OGT has received 10,173 calls. Of those calls, 993 resulted in the arrest of 1,937 violators. More than 98% of the cases filed resulted in convictions with the courts assessing \$438,350.79 in fines. Rewards totaling \$80,630 have been authorized for callers who requested rewards.

Although not reflected in the October meeting, three recent calls to OGT have resulted in the apprehension of 68 violators who illegally caught and sold more than 1,000 fish, including striped bass, white bass and paddlefish, which is an endangered species in Texas. The courts assessed \$92,450 in fines for these violations. All apprehensions were made in the same area of North Texas and none of the callers reporting these violations requested a

## FmHA project-JUST KIDS

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture, has selected the Farm Safety for "JUST KIDS" program as its public service project for 1990-1991, through its Wellness Program's Public Safety Campaign, according to Dennis Cumbie, FmHA County Supervisor for Tom Green, Coke, Irion, Sterling, and Reagan counties.

Farm Safety for "JUST KIDS" is a non-profit organization dedicated to educating parents and children about farm injury prevention. This organization stresses raising awareness levels regarding on-farm hazards. Each year, farm accidents result in the death of 300 young people and 5,000 serious injuries. The primary age group affected is 5 to 14 years old.

Cumbie stated, "FmHA's involvement in the program will enable Farm Safety for "JUST KIDS" to reach a national audience for the first time." Education material including a film, safety fact sheet, warning decals and children workbooks will be distributed by FmHA personnel throughout Texas. Over 13,000 FmHA employees, nationwide, will help spread the farm safety message to schools and the general public.

A Cornell University study reveals that children bear the brunt of farm accidents when the injury rate is adjusted to account for the time each worker is in the workplace. In 1988, 35.6% of farm accident victims were children ranging in age from 5 to 14 years. There are three factors today which may be aggravating the dangers for children: (1) Increased mechanization; (2) New safety hazards - 50% of the ATV accidents (900 deaths over 5 years) have involved children; and (3) Stressful economic conditions.

"We believe Farmers Home Administration in Texas can make a tremendous contribution to this organization in reaching thousands of children and young adults in rural areas that would have otherwise been missed," Dennis Cumbie said.

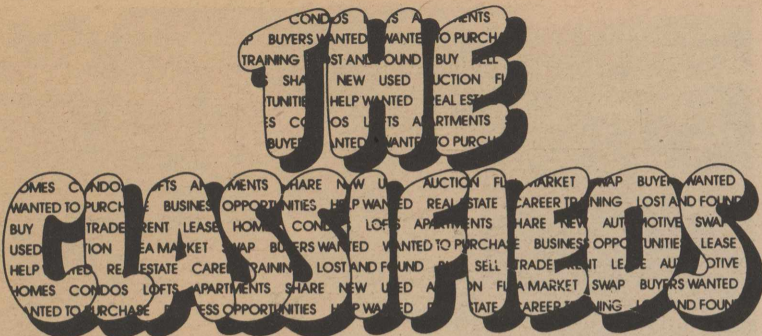

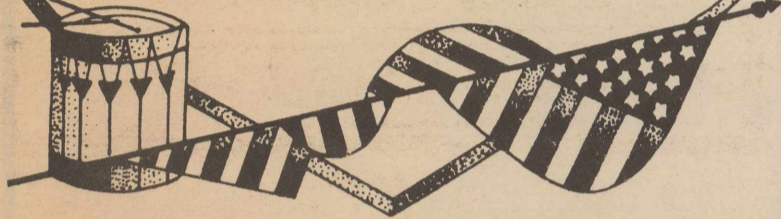
