Lee signs proclamation

County Judge Royce Lee has proclaimed the week of October 6-12, 1991, as "Fire Prevention Week" in Coke County.

The Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday through Saturday period in which falls October 9, the date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings.

In his proclamation, Judge Lee has called upon the citizens of Coke County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such as locating and eliminating fire hazards; checking smoke detectors and developing a home escape plan; as the 1991 theme suggests . . . "Fire Won't Wait . . . Plan Your Escape!"

Robert M. Brown of Bronte, President of the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control." Protect yourself by keeping fire a

 Regularly inspect your house and outbuildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage, heaters and heating system. Make needed repairs or replacements without delay. Don't overload circuits or bypass fusing.

· Remove trash, stacks of papers, and other unneeded combustibles that could feed

 Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mix-up. Never use a kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area - have ample ventilation.

· Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote buildup.

 Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.

· Don't smoke in bed nor when drowsy. Don't smoke when using flammable materials nor in places that have readily combustible materials such as hay, straw, dry weeds, grain dust, etc. Store flammable liquids in wellmarked, closed containers. Make sure your cigarette or match is "out" before discarding.

 Install approved lightning protection systems on main buildings. Inspect them annually to make sure they are properly grounded.

· Be prepared for fire should it strike. Have operating smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach children how to call for help. Have a water supply available to fight fire.

· Choose and regularly inspect fire extinguishers that are the right size and type for the fires that might occur.

· Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.

Cody Holland scored a touchdown on a 25 yard run. Nicholas Arrott then completed a 65 yard pass to Kale Beck for another six points.


The final score was made on a 25 yard run by Russel Vaughn.





Tax permit fee abolished

"New businesses that are scheduled to open their doors on or after October 1 and have already paid the \$25 sales tax permit fee, will have their money refunded," State Comptroller John Sharp says. "The same applies to existing businesses that have already filed to have their sales tax permit renewed on or after October 1."

The refunds coincide with the announcement that the annual \$25 sales tax filing fee paid to the Comptroller's Office is abolished, effective October 1.

"Not only will the \$25 fee be abolished, but we're also going to issue a sales tax permit to a business for an indefinite period of time. As long as they are making sales and sending their taxes to the state, businesses won't be required to renew those permits every year, as they are now," Sharp said.

According to Mickey Moore, president of the Texas Association of Retailers, merchants are delighted to see the permit fee abolished. "They felt all along that it was inappropri-

mit fee abolished. "They felt all along that it was inappropriate to ask them to pay a fee for the privilege of collecting sales tax for the state," Moore said.

"Since it was first enacted by the Legislature in 1987, the \$25 annual sales tax permit fee has generated more mail from angry business people than any issue handled by this agency in the last 20 years," Sharp said.

"Hundreds upon hundreds of business owners were mad that they had to pay a \$25 fee every year to collect taxes for the State of Texas. It didn't make any sense to me either, but that was the law--a law that needed changing," he said.

"While the fee generated substantial state revenue-estimated at \$12.6 million in 1992 and \$14 million in 1993-it also generated more animosity among Texas business people toward state government than you can place a dollar value on," Sharp said.

Also eliminated is the requirement that sales tax permits be renewed annually. Beginning October 1, the permits will only be cancelled if a taxpayer reports no sales or taxable purchases to the state for a year's time, or if the business does not file its sales tax returns and remit the taxes it collected to the state.

WTU announces rate reduction

Customers of West Texas
Utilities Company have some
good news in the form of lower costs for electricity beginning with October bills. The
lower costs are produced by a
one-time credit and a reduction in the fuel cost portion of

"Our continuing efforts to lower boiler fuel costs and related transportation costs were successful and prompted the reduction," said Billy Kelly, WTU's area Those efforts manager. include renegotiation of supply and transportation agreements, construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide better access to suppliers, and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so they burn less fuel to make electricity.

The credit will be issued on customer's electric bills during the billing month of October. An average residential customer using 660 kilowatt hours of electricity will see a reduction of \$13.17 on the bill that month. The actual reduction for each customer is based on their previous month's use of electricity.

The reduction in the fuel portion of the electric bill will be in effect for all upcoming months. According to Billy Kelly, it will mean an average 3.5% reduction from costs last

The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) recently granted the company's request to reconcile fuel costs for April 1987 through December 1990 and adjust the fuel portion of the bill to recover projected fuel costs. WTU filed the request last February.

West Texas Utilities Company serves 177,000 customers in a 52 county area that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.



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Stenholm supports rules

Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) expressed strong support of the new rules House Speaker Tom Foley unveiled today concerning Members Congress who bounce checks at the House of Representatives Bank.

"I think it is ridiculous that Members of Congress should be bouncing checks without paying a penalty or making any effort to rectify their situation," said Stehnolm. "We should be treated no better than anyone else."

According to a recent Government Accounting Office (GAO) report, 134 House Members bounced a total of 4,325 checks at the House bank in the first half of 1990. The report also found that 581 of those checks were for amounts over \$1,000.

When the amounts were repaid, no penalties were charged by the bank.

Speaking on the floor of the House of Representatives, Foley announced that the practice of bouncing checks at the House bank without penalty has ended. He stated that from now on, bounced checks will be assessed a service charge and that no checks drawn against an account with insufficient funds will be honored.

"There will be no exceptions, regardless of seniority," said Foley. "The rules will be followed and upheld."

Stenholm, who has not

bounced a check during his time in Congress, stated he is in favor of the new rules and is optimistic that this will rectify the situation.
