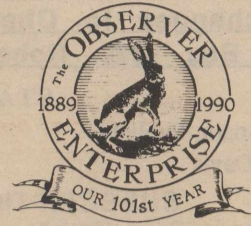

Horns qualify for state roundball playoffs

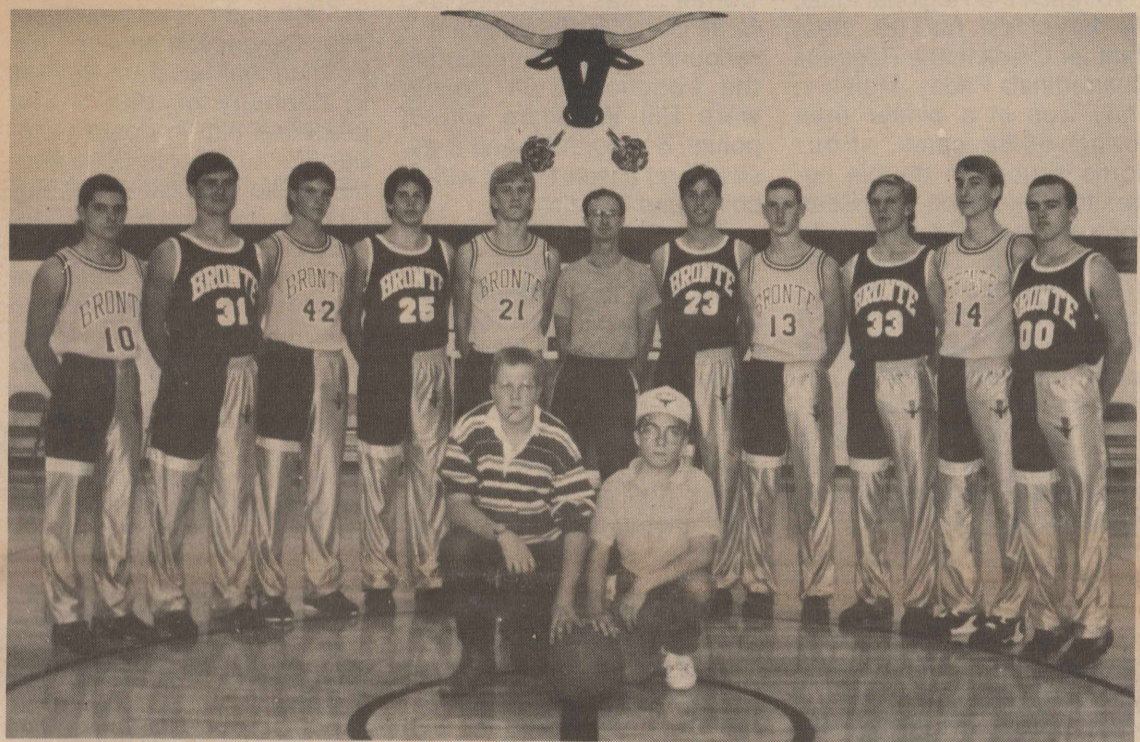
In the Bronte winning tradition, the Bronte Longhorn Boys Basketball Team is participating in the State playoffs after winning the Regional Tournament in Abilene last weekend.

The Horns were scheduled to meet Paducah at 8:30 am Thursday, March 7. At presstime, no results were yet available. If they win, they will play either Moulton or Tenaha at 9 am Saturday, March 8.

The Longhorns were awesome in the Regional Final last Saturday night, winning against Graford, 68-67, in four

overtimes. Senior Justin Phillips continued his outstanding season scoring by putting in 24 points. He also pulled down 10 rebounds, had 4 assists, and 6 steals. Seniors Brandon Marshall and Bill Windham were also necessary assets to the Longhorn team as they each scored 14 and 13 points respectively. Brandon added 8 assists and 3 steals while Bill had 5 rebounds and 8 assists. Senior Sean Conway contributed 9 points, followed by

Gazebo coming to Bronte

The Coke County town of Bronte, population 962, is going to be the new home of the Texas State Capitol gazebo that has been located on the grounds of the State Capitol in Austin since the 1988 Centennial celebration.

The Texas Senate voted last Thursday, February 28, to give it to Bronte.

Senator Bill Sims of San Angelo authorized the resolution transferring ownership of the structure to the town where townfolk are elated to use it as a tourist attraction.

The Senate Administration Committee recommended the gazebo to be given to the West Texas town a second time.

There was an attempted block by Sen. Krier of San Antonio to give it to that city until Sen. Sims persuaded committee members quoting "Bronte wants it free, and will move it free, and I can't think of a better deal."

The deal had been discussed with now Judge Royce Lee and Sen. Sims sometime in 1989 and on several occasions since. Mr. Lee first mentioned in Bronte on August 8, 1989 that he had asked for and agreed to accept the gazebo.

