Post Office Will Have All New Equipment in South Side Location

It will have a large plate glass front, and entrance lobby or vestibule will be on the west side of the front. A 12-foot lobby will extend across the entire front section of the building. Another lobby, approximately seven feet wide, will extend along the west side of the in-terior for a distance of 40 feet. Lock boxes, approximately 500 in number, will be arranged along the west lobby, Mail drops will also be located at the front in the west lobby. General delivery, money or-

General delivery, money or-der, and two stamp windows will be located across the front of the lobby. Entrance into the work room section of the post office will be through doors at the east side of the front lobby and at the end of the 40-foot lobby on the west side.

Floors throughout the building will be of asphalt tile over concrete.

New furniture and equipment items which have been requisitioned include the following: Two lobby desks, dumping and stamping table, parcel post dumping table, canceling machine table, wing mailing letter case

The Haskell post office will have practically all new equipment and fixtures when it is moved to new quarters on the south side of the courthouse square early next year.

Examination disclosed that the bobcat was wearing a collar and tag, indicating that it had likely been a pet at one time. The bob-



Producers Should Sell Only Market Ready Turkeys

Quality birds sold in top market condition are the turkeys which please the consumers, says F. Z. Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension

The number of turkeys to be marketed this fall is not much different from last fall. Retail prices at n't likely to differ much either, says Beanblossom But, he adds, the competition with turkey marketing agencies in other states for sales in the consuming centers is a cencern of Texas producers.

Turkeys which are well feathered, meaty and have a good distribution of fat under the skin are always in the greatest market demand. Rushing turkeys to market before they are properly finished depresses the whole marketing process, explains Beanblossom.

According to the specialist, the ideal market bird is fully feathered on the back, breast, tail and underneath the wings, Few undeveloped feathers in these areas means the bird will pick well. Housewives won't be annoyed by having to pull pin feathers. A good covering of fat under the skin makes the bird easier to process but most im-portant, says Beanblossom, a well-finished bird has eye appeal for the consumer.

Producers can determine the correct marketing date by making careful observations of the entire flock and by handling a few individual birds from time to time. The degree of fatness can be checked by looking at the skin covering the breast, particularly in front of the thigh area, says Beanblossom.
