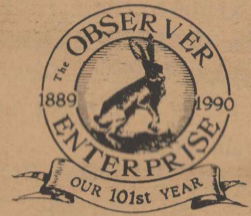

Candidates file for seats in local elections

Coke County taxing entities have set elections for May 4 for the purpose of electing those members of their respective governing bodies whose terms will expire.

The Robert Lee Independent School District will have three seats vacated on the board of trustees. The terms of Edwin "Butch" Davis, Gaylon Pitcock, and Jim Clendenen will expire. Deadline for filing for these positions was Wednesday, March 20, at 4 pm. At presstime Wednesday, three candidates had filed - incumbents Davis and Beverly Burdett. Trustees who will remain on the panel are Ray Aldridge, Bill Burns, Mary Grim, and Darrel Pitcock.

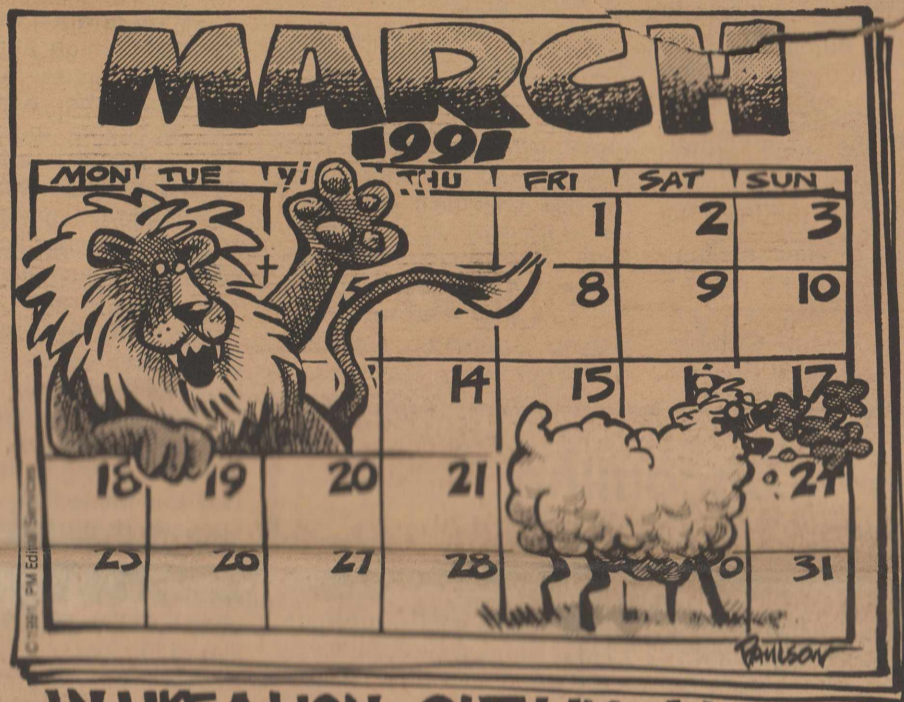
Four city council members, three for a regular term of two years and one for an unexpired term of one year, will be elected by the City of Robert Lee's qualified voters. Filing deadline was also on March

20 and at presstime Wednesday morning four candidates had filed - A. L. (Speedy) Brasuell for the unexpired term to which he was appointed to fill Joe Barrett's term, and for regular terms, Sparks Burdett, incumbent Joe Brazier, and Mary Cherry.

Members whose terms expire are Ruth Luna, Richard Johnson, Joe Brazier, and Speedy Brasuell. Remaining on the governing body are Councilman Keith Eubanks and Mayor Jackie Walker.

The West Coke County Hospital District board of seats on its panel. Joy Bagwell and Kenneth Green's terms expire; both have filed for re-election. Directors who will remain on the board are Jack Thomason, Linda Arledge, and Ruth Robertson. Filing deadline for the hospital board election is April

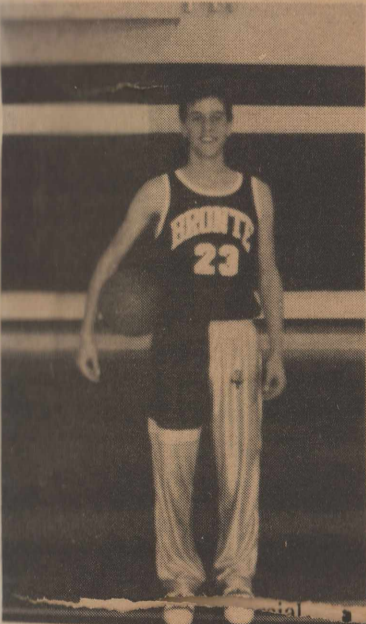

In the Journalism portion of the contest, Janet Pentecost, Wendy Lamar, and Lori Renfroe will compete in Editorial Writing. Headline Writers will be Lori Wink, Jody Brasher, and Brandy Hayes. News Writers and Feature Writers will be Lori Renfroe, Lori Wink, and Shelbi Grim.