Judge Lee and Chester Wilson motored to Austin on February 28, 1991, for the purpose of evaluating mov-

High-speed chase ends in Robert Lee

The scenario in Robert Lee last Thursday had all the elements of a Grade B movie. It began south of San Angelo near Christoval with the familiar chase scene about 2 am. Two suspects apparently had stolen the 1991 Z-28 in Houston, Harris County, sometime the evening before. The car was pursued to San Angelo at speeds of 105-120 miles per hour. After eluding a number of officers, the same car was observed by Coke County Deputy Wayne McCutchen entering Bronte at high speed. As the suspects turned toward Robert Lee on Hwy 158 about 4 am, McCutchen gave chase and radioed for assistance. As Deputy Jeff Barnes started toward Bronte, he met the car as it turned down the Robert Lee Cemetery road and went into the sanitary landfill lane. Barnes followed the car and was almost run down as the suspects, realizing the dirt road deadended, came back out and headed west up Hwy 208.

McCutchen and Barnes were joined by Sheriff Marshall Millican, DPS Trooper

Roy Blair, and Game Warden Sparks Burdett. According to officers, the suspects eluded the pursuit by turning off their car lights on Sanco road. After daylight, the car was found abandoned near the Sanco Cemetery.

The Sheriff's Office warned area residents to watch for two suspects on foot and get keys from vehicles. The local officers were joined in the manhunt by law officers from Sterling City and San Angelo; including DPS Sgt. Truman Richey and Trooper Carlos DeLaRosa. United States Customs personnel brought the department's helicopter and other light planes joined the search. About noon, two suspects were located in an occupied house in Robert Lee and were taken to the Sheriff's Office for questioning.

Sheriff Millican said initial proof was not available that the two were indeed the occupants of the stolen vehicle but some lab analysis results are forthcoming. The suspects were released and no charges had been filed at presstime Wednesday. Milli-

can said of the two male suspects that one is a juvenile not yet 16 years old.

Harris County officials will have the option to file charges in the car theft. The late model car was impounded in the county yard.

Senior Jason Pierce with 7 points and Darrell Lucas with 5 rebounds and the most important point of his entire season.

To reach the Regional Final, the boys first had to meet Panther Creek in the Regional Quarterfinals Friday, March 1. They won in a closer than normal 56-52 game. Four Horns scored in double figures that afternoon with Sean Conway leading the way with 14 points and 13 rebounds. Justin Phillips put in 13 points, 15 rebounds, and 3 steals, while Darrell Lucas added 12 points and 8 rebounds, and Brandon Marshall went up for 10 points and 3 steals. Rounding out the Longhorn scoring list was Bill Windham with 7 points, 5 rebounds, 6 assists, and 3 steals.

The Regional Semi-Finals followed with Bronte matching up against #5 state-ranked Brock. The Horns came away with a 64-60 win to send them to the Finals later that night.

Again scoring in double figures were Justin Phillips with 18 points, 15 rebounds, and 3 steals; Brandon Marshall 17 points, 4 assists, and 3 steals; Darrell Lucas 11 points; and Sean Conway 10 points and 7 rebounds. Also contributing the Longhorns' 64 points were Bill Windham with 6 points, 5 rebounds, and 8 assists, and Jason Pierce with 2 points and 4 assists.

In Bronte's first State playoff since 1987, when they lost to Paducah in the Championship and this year's seniors were eighth graders, the Horns are ready to bring home the State Title. This year, Bronte is going into the State Tournament with an impressive 28-4 record and a remarkable 3-point shot team percentage of 40%.

Bronte can be proud of Coach Rocky Rawls and his Longhorns. They're representing our city very well. If at all possible, make the trip to Austin and support the Longhorns. They've earned it!!!

Congratulations are pouring in all over since publicity has been in several large city newspapers.

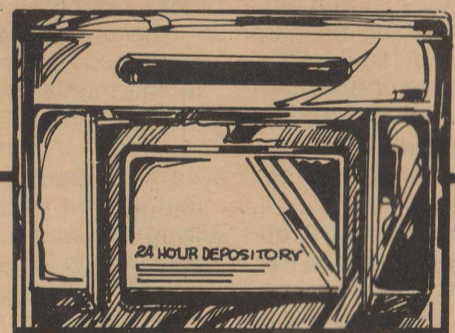
There will be meetings in the near future to decide who, how, and when the removal and transportation to Bronte will occur.

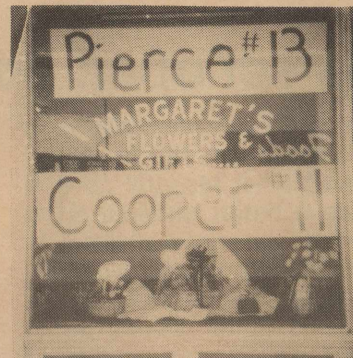

Dear Editor;

I met Jim Dunnam in 1974 when I was covering Bronte Longhorns football for the San Angelo Standard-Times and Jim was the crack student statistician for the Longhorns from his wheelchair. His skill then was crucial to my reportage because I never was very good at keeping up with exactly who was doing what to whom during a football game.

