The Bronte Longhorns were named the Class A State Runners-Up last Saturday in Austin after losing a hard game to Moulton, 53-44, in the Championship Finals.

Their first game in Austin was the State Semi-Final Thursday morning, March 7,

against Paducah, the team they lost to in the 1987 State Championship Final. This time, however, the Longhorns started on top and never looked back. The final score of the game was Bronte 72 - Paducah 65. In true winning form, five Longhorns

This was Moulton's third year in a row to come to the State Tournament and make it to the Finals and they came ready to play. Trustees who will remain on the panel are Ray Aldridge, Bill Burns, Mary Grim, and Darrel Pitcock.

Applications for those wishing to be a candidate can be filed at the Superintendent's Office Monday through Friday, 8 am until 4 pm, from February 18, 1991 until March 20, 1991. Anyone wanting to run as a write-in candidate must file an application with the school also. The deadline for filing this application is April' 4, 1991.

According to West Coke County Hospital District Administrator John McDermett, that entity's board of directors will convene on Monday evening, March 18, and will set an election date at that time.



Adding a little chocolate may be the ticket for getting children to drink milk, one of the best sources of bonebuilding calcium. meaning parents who keep their kids from drinking chocolate-flavored milk may actually be keeping them from drinking milk altogether.

New York University researchers found that when offered whole milk, 1% milk or 1% chocolate-flavored milk, sixth grade students always choose more of the chocolate milk. One cup of milk contributes almost 1/4 the recommended dietary allowances of calcium for school age children and adolescents. This concern for calcium intake is important.

Osteoporosis has become a well-recognized word to most people. It is a disease caused in part by the lack of adequate calcium to strengthen the bones. During their developmental years children need lots of calcium during the critical developmental period can cause the bones to be less dense, more fragile, and more susceptible to breaks and fractures. This brittle bone disease is called osteoporo-

Dairy products are the primary source of dietary calcium. By consuming four servings of milk daily children can be assured they are getting the calcium they need to build strong bones for a healthy future.


A common misconception about milk is that if it is flavored chocolate for instance, it is less nutritious than unflavored milk. Not true. The nutrient content of chocolateflavored milk is similar to that of unflavored milk, with the exception of higher carbohydrates and calories. These extra calories in chocolate milk are easily burned off by children who are active. Also, available is lowfat chocolate milk, which has all the nutrients of unflavored milk.

Research shows that by offering children chocolate milk they are more likely to choose and drink the flavored milk there by getting the valuable nutrients milk provides, including calcium. Research has also shown that the availability of chocolate milk does not affect the amount of food kids eat, and, when chocolate milk is available, the percentages of students selecting some form of milk is in-

Milk, both flavored and unflavored, provides significant amounts of several nutrients including protein, fat, carbohydrates and several vitamins and minerals. And the addition of chocolate to milk may be the ticket for getting finicky children to drink milk.

The State Board of Education on February 16 in Austin approved the following University Interscholastic League rule changes involving athletics.


UIL rule changes are:

2. Require that a coach ejected from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct, or a football coach who receives three unsportsmanlike penalties in one game, be given a public reprimand and placed on probation for one calendar

3. Allow seniors to try out at a neutral site and be observed by representatives from more than one college at a time.

4. Remove the restriction, except in football contact activities from practicing with or against college athletes at a


