Over 400 attend Bronte patriotic rally

Over 400 people converged on the Bronte Mini-Park for the Patriotic Rally held Friday afternoon, February 15. To start the afternoon, a Red, White, and Blue Parade involving Veterans, a Color Guard from the Concho Valley Vietnam Veterans of America #457, the local firetrucks, all Bronte School students and teachers, parents, and other citizens, started at the school and ended at the Mini-Park.

Once at the Mini-Park, Judge Royce Lee recognized the Veterans for their "contributions to our free society and heritage." He also mentioned how proud we are to have them as a "vital part of our effort to rally around our brave, loyal, and dedicated men and women in all the Armed Forces, but especially those in the War of Freedom, assembled in the Middle East." The crowd then joined in the Pledge of Allegiance. The Bronte Longhorn Band played the National Anthem and Phillip Bell, pastor of the United Methodist Church in Bronte and a veteran, gave the invocation.

Letters from State Representative Rob Junell and US Congressman Charlie Stenholm commending our efforts were then read by Judge Lee. Representative Junell wrote "gatherings such as this provide us all the opportunity to offer our support and concern for our family members and friends directly involved in this ordeal." Congressman Stenholm wrote us that "by standing together as a community in support of our soldiers, sailors, and airmen, Bronte is setting an example for America."

The Bronte Longhorn Band, under the direction of Homer Stewart, played a Military Medley. "Tribute to the Flag" was presented by Bronte Elementary student Michael Martinez. To round out the youngsters' part of the program, the Kindergarten, First, and Second grade students from Bronte Elementary then sang "You're A Grand Old Flag."

Judge Lee continued with a speech concerning the war in the Middle East and how some of our people will not return. He said we would yet. prevail and be triumphant but at what price. He mentioned that we should be proud to be Americans and Texans and to let the men and women serving in Desert Storm know that we love, respect, and tions." All who would like to honor them. He further added that it's "a shame that it takes such a monumental catastrophe as war to draw out the patriotism as we exhibit in this rally around our Troops, our Flag and our Country today. This, we should do regularly, without war." He then urged the entire group to join in singing "America" to end the Rally.

Bacteria such as salmonella cause as much as 90 percent of all food-borne illnesses in the United States. Nevertheless, more attention is focused on additives, pesticide residues, hormones and antibiotics, unfairly marking the United States food supply as unsafe.

America has the safest food supply in the world and a very effective system for monitoring safety. There are, however, some valid concerns about microbiological problems with our food supply.

Government regulation, food inspection and conscientious farming and production processes cannot control the biggest danger in food: Human error in food-handling causes up to 81 million cases of food-borne illness in the United States each year, resulting in up to \$17 billion in medical costs and lost productivity. Safety begins at home. Ironically, food-borne illness is the easiest to prevent by throroughly cooking foods to destroy bacteria, keeping raw and cooked foods separate and refrigerating raw and cooked foods promptly.

Bacteria are everywhere in the environment-- in the air, soil, water, our own digestive tracts and in other warmblooded animals. They can exist naturally in food or are introduced by a food handler, unclean equipment or another outside source. Bacteria thrive in foods rich in protein, especially meats, eggs and dairy products. Although animal industries fight bacteria


with careful processing, some still slip into the food supply. More often, bacteria contaminate a food during unsafe handling and preparation.

The easieat way to control bacteria, which thrive when left between 40 and 140 degrees Fahrenheit, is normal refrigeration and cooking. Under favorable conditions, bacteria can reproduce at a rate of one cell every 20 minutes; in eight hours one cell can become one billion cells.

The best way for food handlers to provide safe foods at home and in restaurants is to follow the FOUR C's: Clean your hands, utensils, equipment, working surfaces and foods that need to be washed. Cook foods until their temperatures reach at least 140 degrees F. Maintain foods above that temperature when serving. Chill foods immediately after purchasing and after serving. Maintain at a temperature of less than 40 degrees, freezers at 0 de-grees. Keep raw foods and any equipment used to prepare raw foods away from cooked and ready-to-eat foods to avoid Cross-contamination from bacteria.