I lost track of Jim when I left Angelo in '76 but ran into him after I returned to Abilene in '86 and discovered while I was fiddling around with several other newspapers and worse jobs in that decade, Jim had taken one college degree in mass communications and radio-tv, then another degree in education with majors in history and English; taught at The Bridge for three years; and operation his own Video business - while doing volunteer work at the ACU Library, serving as a spokesman for the Muscular Dystrophy Association, and assisting with

the MDA Telethon for several years.

I know that Jim had great support from his fine parents, but his busy and productive joint careers in business, education, and public service must stand as a major testimonial to the indomitability of the human spirit.

Jim achieved more in his 34 years than most people I know with a lot more mobility, and his memory will be honored by the many West Texans whose lives were touched by him.

The final segment of the women's program will have Rollins presenting "A New Meaning for the Equal Rights Amendment - The Animal Rights Issue Coming Home."

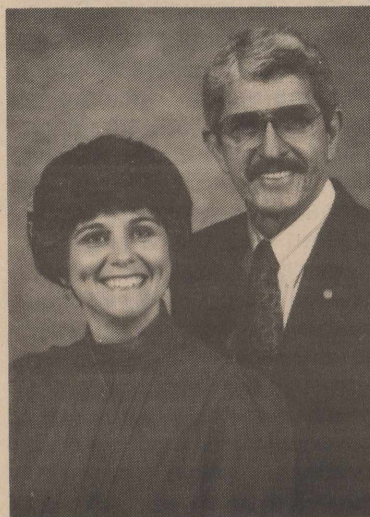

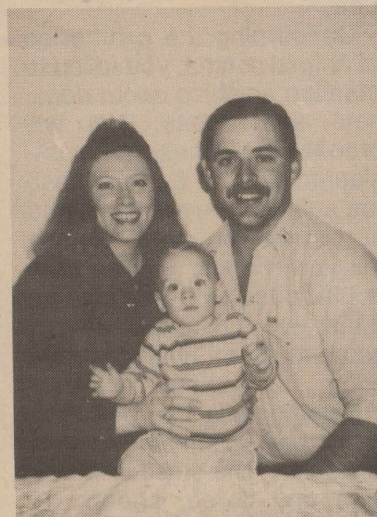
C-S Farm Bureau fills local positions

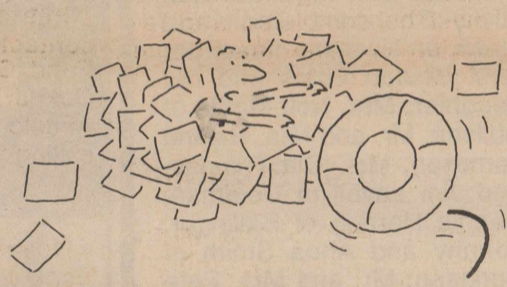
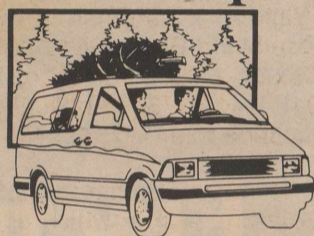
The group encountered heavy snow, with a final total of close to 20" of new snow

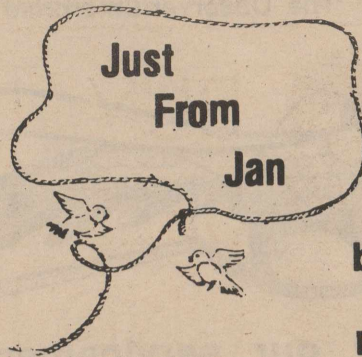
After two phone calls, the group gathered at the home of Pat Oglesby for an old-fashioned fried chicken supper "like mother used to cook."

City faces higher costs for water

In a recent budget workshop meeting, the Robert Lee City Council spent much time on the costs and income in both the water and sewer departments, and a possible deficit for the upcoming year. The costs of operating both the water and sewer has risen sharply in the past several years. The cost of the purchase of water from Spence in the past year was \$24,000.00, the highest the city has ever encountered. The city is facing a possibly higher cost for water for the next year. The sewer department is still making bond payments on the plant, and as the plant gets older, the costs of operating it and keeping it up to standards has increased. The city is now facing quite a large expenditure to bring the plant up to state standards. After much work and discussion, the council has determined it will be necessary to increase both water and sewer rates for the next fiscal year. The last water rate increase was in 1985, and the last sewer rate increase in 1988. The details of these rate increases will be finalized in the next regular meeting of the council on March 11.