"Although the UIL is more often associated with athletic competition, more students compete in the academic contests," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director. "In fact, the League began as a debating league in 1910 and then later merged with a track and field association to form the basis for the current organization. Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests."

Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. "Long before the development of other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in writing, speaking, mathematics, and science," Marshall added.

UIL academic contests cover several subject areas including math, science, business, language arts, journalism, speech, and theatre.

Recently, contests in current issues and events and computer skills were added.

The purpose of the UIL academic program is to use competition to develop students' higher order thinking skills. "A primary objective for League directors is to maintain a high correlation between what is taught in the classroom and what is required of students involved in extracurricular competition," said Janet Wiman, UIL academic director. "Consequently, as much emphasis is placed on the educational context of the contests as is placed on the contests themselves."

Students who compete at the State Meet level also qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1990-91, the TILF awarded more than \$490,000 in scholarship grants to 380 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1991-92, the TILF expects to award an estimated 480 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$590,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals, and families.

The TILF has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

Spring means warmer weather is coming and it is time to clean and store your winter clothing. Clean all items before storing. Even tiny spots of soil or food make the fabric more susceptible to staining, mildew and insect infestations. Launder washable items and garments, but avoid using laundry additives such as fabric softener and starch. Fabric softeners tend to yellow with age and starch attracts insects.

Reduce dry cleaning costs by having "dry clean only" garments cleaned, but not pressed. Store wool garments in moth repellent (balls, flakes, or crystals), but avoid putting moth repellent in baby or children's cotton clothing.

Tailored and professional clothing should be stored on padded hangers protected in a cloth garment bag. Avoid storing garments in plastic whenever possible. Plastic garment bags and dry cleaner bags trap moisture during the humid summer season and sometimes cause garments to become yellowed and discolored. The print from dry cleaner bags has been known to degrade onto garments leaving an ink stain.

If you do not have closet space available for winter garments, then store the sleeves and shoulders with tissue pa-

per. Store in a tissue lined box. Choose large flat boxes so that the garments may be folded fewer times and are not crushed by the weight of other garments. Store the heaviest garments on the bottom and lighter weight garments on top.

Good places to store out-of-season garments include the "far end" of a bedroom closet, under the bed, and the top shelves of a clothes closet. Avoid hot attics, damp basements and damp garages, because mold and mildew grow in humid conditions. Also avoid storing good clothes next to the outside wall because outside walls tend to draw dampness with outside temperature fluctuations.

ASCS exempts cover crop

The Texas State ASC Committee today exempted Texas from the fifty percent cover crop requirement on Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) acres according to Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee.

The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 required that half of the acreage set-aside under the commodity programs be planted to a cover crop. The legislation also allowed for the exemption of those areas determined to be arid by USDA.

The determination to exclude Texas was based on meteorological data that shows the line between non-arid and arid regions running from North Dakota through Texas. All states east of the line are not considered arid and must comply with the 50% cover requirement. Most states west of the line are considered arid and do not have to comply with the 50% cover

requirement. "Since this line runs through Texas, the Texas State ASC Committee determined to exclude all of the state from the 50% cover requirement," Harris said.

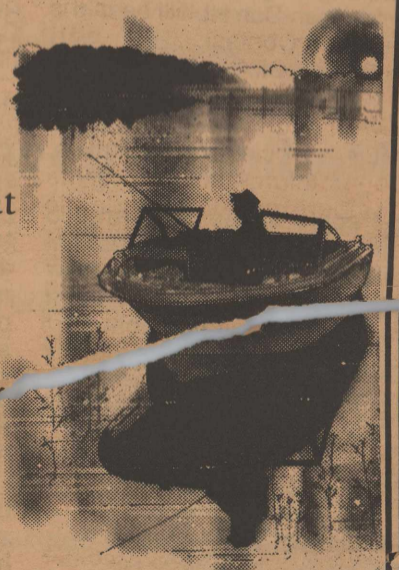

2 medium onions, chopped	1/8 tsp. freshly ground black pepper
1 small green bell pepper, chopped	1/8 tsp. paprika

Boil potatoes in water 20 to 25 minutes, or until tender. Remove from heat and add cold water until potatoes are cooled slightly. Peel and cut into 1-inch cubes.

In a large non-stick skillet, sauté onions and green pepper in oil until tender. Add potatoes and sprinkle with black pepper and paprika. Cook over medium heat 10 minutes or until potatoes are browned, stirring frequently. Serve hot.

Makes 5 servings.

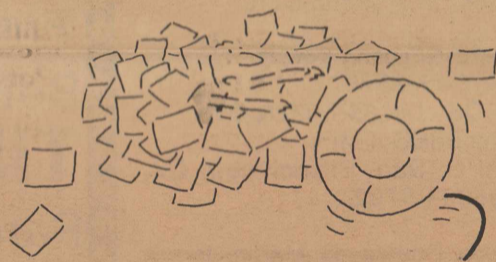
