Road bond issue defeated

A county-wide road bond election held Tuesday, November 27, in Coke County was soundly defeated by a total of 327-205 votes. Only 532 voters went to the polls in a dismal turnout; registered eligible voters number 2,226. The issue was turned down in every voting precinct. Absentee voters defeated the proposal 14-5; Precinct 1, 85-71; Precinct 2, 72-58; Precinct 3, 83-36; Precinct 4, 13-3; Precinct 5, 40-19; Precinct 9, 20-13.

The bond election, if passed, would have authorized county commissioners to issue bonds in the amount of \$970,000. and to levy tax-

King elected to third term

Former New Mexico Governor Bruce King was elected for a third separate term last week with 54% of the voters' support. He was returned to office after a busy, active campaign which included a train trip across New Mexico with a strong entourage of other state Democrats aboard. King, 66, of Stanley, New Mexico, was aided in his campaign by his hard-working wife, Alice.

Bruce King served the state as governor 1971-1974 and 1979-1982. He will take office for the third time January 1, 1991

Governor King is the son of the late Will King, a Coke County pioneer, and is a nephew of Dave King and Lillie Gaines, both of Robert Lee, and R. B. King of San Angelo. Local cousins include Alene Key, Lorraine Brooks, and Willie Eads.

Gary King, the governor's son, is also in politics. David King, 44, son of Sam King, is also following the family's political lead. He was elected state treasurer in a landslide victory after serving as a state employee for some time. He is governor-elect Bruce King's nephew



Over 300 educators, students, and their families attended the awards ceremony on November 3, 1990, hosted by the Texas Association of Educational Technology (TAET) and Texans' War on Drugs at the annual TAET Conference. Traci Standifier, 1990 Miss Teen Texas, spoke briefly to the attendees and presented the awards to winning students.

The Substance Abuse Prevention Media Fair is a unique project now in its fourth year of existence. Students from across the state of Texas compete by creating and producing drug prevention messages in the formats of audio, computer programming, video, photography, multi-media, and graphics. Winners are selected from each grade grouping: kindergarten through third, fourth through sixth, seventh through ninth, and tenth through twelfth grades.

Participating schools or school districts sponsor their own Media Fairs, with the winners going on to regional competition. Participating Education Service Centers throughout the state sponsor regional Media Fairs and submit the winners for state competition.

Texas Association of Educational Technology (whose membership includes media directors and coordinators of instructional resources within educational institutions), and Texans' War on Drugs, a statewide, nonprofit organization dedicated to the prevention of drug use through awareness and education, and Education Service Centers/Satellites which serve as the information link to/from school districts.



We have been fortunate enough this year to have grown a tremendous amount of grass and forage for livestock consumption, but once grass has stopped growing and loses its lush green appearance, it begins to get course and fibrous. We still have the abundant amount of forage out there, but it loses much of its protein content and becomes harder for livestock to digest.

Animals consuming diets that are lower in protein lose their appetites, develop a rough appearance, become weak and possess lowered resistance to disease, and overall growth, reproduction and weights of offspring are greatly reduced. There is a misconception that the animals can simply eat more to make up the needed nutrients, but since the grass is slowly digested, consumption is actually lowered and the animal receives even less nu-

If protein supplementation is added to this type of diet, the digestion will increase, and eventually the animal will eat more, thus gaining the re-

Protein supplements come in many forms and types, such as cubes, cakes, blocks, and liquids. Each will vary in nutrient composition and concentration and the producer should be aware of the actual protein content. comparing the price of feeds, figure the price by the pound of actual protein gained, and often this will point out that some of the so-called "bargain feeds" are actually more expensive for what you actually get from them.

The way livestock are handled during the winter will have an influence on her offspring's future and next year's

offspring as well. If cows are allowed to calf in poor and thin condition, the odds of her maintaining a 12 month calving interval are greatly reduced. Also, milking ability and the level of lactation the animal will have at parturition is influenced by their nutritional status from 6-8 weeks before calving or lambing. A female with lowered nutritional availability at this time will cause her to start milking poorly and more than likely stay that way. Another good point to remember is that although supplemental feed is expensive, it is cheaper to maintain weight than to try to put it back on at a later date next spring.



Healthy diets are high in complex carbohydrates which come in two forms: Simple carbohydrates or sugars (cakes, pastries, and candy, for example), which tend to raise blood-glucose levels very high and rather quickly, and often provide little nutrition and no fiber; and complex carbohydrates (vegetables, dried beans and peas, brown rice, and whole grain flours,

breads, and cereals, for example), which tend to raise blood glucose gradually over a longer period of time, and contain a variety of vitamins and minerals as well as fiber,

The American Diabetes Association stresses that good nutrition also means limiting fat and cholesterol from foods such as gravies, sauces, dressings, fatty meats, and fried foods, as well as eggs and some dairy products. Fat and cholesterol have been linked to atherosclerosis (fatty build-up inside blood vessel walls), and can contribute to heart disease and stroke. Some people may be encouraged to limit salt as well.

Jan Yanez, Coke County Extension agent (home economics), can provide some diabetic resources to help you select foods within your meal plan that will also be good, healthy treats during this holiday season.

One suggestion for diabetics is to eat fresh fruits or unsweetened canned fruits. A baked apple sweetened with artificial sweetener, cinnamon and dietetic lemonlime soft drink makes a festive dessert.

"Another holiday treat pumpkin custard - can be made of un-sweetened cooked pumpkin combined with artificial sweetener, cinnamon, ginger and saccharin. This baked custard would be counted as one half slice bread," according to the agent.

Plain or dietetic gelatins can be prepared with or without

fruits for many desserts. Try combining plain gelatin with low-calorie cranberry juice, artificial sweetener and orange rind. Pour into orange shells and refrigerate. If fruit is added to the gelatin, count the fruit as the fruit exchange for that meal.

"Many diabetics are unaware that they can eat regular ice cream - in limited amounts in place of a slice of bread and two fat exchanges.

"Avoid diabetic candy and ice cream because they may be high in fat, contain other forms of nutritive sweeteners such as sorbitol and xylitol and may be very expensive. Also, the labels may be confusing," Yanez said.

If diabetic ice creams are used, they must be calculated into the diet. Ask your dietitian to tell you the proper exchanges for each type of ice cream. For example, 1/2 cup of regular ice cream could be substituted for one starch/bread and two fat exchanges or servings. Onehalf cup servings of the following dairy desserts contain the following calories:

1/2 cup vanilla ice milk (4%) 92 calories


