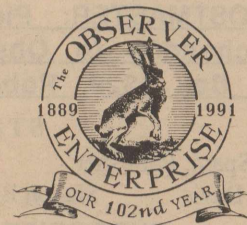

Rabbit Twister Festival plans take shape

A steering committee from the West Coke County Community Development has completed plans which began months ago for the Rabbit Twister Festival to be held on Saturday, July 20. The day's events promise to relieve mid-summer boredom for all the family. Something for everyone will be offered.

The festival will begin with a super parade line-up of 31 confirmed entries. Grand Marshals for the procession will be KLST's Donna Davis and Lou Kordek in Herbert Horeis's horse-drawn carriage. The Ft. Concho Color Guard will lead the parade followed

Parade entries will gather at Fern Havins Park in south Robert Lee at 9:30 am and be ready to go at 10 am.

The parade route will allow everyone to watch. From the

park, it will proceed east to Hwy 158, north on the highway to 7th St. (the watertower) and turn west one block to the main street of Austin. At Austin, the lineup will go north through downtown to Hwy 208 (10th St.). At the red light, the parade will turn left and continue to the Davis Grocery corner. A left turn on Bishop and a left on 8th will take the parade in front of West Coke County Nursing Home for the residents' pleasure. The parade will make a right turn on Chadbourne and go south to disband back at

Craft booths, food booths, exhibits, contests, and entertainment will be available in the downtown area and behind the courthouse. Buggy and wagon rides will take folks around town. The Coke County Museum (the historic jail) will be open to visitors 1:30 - 3:30 pm.

A Petting Zoo will entertain children while gun fights and a bank robbery will break out on what may be the last frontier.

Contests will include a bonnet contest which can include any headgear of the era. Old fancy hats, cowboy hats, derbys, etc. will be accepted in the contest. No entries - just come by and join in the fun!

The Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau has scheduled this year's Miss Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau Contest for Friday, August 2, 1991. This year, a Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau Talent Find Contest will be held on the same day, Friday, August 2, 1991.

Eligible participants for each contest must be between 16 and 21 years of age by September 1, 1991. Participants must be single and a family member of the Coke-Sterling Farm Bureau membership.

Winners of each contest will compete at the District level in Stanton, Texas, on August 12, 1991. Each district winner will be awarded a \$600 college scholarship by Texas Farm Bureau. District winners and their escorts will receive an expense-paid trip to the State level Miss TFB Contest and Farm Bureau Talent Find Contest in Lubbock, Texas, November 30 - December 1, 1991. The district winner must compete in the state contest in order to receive the district level scholarship. The

state winner will be awarded a \$2,000 college scholarship and the state runner-up will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship.

New scenes highlight Ole Coke County

Plan to be in Robert Lee on Friday and Saturday of the last two weekends in July to attend "Ole Coke County, Home of the Rabbit Twisters!" On those nights, July 19, 20, and July 26, 27, the best show of the year can be seen at Mountain Creek Amphitheatre, located between the two ball parks on the north end of Austin Street.

The annual production involves more than a hundred citizens from Bronte, Robert Lee, and the surrounding county area, all native Rabbit Twisters or adopted by marriage or a move into the county. Experiences of pioneers and ancestors are portrayed from Chief Sanaco's Comanche camp in 1854 through the elimination of "likker" in early 1900.

Much work has gone into improving the theatre on the banks of Mountain Creek, transforming the site to extend the feeling of stepping back in time with weathered wood buildings on Twister Avenue. Family heritage items have been donated to accentuate that feeling, such as the windmill and well donated by Dr. and Mrs. Phil Ray

At 8 pm each of the four nights of production, guests will see Indian riders on "The Hill" in costume; Indian mothers and children will play back stage, and the Pageant Choir will begin a 20 minute concert of patriotic songs as a patriotic salute to veterans of all wars. Coke County and other veterans are asked to be present to be recognized. Every American will be thrilled by the presentation of the Colors, and the Pledging to our beautiful and meaningful Stars and Stripes.

At 8:30 pm, the play itself will be introduced by Harrell Johnston, The Rabbit Twister (the narrator) with knowledge of headline news, will narrate information and link the story of "Ole Coke County" from days of Comanche Indians to the victory of the Great Temperance Movement of 1910.

Children through five will be admitted free. Children 6-12 are \$3, and adults are \$6. Bus loads of 20 or more will receive a 20% discount.

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CRP sign-up continues thru July 19

Texans will have an opportunity to get more of a good thing during the 11th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign up July 8-19, 1991.

The CRP pays a fee to land users who agree to put land into permanent vegetative cover for 10 years.

During the first 10 sign-ups, most Texas cropland farmers could count on bids of \$40 or less per acre being accepted.

However, Secretary of Agriculture William Richards says farmers should not rely on that formula when making their bids this time.

"Under the new CRP provisions, bids on eligible land will be accepted based on environmental benefits obtained per dollar of cost," Richards said. "Producers who wish to enroll in the CRP should be aware that there is increased competition."

Texas' State Conservationist Wes Oneth says that land eligible for previous CRP sign ups included land that was highly erodible, land useful as filter strips next to permanent bodies of water, cropped wetlands, or areas subject to stream scour.

Oneth says land eligibility requirements will be expanded for this sign up to include cropland acres that could affect water quality and well heads, which are sources of

water for municipalities. It will also include alley cropping which would allow producers to plant strips of hardwood trees and continue to farm between tree rows.

Richards says that to increase water quality benefits under CRP, producers offering areas such as filter strips, grass waterways, windbreaks, shelter belts and contour grass strips will receive additional consideration during the bid evaluation process.

Richards adds that bids for enrolling wetlands will not be accepted during this sign up because the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 establishes a Wetland Reserve Program.

Richards says producers can simultaneously enter the same acreage into the annual commodity programs and CRP. They can withdraw from the commodity programs without penalty if the CRP bid is accepted. Acceptance of a bid is not binding to either the producer or USDA until the contract is signed.

Oneth says he is glad that another CRP sign up has been approved because it is one of the best soil conservation programs ever.

"In the first 10 CRP sign ups, Texans had 3.9 million

acres of land accepted into the program, Oneth says. "On average, erosion was reduced by 36 tons on each of those acres as a result of the program. That's over 40 million tons of soil that did not erode as a direct result of the Conservation Reserve Program."

Oneth says the program keeps soil - and agricultural chemicals added to the soil - from reaching water supplies. He explains that without vegetative cover to keep soil on erosive sites, it washes away, eventually reaching streams, lakes, ponds, and underground water supplies. Once there, it reduces the quantity and quality of water for fish, wildlife, and humans.

"When a program does as much good as the Conservation Reserve Program does, you've got to like it," Oneth says.
